Life moved on for them both with marriage, children and divorce until the Google search engine ran into overdrive as it paired them up again.


A frenzy of modern correspondence followed and not willing to let her slip away again, Eddie proposed, married and whisked her 'across the ditch' to join us in Roleystone.

"It's not just an ordinary house - it's their life! Ron designed and built this place," said Elisa Pesch, aged 13, who proceeded to carry some of our artworks up my steep drive to safety.

That's the way it was - a bit of last minute panic when I was asked to evacuate - and a bit of "*what shall I take with me*?" - followed by a spout of questionable decisions and regrets about what I didn't take - then all OK in the end - except for an ashen valley, a lingering smell of burnt eucalyptus and a very different outlook from the one I have enjoyed for the past twenty years. A good challenge to reproduce the scene captured in the photo utilising some of the burnt charcoal left in the wake of the blaze.


Already the kangaroos are back, the robins are splashing in the birdbath, the grass trees are sprouting and the kookaburras are laughing.

It is no laughing matter, however, when contemplating the devastation down the valley. I feel very sad for families from Kelmscott and beyond who lost their homes and possessions and especially sorry for one talented student/artist from our group who lost her home and precious artworks.

I must give you an incident that my husband and I will never ever forget. Two ladies came over to us and started talking and during the conversation asked where we were going to sleep. At that time we did not realise there was another gymnasium there as well and we said we probably would be sleeping on the floor. They said "no way" and they went to their homes nearby and


CONSTRUCTION OF TEMPORARY BRIDGE


The construction of a temporary bridge over the Canning River on Brookton Highway is well underway and is expected to be finished in early March 2011. Main Roads WA began demolition of the old Buckingham Bridge, which collapsed during the Roleystone-Kelmscott bushfire, on 14 February.

Pipework was then laid in the river bed and the road embankment was constructed. The Canning River is now flowing through the pipes and the roadway is being built above it.

Local residents and through traffic will soon have access to the full length of Brookton Highway. The opening could be prior to the long weekend in March. This will allow for the removal of detours and a return to normal traffic conditions.

Welcome to Chris Phillips who has recently been appointed as General Manager of Kaarakin.

Since January 2011 Chris, his wife Carley and their young 7 month old son James, have started their new lives as the residential managers of the Black Cockatoo Preservation Society's headquarters based at the rehabilitation centre (the old Cohunu site, off Mills Road in Martin). The organisation is going from strength to strength and with the appointment of Chris as a fulltime Manager, the group are hoping to achieve their aim to save the Black Cockatoo from extinction. The President of the Black Cockatoo Preservation Society, Glenn Dewhurst is very enthusiastic about Chris coming on board.

'Chris has a passion for wildlife and he will be working around the clock to improve this place. Chris will be running the

daily operations of the centre, organising volunteers and engaging the community. Glenn said.

Last year the group released over 500 birds back into the wild. Chris aims to improve on this. His initial focus is to continue to restore the old Cohunu site which was left severely degraded. The group is currently building a 60 metre flight aviary, to help the birds with their rehabilitation prior to release.

Chris has a degree in Conservation and Wildlife Biology and this role is very important to him. He has served with the Sea Shepherd Conservation Society 'saving our whales' and this passion is translated into the need to save our cockatoos.

'The Black Cockatoo is classified under

the WA wildlife act as 'rare (likely to become extinct)'. The species is experiencing a population crash, with numbers estimated to be as low as 8% of their original numbers. If we want our children to see these wonderful creatures we have to act now to save them, we must protect their habitats and improve their chances of breeding successfully.' Chris said.

The Black Cockatoo Preservation Society is seeking volunteers to help with the cockatoos. A range of roles are available and not all are strenuous activities. The group would like to invite local school groups and community organisations to visit (and perhaps to volunteer to help!) Please note that prior contact is essential before entry. Joyce and Mike Arnott are practising the 'Good Life' in their backyard with a full aquaponics outfit providing a large amount of their fresh produce. They are self confessed 'hopeless gardeners', with a history of failed veggie gardens ('We forget to water them!' said Joyce). The system they have now is very self sufficient (once the ecosystem is in balance).

The system involves aquaculture (in their case growing Silver Perch) and hydroponics cultivating soil less vegetables that are enriched with the wastes produced by the perch! The fish feed the plants; the plants clean the water for the fish the system copies nature. The plants filter the wastes out and fresh clean water is returned to the perch. Plus the Arnotts get to consume some beautiful vegetables in the process.

