In mid September when I caught up with young Roleystone equestrian Bayley Thomas, she was preparing her two part Andalusian mares for competition in the Perth Royal Show. In 2010 one of her mares Molly (Torridon Rufina) won Champion Partbred Andalusian and her younger sister Pippa (Torridon Rhythm N Blues) was runner up. This has been

with Molly currently holding the mantle of State Champion in this category.

Bayley has owned Molly since she was a one year old and Pippa was purchased by Bayley's sister Kim when she was only two weeks old. Over the last four years she has steadily worked with the horses, preparing them for the rigours of show performance. Both have competed in the halter competition and this year Molly will be competing in the ridden section as well.

Along with training them in performance, goes many hours of grooming and making the horses look just right. Bayley believes that often owners let down their horses by neglecting this aspect. Her horses are truly pampered before competitions.

Rolestone Animal Hospital Opens

The Roleystone Animal Hospital opened their doors on the 17th September and owners Richard and Debra celebrated the 'real start' to their new business.

They have been practicing for six months in the area with Richard conducting house calls but this marks a new chapter for the couple as they now have their own

Richard still intends to do home visits but he will also be available at the centre on Page Road for consulting sessions and to conduct surgery when required.

Richard wants to provide: 'a place for complete care for your animals.' Although he may need to call for specialist treatment in some circumstances, he can manage most routine surgery and is more than happy to treat a wide range of animals.

In August last year local Nhari Lipscombe, who used to be a veterinary nurse for Richard in Karratha, contacted the pair to let them know she had found the ideal spot; they should come to Roleystone to set up their new Veterinary Clinic. So they flew down from Karratha and stayed overnight at Lakeside Resort. Next day they looked around and managed to fall in love with the place, buy a home in Araluen and end off the day with an evening meal at Roleys on the Ridge.

They then started to put their dream into practice. Failing to find the ideal location in Roleystone, the converted homestead in Page Road is still ideal for hills customers as it is easy to get to (you don't need to cross the highway) and it is not on a main road. Hey Everyone,

So it has been a while since my last input into the Courier, and my excuses vary from laziness to writer's block. The reason I have chosen to write this now? Well I have to!

It feels like almost every day we are hearing more and more about aggressive dogs attacking anything from people to other animals. Having been involved in Dog Showing and breeding with my Mum since I was a wee lass, I put these attacks down to bad temperaments and irresponsible owners.

Though when it actually comes to attacks, to be perfectly honest I would much rather hear about them on the news, and not have to experience one myself whilst taking my pooch for an innocent stroll.

It was Tuesday the 6th of September at 5:20 when my Mum and I decided to take my Siberian Husky (Kid) and two of our show whippets for a walk around the block.

Living on Westborne Road and wanting to avoid the epic hike up the hill to get back to the house, we thought we would head down Westborne Road towards Brookton Highway. After getting around 150 metres into our walk we stopped on the path at the local park as we noticed a dog off the lead, a black Staffordshire Bull Terrier to be precise. Unfortunately before we had a chance to walk back, the dog caught wind of us and took off from the two young teenagers who were sitting in the playground.

The only lucky side to this story is the fact that my Mum and the two whippets were not the ones attacked as I can 100% guarantee that an animal would have died that day. Unfortunately Kid, my Siberian husky was not so lucky. Before we had a chance to do anything the dog had launched himself through mid-air and landed on Kid's back attacking him with hatred in his eyes. After 5 minutes of fighting, screaming and even a kick or two from me, the Staffie was pried off my dog's face by the boy, who I presumed owned him. However they were very quick to disappear as soon as they got control of their dog, without leaving any details or even to wait and see if Kid and I were OK.

After the ordeal I thank god for the massive coat he gave Kid, otherwise

we would have all been a lot worse off. There was a lot of blood, so we took Kid to the vet who found a possible fracture and prescribed antibiotics. Kid is now slowly on his way back to recovery.

This now brings me to my main point of the article. I have walked my dog around Roleystone for 7 years and never had a problem.

He is always on a leash unless its 6am in the morning and I am the only person at the Roleystone Oval. Through the irresponsibleness of parents letting their kids take this dog to the Park, it has resulted in a shocking and scary afternoon for all involved. Not to mention a \$200 vet bill for an incident that could have easily been prevented. We were lucky things were not worse, or that a human was not bitten in the process.

