Afterwards we had a great lunch on the verandah of the house, said our thanks and goodbyes to all the very hospitable Bindoon/Gingin people and discussed on the way home how we at St. Christophers can give them all an equally enjoyable time in the future. Chris Bloomer





Roleystone's own super teacher Mady Colquboun has a great history of promoting her students and now she has been involved in taking a group from Armadale Primary school into the finals of Wakakiirri. With the heats held at the Regal Theatre in August, the team from Armadale has made the final cut – to be decided in September.

Wakakiirri means 'story dance' in aboriginal language and the Armadale students have developed a 7 minute performance based on the February Fires. The underlying philosophy is to make a positive impact on your community (school and surrounds) while sticking to the 'reduce, re-use and

recycle principle'.

'We chose the February fire as a theme because one of our families lost everything and many others had friends or families in the affected area. Also the school is situated right on the edge of Settlers Common and of course this is a bush fire risk' said Mady.

Mady put her skills as a Dance teacher to great use – developing the choreography with wonderful support in the production of costumes, props and music shared between the staff and parents. Mady and the 2 year 6 teachers, Pauline Edgcumbe and Rob Devine were involved in the production. The most important inspiration came when the student who lost her home shared her story with the children.

Karlyn Geary, who played Julia Gillard visiting after the fires, wrote to the Prime Minister and the school received a personally signed letter back from Julia that afternoon!! Not just a quick 'I got your letter' but a whole page talking about the importance of the fire-fighters and the need to

Sadly two dogs could not be saved but Sean acted to get his brother and his parents out of immediate danger. They were saved by a fire crew from Bedfordale who arrived in the nick of time. The family saved almost nothing from their home as they had no time to prepare. Sean and Charmaine's home was saved although the property is still extensively damaged. Sean's selfless actions and quick thinking has seen him nominated for an outstanding Bravery Award. So for Sean's actions as a dad, son and brother we think he is a worthy recipient of local father of the year.

My wife was telling me about a radio program that she listened to last week that rated the top ten most boring things to talk about and apparently talking about your holiday was up there next to Australian politics. So at the risk of being incredibly boring here is a brief description of our 6 countries in 6 weeks belated honeymoon trip.

Jacqueline and I actually said our vows under the magnificent Crab Apple Arbor at Carmel Rose farm two and a half years ago on the 9th January 2009 but a weekend at the Duxton does not a honeymoon make, so over the last three months we put this trip together.

We started our romantic jaunt with 3 nights in Hong Kong which turned into 4 as Air France decided to have a strike delaying our departure to Paris by 24 hours, not to worry Hong Kong was fun. We loved the Flower, Fish and Bird Markets the most and marvelled at the concentration of buildings, people and cargo ships. We soon felt at home at the Regal Kowloon and made the most of cocktail hour in the Club Lounge with glimpses of the harbour.

Next stop Paris, we arrived in the mid afternoon to a 36 degree day and had a 1 hour delay between the airport and our accommodation due to people playing on the train tracks. Lesson number one, don't hesitate to fork out for a taxi fair when travelling with suitcases!

When we finally found our accommodation we couldn't have been happier, the Degres de Notre Dame is located around the corner from the famous Shakespeare Bookshop directly opposite Notre Dame...wow, unfortunately due to the industrial action we only had the one night to enjoy it as we had arranged to head south to Lyon the next day to pick up our leased Renault (again not to worry as we would be back in Paris in 5 weeks for a better look around).

Leasing a car is definitely the way to go for periods of 21 days and more in Europe as you get a brand new car with no hidden extra costs. From Lyon we made our way to the Swiss border crossing at Bellegarde and discovering some fantastic rural gems in France on the way. After a brief stopover in Genève we headed around the Lake to Lausanne where we stopped the night. Next stop was Interlaken for a lunch of Potato Rosti followed by Swiss chocolate (of course!!) consumed whilst marvelling at the numbers of paragliders soaring amongst the mountain tops. These aerial daredevils would be our constant companions while in the Alps and I admit to being envious of their skill and bravado; I couldn't think of a better way to experience such awe inspiring scenery the scale of which defies my limited vocabulary!

From Interlaken it was a short drive up the most incredible valley to Lauterbrunnen where we parked the car for three nights as we had to catch the cog railway to our hotel in Wengan. We will never forget stepping out onto our balcony, looking up and as if on cue the clouds parting to reveal the magnificence of the Jungfrau towering above us at more than 4100 metres!

A few days later we caught the train through the



Eiger to stand on that mountainside just below the peak in minus 6 degrees with a wind chill that sent the mercury looking for somewhere to hide. Fortunately I had the foresight to wear a t- shirt under my long sleaved shirt but at least I had shoes on, some Japanese tourists were caught out wearing sandals and socks (fashion suicide at the best of times certainly not the best attire to hit the snow in)! I could go on and on about this part of the world but will just say that if you get a chance to go don't hesitate, it's simply out of this world.