They are now just about to sample



some of the larger silver perch - an event that they have been eagerly anticipating.

They have been experimenting for over twelve months and they think they have it right now. The system is in balance. The vegetables are really large, tasty and fresh, plus there is minimal waste as you only pick what you want (eg the outer leaves of the lettuce.) They are currently growing: tomatoes, cucumbers, capsicums, squash, watermelon, zucchinis, lettuce, strawberries and herbs. Their system is under shade cloth (to deter some very hungry kookaburras from feeding on their fish. The whole system is truly organic (Joyce occasionally adds some Seasol to the foliage to ensure trace elements are available.)

The whole thing involves some upfront expense (they estimate the system cost around \$6000) but they consider it to be well worth it. They purchased their system from Backyard Aquaponics in Jandakot (who can be contacted on 9414 93354 or enquiries @backyardaquaponics .com)

'We get to eat food we have grown ourselves so we know how it is grown and that it is very fresh' Joyce said. If you want more information you can contact Mike on 0433 367487.

A Very Sad Sight: By Paul Mutton

This "crab" trap was pulled this month from the Canning River by the Thompson Rd Bridge in the Roley Pool Reserve. Inside it was the dead remains of a native Australian Water Rat that had drowned in it a few hours before. Also present were about 20 undersized marron (the intended target) that it had been trying to access.


These traps are illegal to use in streams and rivers and are death traps to all that enter them. If you come across them remove them straight away, and let the users know of the damage they do. A small scout around the area revealed the mummified remains of a second Water Rat that is likely to have met the same fate.

These animals are quite uncommon and are the top native carnivore in our river. The population must be under pressure from a declining river health and a noticeable decrease in the abundance of food sources (including marron, mussels, gilgies, and shrimp). To find them still living in our area is a rare fortune and a reminder that we still have special environment that needs our support to survive the pressures. Guest Editorial

This month, with the true horror of the bushfires so recently upon us, I thought it appropriate to invite 'an independent expert' to make comment on the bushfire risk we all face.

Why do some houses burn and others don't ?

There have been extensive studies into why some houses burn in bushfires and others don't. A number of research organisations including the CSIRO and the Bushfire Co-operative Research Centre have surveyed over 3750 damaged and undamaged homes since a 1944 bushfire.

We know that the major bushfire attack mechanisms



radiant heat and direct flame contact. Wind can also impact on homes by damaging the building envelope allowing embers to enter.

on homes are ember attack,

The main factors which affect house survival are:

1 – The weather conditions. Severe weather influences both the magnitude of a bushfire impact, and likewise the vulnerability of a home to ignition. Studies have found that virtually all house losses occur during severe, extreme or catastrophic weather conditions (ie when the Fire Danger Indices are over 50).

2 – Surrounding Bushfire Fuels

This includes all the elements that will burn, their size, structure, moisture content and arrangement both vertically and horizontally in the environment. Houses closer to these fuels experience higher bushfire attack levels. To put this into context, the Australian Standard (AS 3959-2009), Construction of buildings in bushfire-prone areas) indicates a home on flat land needs to be a minimum of 42 metres from open forest otherwise plain float glass windows can crack and fail. In terms of fuel quantity, if the amount of available fuel is doubled, the fire will travel at twice the speed, but the fires intensity will be fourfold. 3 - Local topography

Generally for every increase in slope of 10 degrees, a bushfire will double its forward rate of spread and intensity. This is why houses on slopes are at higher risk from bushfire attack.

4 - House design

This relates to how complex a home is, how easily embers will be caught in corners, etc. Elevated homes with subfloor spaces, decks and complex roof designs are more vulnerable to ember accumulation attack. Homes with gaps larger than 2mm in the building envelope are vulnerable to ember entry which has been identified as the main cause of most house ignitions.

5 – Building Materials Homes with combustible wall cladding, timber decks, timber steps, timber window and door frames and evaporative coolers are all more vulnerable to ignition in bushfires.

