

## Art Deco walks the Pipeline

The Art Deco Society of WA recently held their 112<sup>th</sup> Art Deco Discovery Walk at Contour Road, Roleystone, where the main focus was on the Contour Pipeline. The Walk was led by Armadale City Councillor and officer of the Heritage Council of Western Australia, Henry Zelones, who spoke at length to the group on the important state-registered and National Trust listed 1930s structure which, after the recent bushfire, is now visible from the studio of the society's president, Vyonne Geneve.

The Channel carried water from Canning Dam to the metropolitan area and was operational for nearly 40 years until 1975 when it was made redundant. During the Great Depression the building of the Contour Channel provided work for many needy families. Married men were given employment for three days a week and those who were single worked for the remaining two week days.

An exhibition of drawings by Ron Facius of National Trust listed places located in the City of Armadale - including the Armadale District Hall, Ye Olde Narrogin Inne, Roleystone Village and the Roleystone Theatre - was on view after the Discovery Walk.

## Kathryn Diss Making it in Media

Roleystone girl Kathryn Diss has been making a name for herself recently as a reporter for the ABC. Here Kathryn answers some questions.

I was born on the 6/10/1989 in Kalamunda Hospital, daughter and second child of Robert and Dale Diss. I was raised in Roleystone and I have lived in the same home my entire childhood. My parents built the house during the early years of their marriage.

I attended Roleystone Primary School and Roleystone District High School before Kelmscott Senior High School in Year 11 and 12 (because it offered media studies and good physical education courses).

My family still live in Roleystone in the same house I grew up in. My older brother, Brendan is carryng on the 'Diss' legacy as he's just recently purchased a block of land in Roleystone and is planning to build the house himself, like our parents.

I had to move to Geraldton for an ongoing full-time position with the ABC, much like a doctor or nurse would do during an internship. I was working out of ABC's Perth office for about nine months on a full-time contract, but if I was to get on-going full time work, I had to go for a country position and do my stint in the bush!

## When and how did you decide on your career?

I decided I wanted to become a journalist at the indecisive age of 13. Prior to that I wanted to become a nurse, a doctor and a physiotherapist, all of which I think I would still enjoy if I had taken a different path in life. Even though I chose journalism I still haven't ruled out a late career change to physiotherapy as I still have a strong desire to study health and fitness.

I think the main determining factor between the two for me was that I had always been a strong English student. I loved writing in all forms and I had and still have a passion and interest to learn about the stories of other people. The need to know everything and the curiosity to scratch past the surface of a story, are traits which all successful journalists must possess. If asked, my family would probably say I am one of the nosiest people they know.



Another factor determining my decision would be my interest in the news cycle, it's always fascinated me. I thought journalism would allow me to achieve, it would be a cliché to say it was to change the world and right all of its wrongs ... but ultimately what I find most rewarding about my job is having the opportunity to speak with a wide variety of people on any given day and to absorb different points of view from all sides of the spectrum. On top of that, I have always enjoyed the adrenalin rush of public speaking, so having the chance to work on my voice and present news has always been a drive and something I see as an accomplishment.

## What helped you make this career decision?

My desire to become a journalist quite honestly began with the goal to present television news. However, as I have matured and become well aware of the stresses and challenges that side of the job involves, I have changed my goals somewhat.

A fond moment from one of my early television news lectures at university also played a part...when the tutor asked his students who wanted to become the next Rick or Sue? (Channel 7 News)...my hand shot up prematurely thinking others would accompany me, however I was wrong. He then proceeded to say there is about a 1 per cent chance that any of us will become a TV news presenter. The desire to become a journalist must lie with wanting to report on the news, not present it.

I think my decision to become a journalist also hinged upon my admiration and respect for the bravery many reporters possess. Many reporters work extremely hard and in dangerous locations of the globe to simply inform the world of someone's misfortune or joy.

Journalists and the media keep the world informed and despite the criticisms they endure, without them, the world would be lost. ABC's Afghanistan correspondent, Sally Sara, is a prime example of such journalistic skill and is one of the most inspirational people in the world.

How did you break into the abc? I did work placement at the ABC during the final semester of my degree.