After our stay in Wengan we had to make a b-line for Venice via Milan. The Swiss leg of this route was without a doubt the most incredible driving I have had the pleasure of experiencingmore turns than a packet of two minute noodles. Next time it will be on a bike!

By the time we had crossed into Italy it was obvious we had no choice but to hit the motorway as we were running out of time. Two things became apparent very quickly, firstly Italian drivers consider both the 130 km per hour speed limit and the white line lane markers as nothing more than loose recommendations and, secondly Italian truck drivers work on the basis that might is right...I wasn't going to argue with them.

Surprisingly we managed to arrive at the Tronchetto multi level car park on Venice Island (thanks again for the hot tip Julie and Duncan), with only the mildest post traumatic stress disorder symptoms that disappeared as soon as the concierge at the Hotel Antiche Figure informed us that because it was our honeymoon they wanted to upgrade us to a Junior suite....sweet!

Enough for now and we are not even half way through!

Students at both Roleystone schools are taking a stand against youth smoking by participating in a new smoking prevention project being coordinated by the South Metropolitan Public Health Unit, City of Armadale and the Smarter than Smoking Project.

The Smarter than Smoking Young Directors' Festival 2011 will see students from a range of schools including Roleystone DHS and Roleystone PS, create and produce their own 30-second smoking prevention commercials.

Georgia Siroen, Assignment Director, of the selected commercial from Roleystone District High School summarized the process for their group.

'A few schools were given the chance to create an anti smoking advertisement with the selected advert would be screened in local cinemas. At Roleystone District High School, all year groups had the chance to think of their own ideas. We were lucky enough to be selected as the school's entry.

We then made a storyboard of the script, different shot types, call sheets, props lists and we had to build and create our own sets. We were very lucky in the advert to get the opportunity to use Bob Hart's camera (which is



Roleystone Primary school students, under the guidance of Alastair Evans, are also developing their own commercial. They were recently invited up to the District High School to view the commercial being shot.

The community will be invited to view the commercials at an awards night in Term 4. All the commercials will feature on the national youth smoking prevention website OxyGen.org.au. The overall winning commercial will be screened at local cinemas and used to create educational resources for schools.

Sharing Responsibility; Improving Bushfire Safety at Hillandale Village



Mick Keelty's report on the Roleystone-Kelmscott bushfire of February 2011 emphasized that communities must share responsibility for protecting themselves. This is exactly what communities did before FESA and DEC existed. Residents burnt off, as often as the bush would carry a mild fire. For jarrah forest this is every 3-4 years. They used green marri branches and wet bags to keep fires away from buildings. The earliest European settlers learnt their fire skills directly from professors of fire, the Nyoongar people.

Even after that big bushfire, there are still areas of Roleystone in danger, due to heavy fuel loads. Long unburnt balga (grasstrees) are a common cause of intense

flaring in bushfires. To remain healthy, and produce seed, they need burning every 3-4 years. This keeps fires mild, and avoids destroying the whole green top, as happens in fierce fires. Frequent fires also stimulate djiridji (zamias) to produce the red fruit (byoo), which Nyoongar people relished. Without byoo, we will lose the djiridji, and the nitrogen it fixes.

The area around Hillandale Village has many balga, both within the village, and in the adjoining Eskdale Reserve. Their thatch could be clipped, piled around nearby djiridji, and burnt. This will improve bush health by releasing nutrients, and stimulating the soil bacteria which fix nitrogen. Wildflowers will flourish next winter. The burning needs to be done before October, when the bushfire season starts, and should be repeated every 3-4 years.

Roleybushcare is a volunteer group, which works at cleaning up rubbish and weeds; restoring native plants; and injecting trees against dieback. They have been approached, and volunteers may be available over the next few weeks to clip the balga thatch.

Clearly the matter needs to be approved by the Hillandale village residents; the management body (Amana Living); the Roleystone Fire Service and the City of Armadale.

If all are supportive, I will approach Roleybushcare to set a firm date for the clipping to take place, and for Roleystone Fire Service to burn the thatch. Smoke will be minimal, but residents will be warned, so they can close windows. Other tidying and mulching can be done, if time and labour are available, throughout the summer. Anybody is welcome to help, whether you belong to Roleybushcare or not. Just contact me, and I will keep you informed. FLYING HIGH ON COCKATOO VOLUNTARY WORK

There are so many options for voluntary work but my heart skipped a beat when I saw a baby Black Carnaby's cockatoo in The West Australian. It was born in captivity and its black twinkly eyes appeared to wink, while the curl of its beak lent the adorable bird a shy smile. The professor who was rearing it made the comment that it was so noisy that he knew it was a female! I chose to ignore that remark! It's not known exactly how many Carnaby's Black-Cockatoos and Red Tail Black Cockatoos are left but the Carnaby's Black Cockatoo populations have declined by over 50 per cent in the past 45 years. They like to live in the same areas and, due to the rapid growth of the metropolitan area, their regular nesting spots have been depleted.

Upon seeing the article in the paper, I knew immediately that I wanted to help protect and restore these important native birds. Off to the Kaarakin Black Cockatoo Rehabilitation Centre my husband and I ventured, not knowing what was in store for us.

