What is in a Name?

Here is your chance to have your say in the naming of the amalgamated Roleystone

While schooling has a long and proud history in our area, the school formed after the amalgamation of Roleystone Primary School and Roleystone District High School will, in many aspects, be a new school. A community meeting held on Tuesday 25th May resolved to put forward five alternative names to the local community to be voted on. This name should reflect our locality, respecting what has come before but also demonstrate a new era of education.

The choices are:

- Roleystone School,
- Roleystone District College,
- Roleystone College,
- Roleystone Community College
- Roleystone Community School.

The top three choices will be submitted to the Education Department and the community's wishes will assist the Minister in formulating her decision.

Anyone who lives or works in the district is eligible to vote. Voting will occur in the week starting the 28th June. Interested persons will be able to lodge their vote either at the front office of either school, at the shopping centre (details to follow) or at the Roleystone Neighbourhood Family Centre. School aged children will have their opinions canvassed in class. All residents are invited to have their say.

Kaarakin Saves Hail Injured Birds

On Monday the 22nd March 2010 Perth was hit with a freak storm that resulted in extensive damage to property. It also caused the death of hundreds of birds and animals across the Metropolitan area.

The Black Cockatoo Rescue Centre went into rescue/recovery mode. A range of calls came in from people who had either dead or injured Carnaby Cockatoos at their homes; these are an endangered species. Not wanting to place our volunteers at risk during the storm, we explained to callers how they could help these birds until we could arrive in the morning.

Next morning my wife Andrea, our 22 month (Tari) and 3 year old (Codi) and I rescued 17 cockatoos travelling over 400kms to do so. Meanwhile other volunteers at Kaarakin were preparing our aviaries for the injured cockatoos.

Over the coming days the Perth Zoo received 32 endangered Carnaby's black cockatoos from DEC and our volunteers. Most exhibited fractures as well as soft tissue and skeletal injuries. A number of the Carnaby's had to be euthanized because of their horrific injuries and some died on the way to the Zoo. I must take my hat off to the staff at the Perth Zoo. They swung into action to deal with the onslaught of injured wildlife: it was like watching a scene from M.A.S.H!

One family in Canningvale found four in their back yard and picked them up and put them in their shed. When they opened the shed door the next morning, four flew away. One more seriously injured bird is still at the Perth Zoo.

After assessment and treatment, thirteen of the less serious cases were transferred to our centre at the Black Cockatoo Recovery Centre, here in the hills.

During the rehabilitation of these cockatoos over the next two weeks we had to collect approximately ³/₄ of a tonne of native food for them every second day. This massive task took many hours. The birds had to be monitored to make sure they could fly and were not losing too much weight. When the Cockatoos came into the centre you could see the black and blue bruising and you could tell when they flew they were in a lot of pain.

Rick Dawson from DEC said: 'Most of these birds weren't too bad, they had superficial wounds and in fact when we actually released them at the rehab centre they couldn't fly too well because they'd actually been pummelled by hail stones. So they didn't want to fly, they were really sore, like they'd been playing rugby.'

On the 7th April, 14 days later and after 96 hours of critical care from volunteers, thirteen endangered Carnaby's black cockatoos were released back into the wild at Kings Park. Prior to this they were tagged and micro chipped which will help with research into the species. Carnaby's are endemic to South-West Australia and it is estimated that only 20,000 currently exist with the population spread over only one-third



of the range that existed 50 years ago. In total and as a result of this storm

- 68 birds in total were dealt with
- 14 cockatoos were released
- 4 are still recovering from injuries
- 50 died as a result of their injuries. Our totals for March:
- 111 birds in total were dealt with by our centre
- 34 Black Cockatoos were released or are undergoing further treatment
- 73 died of their injuries or illness including starvation

These birds cannot sustain these kinds of losses.

The cost to our organisation was just over \$2000. We do not get funding from the government for this. The Black Cockatoo rescue centre needs your help, especially at the moment. With the ever-increasing load of injured cockatoos and the yearly program of giving medications, we are in desperate need of money for medicines and fuel to conduct recues. This has become critical in what we are doing. Please if you cannot become involved with the Black Cockatoo rescue program perhaps consider making a donation to make sure these cockatoos receive the expert care they deserve.

Be proud of what's happening here in your hills with the Rescue Centre. We are the envy of other states that do not have this facility or the expertise. We are the first.

So thankyou to all Nurses (and Health Professionals). Your efforts are very much appreciated.












