


### May Cover

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### We can have both!

Good news this month. We have quite a few key people last month interested in retaining the oval, and we have determined that it could be viable to have both the oval retained and retirement accommodation on the site. Local Councillor, Caroline Wielinga, supports saving the oval and surrounding bushland and attended the last Retirement Living Project Committee meeting chaired by Cr Pat Hart, to present a proposal that combined the retention of the oval with seniors accommodation units and to learn if this was a viable option. We have also learnt that during the Retirement Living Project public meeting (30th October) people had requested for the oval be retained. This was also requested in writing to our councillors a month following the meeting. I had a couple of meetings with Kelvin Oliver (former Gosnells Town Planner and a member on the Committee) who has brought me up to speed with the planning procedures. Kelvin has also been toying with various concept plans including Oval and Retirement Accommodation proposals. If the Retirement Accommodation used a septic system such as a BioMAX, at least 40 units could be built while still retaining the Oval and surrounding bushland. As advised at the public meeting by Dale Cottages, 25 to 32 units would make the site viable.

The BioMAX system will actually produce water, which has been earmarked for the cross park oval. Expressions of interest have been received from potential developers.

It is understood that several of these submissions requested to develop part of the site, leaving the oval intact. This supports the viability of the combined Oval and Retirement Accommodation proposal. So it does appear possible - but we need your input to ensure it happens.

Unfortunately we have been described as a "small group of proponents" - so please

contact our MP, Tony Simpson, to let him know that you wish to keep our small community oval (phone: 9525 4822 email:<u>darlingrange@</u>

So how do we save the Robin Road Oval? Two ways - either we make sure that a special condition is included in the rezoning documents to protect the Oval. Better still, we should ask our member of parliament (Tony) for this portion of the land to be gifted to the City of Armadale. In the following months we will need to determine the cost of maintaining the Robin Road Oval for the Council's deliberation. Local business sponsorship of the Oval may be required. Please contact Chris if you are interested in this concept (0439901932). I've been advised that the State may not wish to proceed with rezoning if the community is divided. Worst case, this could mean that the site becomes open for general sale and we could all lose out. Discussion is good at this stage, but ultimately we need to all come together to support a single resolution. This is where we at at the moment: The State Government is now compiling a set of rezoning documents to rezone the site for "special use Seniors Accommodation". These will be presented to Council and the Council will publish them for public comment (from 1 to 3 months).

During the public comment period, we as residents have the opportunity to write submissions to Council regarding retaining the oval. Hopefully a public meeting will also be held during this period. Council will then make a recommendation to the WAPC, and the WAPC will finalise the documents taking all submissions into consideration.



# Lest We Forget: an Anzac Day Tribute **Bill Mitchell: A True Survivor**



With the 70 year anniversary of the Battle of Tobruk just passed, it is timely to reflect on the experiences of our own Bill Mitchell who experienced war service at this site and in other theatres of war during the Second World War.

Bill Mitchell served with the 2/43 Infantry Battalion over the war's duration. He was a miner from Boulder and he decided to enlist after the fall of France, being called up in December 1940.

After six months of training on Vickers Machine Guns his infantry battalion was sent as reinforcements to Palestine, sailing on the Queen Mary in July 1941. They were sent into Tobruk, following the horrific Salient attack. (Australian losses in this skirmish had been considerable. The 2/24th Battalion alone had wounded or taken prisoner).

grandstand view of the attack (an English War ship off the coast was shelling the town) and in amongst all of the lights, bombs and noise he was called to 'come back to the front line'. In the ensuing melee Bill was wounded with a bullet in the elbow and a gaping wound in the back caused by shrapnel.

For the next eight months Bill was sent to a number of hospitals: Alexandria, Gaza Ridge and finally back home where he was in and out of Hollywood Hospital.

In May 1943 Bill rejoined his unit who were headed for New Guinea and the Song River. Bill's Christmas present that year was a case of dengue fever which forced him back to Queensland to recover. He had to walk down the mountain to the medical post with a temperature of 104 degrees and following treatment he had to walk back up the mountain to recover his pack.