We were greeted by the manager Chris Phillips who explained the workings of the sanctuary. Some cages are for those birds that are being rehabilitated from problems such as being shot or road trauma; hopefully these birds will progress to other cages where they can recover their flight prior to release back into the wild. One cage is for those cockatoos that are sadly too injured to ever be released. There are also cages for domesticated Carnaby and Red Tailed Cockatoos "the friendlies" who have been confiscated from, or surrendered by the public, venturing into their cage is an experience not to be missed. Unfortunately these birds will never be able to be released into the wild.

When we started at Kaarakin we were welcomed by the small group of volunteers whose job it is to feed the cockatoos. I was immediately struck by the dedication of these people and feel proud to be able to add my own small contribution.



Spring is here. The orchards are bursting with spring flowers and the bush is a treasure trove of wild flowers. I visited Araluen Park last week and the spring flowers were truly spectacular.

And along with the wonderful weather comes the reality of living in our beautiful but







demanding bush environment. Last year's summer heat and horrifically dry conditions remain as a grim reminder of what lies ahead. So the Keelty report and talk of bush fire preparedness is timely. (See page 28).

Those who choose to live in the hills must also face up to the very real responsibility of suitably preparing their homes and properties.

It is great to see that some of the regulations that have hampered us preparing our properties are being relaxed. The letter entitled burning grasstrees (page 13) shows that the City of Armadale is keen to encourage common sense action.

I also applaud David Ward's strategy (see page 11) to garner community action towards helping Hillendale residents making their residences more bushfire ready. Hopefully local community helpers will rally to this worthy activity.

My Dad, when he was a student at Karragullen Primary School in the 1920's, relays the story that every child was given a box of matches in early August and told to 'burn the bush'. In this way the children of the area managed the bushland area with a series of cool burns, carried out when there was no danger of a fire getting away.

Of course this is not possible today, but we still should be encouraging local residents to burn, cut and manage bushfire hazards in early spring whenever possible.

Spring 2011 will also bring with it Local Council Elections. Cr Pat Hart is stepping down from the role after thirteen years of service to the community. Pat has served the community exceptionally well over this time and deserves great praise.

Her retirement leaves a vacancy for

Iarrah Ward. Two nominations have already been submitted to Counci: former Counciller Laurie Scidone and aspirant Grant Nixon. Traditionally voting in local council elections

does not attract a high voting rate.

This is very strange, as this level of governance is so important, as it impacts on every aspect of how we live. See the letters to the editor all of these relate to council issues!

Our councillors shoulder huge responsibility and arguably should receive far higher compensation for fulfilling this role.

Jarrah Ward is unique as it has very different needs from most wards within the City of Armadale. The area is largely bush, has a significant rural component and it is home to a small population occupying a large region. Plus many of the values of those living in Jarrah Ward, differ from the values of those in many other wards within the City of Armadale.

Overall, block sizes are larger than the rest of the city, the infrastructure is sparse and the requirements are great. Environmental issues are ranked highly and there is a reticence to pursue development, without close inspection. Our community is aware and often vocal.

Jarrah Ward has 2 Councillors and, in considering the needs of their constituents, they are often placed at odds with others on Council.

Thus we need strong leadership in this sphere of government.

So all Roleysone Karragullen residents are urged to get behind the candidates, find out what they stand for and above all, please VOTE. We cannot complain about what Council does unless we have been part of the process.

I commend the September edition to you. This is the 35th edion I have produced and the Courier is now in its 35th year.

BURNING GRASSTREES

A few weeks ago while trying to prepare our block for the summer fire season, I applied to Armadale Council for a permit to burn off grass trees on our 1/2 acre property. I had attended a Great Garden seminar and was told that many grass trees in the south west were dying due to not having controlled burning, as this encourages regeneration and also reduces the fire risk. This seemed such an ideal time to burn off as the ground was damp with rain predicated the next day. The permit from the Health Department at Armadale Council was denied on the basis that we could only burn off a small area of leaves and twigs. I spoke about this to Chris Cairns, (Roleystone Bush Fire Ready Coordinator) who suggested that I contact Pat Hart our local councillor.

I contacted Pat Hart who in turn contacted Bryan Watkins (Chief of Armadale Council Bush Fire brigade), who spoke with Ian Watt (Coordinator of Armadale Health Services). This resulted in Bryan Watkins informing me that we could indeed burn off our grass trees with a permit, as could everyone in Roleystone. I feel that this change of heart came about because of the recent bushfires in February with the need to reduce fuel on the ground.

While I appreciate that the Health Department is trying to keep smoke to a minimum especially for asthma sufferers, I feel that after the wakeup call from the recent fires we need to keep our blocks as fuel free as possible. I understand that we must have regulations, but after the February fires, feel that we should be doing our utmost to keep Roleystone & surrounding areas as fuel free as possible.