I must have learnt something at Curtin because I managed to impress and score a perfect grade. I then made the bold step of asking for more work experience...and then waited over a month before being asked to come in for a week of training with the intention of starting casual paid work with the ABC.

I was thrilled, overjoyed, nervous and grateful I had a job before finishing my degree, others aren't so lucky. At the same time I started producing and reading news for Curtin FM when I wasn't working at the ABC. Juggling both jobs



meant I was working about 60 hours a week for about 3 months. It half nearly killed me, but the lessons I learnt were invaluable.

I was then offered a full-time contract with the ABC and I had to say goodbye to Curtin, a sad, but necessary move up the ladder. However, that's not to discredit the priceless lessons I learnt at Curtin, most of which led to me succeed at the ABC. When asked how you got a job at the ABC so young, I say, luck, hard work, assertiveness and simply being in the right place at the right time.

#### What is your current role with the ABC?

I am classified as a news journalist or reporter working in one of ABC's regional offices. I am the only journalist at the station and I work alongside ABC local radio or programs. Although we communicate, we both carry out completely different roles. Under my position I report on and generate the news for the Mid West and Wheatbelt regions of WA.

I am a tri media reporter, which means I report for radio, online and television. However, my primary role is radio and online. I have to produce a local Mid West and Wheatbelt bulletin each day, which I read each morning at 6.30 and 7.30 am.

I then carry on with the rest of the day's work, which requires me to file news for state-wide regional bulletins three times a day... more or less covering the news of the day and generating news when it's quiet.

In my spare time, which is rare, I write online feature articles on topics from my regions and I try to generate television news stories. I am also required to film the television footage I gather and television interviews I need. More or less I am a one man band and I am required to cover and report for all three mediums...and yes that means I do a lot of overtime!

A rough estimate of how long it took me to gather all the required vision and interviews for my last TV story took me about 10hours...so that's a long day!

#### What are you future aspirations?

For me, the most important part of being a journalist is having the ability and reach to tell someone else's story, which is why I aspire to be a foreign correspondent one day.

I think working in a third world country such as Africa or Afghanistan would be an amazing opportunity to report on not only the misfortunes of others, but to experience the greatness and diversity of other cultures. However, foreign correspondence requires years of experience and dedication and such postings don't exactly lend themselves to family or friends.


In the short term, I am enjoying having the opportunity to learn a wide variety of things I wouldn't have experienced if I hadn't come to Geraldton. Since coming to the Mid West region, I have learnt a plethora of facts about mining, agriculture, fishing, aquaculture and horticulture which I wouldn't have if I hadn't come to the region.

The sink or swim mentality is definitely the way to learn in the country and it is by far the quickest way to learn.

wet winter and thoughts of that hot, hot dry summer will gradually fade.

Still I feel that our climate is drying and sadly for folks in the hills, this means permanently changing our behaviours to suit a hotter, drier environment. This means drought proofing our gardens, saving water wherever possible and even retrofitting our homes to cope with this altered environment. It also means getting our properties ready for the next fire season - now.

This month I was priveleged to go to the Bushfire Review night hosted by the organic growers. (See report page 28.)

Three couples stayed to defend their properties; they survived and their properties were amazingly unscathed. The unifying message was that luck had little to do with it, they were all prepared - they had thought things through and had plans and the correct equipment. Their properties were all defendable because they had made preparations before hand - even in the face of the horrific conditions that arose during this fire situation.

The organic growers are planning to hold another session in Spring to assist people to develop their own bushfire plans. Well done to this group for assisting the wonderful work done by the local fire brigade in developing fire awareness and prevention strategies for our community.

This month has seen the two councillors representing Jarrah Ward, take opposing views on the appropriate allocation of funding for the area.

Readers are directed to pages 36 and 37 to

see a summary of their opposing views. I believe that our councillors work very hard to ensure our area is well served, no one would take on a role like this unless they were dedicated and committed.

Councillor Pat Hart has worked tirelessly over many years for this community and is advocating the funds be spread over a range of projects. Many of these are worthy, and some long overdue!

Councillor Wielinga would prefer the bulk of the remaining funding be redirected towards one item - toilets for Borello Park. To support her argument Cr Wileinga has a petition signed by many in the young family demographic. (It seems that both are keen for funds to be allocated to upgrade the skate park; rumor to the contrary, about this has caused some acrimonius comments to be directed towards our councillors and this is regrettable.)