In my opinion this animal needs to be put down. It initiated the fight and it was not going to give up until there was blood.

I reported the incident the next day to the Armadale Council but unfortunately because I could only give the description of a Black Staffordshire Bull Terrier there really isn't anything they could do. Unless the dog does it again!

So from this experience we are out of pocket and my mum is too scared to walk her dogs anymore in what should be a safe area.

As my final say I would like to say a massive thank you to the lovely ladies who came out from their house to help after they heard the hysterical screams from my Mum. We did not get a chance to grab their names but it was lovely of you to come and help!

REZONING RESERVE 24458 ROBIN ROAD ROLEYSTONE

The Roleystone Seniors Housing committee wish to advise that the initiation of the amendment to rezone the Primary School site from Public Purpose to Residential-Restricted Use has commenced.

The proposed amendment will facilitate a future development application for Aged or Dependant Persons Accommodation on the Primary School site. The initiation of the rezoning application has passed formally through Council and been referred to the EPA for their comments. After EPA have made their comments it will, if no reports are required, be formally advertised by Council for public comment. We think this will possibly be November/December. After Council formally considers all submissions and makes any variations it will then go forward to the WAPC for final approval (probably in March/April). This final rezoning process will take a few months. It will then be up to the State Government to commence the process of putting the land out for tender.





Survey for the Future Use of the Roleystone Primary School Site

In 2012 the Primary School will be moving to Raeburn Rd, and the existing Robin Rd site will be redeveloped. Over the last 55 years its facilities have been used by the community.

Being close to the Roleystone Town Centre, the Robin Road Green has been used in the past for small community events. Surrounded by old Jarrah trees and bushland, it has a natural amphitheatre feel to it. Some believe this "Green" is needed to continue to nurture these small community events. The estimate cost for maintaining the "Green" is \$5,000 per year.

The "Green" also includes 200 year old Jarrah trees, 72 different species of native plants and historic tree stumps.

Retirement accommodation is also required for our ageing Roleystone population. Hillandale is currently full with 24 private accommodation units and 12 Homes West units. Senior Roleystone residents needing smaller homes are finding that they have to leave our community.

There is enough land on this site to have both the Green and at least 40 retirement homes. However this is unlikely without your input.

We hope you take the time to fill out and submit the survey on the opposite side to this notice.

The data collected will be submitted to both the City of Armadale and the State Government in full. Personal details will otherwise remain strictly confidental. Basic results, without personal details, may be published in the local media.

Thus they are asking for residents to fill out the survey on this page.



GETTING HELP WITH BURNING OFF

The letter from Valerie Bell on burning grasstrees in the last issue prompts me to remind residents of the more general burning off situation.

In general fuel loads build up to dangerous levels in natural bush after about five years or so, but how many of us do anything about it? Even firebreaks are not required for blocks less than 5000 sq metres. One can get a very serious fire on much less than this if the area has not been cleared or burned in, say, twenty years which would seem to be the case often around here.

By November last year my wife and I were in exactly this situation with our 3000 sq metre site. Being now in our seventies we felt the burning off job was beyond our own capabilities so we contracted the Roleystone Volunteer Bushfire Brigade to come in and burn the front and back portions of our block; and are we glad we did!

UNCONTROLLED DOGS

I would just like to make a quick response to a letter that I read in the last edition titled 'Request to Dog Owners'.

We moved into the area two years ago and it's been a fabulous decision; we absolutely love the peace and quiet. That is all except for the uncontrolled dogs. We have a Staffy cross who is as soft as you know what, however he is never off the lead when people are around and we never let him run up and sniff dogs or people, as this shows a complete disregard for others. Unfortunately we have had to stop walking our dog along the Churchman Brook track because time after time, other people let their dogs off the lead and let them run up to you. Personally I do not appreciate your dog running up to my four year old or to me and secondly if your dog gets eaten by my dog then that's your fault! I have even been abused for commenting and was instructed that the track is for dogs!!! The ignorance is unbelievable.