While walking around Roleystone I see many blocks that have a great deal of fuel on the ground. Are people aware, that if they are concerned about the fuel load on any of their neighbours' properties, they can phone their local council for advice? A ranger can be sent out to check this out. If pool fences have to be inspected, why not blocks that have a lot of fuel on the ground. Maybe we need more rangers, because the cost of the fires in February is too great to bear. The Roleystone Fire Brigade (volunteers) can only burn off on Saturdays, due to Sunday being a fire free day, then after a certain time they can no longer burn off. It is like having one hand tied behind their backs!!

Considering that the Roleystone Bush Fire Brigade have such a short period to manage controlled burns, surely over the winter months when the fire risk is minimal, the fire brigade should be allowed to make a real difference on both days over the weekend. I appreciate that some people are asthmatics, who may need to consider either being away on the day, or to stay inside, but it seems a small price to pay instead of the devastation that occurred in February. We need to allow the fire brigade to make a real difference, by lowering the fire risk in our area!! I suspect that many residents of Roleystone feel the same way.

I wish to thank Pat Hart, Bryan Watkins and Ian Watt for making it possible for Roleystone residents to obtain fire permits for burning back grass trees.


CITY'S RESPONSE






REQUEST TO DOG OWNERS

Roleystone sure is overflowing with dogs these days. I have the unfortunate privilege of listening to neighbourhood dogs bark all day the minute their owners have left. Sometimes all night! I've had stray dogs come on to my property and tear apart my chickens in broad daylight. Some years ago I was bitten by a dog. And my child is terrified of them.

Despite all of this, I still appreciate the bond a person has with their pet pooch. HOWEVER, when I am out with my family at a local Roleystone park or playground, and your dog is running full tilt towards us, off the leash, then it's guaranteed that we'll have our hearts in our mouths.

You see, whether your dog is a small fluff ball or the large menacing type, we simply don't want to have anything to do with it. Time and again our family encounter unleashed and often unsupervised dogs roaming the parks and playgrounds of our community, and yet the owners appear to be arrogantly oblivious to the needs (or history) of others utilising these same public spaces. I am tired of having to alter our walk route because a Doberman or Rottweiler is unleashed and cruising around the very same public area that we want to access. Don't these spaces belong to us too?

When we look about for the relevant owners we note that they are often far far way, seemingly totally at ease because they believe that their dog is 'alright'. Well, I've come upon this story many times, when someone ends up having a child or relative killed by someone's dog which they say was 'totally out of character'. You simply can't deny that occurrences such as these are alarmingly regular, and are therefore likely to hang heavy in the minds of protective parents.

Come on dog owners, this is a family community too. We reserve the right to walk around our parks and reserves with our families without having to fend off unleashed and mostly unsupervised dogs, no matter what size or breed they are.

I have experienced this at the park on Westbourne Road, where I had the bejesus

scared out of me by a large white dog whilst I was pushing my toddler on the swing. Out of nowhere and within seconds, this huge dog was at my feet, frantically sniffing around my ankles, and when I looked around to find the owners, they were walking many metres away, huddled close and deep in conversation. I actually think they were aware of us, but they seemed to be so certain of the unblemished record of their much loved pet that they didn't for a second stop to think that maybe we don't want their animal anywhere near us. They never called him away, they just kept on walking. I was flabbergasted.

We have also experienced this at Churchman Brook, where a dog (on two separate occasions) has repeatedly accosted us, jumping up on my little one with the owner nowhere to be found, whilst a staff member at the plant there angrily drove around in his utility trying to find him (it is a water catchment area after all!)

We have experienced it at Borrello Park where an unleashed black dog has bothered us time and again whilst we try to enjoy time in the playground.

And don't even get me started on what we have to face EVERY time we go to the Cross Park playground. If we're not being jumped on or charged at, we are being eyeballed closely and this makes us very nervous indeed!

You're entitled to your dog and your dog is entitled to some free time and play. But when you are anywhere near a playground, get that leash out and put it on your dog, especially if there is a child or family in sight. And please, stop assuming that just because you love your dog that everyone else does too! To me your dog is a complete stranger and we are also a stranger to him. He therefore has no bond with us which equates to no care for us either. From our experience, that leaves us open to absolutely anything.

So please, show some respect and consideration for the non dog owners, who are entitled to fear free, stress free recreation in and around Rolevstone.

Definitely the greatest challenge has been taking a stance on topics that have divided our community.


What do you wish for your community going into the future?





Continuing the history of Roleystone Primary School with grateful acknowedgement to Karen West (nee Talbot) and ex-teacher Margaret Bettenay.

1931: Mr A Neville had been appointed as Head Teacher at the school and along with a 'monitor assistant' guided the learning of the young pupils . He had accommodation built next to the school and he and his family, stayed for ten years. May 29th 1931 The school gardens were badly damaged by wandering cattle.

