

65 Years of Marriage for Jim and Norma

Norma and Jim Bullen have been married for 65 years. Very few couples reach such a magnificent milestone - it must be the healthy hills air.

These long-term Roleystone residents are both 89 this year (Jim wants it known that he is not there yet!) and are still living independently. They have lived here, on and off, since the 1960's when they immigrated from England. Between them they have 4 children, 17 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren. All four of their children were present at their 'quiet celebration' on the 17th April when they went to a buffet lunch at the Esplanade in Fremantle. Eldest son Andrew came over from New Zealand for the occasion.

Both Norma and Jim were born and grew up in England. They met during WW2 when Jim was stationed in Bristol and Norma was a telephonist working in the highly secretive Bristol war office. Norma was responsible for connecting calls and she soon found herself becoming 'quite fond' of one of her callers. She did not allow any of the other girls to handle calls from his particular number. They chatted frequently and became quite friendly and then Jim asked to meet with her.

Jim had to catch the bus to the rendezvous spot and when he alighted Norma complained: 'You are quite late'. Jim's quick response was: 'it's not me that is late, it is the bus'.

Norma took Jim home to meet with her parents and have a cocoa - they approved of her choice and Jim and Norma became

Soon after this, Jim was soon sent with his unit to Burma to assist in preventing the southern movement of the Japanese. When Burma was overthrown Jim was not captured and their unit was pushed to the hilly wild jungle area of northern Burma where he spent the next three years. Norma and Jim wrote to each other every day for four years but the correspondence didn't arrive regularly. Norma recalls getting letters in batches of 6 at a time.

After three years Jim was offered his first leave - 28 days back to England. When he arrived in April 1945, Norma had 'the wedding all planned' (being in the middle of the war, most of the finery was borrowed). 'The bridesmaids wore blue', Norma remembers. They married on the 28th April 1945 on a wet drizzly day. They had a two-week honeymoon and then Jim returned to Burma a married man.

Jade Chamberlain Soon to Appear in a Cinema Near You

In the December 2009 Courier we were happy to report that Jade had recently returned from Sydney after working with the Casting Director of the teen sagas Twilight and New Moon. Jade had taken part in the Professional Actors Workshop series offered by AIPA (the Australian Institute of Performing Arts).

Now all of the hard work has paid off as she has been invited to be an extra in Cloudstreet, a 1950's story, based on the book by Perth author Tim Winton.

This is currently being filmed as a 6-hour mini series and due to be shown on T.V later this year. Jade is very excited as this is her very first paid acting job!

Competition for acting roles in Perth for younger teens is very fierce so Jade's success is great news for the young Roleystone lass. Jade has been very fortunate to have received the opportunity to work with some very experienced cast and crew in Cloudstreet.

The old Sunset Hospital in Dalkeith has been painstakingly renovated to resemble an authentic 1950's Perth street. The Lamb and Pickles families share a home at this location in the 1950's and the story is based on the relationships between the families over the years that the family share the home.

As part of accepting the role Jade had to undergo a 1950's blunt bob haircut. She did this without hesitation and stated that: 'I would go bald if that's what I had to do to be in Cloudstreet!'.

Jade's character wears a 1950's school uniform and she appears as a schoolgirl playing hopscotch, attending school and doing typical schoolgirl activities.

She has also been involved in 'an accident scene'. Jade's passion is to be an actor and she has learned a lot just by being on set. 'This is all great experience for me. Sometimes we have to do things over and over again. Last week we had to shoot the same scene several times. The Extras Director commented that I looked like I was having a

good time; and I was! I was having heaps of fun. If I could do it all day every day I would.'


'The cast and crew I've worked with have been fantastic and I have learned as much as I can while I was there. I can't wait to see the mini series on T.V.'



Dawn O'Meagher was recently invited to the launch of the book Until the Boys Return, the history of the Australian Women's Land Army in WA.

During World War Two the massive number of able bodied young men marching off to war, left a huge shortfall in farming properties across Western Australia. This gap was partly filled by a large number of young women who volunteered to go 'onto the land' to do what they could until the boys came home. These ladies were known as The Australian Women's Land Army (AWLA).