I even came across a woman with five

The Vollies took care of Burning Permits and advised the neighbours and turned up late in November (it had been a late, wet winter) with two big trucks and at least two 4WDs and set to work.

I was horrified at the flammability of the long-ignored fuel load - flames just about reached the tops of the jarrah trees, but thanks to their high pressure hoses all was kept very safely in control. My wife and I would have simply burnt the house down. Grasstrees, incidentally, were allowed to burn for a while but extinguished before they became too spectacular.

The crew must have worked for a good three hours, and it wasn't free, of course. But the charge was very reasonable and we paid it willingly. I would urge all residents to consider the RVBB, especially if they are getting on a bit, at least every four or five years. Our mind was put at ease during the February fire and our bush is now a picture of regrowth such as we've not seen for ages and every grass tree has a flower spike.














Linton ReynoldsThe Mayorof ArmadaleStands Down

Assisting Pets Updating Annual Vaccinations

As school holidays approach in October, families may be considering some time away from home which may require putting their pets into kennels or catteries for boarding.

It is amazing how quickly the year passes and it is easy to forget to maintain the vaccination boosters which are required before a pet can be admitted to boarding facilities.

Some veterinary clinics also need vaccination certificates to show that patients have been fully vaccinated before they are accepted.

Having pets vaccinated at home is an easy process with minimal disruption to the pet's normal routine and more convenience for the owner, especially for people who don't drive, or have numerous pets to have vaccinated.

Parents with young children are particularly grateful that they don't need to take the children and their pets along to the vet clinic. For cats and dogs, it is recommended to do a multiple vaccination which covers 5 diseases in one injection. A thorough health check of the animal is done prior to the vaccination and this is useful to maintain a good level of veterinary care before problems develop.

Animals are much more relaxed having their vaccinations done at home and it is a good opportunity to ask the vet about particular problems which may be related to the home environment. It is generally much easier to deal with cats at home rather than having to force them into a cat cage and drive them to the vets.







AT SCHOOL NUMBER THREE:

- The students moved into the school before electricity was connected.
- There were three rooms and three teachers. There were no teachers aides or assistants. Classes could be 40 or more students.
- School photos were taken on the front steps.
- Students received free milk each recess.
- The school colours were pink and green. In the early 1960's they changed to red and white.
- There was no school canteen.
 Once a week parents provided
 lunches as a treat. In winter this
 was 'mince on toast' in summer
 'polony and salad rolls'.
- The students planted the grass on Cross Park Oval after it was levelled, so sports could be played.







City Relaxes Rules for Hill's Residents

The City of Armadale has extended measures to assist hill's residents prepare their properties for bushfire season.

Greenwaste collection limits will be relaxed for hill's residents and burning permits will be more readily available as part of extra measures taken by the City of Armadale to help the community prepare for the coming bushfire season.

The City has put in place a range of interim measures to encourage people living in the hills to reduce fuel loads on their properties and be aware of the risk of fires in bushland regions.

These initiatives are:

The usual 6 cubic metre limits per property for the 2011 spring/summer greenwaste collection will not be enforced for hills residents;

"Permits to Burn" will be issued by telephone, fax or email providing the applicant is able to fulfil the conditions of the permit;

The Chief Bushfire Control Officer will have the power to issue permits in bushland regions for Sundays and public holidays and on lots up to 1200sqm. It must be clearly identified that it is necessary to reduce a particular fire risk before a permit is issued.

The City will provide extra public information about bushfire risk, the best ways to reduce fuel loads and the need for property owners and occupiers to be responsible for reducing fuel loads.

The City also has a new Bushfire Information brochure which has been distributed with all Rate Notices and is available online at www.armadale.wa.gov.au.

An additional greenwaste collection in the hills area over summer will be implemented, if required.

Between 1 April and 30 September, Permits to Burn are issued by the City's Health Services, while from 1 October to 31 November and 1 April to 31 May, Ranger Services issue permits. These periods are subject to change due to weather conditions.




Picture Palaces of Perth and other places in Western Australia

On a Wing & A Prayer

An enthusiastic group of Kaarakin volunteers, their families and friends were welcomed to a very special 'world first' advanced screening of 'On a Wing and a Prayer' recently. This is a film about Carnabys Cockatoos and stared Kaarakin's own Carnaby Cockatoo - Harmony!