THE HISTORY OF SCHOOLING IN KARRAGULLEN RECORDED AT A 'MUST VISIT' WEBSITE

A newly released website gives local Karragullen residents (and others) the opportunity to search for themselves and their relatives, as schoolchildren.

Karragullen Primary School ran proudly for nearly ninety years before being closed in December 1999 with the last 29 students transferring to the two Roleystone schools and to Pickering Brook PS. This ended a proud history of schooling in Karragullen, with the first school opening in 1913 (although an earlier school at Canning Sawmills ran from 1891). The history of the Karragullen School (and in fact a lot of other very topical local information) can be viewed at http:// pickeringbrookheritagegroup. com/school.html#article7

The Pickering Brook Heritage group (comprising 10 enthusiastic volunteers) have compiled this fabulous website, rich with stories, facts and photos of the area. In the 'schools section' many locals have already looked themselves up and viewed older relatives when they were school aged. Even for readers who were not from this area, viewing the old photos with names from the past reveals the families many of our landmarks are named after.

The first Karragullen Primary School was set up in 1913 at Illawarra orchard with teacher Ms Maggie Ferguson and had 12 children attending. Mr Thomas Price (Manager of Illawarra and grandfather of the current owner Tom Price) deliberately advertised and employed a family at Illawarra Orchard that had a large family of children to help boost the numbers for the school. This allowed for the employment of Doris Bettenay as a monitor, the first local to be employed. In 1919 when development went more towards the southeast, the Karragullen School moved to the 'Rock Inne' site. In 1956, the Canning Mills School closed and the Karragullen Primary School

in 1967. The school stayed at this site until it closed in 1999. In 1978, the Roleystone Courier headlined:

NO O'MEAGHERS IN SCHOOL

For the first time in 55 years there are no O'Meagher children in the Karragullen School this year.

There has been an unbroken line of O'Meaghers since 1923 when Jack O'Meagher was enrolled. His generation ended with Malcolm who was joined by the first of the next generation. This was Janice Scari. Although she doesn't bear the O'Meagher surname, she was John senior's granddaughter and was raised by her grand parents. Some of the O'Meagher wives had seven children and at one stage in the tiny school there were six of the clan. Jack O'Meagher's 1931 report card is displayed on the website. (Jack's children are John, Tim and Stephanie).

Another family with strong links to the school are the Ghillarducci's of Karragullen. Tania was in year 2 when the school finally closed and she recalls how devasted she was 'It was a really good school, small but really caring. I really didn't want to move to Roleystone' she recalls.

Tania's dad Eric Ghillarducci went to the Karragullen School at the Rock Inne site and recalled that he only really liked sports. (He also remembered some great pranks like burning plasticine in the fireplace). All 5 of Tania's brothers and sisters went to the school and her grandmother Millie Travacich went to the Pickering Brook School in the 1930's.

All this and more feature on this fantastic website. Congratulations to all concerned. This website provides so many memories and keeps the record of the proud history of schooling in Karragullen. groups for just about everything. So how can someone feel alienated or bored, if they live here?

For young people between high school age and prior to forming a family, the perennial urge seems to be about fleeing the community that nurtured them.

I clearly remember when I was this age, I couldn't get away 'from the farm' quickly enough! So perhaps this is an age group that a community will always find catering for locally, is just too difficult.

Still I can't stop feeling that there is something more insidious here; today's twenty-somethings just do not seem to have the resourcefulness of previous generations. Perhaps the answer lies in the shift toward electronic contact that has happened. Has this made the art of initial, face to face contact, just that bit harder than it used to be? Will they be able to make a successful transition towards 'local community life' that is at the heart of towns like ours?

I do not have the answers but this is a demographic which seems to be less catered for than others.

Perhaps some of our community groups could look towards making themselves more youth friendly? I welcome your comment.

Plus I have got to race, so much to do and so little time.

My thanks to all of the wonderful contributors, the challenge is getting your contibutions in. Your efforts mean that this publication gets better all the time! *I wish you all happy reading.*LINDA MOORE







Building Sensitively in Roleystone An Owner-Builder Story - Part 2

Continuing the story of Paul and Dimity Mutton's amazing house construction

In November 2007 we started construction of our house with the digging and construction of the footings. We used strip footings rather than a slab which minimize earthworks, damage to the site, and the costs were a small fraction of the cost of putting in a slab. I had the help of a bricklayer/stonemason friend (Paul) to assist in the laying out and placing of the reinforcing, and many friends helped on the day of the concrete pour. Paul also stayed around to help make a thick stone wall made from stone on the block that forms the lower half of the front wall of the house.