But the War was still not over for Bill. His next posting

was to Borneo. He arrived just in time for the assault on Labraun (an island off the coast of Borneo).

The war finished and Bill spent the following months collecting Japanese soldiers in open backed trucks and repatriating them to Japan. He hitched a ride on a Catalina and flew back to Perth about six months after the Japanese surrender.

After his discharge on 23rd January 1946 Bill found work with a family on an orchard in Carmel. (As Bill had contracted malaria he was not able to go back to the mines). He heard (from Ted Garland who owned the block next door) that a block was for sale in Roleystone and purchased their orchard (now the site of the Vale, Holden road).

Bill met and married Wanda a former army lass, in 1948 and raised their six children on the orchard until 1981 when Bill retired to his home in Heather Road.

As the number of World War two veterans diminishes, Bill is still going strong as a 94 year old – they made them tough in those days.

March to spend 3 weeks travelling through Jordan and Syria and what an amazing journey it was.

We spent the first 3 days in Amman, staying with Sam, who I met while he was at Curtin Uni completing his PhD.

It was great to have Sam show us a part of Jordan we would not have got to experience if we had been on our own. We spent a day wandering around the ancient Roman City of Jerash with an imposing collection of archways, theatres, temples and cobbled streets.

A swim in the Dead Sea was a must and being very rocky it was hard to find an easy place to get in, so we decided to bluff our way into one of the Resorts as they have pools, bars, yellow sand beaches and ramps into the water. A very inventive story saw us get valet parking and access to the beach.

We also visited the site where Jesus was reported to have been baptised, visited some incredibly old churches and stood on the edge of the Jordan River looking across to Israel.

Petra was definitely the highlight and we spent 3 days there, as it is such an amazing place. To see and really experience what this ancient place is all about you need to climb the thousands of steps and walk the many tracks.

To walk the 1200m As-Sig the main entrance to Petra through deep and narrow gorges to emerge face to face with Al-Khazneh (The Treasury) was incredible. Petra's second most famed attraction is Ad-Deir (Monastery) is a climb of 800 steps cut into the rock and worth every step.

The Palace and Corinthian Tombs are carved into the face of Jabal al-Khubtha

the 700 odd steps to the top of this mountain gives you an amazing view over Petra. Petra is over 2200 years old and was gradually abandoned after the 14th century and was completely lost to the West until a Swiss traveller named Johann Burckhardt rediscovered it in 1812. After spending a day in the desert at Wadi Rum it was back to Amman and the long bus trip to Aleppo in Syria. I really liked the Arabs in the long white robes and I thought of bringing one home but settled for drinking tea with them in a Bedouin tent in the desert.

Syria would have to be one of the most hospitable countries I have visited despite all the trouble reported in the media. We travelled extensively through the country and never saw or experienced any trouble, although the unrest seems to have escalated since we left. Obviously my peace-keeping mission was not very successful!

One of the many highlights for me would have to be the Dead Cities dating back to the 6<sup>th</sup> century and there are reckoned to be some 600 sites. It remains a mystery why these towns were abandoned centuries ago. There are so many wonderful historic sites throughout Syria like, Krak Des Chevaliers, and one of the best preserved Roman theatres found anywhere is in the historic town of Bosra and of course Palmyra dating back thousands of years.

We stayed in the old city of Damascus and absolutely loved wandering around the souq (markets) and all the narrow allyways finding interesting restaurants and courtyards. Even walking back to the hotel at midnight through the narrow ally-ways I never felt concerned or unsafe.

The publication of Chris Horgan's piece in the April edition entitled 'Can We Keep the Oval', certainly struck a chord with many across the community.

There were a variety of responses and much debate and I for one believe that we will end up with a great outcome.

Perhaps as Chris Horgan says 'we can have both'! The oval is certainly lovely and the strip of bushland is a delight. I do not have the same affinity with the buildings - although I did my 7 years of Primary schooling there. Katie Ross feels differently and proposes an alternative vision (see next page).

We all must appreciate the huge amount of leg work that has gone into the proposal to establish Seniors Independent Accommodation on this site. Councillor Pat Hart and her committee have worked tirelessly for over two years to achieve this and in Pat's words 'many of these Seniors sometimes find it hard to have their voices heard'.