6 - Landscape objects Objects such as sheds,

mats and general clutter all catch embers, if they are close to a house can easily ignite first which can then threaten the main house with their own radiant heat, flames and embers. 7 – Human Behaviour Brigade and occupant behaviour before, during and after a fire event plays a major role in house survival. Many homes are saved after a fire font has passed. House survival rates can increase 3-5 times then that of undefended homes. Staying to actively defend a property can be a good option for people who have comprehensively prepared homes, have safety zones and contingency plans, are mentally and physically prepared and have all the necessary equipment. It does of course carry the increased risk of injury and death. Late evacuation also carries significant risks to people when fleeing a bushfire.

wood heaps, garden, door

The challenge is to determining if the standard of your home is appropriate to the level of risk it is exposed too? Many homes in WA have not been constructed to even minimal bushfire standards.

Loui was one of the foremost orchardists in the district and leaves a large family and a wonderful legacy.

Fire Preparedness

I despair sometimes at the lack of fire preparation on some Roleystone properties.

I drive along Brookton Highwaya and along Urch Rd for instance. There are some people who have gone to a lot of effort to reduce fuel load on their properties, they have put in firebreaks, they have slashed grass, they have no trees near their homes, they have areas around the home for fire trucks, and so on. Fabulous. This is how it needs to be. Then there are others who have done nothing. Who do not have fire breaks. Who have homes surrounded by scrub, trees, and the like. Who have knee high dead weeds (dead watsonia on Brookton Highway for instance is dreadful) and grass at the front of their properties on the road verge. This increases the risk not

Mia Rae Caccetta was born at 1:51 pm on the 01/01/2011 weighing 1.1pounds (480grams) and arriving 15 weeks premature.

My wife Lynda was not feeling well on the 30th of December so I took her to Armadale Hospital Emergency as a precaution. Upon admission she was diagnosed with preeclampsia and rushed to the labour and birthing ward of Armadale. It was there we were informed of the situation and told that the baby would need to come out within the next 2 days as the placenta had become toxic to Lynda.

Lynda was rushed by ambulance to King Edward Memorial Hospital and was under 24 hour monitoring to see if the condition worsened. At lunch time on the 1st of January we were told that the baby would need to be delivered by emergency caesarean and within the hour Lynda and I were in the operating theatre and baby Mia was born.

The main concern for Mia was for her lungs as being born this early they are not yet ready to breathe on their own. Lynda was given steroids to help develop Mia's lungs and they had the desired effect meaning Mia only needed basic ventilation in the nursery.

She is doing really well and now weighs a whopping 2.5pounds (1115grams). Mum Lynda has fully recovered and spends most of her time by Mia's incubator cot. 

OUR FAMILY IN MEXICO

Our son was 4 years old. He had just come home and was excitedly showing us his drawing of the Nativity.

"This is baby Jesus and this is Mary, his mother. Here are the three wise men, and a shepherd." His voice was enthusiastic and full

of pride. "And who's this?" I asked, pointing to a short fat figure near the manger.

"That's Round John Virgin" he replied.

Robert is now a missionary in Mexico City, with his wife and twin sons.....which is why his every 3 or so years.

Mexico City has a population greater than the entire population of Australia in an area measuring about 40 kms by 40 kms. This is much smaller than the area of greater Perth. It is a vibrant, noisy, colourful, exotic and exciting city with a plethora of historical buildings and Aztec ruins to visit, from the Pyramids of the Sun and moon - Teotihuacan - to the magnificent castle of Chapultepec. Robert, Shelley and our grandchildren - twin boys - live near the UNAM, the largest university in the Americas, if not the world, with an enrolment of over 350 000 and up to

50 000 of these students walk past the house every day,

My son and daughter in law cater to the passing students in Christian Outreach through a cafe they have set up in front of their home. They provide low cost coffee and food to students who have quite likely spent a couple of hours travelling to get to the University. Their street is a hive of activity; although only about 150 metres long, during the semester each house turns into a restaurant,

Nearby is the beautiful plaza of Coyoacan with art galleries, museums restaurants and the picturesque hustle and bustle of the artisans' market - a treasure trove of local handicrafts that are authentically Mexican.

Of course it is not all "beer and skittles." There is a darker side to the city and the presence of armed police and news reports of drug cartels etc are constant, with many murders mainly in cities closer to the USA border. Crime and poverty are evident (the traffic is another story!) Although I have been heard to say that our trips are just very expensive babysitting, we really do enjoy ourselves in this exciting environment.

Our family in Mexico is there to spread the word of God, nurturing and nourishing selected student workers. They provide a drop in centre, study facilities for fellow students and extend the hand of friendship, teaching' preaching and leading by example. For those of you who know Robert Chapman, also known as Dr Thrill, be assured that Dr Thrill is alive and well, delighting in his family and sharing generously in his chosen community.