On one part of the site, where the ground dropped away, there was enough room to put in a semi-underground study under a bedroom. This required very little extra earthworks and as expected we hit solid granite which now forms an interesting floor of this room. Another feature exposed in the floor of my study is the original Canning Dam pipeline which passed across our block and under our house.

My brother-in-law Nick, who is a very handy guy, was the main person that helped me throughout the construction process, but from time-to-time friends (sold by Dimity's spectacular lunches) helped when extra assistance was required. One of these times was the raising of the poles that supported the ridge beam of the house. I found a source of lots of old power poles and at \$50 for a 10m+jarrah pole it was such a bargain that I decided to use them for the ridge beam as well (thanks Gerald for your encouragement!). Three poles at \$50 each were much cheaper and ended up having a lot more character than the \$2500 LVL beam that I had originally planned.

I used recycled materials and native wood wherever I could. I had many large (up to 5m long x 1m wide) slabs of Jarrah that I had milled from salvaged logs a few years before and used these for all the natural edged window sills (>0.5m wide) and sunk a whole one in for the entrance floor. Inspired from an old wall in Krakow, in the centre of the house I used recycled red bricks mixed with old limestone blocks to make a large double brick & stone wall and bookshelf. My wife Dimity led the brick cleaning team which was pretty good going considering she was 8 months pregnant at the time.

During the raising of the strawbale walls our architect held a couple of workshops on strawbale construction and lime rendering. In the end however pretty much the entire lime rendering was done by a plaster (Mitch) and his team who had made his own strawbale house in Churchmans Brook.

One of the good things about straw bale is its flexibility and once the bales are stacked you can cut out alcoves (with a whippersnipper/chainsaw) and I used some old circular wheels and a large chaff cutter wheel for some windows. *Next month: Finishing off & moving in.*



AIRCRAFT NOISE OVER ROLEY

As a result of the West Australian Route Review Project (WARRP), three new flight paths are now directly over Roleystone – two for large commercial jets and one for turbo prop aircraft. There is also another one 5 km to the north.

The result of these changes has meant dramatically increased noise over our suburb. The arriving jets fly directly overhead at lower altitudes than should reasonably be expected in a Hills suburb 30km from the airport.

The Councils of Bayswater, Belmont, South Perth, Canning, Gosnells, Kalamunda and Mundaring have all been involved in the WARRP since 2006 when the first consultations and discussions began. The City of Armadale however was never invited to be involved.

A recent Senate Committee Hearing into Aircraft noise was held in Peth on April 28, and as a result of that Hearing, the City of Armadale has now been invited to be on the Committee.

According to Air Services Australia, there were no complaints about the new routes, therefore they assumed acceptance of them. It was a bit hard to complain when neither you nor your Council knew what was happening.

Many Roleystone residents forwarded complaints to Mr Don Randall and also registered complaints via the Fair Skies Website and subsequently made submissions to the Senate Committee Hearing.

Air Services Australia log every complaint and only take action based upon the number of complaints received, I would urge concerned residents to register a complaint via the Air Services Australia Webtrak site: http:// www331.webtrak-lochard.com/webtrak/per3 each time that they are affected by excessive aircraft noise. Also keep your local Councillor and MPs informed. (WebTrak is a Community Web replay which shows all flights). The arriving jets pass over with a frequency of less than three minutes apart at peak times when they are landing in the S to N direction on the main runway. This situation will worsen with the planned increases in air traffic over Perth. Flights are also allowed to arrive in the early hours of the morning and there will be no curfew in Perth as there is in Sydney and Adelaide.

It should be noted that a very slight shift in the flight paths to the East would take the jets over uninhabited areas and avoid Roleystone altogether. Your complaint may help achieve this.

We are privileged to live in one of the most beautiful places on Earth. Don't let the bureaucrats and general apathy rob us of this wonderful life style. If we want to preserve it, we're going to have to fight for it.



On hearing the unmistakable and comforting calls of two boobook owls, I called my wife Marie and Jan, her friend from England. We listened enraptured.

'Maybe they are back living on our block?' suggested Marie.

'I doubt it. We have no old trees with hollows big enough. They are probably nesting further down the valley where there are a few older trees. But, it is a great sign that our Jarrah forest ecosystem here in Roleystone is operating'.