The history of the land army in WA has now been eloquently told in a booklet launched on April 8th. All the living Land Girls were invited and those who were able to make it to the event were treated to a wonderful feast and lauded for their efforts. Dawn was number 61 of the 280 girls in WA and one of the earliest to volunteer. She had many placements, not all happy (one she ran away from!) She fondly remembers her placement at Illawarra Orchard in Karragullen and spent the next 48 years on another Karragullen orchard, so this proved to be very good training for her! Many of the young girls were in their teens and the majority were from the metropolitan area. Few had the rural skills needed for their new occupations. Some told of hard work and some remembered that they were not always treated well but many of the memories were joyous. Most had the attitude: 'As long as I am needed I will carry on.'

Many of the girls who joined the land army met their future husbands while they were inservice. Four Land Army Girls found husbands while serving in Karragullen: Dawn O'Meagher (wife of Bill dec), Ethel Smailes (wife of Ken dec), Daphne Spriggs (whose husband was the late George Spriggs MLA) and Joan Smith (who left the area some years ago). Dawn and Ethel married local lads and became important contributors to the community. In 1995 Dawn moved to Roleystone where she has lived happily for 15 years and Ethel still has strong links to the local area.

Dawn and Ethel both met their husbands while working for the Price family at Illawarra during WW2. Both future spouses were on leave, Bill from the army and Ken from the navy (he was





DALE COTTAGES FLINDRAISING GOLE DAY


Over 120 players teed off at Araluen Golf Resort on the 26th April for a major fundraiser golf event for the Dale Cottages Care Foundation.

Students across WA competed for this prestigious competition. And now the real work begins.

Lauren's mentor for the Challenge will be Prof Michael Borowitzka, a Professor of Phycology at Murdoch University (and known to may Roleystone locals as husband of Lesley Borowitzka Reverend of St Christophers Anglican Church in Roleystone and also a doctor!).

Prof Borowitzka conducts research in 'Phycology, commercial applications of algae and renewable biofuels from algae'. Some of the work the professor (and his wife Lesley) conducted underpinned the beta-carotene plant at Port Gregory (the pink lakes on the way to Kalbarri). Lauren will be working with her mentor one day per week for the next term. At the end of this period Lauren will undergo a rigorous interview process to present her findings and to see whether she will be invited to progress to the next stage.

In 2009 we were able to report that another Roleystone student Oliver Tester successfully competed in this competition and flew to the USA to enter into the world challenge. Best of luck Lauren and hopefully you too will be successful in your endeavours.

So What is Happening to the Primary School Site.....?

The State Government has written to the City of Armadale advising that the Roleystone Primary School site will be: 'surplus to their requirement as at February 2012 'and it is proposed to sell the land via the Property Asset Clearing House. The City's comments on the proposal were sought.

'Council noted the proposed disposal of the Roleystone Primary School site, and advised disposal should be restricted to a purpose relating to aged persons accommodation or care and the City would welcome any involvement associated with the planning or facilitation of the re-use of the site. The City acknowledged the need to take into account the substantial trees on the site plus the oval and the historical significance of the site.'

The full item is available to view on the Council website where you can link to the City Strategy committee agenda for April.'

We still have quite a bit of work to do yet in order to put a case to Council for the formal request for rezoning.

We have been advised that this is 'unlikely to happen and the developer now has other plans that should be much more palatable to those who so vehemently opposed this over the last

I salute the many people who became involved in this debate, as the time period alone certainly shows the power of public opinion.

Public opinion and community conversations have certainly assisted in the very positive progress regarding the future landuse of the Roleystone Primary School site. I thank the State Government, the City of Armadale especially Councillor Pat Hart, and the many others who have been quietly working on this outcome. Obviously it is not definite yet but the signs are certainly looking very positive for the establishment of aged care in the centre of our community.

I would like to conclude by recognising the passing of Rona Pettigrew who died in April at 90 years of age. This wonderful Scottish lady and her larger than life husband Jock (dec) were significant contibutors to our community over the 50's - 70's.

The Pettigrew's 'new house', built in 1960 on 2 acres at the corner of Hall and Jarrah roads shows a very different Roleystone. Their 'eastern view' was of the far hill coverd with the Borg's citrus orchard. No hint of the houses that now occupy both sides of the Brookton Valley.

In her daughter's words:

She fell in love with the bush, the sound of the kookaburras and the kangaroos at her back door, but it was the kindness of the Roleystone people during the difficult first few months when Jock was looking for work, that touched her deeply.

Thanks again to all, past and present contributors who make this community what it is. A great place to live! LINDA MOORE



Roleybushcare asks for Explaination as 'Lot 62 Croyden Rd' is Passed



To: The Minister for Planning Mr John Day MLC

I am writing on behalf of the Roleybushcare community group in Roleystone (www. roleybushcare.com).