I am a supporter of the concept of Seniors Accommodation, although my preferred option was for a high care facility. My wish is that the elderly do not have to leave this community in their last few years. (I understand this is an emotional response and not based on economic considerations)!

Mollie Connole's personal message printed in the May Courier, shows how devastating it was for her to leave Roleystone - when she was too frail to cope.

Still if the reality is that we cannot have high care/hospice accommodation, than Independent Seniors Accommodation is needed (and with an aging population, will be more needed in the future.)

But I am also fully supportive of everyone's right to have a say and written submissions when the rezoning process comes up will be very interesting.

One comment I saw, in the flurry of email comments, did take me back though, when a correspondent questioned whether the 'Senior demographic contributed to the community significantly'.

I do feel the need to defend the needs of this valuable section of our community. I was born here and that is the demographic that did everything for the community when I was growing up. They built Roleystone and Karragullen!

I can understand that people in a community tend to see the same age demographic where-ever they go. Young families tend to join junior sport and school activities and seniors are not so represented in these areas. So does this mean that they feel they do not contribute?

With my editor hat on, I see the huge contribution of the over 55's in nearly every other organisation across the district. I think if we ran a census there would be a vastly disproportionate representation of over 55's as volunteers and contributors across most clubs and organisations across the area.

And when seniors are too old and frail to contibute, does this mean we cease to care for them? I think we would all agree that this is when strong communities support the most.

I lived for some years in mining towns - and one aspect of these towns is that they lack the Seniors demographic. In my opinion this made such towns incomplete. What do you think? So April was an interesting month. At

least we finally had some rain - and hopefully it was in time, as so many of our trees in the bush have died. May we have loads more rain in May! Happy reading to you all. *Linda*

### THE ROLEYSTONE PRIMARY SCHOOL SITE: SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

As you are aware, at the end of this year the Roleystone Primary School will be amalgamated with the Roleystone District High School and all students from Kindergarten to Year 10 will attend school at the newly named Roleystone Community College at the Raeburn Road site. The Roleystone Primary School site has been slated to be used for a privately developed over 55's lifestyle village (low and high care not being financially feasible) and a rezoning process is currently underway to that end.

After recent discussions with Councillor Caroline Wielinga, it is my understanding that in February of this year Landcorp sought Expressions of Interest from prospective purchasers and that in this process the whole of the site was considered for development. However, in an article in last month's Roleystone *Courier*, the subject of saving the Roleystone Primary School oval as a community asset and public open space was raised. In response to this article, I sent an email to my Roleystone network of friends proposing, I must admit, a very utopian notion of preserving the whole primary school site for the benefit of the community. This email was in turn forwarded on to many more residents in Roleystone and the idea garnered a lot of support from several different quarters.

Following on from this show of support, and in order to raise greater awareness within the community, an article was printed in a recent edition of the Comment News. In this article I suggested that perhaps a compromise could be reached whereby the proposed lifestyle village could exist in harmony with some of the current primary school infrastructure being preserved for use by the community.

Indeed, this suggestion was not a new one. In an article published in the Roleystone Courier in September 2009, former Councillor Laurie Scidone wrote: "It is essential that the woodlands area on the western boundary is preserved along with a school building, signifying that a school once stood there..... By transferring delivery of public education in Roleystone to the Raeburn site from 2012, the community has given up an asset in the centre of town. This needs to be recognised by government and in some small way a benefit should be returned to the community." This sentiment was also echoed by Tony Simpson MLA in a recent media statement. Mr Simpson stated: "I do agree there is a shortage of community halls in Roleystone and would suggest that maybe the original school building and its adjacent car park could be retained for use by community groups as a part of the compromise with any successful purchasers... I have always supported the retention of part of the oval for public open space however this would need to be agreed

The original Roleystone Primary School building and the school oval on Robin Road have always signified a sense of place, belonging and community in the very heart of Roleystone. Thousands of students have passed through the school in the nearly 60 years since the Primary School has been located on Robin Road, and who could forget the school fairs, sports carnivals and Carols by Candlelight (when you were allowed to hold a candle!) held on the oval.