This situation will now be directed to a full council meeting for a decision. Sadly there seems to be never enough funding to cover worthwhile projects. So what do you think?

So I commend the June edition to you I once again thank the community for their massive contributions to filling the magazine.

Each month I worry that there is nothing coming in - and then in it flows. Wow there is such a lot happening in our town!

## Letter to the editor

### RESPONSE TO JUNE EDITORIAL RE: USE OF BIRD SCARING DEVICES

Your June editorial offered an opinion piece on gas guns, an argument for their introduction on local orchards for bird control. Gas guns have never been a part of the local scene. A trial in 2004 resulted in the State government producing 'Best Practice Guidelines for Bird Scaring in Orchards - Noise and Threatened Species' in 2005. When gas guns are used according to these and EPA guidelines there should be none of your so called 'hostile neighbours'.

The March 2006 edition of the Courier provided some good detail on the Guidelines. Under the title Guidance and the sub-head Best Practice Noise Management the guidelines say that: 'In the first instance, consider and adopt bird scaring methods that minimise noise impacts. Depending on the device, its orientation and surrounding topography, gas guns or other acoustic methods could comply with the noise regulations if noise sensitive receivers are at least one kilometre away from the device."

In separate guidance, the WA EPA recommends that gas guns not be used within 500 M of a residence, school or tourist facilities.

Pest species are a particular problem in drought years, we have had DEC visit our property and conduct some very good tutorials on damage control using envirofriendly .177 air rifles with scopes instead of our 12 G shotguns. Our neighbours have no objections with this method. For our higher value fruits we use exclusion netting.

As the Ben Lee song goes: 'we're all in this together', and if we do the right thing, abide by the law and follow guidelines all good things should follow; for smoke, spray and noise. I must say that your linkage of re-zoning of rural land for residential development is a totally different subject. The newer and somewhat incongruous developments on orchards off Brookton Highway were not precipitated by bird strike. Peter J Stewart

### REPRINT OF ARTICLE OUTLINING THE BEST PRACTICE GUIDELINES FOR BIRD SCARING IN ORCHARDS

#### Following receipt of Peter Stewart's letter, I felt it appropriate to reprint the article he referred to (in part). These are still guidelines and were never endorsed by Council. The City of Armadale's current position is also below.

A report to the January Development Services Committee meeting of the City of Armadale advised of the approach in 2004 by the WA Fruit Growers Association to the Minister for the Environment seeking amendment to the Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997 to permit the use of audible bird scaring devices on orchards, primarily for the prevention of damage by Baudin's Cockatoo (the White Tailed Black Cockatoo) (an endangered species) completely protected by law but with a long history of damaging apple, pear and stone fruit crops.

As a consequence, the Minister, although declining to amend the Regulations, formed the Black Cockatoo/Fruit Protection Technical Advisory Committee. The Committee's objective was to develop guidelines that would help fruit growers, residents and local governments manage environmental noise from gas guns and other noisy devices used in orchards to prevent fruit damage by threatened cockatoos.

It produced the Best Practice Guidelines for Bird Scaring in Orchards (2005), a pamphlet offering advice to neighbours affected by noise caused by bird control in orchards and a checklist for orchardists proposing to use audible devices.

The Guidelines have no legal status, and do not attempt to define or have a bearing on determination of when an offence has been committed. Strict compliance is not a defence against any enforcement action; and no more than a guide to the City as to whether or not it will take enforcement action, while emphasizing that there remains a high probability that the use of some devices (in certain circumstances) will involve a breach of the law and that persons using those devices do so at their own risk.

Growers should develop a comprehensive noise management strategy that includes:

• acknowledgement that the suggestions within the document have been noted and, where practicable, implemented; and efforts to minimise noise output; and use gas guns and other static audible devices as the means of last resort, with other methods of bird scaring being used where possible and practicable.

When such devices are used, efforts to minimise noise that may (dependent upon

individual circumstances) be included are:not using them before 7.00am or after 7.00pm;

• if possible, facing them away from the neighbours likely to be affected and upwind;

• taking practicable measures to attenuate noise (by use of bales of hay or similar material, for example);

• ensuring that the firing rate is as low as possible and there are no more than six short volleys per hour;

using them for no more than two periods per day and only when birds are present; and
moving them around regularly.