We explained to Jan: 'You know the Land for Wildlife sign at the top of the drive nailed to the tree? It was boobooks that stimulated us to apply for Land for Wildlife status for our block. After inspection, on the 5th July 1997, we became full members of the scheme. Our sign number is 36.3

On the 8th January 1997, whilst sitting on our deck admiring the sun sliding down a gold and pink sky into the Indian Ocean south of Garden Island, we once more heard the unfamiliar chirruping of crickets. We had heard the chirruping the evening before but could not pinpoint the sound.

This time I was determined to find the cause of the sound. The trill chirruping was coming from a large marri tree up near the beginning of our driveway.

'This sound is too loud and penetrating for crickets.

Then I saw perched on a spout high in the tree two small owl faces looking down at me. On a branch above them were two mature owls. They were surely the parents of these fledglings? They looked very boobookish to me.


The babies flew off to the marri tree next to the house. As they flew the chirruping followed them and so did their parents, and so did I. The babies/teenagers were learning to fly. They flew in a circle over the house three or four times chirruping as they went. Each landing back in the marri was less ungainly than the last. They were obviously finding their landing legs. Both were definitely chirruping like crickets, calling to each other and their parents.

I rushed indoors to search through my bird book. I wanted to check whether these really were boobook owls. The drawings indicated they were. There was no mention of chirruping.

I phoned my friend Tony Start who lives in Roleystone (he was Senior Research Officer at CALM). He would know about this chirruping bird. He did not! He doubted it was being made by boobooks.

'OK. Come for 'sundowners' tomorrow evening. Hopefully they will do for you what they did for me.'

Tony arrived with his wife and his 10 by



40 Zeiss binoculars. We had just started to get our 'laughing gear around the amber fluid' when the chirruping started.

'There they are Tony, look, in the marri

He trained his binoculars on them. Then they did what I wanted them to do. They took off and flew in an arc in front of us, then swerved overhead to fly over the roof. They were chirruping, and the sound was most definitely coming from them. Tony shook his head in amazement. 'They were definitely southern boobooks' he said, and they were definitely chirruping like crickets. I have never experienced this before.'

The owls flew over again just to prove it was they making the noise. I was elated.

'I will do some research and report back.' called out Tony as he and his wife left.

The chirruping and the flights continued for a few more evenings after that. I also heard the parents making their boobook

Just over a month later Tony did report back. His research did not show of any recordings of chirruping from boobook owlets in the south west but there were records of fledged young chirruping in

'Your name will go in the record books as the discoverer of this previously undocumented phenomenon' explained Tony.

Not too long after Tony delivered to me ' Western Australian Bird Notes', A Quarterly Newsletter of Birds Australia, W.A. (Royal Australasian Ornithologist Union). No 81 March 1997. Inside was a short description of the January chirruping episode. It was written by Mr A. N. Start, and next to his name ... my name!

Not long after I came across the Land for Wildlife Scheme.

I had to join to protect my boobooks. And my western greys, and my bandicoots, and my possums, and my bobtails, and western bearded dragons. Sorry...ours!'

The soapbox he borrowed didn't look too good afterwards tho'. In the overall score Roleystone came 3rd out of four troops.






assists with the Kelmscott Show. All this energy - it must be all that rejuvenating hill's air.





GARDENING NOTES JEAN: 9397 5547

The rains have been wonderful. The grass is so easy to weed and the weather is so nice to be out in. I wander half way down my yard and already I can hear the creek roaring.

I remembered last year I had seen a magnificent white double flowering ornamental peach at Mia Flora Karragullen, so between showers, I raced out to see if it was still there. Luckily it was and there was a red one too, so they are both now planted in my garden.

While at Mia Flora, I purchased an Evolvulous pilosus, an ideal cover for when the daffodils are dying back, plus a beautiful emerald lustre Viburnum; a lush full-bodied bush, ideal for hedging. While I was patiently waiting for John, I noticed some Giant Allium and some that have star-like flowers. I knew I had room for them. I'm not sure if they are the same as Russian garlic. I have wanted these bulbs for years but the nurseries always said 'not for Western Australia'. Oh, I also got a packet of Fritillarias, which I have admired in England, Victoria and Tasmania, so this will be a trial.

When John got back, he casually mentioned his Rhododendron stock had just come in and they were in his van. Much poorer of pocket but richer in the things that count, I came home and began digging roses out and planting them in 'full sun' positions. Then I sorted out all the spots for my new acquisitions.