We are writing to invite you to attend one of our regular Roleybushcare meetings.

We would like to ask you to inform us about the planning process that led to the decision to rezone a large block of land in Roleystone for use as high density "resort" accommodation (Araluen Estate).

Members of Roleybushcare voiced their concerns about the environmental aspects of the development to the then Minister for Planning and the City of Armadale.

We now understand that you, as the new Minister for Planning, have approved the rezoning. We are very confused about the process and the input that we and other residents of Armadale can have in such planning processes.

Roleystone has historically had a strong identity and a community minded population that supports environmental care. For the last 19 years our group has been run by volunteers and relies on local volunteers to care for our area.

This rezoning proposal generated strong opposition and is seen by many as a measure of the community's influence in this area. With the decision to rezone the area we feel as if we are unable to influence these important decisions to our community...and we feel let down by you.

We see this meeting as an opportunity for you to explain how the planning process works, why you approved this rezoning, and how in the future we can influence local planning outcomes.

YAL to close Camp Simons

The YAL campsite, known as Camp Simons just to the south of Araluen Park, is to be closed from 30th June.

Camp Simons is sited in a secluded area of bush on the banks of the Canning River off McNess Drive. The area has been used over many years for youth welfare as well as a base for bush walkers, for retreats and for groups with an interest in the environment. While negotiations are still being conducted with government and interested community groups, the nature of the title over the state government-owned land dictates that the site is designated to serve a community purpose.

According to the Vice Chair of the Young Australia League, Araluen Park General Manager Rod Ross, the Young Australia League has chartered a new course for the future in its quest to support relevant services in the development of Australia's youth. 'While the YAL culture was firmly established on the doctrine of Education by Travel and other participatory activities, it is acknowledged that in today's world travel is far more accessible to youth than it once was and there are many other various organizations that are highly skilled in offering a wide range of specialized participatory activities,' says Rod.

'Given these factors the YAL sees its future in a role that supports existing providers rather than being directly involved in service provision,' he adds.

Camp Simons has a long and proud history and no doubt many readers will have had the opportunity to stay at the camp. In 1929 J.J. (Boss) Simons established a holiday camp for the Young Australia League (YAL), on 60 hectares (150 acres) in a deep shaded valley at Roleystone. This has evolved into Araluen Botanic Park and the adjoining accommodation area became Camp Simons.

When Araluen Park changed ownership in 1985 the Young Australia League retained Camp Simons and young people have been able to utilise the camp and soak up the experiences of bush living, over many decades.

Local Roleystone resident Heather Baskerville recalls many happy memories of Camp Simons. As a child she came to a YAL camp: 'they were such fun and I learnt to play chopsticks on the piano'.

Later Heather along with 'soon to be husband' Les came to Anglican Youth Camps at Camp Simons and they: 'swam in the weir and walked for miles along the pipeline in the moonlight up towards Canning





GOLF RESORT FIRE RISK

Roleystone could have been the next Toodyay. Now the rain has come it can be told

Early in November the Araluen Golf Resort undertook a program to reduce the number of trees and shrubs from around the golf course. 30 or 40 of varying sizes were removed from around the fifth green and the sixth tee. They claim it was for drainage purposes.

These trees instead of being mulched were stacked, in most cases behind those fairway trees remaining. Mostly out of sight of the golfers. This combustible material was left for the whole of the summer to dry out causing several residents of the estate to be very concerned for their safety.

We all know about the dreadful fire that raged in this area about five years ago which was started by an arsonist and came very close to homes on the golf course and also those started accidentally by someone using a brush cutter at the Croyden Road end of Heritage Drive.

Last summer (2009) several small fires were caused along the fifth fairway and the eighth fairway by people putting down cigarettes on the very dry grass. Alarm bells were ringing for, if one of these piles of fuel caught light due to a similar reason our homes and lives would be at risk.

I contacted the Armadale Fire Brigade in early November, before the impending fire ban came into effect. They passed me on to the Armadale Rangers' Office.

A Ranger agreed to come out to look, took photographs of some of the piles and went off to speak with the Araluen Golf Resort management. I heard nothing more until I again rang the Ranger's office as the wood was rapidly drying out and I was getting worried. I was told that there was nothing to worry about, that a fire tender could get up the firebreak between the golf course and the forest.

While this was going on the Araluen Progress Association's Chairman was in contact with the Araluen Golf Resort's management and were told that the fuel would be removed by the end of January. Two months have passed since then and the fuel is still there.