If shotguns are used, their use should be kept to the absolute minimum necessary, and the effect on neighbours should be considered and every effort made to minimise it.

Growers would also need to communicate with neighbours, including:

• where possible, discussing bird scaring alternatives and potential noise impacts with them;

• providing them with information, address of the orchard and contact details;

• dates of the anticipated damage season;

• expected times when bird scaring devices will be used; and

• advice that a noise management strategy has been developed and an offer to provide a copy of it.

Every reasonable practicable effort to minimise nuisance and consult with neighbours should be made, and this may well be a time consuming and complex task.

Copies of the noise management strategy, letter to neighbours, and list of neighbours contacted should be lodged with the City of Armadale.

Council recommended that all residents known to have been affected by the use of such devices in the past be advised of the Guideline, associated documents and Council's adopted position which is that the Guidelines have not been endorsed as overriding regulations, invited to forward written comment upon either the principles therein or practical issues arising from its implementation by orchardists by 31 July 2006, and assured that their views will be taken into account in future submissions to the Committee by the City.



We support the guidelines, however if anyone using gas guns contravenes noise legislation we will apply the legislative requirements under the Noise Abatement Regulations.

Recently I read that a decision had been made to name the factions at the amalgamated school, after local main road names 'as these represented early families of the district'.

While many do, some of the more major roads were named by the developers of the subdivision known as Roleystone Estate and are based on persons and locations from England. This article (reprinted from the Roleystone Courier, May 2009) shows how some of these names arose:

Roleystone was first selected in 1840. The first landholders in the area were the Buckingham family who purchased the land for less than 2/- an acre. The name came from Roleystone, a place near Buckingham's birthplace in England.

At the turn of the century the Roleystone estate was subdivided and sold off to many early settlers. The land release 'Roleystone Estate' through the company known as Peet & Co, purported to be the 'Cream of the Darling Range' and advertised 'Miles of Made roads'. The land was sold from 2 per acre (the terms were 1/5 cash. The first 2 years were interest free and very reasonable; payments were suspended in case of sickness or unemployment. You could get more information by ringing 379!)

The 'made roads' in the estate consisted of Peet, Hawkstone, Chevin, Hall, Holden, Raeburn, Jarrah, Heath and Brooks.

(NB some other roads already existed in the area: Albany Road, Roleystone Road (following the path of the present Croyden Rd) and Canning Road (through to Karragullen).

**Peet Road**: This was named for the originator of the first government land allocation in Roleystone, James Thomas Peet, who was appointed as Government Land Agent for Western Australia in 1899.

He was commissioned to sell 8,000 acres of land called the Roleystone Estate in 1902. *(See original flier at right).* 

Peet wrote a diary when he went on a trip to England in 1902. This contains the names of many people who 'live on in the names of Roleystone roads.' (A sad fact was that while he was overseas, Thomas Peet's six-month-old child died of meningitis.) Hawkstone

As quoted in the diary of James Thomas Peet on his return to England in 1902: 'Drove down to 'Hawkstone' the scene of all my boyish ideas of beauty and romance. Blasé as I am and satiated with sight seeing, it still is the prettiest spot in England I have seen. Went past the pool with black and white swans many deer and millions of rabbits. Took snaps of Hawkstone Hall where we used to take tea every Sunday after service in the beautiful chapel.'

Holden Road: Peet went bike riding with his cousins the Holdens (Ethel and Fred) on the 16<sup>th</sup> August 1902.

**Chevin Road:** 'Visited Mr Chevin on 15<sup>th</sup> August on the way from South Hampton docks to Marleigh.' The Chevins were relatives of Mr Peet.

Hall Road – (Walter, Ethel and Sydney) were the relatives, Peet stayed with on his travels back to England in 1902. He enjoyed their company! Their mother Sarah Hall was probably nee Chevin. Raeburn: Relatives of Elders. Lillie Raeburn is pictured in Peet's photo album.

**Brooks:** Cousins of Mr Peet who lived in Southhampton. Cousin Annie died in 1904. *See below: original Roleystone Estate Poster.*

Below is an extract from a letter sent in June to all apple growers.