The school has been listed on the Heritage Council database since 2001 and a nomination is currently being drafted to ascend the original school building and oval to be protected under the State Register of Heritage Places. As residents of Roleystone, it is not too late for us to speak up and support Mr Simpson's suggestion that the original school building and part of the oval be retained for use by the community. In recent years we have seen an increase in the number of Roleystone residents with new housing developments filling up quickly, but we have not seen a corresponding increase in community facilities for our growing community.

A group of residents who support this vision met recently to discuss how to further the call for retention of community facilities at the Primary School site. It has been suggested that a public survey be run to find out what the community as a whole would like, but any other suggestions of the way forward would be most gratefully accepted. A further meeting will be held in May and details of the date and time for this meeting will be posted on RoleystoneNET and on the display board at the local shopping centre.

Please show your support for retaining some of the important community facilities located on the primary school site, in harmony with a lifestyle village, by attending the upcoming meeting or contacting your local MLA, Tony Simpson, and local City of Armadale councillors. *Katie Ross* 



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

### To the Rainoldi Family

Reminding you what an exceptional bloke Steven was may not help your feeling of loss, but I believe we have lost a central pillar of our community.

Like his mother, Steven always made you feel welcome when you visited, and would care enough to drop in after a hard day's work to catch up - usually with kids or a dog in tow. He didn't just talk shop - he was interested in how our kids were doing, and could wax philosophical at times. He believed kids need a sound set of values to thrive. I admired his strong work ethic, his high work standards, his engineering skills, and his pleasure at sharing his knowledge. While he taught me much (for example, arc welding), he was humble and left you feeling respected and encouraged. To watch him work was an inspiration.

He always had time to help a friend. Once when I dropped in he was trying to grade fruit while a shed full of boys with off-road bikes were getting the benefit of his mechanical knowledge - and his tools. He made our gate sign after I admired his; he repaired my chipper, and was there if I needed advice. I always learnt something valuable and felt the better for having spent time with Steve. When our place was on fire a few years back, Steve was here within





minutes, with our other orchard neighbours, and he saved our house from burning.

My favourite story about Steve's "engineuity" occurred when he was about twenty. I used my new power ladder to help the Rainoldis get their Yates picked (big trees, small apples), and when we had finished he said "Could you leave your power ladder here for a while?" About six weeks later he called me to come and collect it. Imagine my amazement to see a gleaming copy of my power ladder, painted Ford blue, standing in his shed beside mine!

Of course, his creation had a longer beam for extra reach, a diesel engine, a three-speed gearbox and a single, light-touch control joystick - all for less than my demo model cost. He built two more after that. The six months experience in an engineering works after he left school was a great investment! I never tire of singing Steve's praises and I am only one of many with stories of gratitude to tell. The longer you knew him, the more you respected and loved him.

## Vale Tom Meadows - 10/03/2011

On the 10<sup>th</sup> March, 97 year old Roleystone resident Tom Meadows passed away. Here his good friend Frank Brockway, reflects on his memories of Tom over the time he knew him from 1974 to his passing in 2011:

We first met Tom when we enjoyed a farm holiday on Tom's, Damboring farm in 1939. This experience was a contrast to the orchard life that we had grown up with. In 1974 when it was time to retire from farm life, Tom his wife Kathleen and the Meadows family liked the idea of going to an area with lots of trees. They started looking in Roleystone and settled on Evan Gwynne's 6 acre property which was part of the original Buckingham land allocation (part of this can still be seen from Chevin road as MeadowVale).

Not long after he moved to Roleystone I was pleasantly surprised to meet Tom down the shop. He had brought a lot of his farm things with him including his workshop welder etc and we needed two cattle grids which Tom agreed to build, with his usual professional style. After this we needed a fuel depot, & then a gantry; Tom obliged and built these for us too. Tom also helped develop our water truck's self loading systems, in fact Tom was wonderful & helped us out in many ways over the next 15 years.

Tom enjoyed a challenge, he made things out of what other people would call 'scrap'. We had a problem of weight, we wanted to decant 44 gallon drums into 4 gallon containers & get the weight correct so Tom made us some balance scales. We put a tin with correct weight on one side & filled the empty tin until it balanced. He rebuilt one of his farm tractors for his son, but couldn't get the parts so he made them himself. He was very handy.