I contacted FESA who told me that they had no control over such a situation and that I should talk to Mr Brian Watkins, Armadale's Chief Bush Fire Control Officer. I was also having conversations with Cr Pat Hart.

It was all documented along with some photographs I have taken, not that any of this would have been of use had there been a bush fire.

Mr Watkins eventually agreed to come out and have a look. He went straight to the Araluen Golf Resort Management with two of his associates who took him to have a look. Where they took him I don't know. He said that it would now be dangerous to move the wood in case of sparks from the machinery. It could have been dampened down or removed by hand.

Still not satisfied I wrote to the CEO of Armadale Council Ray Tame on the 25th January and eventually had a reply from him on the 19th February reiterating what Brian Watkins had told me. He did tell me that Mr Watkins had told the Araluen Golf Resort that they were to move the fuel when it was environmentally acceptable and that they were not to put bush fire fuel there again. Which seems to suggest that it is dangerous where it is.

If this had been us then we would probably have been issued with clear up notices and maybe even fined. Why has the Araluen Golf Resort got away with this all summer putting us at risk? They surely have a duty of care to the people living in the surrounding area and to golfers who use the course.

The Western Australian government have spent thousands of dollars trying to educate us on how to prevent bush fires, after all prevention is better than cure.


I am telling you all this to let you know what we have been sitting on all summer. Many residents have had sleepless nights over this. There is after all only one way out of this estate. If you feel as strongly as I do about keeping your family and property safe then maybe you ought to let them all know thus hopefully avoiding this ever happening again.

We got lucky this time but next time maybe not. Don't be complacent.

The cut down trees were left, in low piles, as recommended and it will be removed shortly as the weather changes.

We are fully aware of the situation regarding the stacks of tree waste at the Araluen Golf Resort.


We could not do anything about it over the heat of summer and decided that the transport of heavy machinery and mulchers into the location at that stage of the year would have created an unsatisfactory risk.

Roleystone in Autumn

The beauty of our area constantly assails me after a long hot dry summer. Driving down Brookton Highway, the stunning autumn foliage of the deciduous trees, makes a wonderful statement. The colour of these trees is enhanced by the cooler climate Roleystone experiences and makes us a bit different to other more temperate areas of Perth.

Many of these trees were planted by private owners and the council verge plantings happened in the era of Cr Deb Hopper. Deb recalls that she had quite a battle to get the trees planted as the policy then, (as it is now) states that only Australian native plants should be planted.

Her 'win' was based on the evidence that deciduous and non-native tree plantings actually give some protection against bushfires.

In the horrific Canberra fires of 2003, the suburbs with heavy plantings of deciduous trees were not as devastated as other areas.

The picnic area at the foot of Cotter Dam sustained some leaf burn at the outer fringes of the planting. The remainder of the trees were unmarked and the internal area of the picnic grounds was unscathed. Deciduous trees do not produce highly inflammable oils and will



slow the advance of a bushfire.

Much as we love our native plants they are adapted to bushfire; many burn readily and some explode. Most of the eucalypts produce volatile gases which encourage the progress of a bushfire. These foreign plantings are not only beautiful they offer some protection

I am a great fan of deciduous trees: they give shade in summer, light in winter, they are often water wise, their leaves drop at one time of the year and mulch down fabulously and they are beautiful. Not everything that is foreign has to be bad!

Thanks former Councillor Hopper and the gardeners from the City of Armadale (and to the many private gardeners) for our spectacular autumn display.

GARDENING NOTES JEAN: 9397 5547

Autumn is such a lovely time of the year. The reds, golds and browns of the valley trees are really starting to happen.

I have many plants with autumn foliage including: wisteria, glory vine and pistachio as well as a persimmon, which came from a Karragullen orchard. What a treat!

We really do not need flowers at this time of the year. My own autumn shades have not happened, but looking down the valley is very pretty. It is so amazing to discover how much work has built up in the garden during the summer months and when we have fine days it is really wonderful to get out into the garden to get it back in shape. Weeds to weed, plants to cut back, bulbs to plant and thus the cycle of life begin again.

A plant that smells fantastic at present is Choisya ternata, Mexican orange blossom. This plant is part of the rutacea family, which includes Boronia, citrus, and eriostemon. This is a great plant for a shrubbery. Another great plant is Philadelphus coronarius (mock orange). Both of these plants can be propagated in the summer.