With the opening up of our local markets to cheaper imports from overseas (and in some cases from countries without the levels of rigour, ethics and regulation governing our own industry) does this sound the death knell for our local fruit growing industry? As consumers, should we make our thoughts known about what this will do and is doing, to our local fruit growing industry? Ed.

During the past ten years, Apple and Pear Australia Ltd has spent a lot of time on actions to protect our orchards from exotic pests and diseases and to get the best possible returns for our apples and pears. APAL has been very successful in this regard.

During the past five years, APAL and initially the Federal Government have put a lot of resources into the Future Orchards 2012 program, which aims to increase the international competitiveness of the Australian industry. Unfortunately, the news on this front is not good.

Work done by the reputable Centre for International Economics (CIE) indicates that by 2014, the most likely impact of apple imports from China, New Zealand and USA will be that farm gate prices will be down by 21 per cent and orchard income will be down by around 32 per cent.

No matter what your present situation, this study should give everyone cause for review. What will your operation be in 2014? What actions do you need to take to remain profitable and sustainable with lower prices and income? What steps do you need to take from here?

This assessment indicates that as an industry, there are still many changes that can and have to be made. APAL is working hard with government to gain support for favourable transitional arrangements but no matter what we achieve, any support will only help to soften our exposure to world trade conditions; the transition will still have to be made by all of us. *Darral Ashton*

## **Open Letter Requesting Support Roleystone Gymnastics Club**

Option 2: The Club remains closed Term 3, using that time to advertise for a new Head Coach. If a Head Coach is found, he/she will be responsible for establishing a brand new timetable and the committee will be assessing and altering the current

Structure Fee accordingly. Should the Committee be

unsuccessful in securing a new Head Coach, with the appropriate qualifications by the end of Term 3, the Committee will begin the process of closing the club permanently and selling all equipment to pay debtors. Should this option be successful, the Gymnastic Club will be offering additional classes at the end of Term 4 to make up for those lost at the end of Term 2.

## Blokes Show Their Artistic Talent..



Organiser Pete Hardinge said:







## Exercising for EXPLOSIVE POWERS

#### While many people exercise for toning and weight loss, there are a whole range of exercises designed for sports performance.

The best way to improve the "explosive power" required for most sports is through the combination of hypertrophy training (muscle building) with Plyometric training. For a sports person, or a person who wants to beat their personal best, this is GREAT news.

So what are some examples of Plyometric training?

Clap pushups, clap chin-ups, jump lunges, jump squats, skating drills are all examples of Plyometric training.

## How Local Residents Saved Their Homes During the Fires

On the 8<sup>th</sup> of June a large crowd joined in with the Roleystone Organic Growers to hear a review of how some residents managed to save their homes during the recent bushfires. Leissa and Paul Hanley, Howard Herbert, and Carol and John Wolf all managed to save their own homes, but watched while many of their neighbour's homes were lost. Howard's friend Paul Huisman proved to be an able friend and had come from Byford to assist – he also came with a complete fire fighting kit – a very welcome support to Howard.

The decision to 'Stay and Defend' or 'Go Early' is an individual choice, and many residents chose to leave. The speakers at this evening all decided to stay and were all very glad they did, and would do the same if threatened again.

All six speakers agreed that their actions helped ensure that their homes and also some of their neighbours were saved.

The evening was fascinating; the speakers gave great practical advice and provided insightful comment on their experiences and how this has shaped how they will prepare in the future. Often the speakers showed raw emotion and everyone in the room empathised with what they had been through.

Some had hours to prepare as they watched the fire steadily move towards them. Others like the Wolfs had no more than 15 minutes as the Bed and Breakfast adjacent to the Buckingham Bridge Carol manages, was engulfed by a fire



storm almost immediately. What was common to all three groups was that they had already thought through what they were going to do; they had made preparations and had made plans. They also were mentally strong enough to cope and were willing to defend their homes for up to 36 hours. None of these speakers expected someone else to save their property – they accepted that the responsibility for this, was their own. Luck had little to do with their survival or why they managed to save their homes.

We are all far more aware following their honest and thorough reflections. The Organic Growers intend to have a follow up meeting in spring to assist in formulating Fire Action Plans. If you need more details please contact Lisa on 9399 2312.