At the last camellia society meeting Harry Mazza showed us a range of horticultural tricks for the positioning and treatment of camellias, hanging-baskets, espaliers and trellising, hedges, standardising and plaiting two different varieties together. It was a reminder of a lot of things I had seen in Japan. This and bonsai, if you have time and lack space are all great ways to enjoy your garden and keep the plants to manageable sizes. A hedge can be low enough to define an area or even large enough to screen off unpleasant views.

There are so many wonderful plants of all kinds available nowadays no one needs to have a boring unfulfilling garden. Gogi Berry and Blueberry should be easy to grow in our heavy soil, remembering Blueberries are of the rhododendron or Ericacea family and will perform in the same conditions and with the same treatment. Blue fruits are excellent in assisting to prevent Macular degeneration.

If you want very good autumn red foliage in your garden, plant: Plums, Chinese Tallow Trees, Liquid Amber, some Maples, Persimmon and the climbing Virginia Creeper. All will add character to your garden.

Well time to while away a bit of time outside. Enjoy. P.S don't forget to water plants under the eaves.



Wild Gossip



Last month I wrote about problems with unwanted roof space visitors, giving tips on identification, avoidance and offered possible solutions. Ironically over the last month we have had big issues with roof space visitors.

Our first visitor was a beautiful male possum, who obviously managed to sneak in whilst my husband was replacing gutters — these little devils will take any opportunity of finding a warm place for winter!! Obviously when the gutter replacement was completed we had concerns that the possum might be trapped in the roof space so caught and relocated him to a possum box in the garden.

A few nights later we heard roof noises and he was back! We were a bit baffled as to how he had got back into the roof space and spent several days trying to find his entry/exit. Eventually we noticed a small hole in the eaves cover where a pipe had been removed during the gutter replacement. When our possum left that evening my husband quickly blocked up the hole.





The following night we had roof noises again. After checking and rechecking we could find no possible entry/exits places for a possum. We then observed that the noise was occurring for most of the night instead of the usual dawn and dusk possum movements and concluded that our visitor was probably not a possum.

We deployed a live catcher in the roof space and after a few nights of false alarms when it closed empty, we finally caught our roofinvading rat.

Whilst we seem to have won this battle we do know that our roof is not rat proof as they can squeeze through the corrugations in the tin but hopefully it is now possum proof. Please contact me for help for or advice about all injured or orphaned wildlife.

Assisting Pets Affected by Mange

A reasonably prevalent skin problem, which affects dogs, is the condition called Demodicosis, commonly known as mange.

The condition is a skin inflammation problem caused by mites, which are normally present in the skin of most dogs. The mites live in the hair follicles and generally don't attract any attention unless the number of mites becomes out of balance for the host dog to manage. This imbalance is often seen in young dogs in which case it is known as Juvenile Demodicosis, or in other cases, disturbances of the immune system may allow the population of mites to dramatically increase.

For young dogs the condition often resolves with out treatment as the immune system matures. Unfortunately it may also persist and become more generalised having severe effects on the dog even as it becomes an adult.

A diagnosis of demodicosis can be made by the veterinarian based on the physical examination and the medical history. In some cases a skin scraping may be done by the vet to see if there are mites present in the sample which is studied under a microscope.

The treatment of demodicosis can be very frustrating and the long term results will depend on whether there is an underlying medical condition and what can be done to resolve or reduce that. On the other more satisfying end of the scale, many cases will respond effectively to treatment and the problem is resolved, much to everyone's relief.

Mange can be part of an array of skin problems often seen on the one patient. Care of these patients at home for skin conditions is readily available and I am happy to offer a home visit to discuss the animal's individual problems.

CIARA'S GIFT

Ciara Glennon's death in 1997 shocked me. The circumstances of her death and that of two other young women have been linked to the unsolved Claremont serial killings.

Many wondered how a mother would face the aftermath of such a horrific event. Ciara's mother Una Glennon described her feeling at that time as one of: "...shock and disbelief ... accompanied by a physical pain", and goes on to reveal how she felt that she couldn't live any more.

Thirteen years later, Una has written a book called Ciara's Gift about her search for meaning after this massive loss. She describes the book as: "...the book that I would like to have been able to read at the time".

The book focuses on Una's journey from suffering and pain to peace and then hope. "No willpower can force grief away. Nothing cures it and all attempts to bypass it only postpone healing".

Between 1997 and 2010, aspects of Una's life (and that of her husband Dennis) have been challenged. These challenges include one to her Christian beliefs (which are

re-affirmed), how different people deal with grief and, how she reacted to people whom she didn't know that were offering their support.