The Japanese windflowers or anemones are blooming nicely now. This plant is a good spreader so put it in a sunny area where it has room to take over. I like the single ones better than doubles, white is pretty common and probably the nicest of all. All are attractive and need no special care.

While in Japan I saw many different cherry trees, mainly white in the wild ones but there are also magnificent pink varieties. Some of the old camellia trees were so large you couldn't link your arms around the tree when you went to hug it. A lot of azaleas were just starting to flower and they were very beautiful and evenly grown clumps. Although we were into spring there was a night of very heavy snow and the areas looked lovely covered in white.

Vern Bettenay was born in Roleystone in 1922 and the only significant time he spent away from 'his valley' was during the Second World War.

Now in his 88th year, he is now the oldest person born in the area still living here (and he is still actively working on his orchard).

Vern reminisces on the era of WW2 in the district:

'There was great support for the war in Australia from the outset and many local lads joined up to go to fight Germany. Many had fathers and uncles who had fought in the Great War and support for England was still very strong. Dad (Arthur Bettenay) and Uncle Wilfred (Wilfred Bettenay) had fought in both Gallipoli and Flanders so they were keen for us all to go.'

'Most of the lads were really keen— it was seen as an exciting adventure! Even those who did not join the forces were involved in the war effort in some way. Around 20 local people saw overseas service by the end of the war.'

'My mate Bill O'Meagher and I were keen to go off to training camp in Bunbury (Nashos) when we turned 18 and half way through the camp the Japanese

entered the war. All of a sudden our 'three month training camp' turned into a permanent stint and I was in the militia in the 10th Light Horse.'

'The Japanese moved very quickly and although the general view around our area was that they would probably not get here, they needed to

be stopped.'

'The fall of Singapore really shocked everyone as we all thought it was impenetrable.' Vern's own war career changed:

'I was not keen on horses so I transferred to the 16th Battalion and I was sent to reinforce Darwin. On the way there, Darwin was bombed but I was not too troubled by it all.' He recalls.

'As the Japanese invasion became bogged down in New Guinea they decided Darwin was relatively safe, so we were posted to New Britain to retake the Japanese strong hold on the island of Rabaul.'

'This involved making our way across the island on a jungle track. We were involved in a few bad skirmishes but overall I was always in the lucky troop that avoided the high casualty battles. We came across some attrocities but I was never hurt. Eddie Burley, who worked on Smailes Mill in Karragullen,

was in the same battalion and he was killed. So you could say there was a 50% survival rate of local boys from our battalion!'

'Thank heavens we didn't make it to Rabaul before the end of the war or we would have been annihilated with the mass of infantry housed on the island.'

As hostilities came to an end, Vern who was now a sergeant, was involved in guarding the Japanese prisoners of war captured when Rabaul fell. This mainly consisted of: 'taking them out on work parties. They were pretty docile fellas by then. Probably like us, they just wanted to go home.'

Vern was able to return home on a tanker from Nehru: '20 of us were camped on top of a pile of superphosphate'.

Vern returned from the war and has never left 'willingly' since. (Despite his wife's insistence that he goes travelling occasionally.)

This wonderful gentle man has strong pacifist leanings but he still believed strongly in defending his country. As the number of WW2 veterans dwindles, it is timely to remember them. Thanks to everyone who did their bit, large or small, at home or overseas and in all conflicts, to protect our freedoms and way of life.





A Pioneer Passes On.

Rona and John "Jock" Pettigrew arrived in Roleystone in 1952 after immigrating from Glasgow, Scotland. They arrived with their young son David and less than ten pounds in their pockets. They settled into a small two room cottage off Hall Road, with the initial intention of using as a starting point to then look around Perth and buy some land a little closer to the city. Jock and Rona fell in love with Roleystone immediately and decided to buy 2 acres of land

Jock built the family home. (See photo - 1960). The Pettigrew family grew with Rhona's birth in 1954 and Janet's in 1963. Rona was involved in the Women's Fellowship at the Congregational Church and in later years volunteered at the Armadale Hospital. Jock was involved in the Roleystone Choral and Dramatic Society, the Roleystone Cricket Club and was an inaugral member of the Roleystone Country Club.

Rona was a wonderful knitter and made some of the best apple pies and sausage rolls in the district. Whilst it took the locals a bit of time to get used to her Scottish accent she made many life long friends, particularly Dot and Jack Parkin and her dear friend Sybil Sheppard. Jock died in 1977 and in the 1980's Rona travelled extensively with other Roleystone ladies around the state and internationally. She left Roleystone in the late 1980's. She lived independently in her own unit until 6 months ago when she moved into Stirling Aged Care, aged 90 years.