March 23rd 1936

A fierce fire passed over the school property this afternoon. The HT (Head Teacher) and $\check{4}$ senior boys had to spend 1 $^{3\!\!/}_{4}$ hours burning a break to save the quarters and fighting with bushes and buckets of water from a hole in the playground to save the out buildings. A number of posts were destroyed and a considerable quantity of HT's firewood. The radio aerial fell owing to destruction of the tree holding the guy rope. Children and teachers suffered a great deal from the smoke. School was not dismissed. This was the most fierce fire that has swept through the area during the past 10 years. Owing to the long dry summer the bush burnt fiercely even the tops of the green trees were burning and from these came the

Mr Neville was replaced by Mr R Dalby in 1937. He stayed as Head Teacher for 13 years.

Feb 1st 1938

Took up duty as Head Teacher..... The children are a fine type, well mannered and very eager but they appear to be addicted to talking during lessons.

Over the period of World War 11 there were mentions of the school's contribution to the war effort. On April 30th 1940 the school was closed when the teachers attended drill instruction in Maddington and on August 14th 1942, the children's donation of 16 shillings for the prisoners of war fund was paid into the Department.

By the mid 1940's the school was overcrowded and the tiny side verandah was enclosed to form an infant's classroom. The infant class was taught by Miss Margaret Gowans who also stayed in the location after she too married a local farmer - Mr Vernon Bettenay.

Following WW2 the school mirrored the growth and change in the district. Many children had been evacuated from the metropolitan area during the war and after the war migration programs resulted in many non-English speaking students. Margaret Bettenay recalls the international flavour of the student population with the playground ringing with Dutch Jingles in skipping and European version of Knucklebones. The Italian migration

leystone Primary School 1930 – 1970

happened soon after this point.

By 1951 Mr Dalby had retired and Mr Clive Griffiths took up his appointment.

In June 1952: Received word that free milk would be delivered.

The school was overflowing and crown land was purchased in North Roleystone for the construction of a new school. Classes were now being held in the Congregational Church Hall – the little school was full. On July 2nd 1956 under Mr Bernard Smith a new school was completed and opened.

Many former teachers were present at the opening. Since 1956 the Roleystone Primary School continued to grow. The 1950's and 1960's saw big immigration into the Perth hills with many Slav and Italian families seeking to carve new life on the farms and orchards in the area. In 1961 the old teacher's quarters were gifted to the Congregational Union and the new school quarters were occupied by Mr B Smith and his family.

During 1967 the school had grown large enough for an application for a new classroom to be made. The 21 students in year 7 in 1967 were cramped into the former staff room as a learning space.

(Not that they minded. Linda Bettenay recalls that having a kitchen sink in the room allowed for some great antics when the headmaster was absent from the class which seemed quite frequent in retrospect!)

On 6th December a contract was let for a classroom to be erected at the cost of \$6 522 and this was finished

Mr Bernard Smith retired and his place was taken by Mr Max Scott. (Rumour has it that the old Principals quarters were sold after Mr Smith left and that many years after the sale it was discovered that the new owners had never been charged for electricity or water - all courtesy of a very generous Education Department and no doubt an oversight somewhere.)

Gradually the surrounding district of Roleystone was changing with a decrease in the importance of rural orcharding and a rise in the use of the area as domestic accommodation.


What a Wonderful Night of Entertainment

The caring and compassion of the local community is something I will hold in my heart forever no matter how bleak I may feel during my ongoing rehabilitation.


THE COMING SHOW



Some Lessons to Learn - Fire Safety

I thought Mick Keelty summed it up beautifully when he said that if we don't know the fuel loadings we live amongst then we don't understand the risk we are exposed to. In short, how can we mitigate the risk if we don't know what it is?? Seems logical doesn't it! The fact is this analogy can be applied at both the broad landscape scale and the individual property scale.

If you live in a house that has not been constructed (or retrofitted) to bushfire construction standard, you are at increased risk of your home igniting during a bushfire. If you don't maintain fuel loads on your bush block below 6-8 tonnes per hectare, it's likely the next fire will be uncontrollable. So if you don't know what the construction standards of your home are OR what your surrounding fuel loadings are then you have no idea what the level of risk you are exposed to every summer.

I think there are many reasons why so many people are unprepared, but a key one must be that they simply do not understand their level of risk.

So how do you determine your level of risk? Do a Bushfire Attack Level assessment on your block. The Australian Standard AS3959-2009 provides the methodology. Your assessed level determines what to do to your home to

retrofit it and help it comply to survive the next bushfire.

When areas are finally declared bushfire prone, this will automatically be triggered for all new homes. It cannot be enforced retrospectively to existing homes, but you can do the assessment and then retrofit your home to help it comply. This is real quantifiable bushfire risk mitigation that you can do and it's not necessarily expensive. Lastly, I am passionate about community bushfire education and engagement, not enough people are currently engaged. The report highlighted the need for more activity in this area. The University of Western Australia are running a one day Bushfire Survival Plan workshop in October targeting residents in bushfire areas. It just provides another option to the local brigade, FESA and local government programs and might be just what you were looking for. Simply Google: 'UWA & Bushfire'.

The Keelty Review Some major pointers to

come from the Keelty review impacting on this community.

That: 'not one agency appearing before the Special Inquiry could point to engagement of the community during exercises designed to test response to a bushfire emergency', causes great concern. The importance of community engagement in any crisis situation is of major importance.