Tom was the most intelligent man I have known. He had only been able to go to school for three years when he had to leave & work on the farm. He studied through correspondence & always got good marks. His knowledge never ceased to amaze me. I asked about the number of basic minerals and he replied that there are 92 and named 27 of them before he ran out of memory.

At seventy five his arthritis forced him to retire from manual work. So he bought a computer and proceeded to write a book. He found that the computer couldn't print the pictures he wanted so Tom had to change computers & get one that would. When he finished his first book he tried to get somebody to print it but no publisher could be found, so he bound it himself, all 52 copies of it. I am privileged to have one of those copies about life in Western Australia from the early 1900's. Life today seems so easy by comparison. Tom went on to write two more books & do lots more with his photography.

Unfortunately his wife Kathleen died on May 6, 2000 & his daughter Rosemary looked after him until he died in March. He would write to the papers or anybody else if he felt strongly enough about the subject.

He recently wrote to the Armadale Hospital to say that, although people complain about our hospitals, in his experience they were without fault. Tom has made a great contribution to the world in his 97 years & will be sadly missed by his family & friends. *Frank Brockway*

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

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

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

# What is my Home's Bushfire Attack Level?

### A similar question could be: What is my level of bushfire risk or how will a bushfire attack my home?

The Australian Standard (AS 3959-2009) Construction of Buildings in Bushfire prone areas outlines methodology to determine a homes' Bushfire Attack Level (BAL).

Bushfire behavior variables (surface and overall fuel loads, slope, Fire Danger Index and flame temperature) are put into a fire behavior model to determine a predicted bushfire's forward rate of spread and flame height.

Other site specific variables such as the setback distance to vegetation and flame width, are determined to predict the homes exposure to bushfire attack mechanisms. This is used to determine what standard new homes in bushfire areas should be constructed to. The results provide a predicted radiant heat flux exposure, ember attack and flame contact for your home.

The problem is, that in the Perth hills (and most of WA) most homes have not been constructed to any bushfire standards.

However all is not lost because once you have this information you know exactly how to retrofit your home to meet the appropriate standard. Without doing this you are just guessing.

For example, you may screen your home for ember attack, but if your Bushfire Attack Level is predicted to have a radiant heat flux above 12.5 kilowatts per m2, then your windows could break from the radiant heat allowing the bushfire access to your home. Fuel reduction and burning of bush blocks is important for obvious reasons however a good program shouldnot consider your fuel levels in isolation. They need to be considered in conjunction with the setback distance and slope under the surrounding vegetation and the bushfire construction standard of your home.

There are three options available to improve your home's ability to resist igniting in a bushfire:

1 –Reduce surrounding litter and overall fuel loads ( and increase setback distances) to reduce your predicted Bushfire Attack Level.

2 – Increase the bushfire construction standard of your home to match the existing predicted Bushfire Attack Level.

3 – Reduce fuel loads and increase construction standards ( ie match your Bushfire Attack Level to your home's construction standard.

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

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### GARDENING NOTES JEAN: 9397 5547

Autumn is with us but we haven't had the beautiful colours on our deciduous trees this year – the cold has been late in coming.

Still we can all enjoy the cooler weather and see what plants we can save that have battled through the long hot dry summer. I am amazed at the tenacity of some of the plants! The trees in the Canning Valley that were burnt in the fires are already sporting so much green foliage.

During the past month I had the opportunity to plant out a section of the garden with tall bearded Iris. Irises are great survivors like the day lilies, which went virtually dormant over the summer and are now poking their heads through. These are one of the best plants that I know for holding the soil where the gardener wants it to stay. The flowers throughout summer are a welcome bonus but the roots are the garden saviours.

Be very careful with your use of fertilisers; any excessive use just leaches out of the root area. Once we get rain it will drain down into catchment areas and flow to low points on your property where it then can burn all your wanted vegetation.

Some members of the Roleystone Garden Group enjoyed a quiet morning in April while the rest of the group attended Mollie Connole's service to celebrate her life.