Roleystone was always dear to Rona's heart. Having left all her family in Scotland she had to make a new life for herself in a strange land. She fell in love with the bush, the sound of the kookaburras and the kangaroos at her back door, but it was the kindness of the Roleystone people during the difficult first few months when Jock was looking for work that touched her deeply. She and Jock became Australian citizens and loved their lives here, but neither lost their Scottish accent and she remained a proud and independent Scot to the very end. The AGM was held on Sunday April 11, 2010. Graham Fuller is back at the helm with a committee of usual suspects and several new young faces.






The cooler weather is a great time to get those jobs done that will make the summer garden survive better. Therefore, the May meeting of Roleystone Organic Growers will be all about drip irrigation and how to grow good healthy plants using less water.

Drip irrigation is a method of watering which saves on water use. It is an efficient and effective watering system that simply drips water through emitters either on or below the soil surface and delivers water directly to the roots of your plants, reducing evaporation and wind drift. Other benefits include reduced weed problems because water is targeted to the plants rather than surrounding areas, and reduced fungal diseases like black spot and powdery mildew that can be exacerbated by overhead

Our speaker, Robin Weaver from the Watershed has been working in the Irrigation industry for 23 years and is the former chairman of the Irrigation Association of Western Australia. He has written many of the Waterwise manuals for the Water Corporation, so needless to say he has a lot of knowledge!

Robin will be explaining the benfits of drip irrigation and how to set up and maintain the system in the home garden. He will show and demonstrate all the components needed: valves, filters, pipes, joiners, connectors, backflow prevention devices and more. If you happen to use bore water, he will show you the drip system for you. So, if you have been thinking of setting up or converting your current reticulation



system to drippers, here is your opportunity to learn

Wild Gossip

The cooler weather is resulting in the annual problem of possums moving into roof spaces and many people are wondering about a solution. The first thing to do is to verify that your roof space guest is a possum and not rats or mice.

Observing movement patterns and times can help with identification. Usually a possum will wake around dusk, spend some time grooming (so the noise will be in one place), then move to its entry/exit and all will go quiet until around dawn when it will enter, move to its nesting

place and groom. Rats or mice tend to run up and down at all times during the night and if young are present they will frequently return to the nest.

Another identification method is to look for scats (droppings) in the roof space – possum scats are about 2cm long and 1cm wide, whilst those of rats or mice are from less than 0.5cm to 1cm long. The smell of rats and mice is very strong and distinctive and they tend to be destructive and chew on things.


If the roof space guest is a possum its entry/exit point will need to be found, all other possible entry/ exit places secured and then in the evening (after the possum has left) the remaining entry/exit secured.

Waterproof possum boxes placed in trees around the area to provide alternate nesting sites will deter future roof space guests. Trimming or removing overhanging or near-by tree branches might also be useful.

Possums are territorial so trapping and removing them is not an option as it will just leave a nice warm, possum smelling, vacant place for another possum to move into and a relocated possum with virtually no chance of survival.

A common question asked by clients concerned for their pets well being, is in regard to what is the best way to feed their dog or cat for its everyday optimal nutrition.

This can be a very complex area of veterinary health, and discussions with your vet about a particular animal's dietary needs is always helpful, rather than a standard recipe that applies to every

For my own animals and increasingly for the patients that I visit at home, I recommend that a natural diet is the preferred feeding option and it need not be expensive or complicated. It seems easier to feed commercial pet food but these tend to be cooked rather than fresh ingredients and the cooking results in a marked loss in the nutrients available to the animal consuming the food.

Raw meaty bones are easily fed to dogs and readily available for the owner to purchase at local supermarkets. Raw chicken necks are the most popular for cats.

Personally I don't have the time for a complicated feeding regime for my dog so I find it very easy to keep her healthy by collecting any by-products of fruit and veges acquired throughout the day, over ripe fruit, cracked eggs, etc to add to her evening meal. Sometimes I add organ meats such as liver, heart and kidney, which provide minerals and other goodies, and the final addition is a powder supplement that adds further nutritional

For clients with pets suffering from ongoing skin problems, I am happy to discuss additional dietary methods that I have used to reduce the common itchy skin symptoms. "DO NOT CALL" RE- REGISTRATION TIME

"Telemarketing" is when calls come outof-the-blue, offering all sorts of goods and services or asking for donations. Mostly they seem to be selling the services of another telecom company, or insurance or tickets in a competition.