### Bushfire Fatalities The Problems with Evacuation

A quick snapshot of Australian bushfire fatalities provides us with some important reminders. Over 729 people have lost their lives due to bushfires in Australia since 1900. About 21 (or 3% of the total) have occurred in Western Australia.

History has shown that many bushfire fatalities have occurred when people have been caught on the road, either on foot or in vehicles. Historic (ie prior to Black Saturday) national statistics show 32% of people have died in late evacuations and 26% defending properties outside.

Sheltering inside a vehicle or being caught on the road is deadly, people only survive in very mild bushfire events, being caught on foot in the open is even worse.

Yet with all of this good information about the dangers of late evacuation, many people continue to "wait and see" and then flee at the last minute. In a survey of Perth Hills' residents in 2009, 60% of respondents said their trigger to evacuate was either advice from emergency services or they wait until threatened by a fire then go. Why wait until you are threatened before acting? The government does not guarantee you will receive advice so don't rely on it.

Identifying an early evacuation trigger means you leave your property before you are threatened, people have died going to look at bushfires. Bushfires never arrive at convenient times. Use the Fire Danger Rating scale to predict the size of a fire on any given day and identify your early evacuation trigger.

Ensure you and your property is prepared for the passage of a fire front, in case you cannot safely evacuate. Active defence increases your chance of survival.

Your decisions and actions will determine where you are when a bushfire front next comes your way. Think about it now and plan all your contingencies. Bushfire evacuation is NOT easy. Rohan Carboon

Last week the members of the Roleystone Garden Group ventured to Karragullen to the Ornamental Tree Company. Three years ago we had gone to see Narelle and were delighted with her trees and her own garden. This garden is worth seeing just to see what can be done with quality plants. Her placement is brilliant and the plants are all very healthy.

Next month we will go to Pioneer Gardens Nursery. The camellia sasanqua will still have a few late flowers and the japonicas are really setting a very pretty scene. I found three very large beautiful flowers on 'Nuccio's Cameo'. This bush had no water from December on and had been in the shade of some deciduous trees but this had not set it back at all.

Some of the rarer varieties that they have at the Nursery at the moment are: 'Harry's Gem' Bred by Harry Lane formerly of the Camellia Society here in Western Australia, 'Sister Rosalie', then there's 'Tama Vino' and 'Jean Evans' as well as our favourites including 'Debbie', 'Mrs Anne Marie Hovey' and 'Susie Fortson'.

The Garden Club is open to all who enjoy

gardening or just the company of pleasant people. We meet in Orana Way at 10 a.m. and leave at 12 midday.

In my own garden I am taking the opportunity to re-locate plants to more appropriate situations. When I first planted my Mauritian Hemp, I planted it in a shaded situation. Because we have had so many requests for it, I decided to move it to an area where it can be seen and will enjoy the full sun.

One move often triggers off a chain situation, re-vamping things that need water and things that don't. Plus I've put in Crotons and Acalyphas. It is just like playing Chess.

It really is wonderful weather to catch up on reading and also maintaining garden tools. Weeds are easy to pull out now, or (if you use chemicals) if the oxalis is sprayed now it will not need to be sprayed again.

With Azaleas, the thrip that did the damage in the summer has stopped affecting the new foliage, so when the leaves fall, mulch close to the drip-line so the pest will not splash back up on the plant and re-infect the new foliage. Remember to use your Seasol monthly to get plants through adverse times. If you use it from the spray bottles, dilute it to half-strength and always water the garden before using it.

Rose Pruning can be done now or if the weather is frosty leave it to August and pick up diseased leaves so that black- spot is eliminated from your garden. Iean

The premiere was screened at the Ace Cinema in Subiaco and several of the cast and crew were on hand for a question and answer session after the showing of the film.



In 1987 Margaret and Les Lyons as Owner-Builders, designed every aspect of "Karralika" (meaning Blue Hills) to make it as sustainable as could be achieved in the quest to reduce their environmental footprint.



Combining her artistic background and her knowledge of the sun's position in the sky through the year for the location, Margaret was responsible for the landscape design,

carefully selecting trees to ensure that shadows being cast would not block the winter sun. The main roof pitch is 30° which is ideal for the 3-panel solar hot water system and a 3.3+ kW Grid Connect solar system with a 55 photovoltaic panel array.