The garden group meet every third Thursday at 10-00 a.m. I have organised a very special treat in May for all the ladies, to make up for not doing anything special in April so I hope to see you all then.


I'm not sure how many of you have had success with growing the dwarf Bougainvilleas. There is a very attractive range of them available and they almost thrive on neglect. In fact, if they are neglected they form beautiful bracts around their very insignificant little white flowers and forget to grow thorns!

All the dwarf growers have patents on them so they can only be grown for sale under license and must be sold with their registered ticket. This is a compensation for all the work done in breeding and releasing the new varieties.

The Nurseries are inundated with new drought resistant types of plants and now is a good time to go out and make your selection, so you can get the plants acclimatised before the chill of winter comes along.

Try to get your new bulbs in this month while there is still warmth in the soil and the rains hopefully will be here to make them feel at home. Plant bulbs into the areas where plants died over the summer and they will not rot out from overwatering.



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**CHANGES TO JURIES IN WA**

New legislation which passed through State Parliament recently will bring Western Australia's jury system into the 21st century. These changes mean that people who fail to comply with their civic duty could face an \$800 fine.

The changes have been brought forward as a result of review by the Law Reform Commission of Western Australia into juries. The Commission determined that the incidence of excuse from jury service and failure to attend was unacceptably high. In 2009-2010, a staggering 64% of people summoned for jury duty were either exempted or excused from duty.

In an attempt to curtail this exemption rate, the new laws provide that professions which were previously exempt from jury duty, such as lawyers, doctors and expolice officers, are now eligible for service. Serving on a jury is an important part of our criminal system and each person

should be afforded the opportunity to contribute through this civic duty.

The changes also amend the age category for those who are able to participate as a juror, lifting the eligible age from 65 to 75 years. These people play an important role in our community and should be given the same opportunity as everyone else to serve on a jury.

The new laws also seek to send a clear message to employers with the provision of harsh fines of up to \$10,000 for individual employers and up to \$50,000 for companies, if they prohibit employees from acting as a juror.

The changes seek to strengthen Western Australia's criminal justice system by ensuring that juries act as a better representation of our community.

### STROKE: SIGNS AND TREATMENT

The correct term for a stroke is cerebrovascular disease, where blood flow to the brain is affected. There are two types of strokes: ischemic and haemorrhagic.

Ischemic strokes (80-85% of all strokes) occur when a blood clot blocks a vessel in the brain resulting in the death of brain cells beyond the clot, or a blood clot travels from the heart or lungs and gets lodged in the brain. A haemorrhagic stroke occurs when a blood vessel bursts in the brain. Transient Ischemic attacks, known as TIA's, result in stroke-like symptoms for short periods of time. Up to 40% of people who suffer an ischemic stroke report having had TIA's beforehand.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS: include sudden confusion, possible loss of vision or speech, drooping of the face and loss of limb function.

RISK FACTORS: High blood pressure, high cholesterol, blocked carotid artery (Main artery in the neck), diabetes, smoking and heart conditions. All of these conditions are potentially treatable. It is vital if a person is experiencing TIA's that they give up smoking, that their blood pressure is treated and that their cholesterol is kept low.

Secondary Stroke Prevention: For anyone diagnosed with TIA's or an ischemic stroke it is recommended to introduce treatment of blood pressure to achieve a target blood pressure of 130/80 or less. Lowering the blood pressure reduces the risk of secondary stroke. Use of Coversyl Plus or Tritace with Natrilix has been shown to be successful. Introduction of a "statin" such

as Lipitor or Crestor to ensure the LDL's (bad cholesterol) is below 2mmol/litre has been shown to reduce the risk. Blood thinning therapy using Asasantin SR, low dose Aspirin or Plavix is also recommended. Both Aspirin and Plavix are used together after an individual has had a stent put in their carotid artery opening blood flow to the brain.

Warfarin is used when individuals have atrial fibrillation (racing of the upper chambers of the heart) as clots of blood are easily formed.