Often when seeing someone - whether a friend or an acquaintance - who has lost someone close to them, we may become awkward trying to find something to say that sounds "right" or meaningful. Sometimes we may avoid meeting them at all. It was interesting to learn from Una that even a silent presence or just a hug can provide a positive energy and convey a sense of caring.

Una is a living example of the power of feeling one's own pain as a passage through suffering. The book has many quotations from a variety of sources like Soren Kierkegaard's "Life can only be understood backwards, but it must be lived forwards.'

Privilege hardly does justice to my experience of being present when Una Glennon gave her address at the launch of this beautifully crafted book. I am in awe of this lady's sensitivity, honesty, literary skill and grace.

Ringworm presents as a circular inflammed lesion on the skin surface. The ring is often raised with tiny nodules on it whilst the inside is often scaly.

Treatment for simple tinea and ringworm includes the use of antifungal creams lotions or powders use as Clotrimazole, Miconazole or Econazole. All must be applied twice daily and should be used for up to 7 days after symptoms have gone to ensure the spores are killed and re-infection does not occur. Newer once daily antifungals are also available Bifonazole and Lamisil being two examples. Nail and scalp infections are often better treated with oral anti-fungal agents such as Lamisil, Griseofulvin or Ketoconizole tablets. It is best to see a doctor with such infections.

PITYRIASIS VERSICOLOR: also known as tinea versicolor tends to occur over the trunk, neck and shoulders appearing as pale irregular patches on tanned or dark complexioned people or as darker patches on those fair skinned.

COMMON FUNGAL INFECTIONS

Many of us have experienced the discomfort of fungal infections. I wish to consider four such conditions with their treatments.

ORAL THRUSH: can affect all ages. It is usually caused by Candida albicans but can be caused by more resistant fungi such as C. glabrata or C. krusei.

Those more at risk of developing oral thrush include: new born infants, those with dentures, asthmatics using inhaled preventer medication (inhaled steroids), those on antibiotics and immunesuppressed individuals.

Oral thrush presents as a sore mouth with white patches on the tongue and inside of the cheeks. Removal of the white plaque reveals a raw reddened surface which may bleed. It is best treated with Nilstat Oral drops or Daktaren oral Gel.

TINEA AND RINGWORM: These two common fungal infections caused by skin fungi are widespread throughout our community. The can be caught from animals, soil or other people.


Tinea infections can occur anywhere on the body but are commonly found in warm moist areas such as between the toes, groin area or under the breasts.

Tinea presents as an inflamed moist, intensely itchy area of skin but may also present as a moist white macerated area between toes. When these infections occur in nails they become thickened and discolored and when it occurs in the scalp, patchy hair loss can occur.

Treatment is best achieved by rubbing in Selsun shampoo (2% selenium sulphide) to affected areas for a month or using Peveryl (econazole) shampoo three days a month over a 4 month period. These infections tend to be persistent so long













The lead article in a recently unearthed Roleystone Courier published in October 1981 started.

The old Roleystone Co-op Store on the corner of Soldiers Road and Brookton Highway is once again being used in a cooperative venture by three completely different businesses which are all managing to exist happily together under one roof.

Denny Wauchope, the electronics specialist, Marcello Palacois the picture framer and John Mulgrave the leather worker, have quite a workshop between them and the old store is a hive of activity with the three men working at their trades. (Thanks to Rhonda Meadows for saving this copy of the Courier).

Nearly thirty years later the 'old store' is now the home of two new businesses, both in keeping with the valued history of this old building. Steves Unique Eco Handmade Art and Handicrafts has loads of lovely items including made to order Wrought Iron work. Next door, Cottage Antiques and Collectibles, is a store packed with old world charm and 'must have' pieces.

The old Co-op has had a varied history. It was first constructed in 1945-1946 to provide muchneeded stores for the people of Roleystone. It was owned cooperatively by local residents and run by a Co-op board. The first chairman was Richard Knuckey and serving on the original board was: Arthur Bettenay, Arthur Beales and Mr Gilmour.

The Co-op was constructed using largely volunteer labour, utilising war surplus materials at the conclusion of World War 2. The first Manager was Mr Alf Fuller

who had previously leased the Snook's Post Office store (now Hairrods, the Deli and The Grape Gallery Restaurant) and later Frank Happ took

For many years, the residents of Roleystone and Karragullen did a large proportion of their shopping at the Co-op. One of the drivers for the Co-op was Phillip Bettenay (now an octogenarian) and he remembers: 'We used to drive around and take the orders from the locals on Mondays and Tuesdays. Thursday I delivered to Roleystone and Friday I took the orders out to families in Karragullen, Illawarra and Canning Mills.'