Did you know that you can register your personal telephone number(s), including your mobile phone and your home line, with Australian Communication and Media Authority (ACMA) to "opt out" of receiving these often annoying calls? The register, which was launched in May 2007, is only valid for three years, after which you have to register again. More than one million numbers were listed initially and there are now more than 4.3 million numbers on the register. If you were one of the early people who registered three years ago, you must re-register or you will start to get these annoying calls again.

The register works by telemarketing businesses comparing their list of telephone numbers against the register at a special website which shows what numbers can and cannot be called.

Under the regulations some calls will still be allowed however. These include calls relating to payment of accounts, customer orders or enquiries, product recalls and appointment arrangements. Other exemptions include charities, religious organisations, educational institutions and government bodies.

If you want to avoid receiving telemarketing calls, you can register in one of two ways: either visit the Government web site www.donotcall.gov.au or phone 1300 792 958.

Your number is lodged on the register promptly, but it does take time for telemarketing companies to check their lists, so your registration may not have an immediate effect.

Have you noticed that these calls always seem to come at meal times or some other really inconvenient time? I for one will be registering.

Trigger factors: Because the cold sore virus remains dormant in the body after initial infection any fatigue or trauma such as a cold, windburn or sunburn can trigger an outbreak. Certain foods rich in the protein l-arginine can assist the virus to multiply. Any nuts, dairy products and chocolate are common triggers.

School sores may start from insect bites that have been infected as a result of scratching or 'picking' at a wound.

Treatment: Since the causes are different so are the treatments. Success in treating cold sores occurs if medicines are used at the first sign of symptoms, (tingling stage) and reapplied frequently. The following treatment options are available:

- Famvir Tablets 500mg
- Antiviral creams: Vectivir or Zovirax
- Virasolve or Betadine.

Lysine tablets 500mg. Lysine helps to prevent viral replication and can be taken at a lowdose to prevent a cold sore.

As School Sores are a bacterial infection it is best to use antibiotics such as Bactronban Ointment or Penicillin. The crusty scabs should be soaked off and Betadine applied to prevent infection spread.

Remaining healthy, eating well and sleeping well maintains a healthy immune system so that these types of infections occur less frequently. The spread of infection can be reduced by not kissing others or touching the sores during active infection times (weeping sores).

So to check on this or other health concerns, just ask your pharmacist.

COLD SORES OR SCHOOL SORES Cold sores and school sores (Impetigo contagiosa) are two relatively common

infections, which are often confused because they often occur in the same places. The causes are and the treatments

Cold Sores are caused by the Herpes Simplex Virus (Type 1). They present as small itchy or painful blisters, which generally occur on the lips or at the base of the nostrils. There are generally four stages to a cold sore infection:

- General feeling of malaise, tingling or burning sensation around the nose or on the lips
- Fluid filled painful raised blisters which often run in a line
- Blisters break and weep

The cold sores dry up forming a

The time period from first tingling to healing is 1-2 weeks.

School Sores are a bacterial infection, caused by a "bug" called staphylococcus aureus, found on the surface of our skin. The infections often start as pimples and erupt into blisters which produce honey colored exudates which dry to a brown crusty scab.

School sores often occur in children around the mouth and under the nose but seldom on the lips like cold sores. School sores infections tend to grow in size and can occur on any skin surface (arms and legs etc), which is unusual for cold sores.

CAR SELLERS PLEASE NOTE

Following safety concerns expressed by residents with the parking of vehicles for sale near the corner of Holden Road and Brookton Highway, Council officers advised that it is an offence to leave vehicles there for sale and supplied the following information: A person shall not park a vehicle on any portion of a thoroughfare.

(a) for the purpose of exposing it for sale;

(b) if that vehicle is not licensed under the Road Traffic Act;

(c) if that vehicle is a trailer or a caravan unattached to a motor vehicle; or

(d) for the purpose of effecting repairs to it, other than the minimum repairs necessary to enable the vehicle to be moved to a place other than a thoroughfare.

'Thoroughfare' as the following meaning given to it by the Act:

A road or other thoroughfare and includes structures and other things appurtenant to the thoroughfare that are within its limits, and nothing is prevented from being a thoroughfare only because it is not open at each end.



As we launch into the Merry, Merry month of May, Venus dominates the western evening skies.