'On a Wing and a Prayer' is scheduled for release later in the year and the producers chose Kaarakin to be the site of the film's debut screening.

Leighton De Barros, the film's producer gave a talk about the making of the movie and answered questions.

Playful, mischievous and highly intelligent, Carnaby's Black Cockatoos are adored by thousands, hunted by many and saved by few. Endemic to the south-west region of

Western Australia, only a small pocket of these large, gregarious birds remain and these are permanently under threat. Some are still being poached and smuggled for private collections. Many are illegally shot.

Together with land clearing, loss of native food habitat and injury from manmade structures, the Carnaby's Black Cockatoo is


plummeting towards extinction. Species recovery is an uphill struggle; only two percent of newborn chicks make it to adulthood. The odds are against them.

Hope for their future lies in the hands of the local community and one man in particular, Senior Wildlife Investigator Rick Dawson. This year Rick is determined to protect one small family of Carnaby's Black Cockatoos at a 'high risk' nesting site he calls 'The Stump'. Over the last four years the parents have lost their chicks to poachers.

With their species numbers more than halved over the last forty years, it is vital for the survival of their kind that the Stump pair breeds successfully this season. Rick will do whatever it takes to make it happen. 'On a Wing and a Prayer' follows the incredible life cycle of this family of striking birds as they migrate to breeding grounds in the south-west of Western Australia.

Every milestone in their struggle to survive is documented through the engaging story of The Stump family. This is a story of love, loss and sheer endurance.

With special access granted to our film-makers and photographed in stunning HD, 'On a Wing and a Prayer' enters the extraordinary world of the Black Cockatoo, capturing a remarkable never filmed before journey of life and hope for one of Australia's most loved, but critically endangered birds.



Visiting the Gili islands

There are three Gili Islands off the west coast of Lombok, between Bali and Lombok. They are GiliTerawangan, Gili Meno and Gili Air. Ken and I first visited GiliTerawangan (Gili T) twenty seven years ago. At that time we took a speedboat from Sengigi in Lombok to Gili T. It was an unspoilt paradise with beautiful coral and we were the only tourists. There was no accommodation and only one little restaurant that cooked meals, one at a time on a little paraffin stove - a painfully slow process!

Two weeks ago great was our surprise to get off a regular ferry from Bali that landed at Gili T. The first thing we saw was a Commonwealth Bank ATM! There were hotels and restaurants everywhere! We were only on Gili T for twenty minutes before the hustle and bustle was too much and I booked a charter boat to neighbouring Gili Meno. Our arrival there showed us that nothing had changed on that island in ten years - it was quiet, the coral was beautiful and the Sasak people are lovely.

There are no cars or motorbikes on any of the islands. The only transport is by a horse-drawn cart called a Cidoma.

We spent a wonderful three days on Gili Meno, snorkelling, walking around the island, renewing old friendships with the islanders and generally lazing about. The views of Mount Rinjani, the volcano on mainland Lombok were spectacular. The only drawback was that at night there was nothing to do. The villagers all went to bed early and by 8.30 it was virtually 'lights out'!

Would we stay on Gili Meno again? Probably not. We would stay on busy, mad Gili T, enjoying the huge choice of restaurants and hotels. We would then take the inexpensive islanders' boat to Gili Meno every morning at 9am returning to Gili T at 3pm. This would give the best of both worlds – daytime idyllic paradise and night time sophistication. Ah the joys of life as a traveller!




Kimbo's 50


Once when Pauline and Bill (Pauline's husband, now deceased)

A New History Book for the Armadale Region is Launched

On Tuesday 13th September the Who's Who of history across the region gathered for the launch of: "Settlement to City - A History of the Armadale District and its People."

Respected historians and authors, Jennie and Bevan Carter have just completed the book based on anecdotes taken from oral histories. It is wonderfully written, bringing to life the events, people and stories which shaped our location.

Bevan Carter announced at the launch that most of the City's earliest settlers seemed to be horse thieves — with many doing long stints for this and other crimes! Starting with the area's original landowners and their relationship with local Indigenous people the history covers every period up to and including the devastating February bushfires.