The Lyons have taken sustainability further with an organic vegetable garden, utilising permaculture and biodynamic principles.

Margaret said "Karralika" is very much a work in progress with many sustainable initiatives still unfolding. They have had great enjoyment being part of the process and hope they can inspire others. (See their eco-house and Margaret in her garden - at right).



#### **GETTING KRONIC OFF THE** Helen Morton MLC **SHELVES AND OFF THE STREETS**

On Friday the 17th of June, Western Australia became the first state in Australia to ban synthetic cannabinoids, more commonly known by their commercial names such as "Kronic".

Synthetic cannabinoids are chemical substances sprayed on herbs which, when smoked, mimic the effects of cannabis in the human brain. Of great concern are reports that these synthetic cannabinoids precipitate psychosis in some people. These products had previously been sold over the counter and internet as 'legal herbal smoking mixtures' and recent media attention on the issue had led to an increase in their use.

Many users have argued that these "legal" alternatives are harmless, but sufficient evidence exists to show that a real public health risk exists, including hallucinations, seizures, vomiting and chest pain. The UK and the US already have similar laws in place and other states in Australia are also preparing legislation to tackle the issue. Prior to this ban, employers had raised

concerns with the State Government

about the increasing rates of Kronic use in the workplace and the potential safety risks involved. Some of the more vocal industries have been the mining and building industries, and rightly so - random testing by the ChemCentre at one mine site showed an alarming random sample hit rate for Kronic use of 30% for one shift!

Fortunately, the public debate around this issue has been very robust and it was clear to me that the general public and the State Government recognised the risks involved in not taking action and wanted this drug banned.

Unfortunately, this recent ban does not mean that new chemical compounds will not be produced and promoted as "legal" highs in the future, but we can at least know that when they are, we will have new mechanisms in place to ensure that we can identify issues and respond more efficiently and effectively.

## Astronomical Highlights July



It's not often that I have anything much to say about Mercury, but it'll be in view in the early evening this month and the Messenger spacecraft is there, sending back more information about Mercury than ever before.

Until now, poor neglected Mercury has only been visited by one spacecraft: Mariner 10 in 1974-75. Mariner flew past Mercury three times and managed to image about 45% of its surface. Now, the Messenger (Mercury Surface, Space Environment, Geochemistry and Ranging) spacecraft is staying at Mercury and orbiting it every 12 hours.

It's been there since mid-March and is scheduled to continue observing Mercury closely for another nine months. For more information on the Messenger mission, see www.skyandtelescope.com and www. nasa.gov . Mercury's about the same size as Australia (diameter 4,880km) and its mass is only oneeighteenth of the Earth's. Two moons are larger

> than Mercury: Jupiter's moon Ganymede, and Saturn's moon Titan.

If you can get a clear view to the west, e.g. along the scarp, look for Mercury low in the WNW at dusk from about 10th July. By midmonth it's as high as it's going to get and looks like a brightish star, not very high up, in the WNW (approximately the same direction

as the sunset). The only other planet visible in the evenings is Saturn which looks like a medium-bright star high up in the northern sky at dusk in early July. By mid-month it's further west: very high in the NNW at dusk; and at the end of the month Saturn's high in the NW sky at dusk. It sets in the west at about 12:15am on the 1st, 11:20pm on the 16th, and 10:25pm on the 31st. You can estimate the times between.

The morning sky is dominated by Jupiter which is well and truly the brightest starlike object you can see, now that Venus is lost in the glare of the Sun. Jupiter rises just to the north of east at about 2:35am on the 1st, 1:45am on the 16th, and 12:30am on the 31st. At daybreak it's high in the NE sky in early July, higher and just to the east of north in mid-month, and due north by month's end. Mars is in the offing as well, rising around 5am and holding much the same position all month. You'll find Mars low in the NE sky at dawn.

The Moon's phases are very tidily arranged this month: new moon on the 1st, first quarter the 8th, full moon the 15th, last quarter the 23rd, and new moon the 31st. On the morning of the 24th the waning (fat) crescent moon slips by Jupiter, and on the morning of the 28th the thin crescent moon is near Mars.