The shots on the left page were taken by Ben Rampling. Ben grew up in Roleystone and has lived here for most of his life. In the last few years Ben has become familiar with the larger reserves around Roleystone from researching, mapping and photographing the Canning Contour Channel and surrounds.

'Most of the channel between Contour Road and the Cockram's old house on Turner Road is now highly visible because of the fire, including the three inverted syphons (42" steel pipes) that run through the valleys on the northern side of Brookton Highway. The photograph of the Contour Road trail was taken from a high vantage point in the reserve west of Urch road, not far from one of the syphons, with a lens set at 150mm, last Thursday (17 February). The fire started within a couple of hundred metressouth of the track.'

The photograph of the tree was taken on Tuesday evening (15 February), above the channel between Canning Mills Road and Turner Road, with a wide lens set at 24mm. Most of the area around it was previously grasses and very low shrubs, and has burnt down completely to powdery ash over the rocks and dirt.

Since we are studying birds in Room 13, it has been a very timely appearance. It is also quite unusual to see these birds during the day.

As we head into the new school year, there is an air of excitement, and perhaps some are feeling a trifle daunted, at the prospect of running the usual classroom programmes, as well as helping out with 'THE MOVE'.

Part of our first Pupil Free day was devoted to small committees being formed to deal with different aspects of the move. Discussion around the tables was animated and earnest, as staff recorded their thoughts and ideas and tried to foresee problems which may arise. The scope of issues needing to be dealt with is enormous and these initial discussions have highlighted the importance of excellent communication between all parties.

Our staff profile has been enhanced this year with the appointment of Mr Bruce Fraser. Bruce is well – known around Roleystone through his involvement in his sons' sporting activities. 
Room 17 and me in Room 13 are being referred to as 'the bookends'. Take note - as we may hold things together we can just as easily slip out of line when too much pressure is applied!

To celebrate Roleystone Primary School I will be setting space aside each month, to record some personal memories and snippets from people associated with the school in the past.

I asked Maryke Newell (nee Tenhave) about her memories of the last time the school moved sites, back in 1956. Maryke came to Roleystone from Holland with her family in 1952. At one time, her family actually lived in the schoolmaster's house adjacent to the school, on the site opposite Roleystone Theatre (formerly Roleystone Hall). Maryke's father was building their own home in Tyers Road, meaning that once they moved in, they had to walk all the way to and from the old school site. Maryke was part of the first group of children to attend the new school. When I asked what her parents thought of the move, she said she really didn't know. (I suggested that that may have been

because parents didn't discuss controversial issues in front of their children back then. Maryke agreed, but said that as migrant children they were privy to much more adult information than Australian kids because they had to interpret for their parents!) However, Maryke remembers being very excited about moving into the brand new buildings (including the toilet block that still stands).

There were three classrooms instead of two, so they had much more room; and they would have a new teacher. It also meant a much shorter walk through the bush every morning and afternoon. One thing that Maryke remembered was being able to pop down to Roley Pool when she lived on Brookton Highway. Not quite such an easy thing, from Tyers Road! Thank you, Maryke. Pat Watson



Organic Growers How to Prepare Your Home and Property for Bushfires

The March meeting of Roleystone Organic Growers will be about how to prepare your home and property in case there is a bushfire. We should prepare our homes to survive a bushfire even if we intend to leave. A well prepared and constructed house is more likely to survive a bushfire than an unprepared

Chris Cairns from the Rolevstone Volunteer Fire Brigade will be explaining to us the types of things that we can do to prepare our homes and properties. She will be discussing heights of vegetation to have near your home, clearing rubbish and flammable items, minimising ember damage, appropriate clothing to wear during a fire, and preventative measures such as wire flyscreens and covering evaporative coolers.

After the devastating fire, there is so much to say and so little. My heart goes out to every one of you! I think the only thing that has come out of this is a re-evaluation that what matters in the world, is not things but people and animals. Thank you all for being the caring community you are.

An old saying I recall was that I used to worry that I had no shoes, until I saw a man with no feet. I despair when I think of water shortages and burnt plants. Remember that the root system is under the ground and will probably come back, so too will the bulbs. The epicormic buds on our native plants will be back soon and many of the trees that currently look dead will survive. A friend of mine was burnt out and about four years later some of the camellias regenerated. Try not to cut back plants until we get cool weather again. Let the damaged parts protect the roots and lower vegetation.