One story they tell was the unfortunate tale of William Foster, who suffered a miserable fate while proprietor of Armadale's Narrogin Inn in the 1870s. In 1874, 64-year-old Foster was murdered by his cook, ex-convict John Gill. Furious about the standard of meat he had been given to cook with, Gill threatened

to quit his job and was told by his angry employer he would forfeit his wages if he did. After Gill failed to clean the kitchen that night after dinner, Foster followed him into the stables and was shot and died of his wounds. Sadly the Carters collected far more material than they were able to publish!

Lord Mayor Linton Reynolds in his opening speech said: 'This book follows the first history of the region, 'First Stage South', by Daphne Popham, in 1980 and really expands on its research and coverage of significant events and issues. Most importantly, Settlement to City is a really good read.'

It is on sale from the City's Administration Centre, the City's libraries at Armadale, Kelmscott and Seville Grove, Armadale Visitor Centre and History House Museum and retails at \$88 for a hard bound copy (limited numbers available) and \$55 for a soft bound.

BUSHFIRE FUEL AND FIRE INTENSITY

Fuel is the most common environmental factor which is manipulated to modify fire behavior.

Four variables of fuel contribute to fire behavior:

- 1: Type
- 2: Size and quantity
- 3: Arrangement and
- 4: Moisture.

This article focuses on fine fuel quantity that accumulates on the ground although the shrub layer also plays an important role.

During the life cycle of plants, they grow, and shed leaves, branches (twigs) and bark. This all accumulates on the forest floor. In an average jarrah forest it takes 25 years to reach 20 tonnes per hectare of litter, however it only takes 5 years to accumulate over 8 tonnes per hectare.

The general formula for determining fire intensity is:

I = HWR

I = Fire Intensity (measured in kilowatts per metre)

H = Height yield

W = weight of fuel consumed

R = Rate of Spread of fire

The weight of fuel also influences the rate of spread. So more fuel means a faster fire. For many years it was argued that a fire's rate of spread was directly proportional to fuel load, and it was argued that if you half the amount of fuel, this halves the rate of spread which in turn reduces the

intensity of a fire four-fold. However it now looks to have an even greater role.

If you have jarrah forest on your property, a general rule is to burn it every 5 years to maintain fuel litter loads between 5 - 8 tonnes per hectare. It ultimately depends on the quantity of tree canopy cover, because that's where the leaves and twigs come from.

This will help keep the rate of spread and intensity of a fire to a level where the fire can be more easily directly attacked and suppressed. Letting your fuel loads accumulate for longer than this is putting yourself, your family and your home at greater risk.

As for the minimum 20 metres surrounding your home (on sloped country the distance needs to be bigger), your objective should be to maintain fuel loads below 2 tonnes per hectare. This will help stop flames from touching your home and will provide you with more confidence this summer.

If you need help doing the burning, talk to the brigade.



A Most Remarkable Tale?

In 2009, Bobbie and I were caravanning around the North west of W.A. About 200 kms from Carnarvon, we camped at a free camp (Barradale) at which there were about 20 other caravans. I asked Bobbie to see if anyone wanted a camp fire as I had some wood. She came back with the message that there was a small group that wanted a fire.

As we approached the group, Bobbie said "This is my husband, Gerry Chapman...." and a woman said "Gerry - do you have a brother called Rodney?"

Some of you know that my family arrived, as refugees, in Fremantle in 1947. We had left India and my father, with his wife and 6 boys under the age of 10, had managed to bring 35 pounds. We were left stranded on the wharf when our sponsor refused to help.

Eventually, we were picked up by a man who took us to his home and in the next few days arranged for my brothers to be placed in an orphanage.

That left me and my young brother, my mother and my father and we were sheltering under a butcher shop awning when a man came by, saw our plight and took us to his home. We stayed there for 3 weeks.

The woman, Jill, at the campfire was the 5 year old daughter, I was 4 years old and here we were, 62 years later at the same camp.

I was astounded and asked how she could possibly recognise me and she explained that she couldn't understand why her father (a truck driver) would shelter us as they were not well off and that the only Gerry she had heard of was the toilet pot under the bed - what a silly name for a boy!