'People could order anything from groceries, to hardware to agricultural supplies. I was under-age so I had to be granted a special license to drive the Co-op truck (but only in daylight hours). Our first vehicle was an ex army buggy and later we purchased an Austin truck.'

Competition from the newly emerging supermarkets in Armadale, Kelmscott and Gosnells in the 1960s, meant that the Co-op store was forced to close.

The building was renovated and reopened in the late 1960's and used as an art gallery by a group of local artists: The 'Group of Six' which included: Donna Read, George Voudouris, Audrey Davies, Peter Verstegen, Scamp Willcox and Eileen Keyes to showcase their various talents.

When this venture ceased, the shop premises were used by a range of other businesses including: antiques, clothing retailers and a Real Estate Agency and most recently Roleystone Settlements. The current structure, a one-story corrugated iron building, still remains fairly true to the original construction.



THE PUBLIC RECORD OF THE COUNCIL MINUTES WHICH ARE AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION AT THE CITY OF ARMADALE LIBRARIES & AT THE ROLEYSTONE FAMILY CENTRE.

1. Building statistics

During March 2010, a total of 268 building licences valued at \$26,842,716 were issued, compared to 180 valued at \$26,646,703 during the previous month. The total from July 2009 to the end of March 2010 was 2057 licences valued at \$268,843,979. The total for 2008/2009 was 2243 licences valued at \$286,674,726.

2. Subdivision Applications - Consequential Actions

Planning Commission has confirmed Council's recommendation of approval for the creation of 25 lots from Lots 341 and 51 Dimetrieff Rd, Bedfordale.

3. Strategic Plan Review Following a series of Focus Groups, workshops and a public comment period, Council adopted the text of the Strategic Plan 2010-2014.

4. Roleystone Primary School Site

The State Government has written to the City advising that the Roleystone Primary School site is surplus to requirements, and it is proposed to sell the land via the Property Asset Clearing House.

Council noted the proposed disposal of the in early 2012, and will advise State Land Services that in view of the past use of the site and the identified community needs, disposal in the first instance should be restricted to a purpose relating to aged persons accommodation or care. It will also advise State Land Services that the land is reserved for "Public Purpose (Local)" in the City's TPS No.4 and the land needs to be rezoned before the land is disposed of; and that participation by the City in any planning or facilitation of the reuse of the site would be welcome.

5. Extension of Pathway

Cr Hart tabled a petition signed by 41 residents, the prayer of which reads "We the undersigned would like the City of Armadale to consider extending the pathway that has been constructed to the end of Holden Road/ Chevin Road, up to Rubida Rise, Roleystone." Council received the petition and referred it to the Technical Services Committee.

6. Sport and Recreation Club Development Grant

Council was advised

that the City has been successful in gaining a \$69,000 Department of Sport and Recreation grant over a three year period towards a Club Development position. Council noted that the funds will be used to complement Council's allocation for Club Development.

BURNING PERMITS STILL REQUIRED DURING WINTER

Burning permits are issued by the City's Health Services Department during 1 June till 30th September each year, in an attempt to reduce the amount of backyard burning to improve air quality for residences in the

During this period, rural zoned properties are not required to obtain permits. General conditions of burning off still apply which includes negating the impact of smoke on other residents. Applicants are required to fill out an application for a burning permit form and submit this to the Health Services Department for assessment. There is no fee charged for this service and assessment will be based on the necessity to burn for an individual property (e.g. if there are other means of disposal and if the site is too difficult to take garden waste to verge for greenwaste collection). If it is considered that the waste can be disposed of by other means, you will not be issued with a burning permit.

It is an offence to burn off without a permit and there is a penalty of \$250 for this offence. The questions on the application form relate to the property where the burn off will occur, the type and size of material to be burnt, and whether other possible methods of disposal have been considered. It is an offence to make false statements or declarations on an application for a permit and the penalty is \$100 for this offence. Permits are available on Councils website.

SITUATIONS WHEN YOU CAN NEVER BURN - In any of the following situations, burning is totally banned at all times: on Sundays and public holidays; on residential lots less than 1,200 m² in area; on residential lots greater than 1,200 m², where you don't have a permit to burn, where vegetation or other material is cleared from a building or development site. Dave was a something of a rogue. He worked with me in my first job, "worked" being a relatively loose term. I actually remember little else about him other than he was instrumental in my most astonishing car accident. Astonishing because nobody was injured, no vehicle damaged but

Our Mini couldn't pull the skin off a rice pudding so Dave volunteered to do the deed in his Humber Hawk, first cousin to a tank. In a moment when my brain took a holiday, I accepted his offer.