Recommendation 3: the responsibility of declaring areas 'bushfire prone' and Recommendation 40: which recommends mandating the notation on title deeds of affected properties that they are in a declared fire prone area, both seem sensible suggestions. The requirement for preseason bushfire education in Recommendation 6 which emphasises the fact that water

and power supplies are not guaranteed during bushfires, is also welcome. It is important to remind people that in an emergency situation nothing can be guaranteed.

The calls for FESA, DEC and local governments to not only administer comprehensive controlled burning programs but also to conduct them as joint exercises in Recommendations 13 and 14 is also sensible. Not only would such events help reduce critical fuel loads it will allow the cross-pollination of techniques between the agencies and allow them to operate better as one team.

Overall this review provides an excellent opportunity to bring about changes that update our responses to all emergency situations and Mr Keelty is to be congratulated for such a comprehensive review. Hopefully we will now see ACTION on it.



GARDENING NOTES JEAN: 9397 5547

Are your roses and fruit trees pruned? Are your bands battle scarred? Are the weeds growing wonderfully well?

One of the side issues from all the weeding,

is that the chooks are giving eight or nine eggs each day; lovely golden fresh tasty eggs. Yes this is a beautiful

time of the year and we cannot complain especially when the rain obliges by often

coming heaviest at night.

The last month I was so busy in my role with the Camellia Society as I had a visit from the International President of the Camellia Society, Pat Short and her husband Herb from London. We took a quick trip to Cape Leeuwin in the bleakest, windiest weather. I had never seen the water right up to the water wheel and splashing foam into the car park. We also enjoyed seeing the tall karri trees on Caves Road and the garden that once belonged to Jesse Bussell and which has been in the Peirce family since 1904.

On the Monday, a group of keen Camellians gathered with Grant Nixon at Araluen for Devonshire tea and then went for a brisk walk around the Park. The Camellia trees are looking fantastic and the early plantings have responded well to their loving care. In my mind the knockout beauty of the day was a large plant of 'Flower Girl,' a reticulate hybrid in a glowing pink which is on the edge

of a lawned area. It was transplanted two years before from a private garden in Maddington.

We then had an official Camellia planting ceremony with Pat planting an American Bred Cultivar 'Kick Off', Herb planted a variegated version of 'Great Eastern' and I replaced the 'Jean Evans' that died when a tree branch fell on the original bush.



It's dieback treatment time again

The next field day will be on Sunday 18th September at Boulder Rock and is a dieback treatment day. This iconic local site is around 8.5 kilometres up the Brookton Hwy from the Chevin Road turnoff. Boulder Rock is in the Midgegooroo National Park and is managed by the Department for Environment and Conservation (DEC). The area around the Rock was treated many years ago but we need to repeat the treatment. We will meet at 9.00am and work till noon.

Please consider treating your own bush against dieback disease. If you need help, come along to one of our field days in a local reserve. Members of Roleybushcare will give you instruction on how to proceed. It's very easy to do. If you help out that morning, you will be able to borrow our equipment to do your own trees. It is recommended that you

inject your trees every 3-5 years. Grass trees, zamias and small every year. The procedure for spraying is different. The strength of the phosphite is less and a wetting agent is added.





WA SENIORS CARDS – BENEFITS FOR THOSE WHO KNOW

The rising cost of living is an issue that affects all West Australians in so many ways. For retirees and people on fixed incomes the cost of living becomes even more important which is why I am keen to remind WA Seniors Card holders of the benefits their cards offer and possibly introduce them to benefits they were not previously aware of; some people may not even be aware that they are now eligible since changes were announced in the State Budget.

Earlier this year, the State Government expanded eligibility for the WA Seniors Card to allow seniors who work 25 hours of less per week, averaged over a 12-month period, to apply for the Seniors Card.

If this sounds like you and you have not already applied, I encourage you to get in touch with the Seniors Card Centre on 6217 8855, so that you may join the 245,288 card holders who recently shared in \$33.4 million worth of payments via the annual Cost of Living Rebate. Via the Rebate, singles will receive \$150 and couples will receive \$225 to help support them with their daily living expenses.

Although the annual rebate is an important part of the support people receive through the WA Seniors Card, there is in fact a range of benefits worth up to \$1,200 a year. Card holders should be making themselves aware of all the benefits available through the card, which include help with water rates, local government rates, energy supply charges, fishing licences, the security rebate, and the electrical and fire safety rebate.

The WA Seniors Card Discount Directory is a great source of information on what the WA Seniors Card offers, including a list of 500 businesses across the State that offer discounts for card holders. All card holders are sent out a Directory; however, people can contact the Seniors Card Centre on the above number and also check the Seniors Card website at www.seniorscard. wa.gov.au to see the new discounts that are added frequently.

















A number of familiar faces have returned from chasing the northern sun during our winter months and it is good to see them back out on the bowling green.