My garden is looking terrible at the moment with no water for the last month. Still most of the camellias in any area of shade are still protected and shiny green. Some that I planted this past year are definitely not going to come back, and it is now time to rethink the survivor plants that can exist without summer watering. Some of the pelargoniums are looking quite beautiful and the roses have been very good.

> The Jacaranda trees, looking beautiful in their own right, are providing good shade to other plants. Cistus and day lillies continue under all weather extremes. I find more and more I am enjoying my irises and day lillies, daffodils and other bulbs. They are fantastic for areas you do not want to water.

> Following the fires, this is a good time to issue timely warnings about native plants too close to the house particularly the plants with oil in their leaves. This includes all of the Myrtacea family which includes gum trees. Lucerne trees have the virtue of not being readily flammable as do the grey leafed wormwoods and the stately deciduous trees. Some of the succulent plants are very attractive and are great survivors.

> Have you noticed the amount of blossoms on the Marri trees? I do hope that that means we are in for a wet winter. There is only so much water available and if we do not get rain and we continue using what water that is available, I despair for generations to come.

> Continue relaxing and in the cooler moments, try to get mulch back onto the ground otherwise when the winter rains come the topsoil will all be washed away. Good Gardening. Jean



Wild Gossip



I have to say a big THANK YOU twice! My first THANK YOU is to the lovely people who contacted me during the recent fires to offer help relocating the wildlife I have in care, aviary space, cages, carriers and even accommodation if we needed it – fortunately we did not have to leave, but the offers were really kind & appreciated.

My second THANK YOU is to the lovely people who contacted me after the fires to offer help for any injured wildlife – very few victims were admitted, but all offers were deeply appreciated. Hopefully the lack of admissions means that most of our beautiful wildlife got away in time, though the ferocity of the fire suggests otherwise. There will be a lot of displaced wildlife, with shelter, food and water hard to find. We can help our wildlife by providing water in shallow dishes on and above the ground, deploying bird feeders around our property, placing possum boxes & platforms in our trees and hollow logs or pipes on the ground. We can also plant native trees, shrubs & plants on our property and create safe areas that are pet free. Our wildlife is really precious and we all need to make an effort to protect it for future generations to enjoy. On the brighter side:

A few mornings ago there was a tremendous squawking and screeching noise in my garden that alarmed me enough that I dashed outside to see what on earth it was. I found a proud pair of Red Tail Cockatoos showing off their two babies! The noise continued at the front so I went to investigate to find another, equally proud, pair of Red Tail Cockatoos showing off their two babies. I guess my garden was chosen to host the best baby competition!

Assisting Pets Preventing Heartworm Dr Judith Congrene 0433 2137 28

In last month's Courier, my article was about understanding heartworm. Here are the methods for preventing heartworm infection in dogs and cats. The heartworm is a seriously dangerous worm affecting the flow of blood, which may cause damage to the heart and lungs. It is therefore a dangerous illness which is occurring internally often without the owner's knowledge, because there aren't any obvious external signs or changes. Cats can often die suddenly without much prior warning, even if there is only one heartworm present. Thus prevention rather than treatment is important. Different forms of prevention are available and have the flexibility to suit most dogs.

The necessary preventions are available in one formula. The annual injection for dogs is based on weight – very convenient to do at the same time as the annual health check and vaccinations. The other forms of prevention are able to be given by the owner in daily or monthly tablets or chewable doses, or as spot on treatments, for dogs and cats.

Other than the vaccination injection for dogs only, there are a variety of treatments which can be combined with flea control, intestinal worming, mange and ear mites. These multi purpose forms can be quite cost effective especially compared to using several individual products to control fleas, intestinal worms and mites.

During the summer holidays I was lucky enough to travel, with another KSHS student Kia O'Neill, to Germany on a ten week scholarship sponsored by SAGSE.


I will continue to keep you informed. If all goes to plan it could still be a few years before any building commences as the processes involved to get there, take time.





Pro Bono: Icy Poles **David Bardsley Minister Community Church**



Dear Friends

Just occasionally as a management consultant, you get the cream of jobs. I did. Just once. Ice cream. I had a month working on stock management at Peters' Ice Cream factory. Being surrounded by my favourite confection was quite an entertaining as well as appetising experience in spite of wrestling with optimum batch quantities of choc chips.