We met at the vendor's place on a sunny Sunday morning and immediately I knew we were in for trouble. Dave's Saturday night had started at the "Talk of the North" club and he wasn't quite sure where it had ended but somehow he had remembered his commitment to us and turned up on auto pilot. He had the stereotypical "morning after" air about him. The hope that he would stay awake, watch the mirror and anticipate braking looked rather forlorn. We set off in convoy down the main Blackpool road along with half the population of Manchester who were off for a day at the seaside. Hilary led in our Mini, Dave followed in the Humber roped to the Ruby with me steering and praying. All went surprisingly well until Dave unexpectedly started to indicate left. Hilary saw his signal and started to pull over. Actually Dave had accidentally flicked the indicator and suddenly realized Hilary was braking. In his panic, he did a copybook emergency stop, completely forgetting my presence behind. Not wishing to wreck our new acquisition on the girder like rear of the Humber, I overtook it – not a wise manoeuver. Inevitably the rope stopped Ruby abruptly and she spun in her length, ending up facing the wrong way alongside Dave who looked awfully surprised to see me appear at his side window. The towrope had knitted itself into a cat's cradle, which took ages to untangle. We blocked the highway to sun and sand completely and tempers became somewhat frayed amongst the would be holidaymakers. Order was eventually restored and rather fortunately we eventually got home intact.

The point of all this is that I put my trust in the wrong hands because I was impatient. I opted for an easy but risky short cut. Deep down I knew a trailer was the proper solution and a moment's reflection would have revealed my folly in accepting Dave's offer. I don't think I was much wiser in my spiritual life either. I went in all sorts of directions, driven by my own whims and my own agenda, seeking the easy way out at each turn. In a couple of crises I chose risky short cuts and caused grief for loads of folk. But then a huge transformation took place when I put my trust in God and allowed Jesus Christ to drive the tow car, so to speak. Real wisdom is never far away when you travel this way. I'm still impatient at times but I know I'm in good hands now. Are you?



Astronomical Highlights May

Greg Lowe Perth Observatory

Right. Other than containing the winter solstice on the 21st and therefore having the longest nights in our year, what does the month of June have to offer?

Well, a very bright planet in the evening skies: Venus. And another bright planet in the morning skies: Jupiter. And a partial eclipse of the Moon on the 26th. I won't even attempt to forecast the June weather – I'm no meteorologist. Now there's an odd word: meteorologist. One who studies meteors? No, not in the modern sense of meteor meaning a piece of burning space debris.

The word meteor comes from the Greek word meteoros, meaning high in the sky. Logia means to study. Back in the 17th century and earlier, Europeans had a funny way of describing atmospheric phenomena. Winds were described as "airy meteors". Rain, snow, hail and dew were called "watery meteors".

"Luminous meteors" were aurorae, rainbows, and various kinds of haloes around the Sun and Moon. Lightning and shooting stars were in the category of "fiery" meteors. Although the word meteor has become much more specialised these days, the old-fashioned term meteorology continues to be used for the study of the

atmospheric factors that determine our weather. But, back to astronomy, literally the naming of the stars

At the beginning of the month the Moon's waning. Last quarter's on the morning of the 5th and new moon's on the 12th. Then it's waxing: first quarter's on the 19th and full moon's on the 26th. Teachers, if you want your kids to do some chilly moon "obs" in the evenings, start on the 13th or 14th and continue until the 26th or 27th.

From a day or two after new moon, until full moon or the day after. At dusk on the 15th, brilliant Venus is just to the right of the Moon. On the 26th at 7:38pm approximately half of the full moon's face will be obscured by the umbral shadow of the Earth.

Venus is outstanding as the brilliant "evening star" dominating the northwestern sky at nightfall. You can expect it to keep doing so until mid-October. In the pre-dawn hours, Jupiter is the brightest starlike object – not nearly as bright as Venus, but much brighter than any star you can see.

It's interesting to note how much Venus moves against the background stars: it's in Gemini until the 12th, then in Cancer

until the 29th, then in Leo. Being near to us, its movement is quite apparent. Jupiter's much further, so its movement is slower – it stays in Pisces from early May until mid-October.