### Wild Gossip



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
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### **Pro Bono: Wheels** David Bardsley, Minister Community Church



I don't suppose we will ever know who invented the wheel. But it's really fascinating trying to imagine that first moment when one came into use. The world would have been transformed in an instant. One minute shifting a load would involve extremely hard yakka with significant limits on how big a rock/tree/dinosaur or whatever could be moved. The next minute, loads of apparently gigantic proportions could be moved with relatively ease.

In today's world it's hard to imagine life without wheels. Cars, bikes, gofers, pushchairs, shopping trolleys and all sorts of vehicles have evolved around the wheel. Petrolheads like me even refer to a new car as a "new set of wheels". Incidentally we have just acquired a new set of wheels in the form of a classic MG...and the next person to say how "cute" it is will see a side of me rarely on view to the general public! Just about every "essential" thing we take for granted is dependent on motion facilitated by a wheel somewhere along the line. In fact, we can do without lots of things we take for granted today but the wheel isn't one of them. It's so essential we don't even think about it. Until something goes wrong...one drops off...or gets a puncture...or lets us down some other way. Thinking about wheels for some strange reason prompted me to dwell on how we think about God. For many folk, the concept of the God I know has never featured for them or he has been effectively eliminated from their lives - I did once. But I now struggle to perceive the world without God. If I take God out of the picture again, spiritually and practically I am back in the equivalent of the pre-wheel days. Making sense of the world, finding a way through difficulties,

building lasting relationships etc all become Herculean tasks, each one way beyond mere human capabilities. The elimination of God has been cited as an example of human development and progression. But that step appears to me - and to lots of others - to be regressive, not progressive. If your concept of the universe is limited by physical boundaries, may I suggest you are being excessively restrictive? Scientists readily confess to knowing more and more about less and less. Scientific materialism is actually very small minded and unworthy of the whole mental furniture with which we are equipped. Philosophers down the ages have also tried to construct a world without God and the most authentic have ended up in really desperate places. I can only conclude that God is as necessary as wheels. So if God is essential in our world, we had better get a good handle who we are talking about. Easter has just passed and in my reflections on the real message of the season, I was struck once again by the entirely rational and reasonable process the God I know went through for my sake...and for yours. If we choose to ignore God, it doesn't mean he's not real. If we choose not to accept the concept of eternity, it doesn't mean that it doesn't exist either. And eternity is at stake here...it's that important. Even more important than wheels! If you are struggling with what I have said here may I invite you to give me a call? I have found hope and joy and deep peace in a very messy world...I don't want to keep that to myself! Yours in Christ, David.





### Astronomical Highlights May

In early to mid May you're likely to hear of some sort of alignment of planets in the morning sky, with or without attendant claims of earthly consequences. I'm sure nothing out of the ordinary will result.

In terms of how it will look to eyeball observers, brilliant Venus will be the reference point.

It's low in the ENE at daybreak – you'll need a clear view down to the eastern horizon (not always easy to achieve in the hills). Mercury will seem to be coming up to meet Venus until they're side by side on the 8th, with Jupiter just below.

By the  $12^{\text{th}}$ , Jupiter's right next to Venus with Mercury above and to the right. That's probably the best of it – Mars comes into the frame during the following fortnight, by which time Jupiter's climbed above and stands aloof over the others.

Remember that all this is happening pretty low in the ENE at around 5:50am. Somewhat tricky to see, and at an unsociable hour. Astronomy's like that. The only convenient planet is Saturn. In early May, Saturn's in the ENE at nightfall and culminates high up in the north around 10:30pm. Gradually it gets higher and by the end of the month it's high in the NE sky at nightfall and culminates around 8:30pm.

The month of May begins with the "dark of the Moon" – new moon's on the 3<sup>rd</sup>. Astronomers like this period in the lunar cycle

because the viewing of fainter objects is best when there's no moonlight. In mid-evening, away from the light-polluted city and suburbs, the Milky Way can be seen coming up out of the SE and trailing behind the Southern Cross. The waxing crescent moon is the dominant object at nightfall from the 5<sup>th</sup> on. First quarter, evening half moon, is on the night of the 10th. Full moon's on the 17th, when moonrise comes about 15 minutes ahead of sunset. Last quarter's on the morning of the 25th. Then the next new moon's on June 2nd.