Astronomical Highlights September

Ah, the wonders of Wikipedia: a quick Google reveals that the word September comes from the name of the seventh month in the pre-153 BC Roman calendar. The year started in March, back then. I could find some sense in the idea of starting the year from an astronomical event such as a solstice or an equinox. For simplicity, we say these days that spring starts on the 1st of September. More properly, it ought to start at the equinox. This occurs on the 23rd, around 5pm. At that time the Sun will be right in the plane of the Earth's equator.

At equinox time the Sun rises due east and sets due west. If you're on the equator, perhaps in Borneo, the Sun will pass exactly overhead when it reaches its highest point in the sky. This can never happen in Perth; we're too far south. The word equi-nox implies that day and night are equal, i.e. 12 hours apiece. Near enough. The time from sunrise to sunset is lengthened by about 6 minutes because the Earth's atmosphere bends sunlight a bit, enabling us to see the Sun when it's actually just below the horizon.

Another Wiki-fact is that, in the familiar Gregorian calendar, September always begins on the same day of the week as December. The interval is 91 days, a neat multiple of 7.

Thursday September 1st will bring a pleasing early evening sight in the western sky: the waxing crescent moon next to the star Spica, with Saturn well below. Telescope observers, you'd better eyeball Saturn early in the month

because it's settling down into the murk. By the end of the month it'll be setting in twilight. The setting time is around 8:30pm in early September, and 7:45pm mid-month.

The Moon's main phases will be first quarter on the night of the 4th, full moon on the 12th, last quarter on the 20th, and new moon on the 27th. The full moon on the 12th will rise just a few minutes after the Sun sets, and on the opposite horizon. The thin "new" crescent moon should be visible low down and just to the south of west on the 28th at dusk (say 7pm or so). You need a good, clear view low down to the west for this; not always easy to arrange, up here in the hills.

In the absence of Venus, Jupiter is the brightest starlike object in the night sky. Early in the month, it rises just to the north of east at about 11pm and culminates quite high in the north around 4am. Dawn finds it in the NNW. By mid-month Jupiter's rising around 10pm, culminating at around 3am, and standing out in the NW sky at break of day. By month's end it's rising before 9pm – early enough that plenty of people are likely to notice it and phone the Observatory to ask what it is.

Mars continues to be a somewhat uninspiring sight, fairly low in the NE sky at daybreak all month. On the mornings of the 23rd and 24th Mars will be visited by the waning crescent moon.

Suicide Prevention; Everyone's Business

The second week of September is Suicide Prevention Week.

Our community has an active committed group, Roleystone Alive Group, working to ensure that we limit untimely deaths or injurious behaviours in our location. I asked the coordinator of this group to put some words together about the scourge of suicide in communities.

If you fronted up to the emergency room with a compound fracture and a bone sticking out of your arm in obvious distress, you know you would be seen to by a doctor almost immediately, yes?

Well a lot more people die from suicide each year than they do from a broken arm?

What is the triage process for someone emotionally unsound, and how and who should help someone who is contemplating suicide or generally not coping anymore?

Fact: More people die from suicide each year than road deaths in Australia.

We can see how much money is spent on road safety campaigns and safer cars, but where do we openly see suicide prevention thrown in our faces? The truth is not many people know what to do or how to handle the topic. It's often still thought of

as taboo and sometimes people will avoid mentioning the subject of depression or suicide with an obviously distressed person simply because they feel it may make the situation worse. Fact: 80% of people have thought about killing themselves at some point in their lives*.

It's OK to talk about suicide and more importantly it's ok for you to suggest help, in the form of counselling or visiting their GP. A problem shared is often a problem halved, being a good listener (not a problem solver) is often enough to take the edge off for someone. Suicide does not discriminate; age, socioeconomic status, relationship status, success does not matter. Anyone can be at risk and it's everyone's business when it comes to helping someone in need

Not many people know who their 'real friends' are.

We can all rattle off a list of people who without hesitation would come for a few drinks or have laugh with. But most people struggle to locate a friend that they can actually talk openly about their emotions to without fear of reprisal or humiliation, particularly young men. Most often than not in a group full of friends it's generally a count of 2 or 3 that make the cut. One of them being an older mentor type figure, another is someone the same age who is going through similar things and the other is often a woman. *Tip: Find out who these people are in your lives, before you need them.*

Roleystone has been through its fair share of hard times and often a question I was asked is what is being done? Well not so long ago the only things we could see happening were through the churches and every now and then the youth services from down the hill would pop up to babysit teens for a while. It's great to see but it wasn't enough. Roleystone now has a group that is made up of locals who have been together working tirelessly for over a year. The group is made of locals who have lobbied for a fair share of the government's 13 million dollars that has been allocated to mental health and suicide prevention. Roleystone was the first community to set up a committee and actively get involved.

So far projects undertaken include a mass survey of locals in order to do a gap analysis on the current situation. The survey is being undertaken by Edith Cowan University and is the first of its kind; this also means that years down the track progress can be measured. The schools have been involved, resilience training for school teachers has been funded and several programs for teens and children at risk have been introduced and or continued. Speakers such as ex Fremantle Dockers Player Paul Hasleby and Andrew Browne have been into the senior and junior football clubs to talk about their experiences with depression and how to seek help or help a mate out. All up Paul and his mates have visited the boys 8 times in the last 12 months.