One of the highlights was seeing icy poles produced amazingly quickly on a huge carousel chilled in liquid nitrogen - that's very cold! And the process had some interesting moments. The carousel had nests in lines radiating from its hub and it clicked round from job to job. Firstly a little fruit juice mix was introduced. It was frozen when it reached the second stop where sticks were automatically flicked into each nest and held in place. The next job saw the rest of the juice injected. The whole lot was frozen solid by the fourth stop where a jet of steam was played on the outside of the nest to release each icy pole. All the icy poles in each line were lifted out together by their sticks and dropped into the output chute. From there they went for packing. Wonderful. When all went well. But it was vulnerable to jams in the stick dispenser and if no sticks hit the nests, the icy poles would be stuck there and go round a second time. The juice dispensers would then shoot the stuff all over the carousel and the whole lot would freeze up, taking ages to clean.

So when something went wrong, a sensor triggers a siren and a bright red flashing light. Anybody nearby would dash to the

machine, grab some sticks and load them by hand into the circulating nests, hoping they would freeze in and be picked out before the output chute. Loud shouting and arm waving appeared to be mandatory all hugely entertaining to an observer.

In stark contrast, something going wrong in real life is never amusing or entertaining although sometimes accompanied by flashing lights and sirens. My wife discovering a lump where there shouldn't be one tipped us both down a spiral into deep waters for most of the 48 hours it took to find out it was benign. But it was a time when we really evaluated what was important to us and we actually surfaced before the prognosis was finalised. Again, when they lost everything in the recent bushfire, our friends were able to say, "It's only stuff that's gone – we still have each other and our memories...and our faith."

Black Sunday, as it is being labelled, is a wake up call for us all. Obviously we should wake up and evaluate what we can do to minimise the impact of such an event. But we should also wake up and evaluate what is really important to us. How much of our identity and the meaning we make of life is tied up in "stuff"? At the start of this millennium, the Sydney Harbour Bridge displayed in huge letters "ETERNITY". Our physical life, three score years and ten (or a bit more if you are fortunate enough to live in Australia – oh, as long as you are not indigenous) is a blip in the context of eternity. So what's more important - that which will pass away or that which lasts forever? Your call... Yours in Christ David



It is estimated that 19% of Australians smoke and that smoking contributes to 12% of all deaths in Australia.

On average 7 minutes of life are lost every time you smoke a cigarette. So depending on how young you started and how many cigarettes you have smoked, your life may be shortened by 7-13 years.

Astronomical Highlights March

This year's already held more than enough unpleasant surprises in terms of extreme weather events. In this neck of the woods, I worry most about hot days with strong winds and the attendant fire risk.

Being no sort of meteorologist, I won't attempt to predict the weather for the month of March but I draw some solace from the approach of the equinox on the 21st. The shortening of the days to about 12 hours by the end of the month should begin to bring some relief from the summer heat.

Imagine being at the equator where the day length is about 12 hours all year round.

Latitude is the key: the further you are from the equator, the greater the seasonal difference in day length. Also, the twilights are shorter along the equator. For instance, you've probably heard people say that in a Bali evening the Sun goes down and it's just suddenly dark.

The year-round differences in twilight times for, say, Bali and Perth are actually only a few minutes. Much further from the equator the differences are significant. Like in Tierra del Fuego?

The Moon begins this month in waning crescent phase, the morning crescent. New moon i.e. no moon, is on the 5th: the start of a new lunar cycle. The waxing (evening) crescent moon comes well into view on the 8th when it's setting around 8pm. Teachers, your evening moon obs should go from the 8th until full moon on the 20th. Last quarter's on the 26th and the next new moon's April 4th. Saturn's the planet of choice this month. Unlike Jupiter or Venus, it doesn't attract your attention by being very bright. If you see it in a telescope, though, you'll know why it's so favoured.

Your first view of the ring system is startling. Saturn rises in the east around 8:45pm at the beginning of the month, then steadily earlier. By midmonth it's rising around the end of evening twilight. By month's end it's easily visible low in the east as darkness falls. At daybreak it's over in the WNW. Venus continues to dominate the morning sky, looking like a cosmic beacon in the eastern sky at dawn. Its rising time is about 3am in early March, 3:20am mid-month, and 3:50 late in the month. It'll still be the "morning star" until July.