Earth goes through aphelion, the point in its orbit furthest from the Sun, around 11pm on July 4th.

Allocation of City of Armadle Funds in Roleystone

0488 900 307 Fund expenditure on the Cross Park Skate Park & Borrello Park Public Toilets (Council resolution CS78/8/10), Committee is recommending to Council that the Cross Park Skate Park

improvements be allocated \$380,000. This figure comprises \$300,000 for construction and \$80,000 for consultant's fees. In addition to this \$380,000 the \$50,000 promised by the federal government should be secure - to be used either for increased construction costs or consultants fees. This is a great amount of money for the Skate Park and should be ample to get the job done. Current construction costs are \$550/m2 and the current park is 325m2. For \$300,000 the park could possibly be increased, but also modern retaining and fencing should be afforded. \$80,000 for consultant's fees is equally as generous as normally this fee is 10% of the construction cost - allowing for any hidden extras. The spare \$50,000 should also more than cover potential cost blowouts. The remainder of the POS funds totalling some \$225,000, are recommended to be spent on revegetation in Warwick Savage Reserve (\$47,500), paths, seats & landscaping

in Alice and Lina Hart Reserves (\$47,676), paths, seats, landscaping and boardwalks at Borrello Park (\$93,997) and paths, seats & basketball half court at Cross Park (\$36,645). I had lobbied for the majority of this \$225,000 to be allocated for the public toilets at Borrello Park as per community request but this was opposed. Toilet cost estimates were \$190,000, but in the latest report were also suggested to require a \$50,000-\$60,000 consultancy fee, raising the cost to \$250,000 and exceeding the amount available to spend. I argued to have this part of the expenditure recommitted and reinvestigated but was opposed.

The petition submitted for the public toilets had over 100 signatures attained in only a few days - thank you for your support. Any further support for the public toilets at Borrello Park should be directed in writing/email to the City of Armadale. As a second option for this \$225,000 portion, I also lobbied for an inter-precinct allocation on the Canning River walk trail. My view was that funds should be allocated for key large projects locally, as distinct from numerous small projects, but this was also opposed. I could not support the toilet request as: Borrello Park playground is not strategically located, has mainly seasonal use and therefore minimal toilet use and is twice the price of proposed new toilets in Memorial Park in Armadale and that will be used all year round and will be of service for many thousands of people. In my opinion the funds identified for all the above reserves including Cross Park have more social and financial investment benefits for our community than the toilets. This was supported by the Officer's report and recommendations and all seven Councillors on Development Services Committee.

This item is to go to a full Council meeting on Monday 27 June for ratification. If it is supported by more than 7 Councillors it will be formally adopted by Council. Even when or if we have secured the funds it will take quite a while for implementation. There is currently a draft 'Guidelines for a Public Toilet Strategy' which has yet to go to Council for discussion and approval. If Borrello Park meets the criterion for toilets then there could be funding opportunities in the future, just like we have found with the skate park. Cr.Pat Hart







Last year I wrote about the wonderful present that I received for "Christmas in July" when I admitted a tiny unfurred joey kangaroo (a pinkie) during our family celebration

*meal, now I will give a progress report.* The pinkie was small and needed constant care and attention, with warmth and feeding being the most important issues. The pinkie was kept in an artificial pouch (fleecy bag) in a soft sided esky with a heat pack and thermometer at a constant 32 - 34 C and bottle fed every few hours, she also had a leg injury that required strapping and constant checking – a lot of work! I named her Hope.

She grew bigger and fur started to grow making warmth a less important issue and bottle feeds reduced to an easier level, but the leg injury had only partially repaired and left me wondering if she would be able to hop and what future she had? Very soon Hope proved to me that she could hop and from then it was hard to keep her in a pouch.

In November a similar sized joey came into care and I decided that they would make a perfect pair to teach each other. I named the new joey Hazy, as she was a lovely light grey colour. Together they became the "Terrible Two", who conspired to wreck my house, cause total chaos and more, whilst I loved them more each day. Gradually they went outside for longer and longer periods and were introduced to a variety of foods, until it was time for them to stay outside – with hanging pouches for them to use at will, a variety of food and of course their 2 bottles of formula per day.