Members of the community have had Gatekeeper training, this is the only nationally recognised suicide 'first aid' training in Australia and it's been rolled out to key players in the community such as local business owners, coaches, teachers, church leaders, youth workers and more. Another Gatekeeper course is due to be held in November 2011.

Next time you see someone who says they're not coping, even if it's not through words that you know something isn't right ask them how they *really* are. It's National Suicide Prevention Week in September and it's as good an excuse as any to actively have a chat to someone about their emotional wellbeing, a real conversation isn't about the footy or the weather it's about them. How are they going and what's going on with their lives. You might end up being someone's hero and you wouldn't have even known it.

It's up to everyone in the community to want change and to want to be a community that looks after each other young *and* old. Sustainability is the key, so if you're a local looking to get involved contact me via email. Evie.molson@hotmail.com

Dear Friends

Cycle races have always been a bit of a mystery to me. Whenever I watched the Tour de France for instance, there seemed to be long periods when the riders didn't race at all but pedalled quietly along chatting to each other as if on a Saturday afternoon picnic ride. Then all of a sudden somebody would set off in a rush and everybody would charge after them as if their life depended on it.

This year I was determined to get to the bottom of it all and follow the big race from start to finish. And I got hooked. Of course, it's easy to get hooked if the person you are shouting for looks like winning. Now I had hardly heard of Cadel Evans before but he is a compatriot and seemed to be a good guy so worthy of my support.

As the three week race unfolded I learned more and more about this man. And I watched him deal with both planned and unforeseen situations. Quite apart from his supreme athleticism, his mental furniture was obviously superb. His sights were firmly set on the final winning post and he was not at all deflected or downcast when intermediate awards went to others and his grand plan for overall victory was challenged. The only time he led the race was the only time it really mattered.

In the interviews, more of his personal story became clear and he hasn't had an easy ride to the top in this most demanding of sports. He's had his fair share of knocks as well as successes. But throughout, the commentators were keen to comment that he was the "clean" face of a sport which has been marred by performance enhancing drugs. I believe one of the writers in the Bible, Paul, would have really appreciated having Cadel Evans around as

an example when he was talking about the way we can live. Paul saw life as a journey towards achieving a heavenly goal. I know nothing of Cadel Evans' spiritual life but that wouldn't have bothered Paul - he used the example of Greek athletes to encourage us. In Philippians, he wrote, "Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize..." Like Mr Evans, the winners of the Greek races received trophies and cash as well as high esteem. The Christian receives the prize of everlasting glory. Cadel's victory is indeed a modern parable of a good spiritual life. For many of us that path has had more ups and downs than the mountain stages of "Le Tour" and there have been times when we have just got off and sat by the roadside! Maybe that's where you are now. Maybe you never even set off, as you saw it as all too hard. May I encourage you to take heart and give it another go?

One final comment -Cadel Evans could not have achieved what he did without the sacrificial support of his team mates. In the spiritual journey I read about in the Bible, we too are surrounded by team mates who want to see us win through and will give up so much for us.

Wild Gossip: **Rainbow Lorikeets**

The Rainbow Lorikeet (Trichoglossus haematodus) was introduced into the wild in the Perth area about 50 years ago, only a few birds

were recorded so no action was taken to remove them. The estimated current population is above 20,000 birds and now these birds are an Australia wide declared

The Rainbow Lorikeet is a small, brightly coloured parrot, weighing about 125 gms, about 28cms in length, noticeable by its blue head and red bill. They look very attractive and cute but they most certainly are not - they are a pest!

Rainbow Lorikeets are very noisy when flying, feeding and at roost. They leave the roost at dawn to form flocks of up to 50 birds to fly on to their feeding grounds which can be as far as 60kms away. They are aggressively protective of their roost and feeding ground and will drive away our native birds; also they are carriers of the deadly Psittacine beak and feather disease which poses a serious threat to both our native and captive parrots.

The Rainbow Lorikeet causes massive damage to the agricultural and fruit

industries all around Australia. In W.A. the public have reported problems caused by the Rainbow Lorikeet including fruit damage, fouling and noise. On the commercial side there is reporting of major damage to a wide range of fruit in the Hills Orchards, Swan Valley, various vineyards and non-metro areas. Another concern that is the large size of the flight groups could pose a bird strike threat near airports.

Rainbow Lorikeets are commonly kept as pets but must be licensed by D.E.C. These birds must be housed in a secure double- door aviary to prevent escape and care taken with hygiene to prevent the spread of Psittacine beak and feather disease to other captive or native birds. Unwanted birds should be surrendered to D.E.C. or a wildlife shelter - they must NEVER be released.

If you find an orphaned or injured Rainbow Lorikeet please contact your local wildlife shelter or carer and please remember the disease threat to any birds you might have at home and to our precious native birds.