Setting progressively later while the Sun sets progressively earlier, our "sister planet" makes a brilliant sight at dusk. Venus is like the Earth in-as-much as it's a rocky planet, about the same size as our own. As a possible site for a future colony, forget it. The atmosphere's thick carbon dioxide, with clouds of sulphuric acid. There's a runaway greenhouse effect, with a surface temperature around 480 C. As if that's not enough, the crushing Venusian atmosphere exerts approximately the same pressure as you'd find a kilometredeep in Earth's oceans (90 atm).

Mars, the only planet that earthlings are likely to visit within the next generation or so, doesn't look like much from here. It's in the north at dusk and has an orange hue. It's in Cancer now, but moves into Leo mid-month. Watch how it gets steadily nearer to the star Regulus in Leo, in the last week of May (closest approach on June 6).

Saturn's the other evening planet. It's telescopically much more interesting than Mars or Venus, though it still looks like a little round thing with handles either side. Saturn's in the NE sky at nightfall, in Virgo. It culminates high up in the north around 9:30pm in early May, 8:30pm mid-month, and 7:30pm at month's end. At its highest, you can see it best. The rings will gradually appear more "open" over the coming months. Saturn sets in the west at about 3:20am in early May, 2:20am mid-month, and 1:20am at the end of the month.

Bright Jupiter rises in the east at about 3:20am at the start of the month, 2:30am mid-month, and 1:45am at the end of the month. At dawn it's prominent in the NE sky. Also visible at daybreak in the second half of May is Mercury - look low in the ENE around 6am.

The Moon's phases are last quarter on the 6th, new moon on the 14th, first quarter on the 21st, and full moon on the 28th. Watch for the full moon rising just after sunset on the 28th. Teachers, your evening moon "obs" should go from the 15th or 16th to the 28th or 29th.



Pro Bono: Aliens! David Bardsley Minister Community Church



Having dual citizenship is a mixed blessing. It can be a distinct advantage in some situations, such as flying through immigration at either end of the journey between Australia and England, and being able to choose which team to support.

My daughters were heard to shout "Go... whoever's winning" with scant regard for sportsmanship.

On the other hand the definition of "home" becomes something of an issue and some (?) unrefined individuals confuse accent and allegiance resulting in an inaccurate and less than complementary label – Pom! On the whole though we are comfortable with our status – we are "locals" in either nation.

So it came as something of a shock to be labeled as anything other than a desirable resident by "the establishment" when we returned to the UK recently at short notice

for the funeral of my mother-in-law.

Our son Richard had a spare car that we could use whilst there for a couple of weeks. But unlike Australia, the mandatory insurance is not included in the road tax. We needed to make arrangements – a simple matter...or so we thought. Just about every firm rejected our application for one reason or another. But the "killer" blow was when more than one said they do not insure residents of Canada, the USA or Australia. We were classed as aliens in our country of birth!

It made me think of the Biblical call to look after orphans, widows and aliens. This has been built into our culture for many years now and it is one of the fundamental aspects of basic human rights. It hasn't always been so and sometimes we forget the historical context of this commission. Anyway, the condition of such folk isn't so serious today, is it? Our society looks after these folk now, doesn't it? Well sort of...but nothing can change the feeling of being totally adrift in a foreign land that comes with the status of being an alien.

Widows – and widowers too – are also mentally clipped by the loss of their soul mate...ask any number of folk in our community about that. And Hilary and myself are now both orphans, surprised by the harsh impact created by a total absence of either father or mother.

We can extend God's commission into a general principle to take care of everybody who is marginalized by society. The rationale behind the principle is pretty obvious. We are social creatures and, God knows, any community works best if the way we live is grounded on that principle. But let's return to the specified groups of orphans, widows and aliens. Like it or not, we should acknowledge that there are still some very specific considerations applicable to these folk.

In fact today the problem of alien refugees is prominent in public debate. May I encourage all of us in our community to take a lead from God's word in shaping our response. May we always act out of love for the individual – each person is special in God's view. And let's not be unduly influenced by popular, secular mantras - prejudice in any form is, after all, a dreadful and damaging sin.



Naming of Parks, Places and Buildings

The City has prepared a draft policy to guide the naming of Council facilities such as parks

and buildings. The City's rapidly developing new urban areas will produce in excess of 200 new parks and public buildings (such as sporting clubrooms and community centres) over the next 10-15 years. In addition, for various reasons sometimes a decision is made to re-name an existing facility. 