Perhaps even more amazing is the fact that in 2010, my wife broke her wrist when she fell on the bank of the Roper River, in Mataranka. We had to go to Katherine hospital and then, for various reasons, we went on to Kununurra Hospital. About 600 kms from Katherine and 400 kms from Kununurra, we pulled over for the night at a roadside stop - there was one other caravan there - Jill and her husband!



'Myths of Hypnosis'

Hi Everyone,

As you can see from last month's cover, Glenn and I enjoyed the most brilliant much belated honeymoon recently enjoying the warm European sun only to return to the winds and rain of the southern hemisphere winter but also to loads of your questions about hypnosis raised by last month's article written by the lovely June Copley.

In order to answer your questions, which were mainly around the myths surrounding hypnosis Linda suggested that it might be a good idea for me to answer the most commonly asked questions, so here goes! FALSE - Hypnosis is caused by the power of the hypnotist.

TRUTH – All hypnosis is self hypnosis. To be hypnotised a person has to allow the hypnosis to take place. The hypnotist is a trained professional who knows how to guide individuals into the hypnotic state.

FALSE - Only people with a weak mind can be hypnotised.

TRUTH – Anyone of average intelligence who wants to use hypnosis can experience hypnosis.

FALSE - People can be hypnotised to do things against their will.

TRUTH - Whilst hypnotised, an individual may be in an extremely relaxed state however, that person is still in full control. The subconscious will not allow an individual to do anything that is out of character or against their moral code. **MYTH - Hypnosis is just relaxation.** TRUTH – Whilst it is very nice to be in a relaxed state during hypnosis, hypnosis is not just relaxation. During hypnosis

individuals are able to undertake activities such as riding a stationary bike or running on a treadmill (Banyai & Hilgard 1978). **FALSE - people can remain permanently**

FALSE - people can remain permanently stuck in hypnosis.

TRUTH – people cannot remain stuck in hypnosis. If, for some reason the hypnotist left the room when you were in a trance eventually your own mind would do one of two things:

1. You would either realize the hypnotist was no longer talking to you, and you would open your eyes and be wide awake and feeling fine.

2. You would drift into a normal sleep for a few minutes and then wake up normally, feeling fine.

MYTH - When people are hypnotised they go to sleep or are unconscious.

TRUTH – Whilst it may appear to an observer as if the hypnotised person is asleep or unconscious, the hypnotised person is focused, alert and aware of their surroundings.

MYTH - When hypnotised, you are in a trance and have no control.

TRUTH - A person experiencing hypnosis will be able to stop a hypnosis session anytime they want to with or without the help of the hypnotist.

FALSE - The hypnotist has magical powers. TRUTH – the hypnotist is just an ordinary person who has studied techniques.

MYTH - People don't remember anything from the hypnosis session.

TRUTH – When you are hypnotised you will relax enough to keep your conscious mind from interfering with what you are trying to do with the subconscious mind. However, your conscious mind is still present and will allow you to remember.

FALSE-The hypnotised person will confess secrets and tell the truth.

TRUTH - During a hypnosis session the hypnotized person is still in full control of their mind. So therefore a person will not do or say anything they don't want to, such as telling secrets or confessing.

So in summary, you really are always in control whilst in a Hypnotic state and whilst there it is possible to overcome habits, addictions, fears and many more conditions. In fact the list of the conditions that hypnosis has been proven to alleviate if not completely release and heal are endless.

Roleystone Residents Receive \$64,000 in Bushfire Relief

The Roleystone Garden Group went to 'Clivea Classique' on Forrest Rd this week and the return journey saw us with a range of new cliveas: reds, orange and yellows. But the ones we left behind were also absolutely stunning.

We were hoping to go to Amanda's Garden in October, and then found they are only opening on the Saturday and Sunday so I am open to suggestions on where we will go next month. New members are always very welcome.


Today I found a new Bacopa. This trailing plant has pink, mauve and white flowers on it. Whether it is three plants in the one pot or what I don't really know but it looks very pretty. Also have you seen the new releases in Ivy geraniums? They are absolutely beautiful and totally drought hardy, as are all pelargoniums.

The Kelmscott show is fast approaching so collect a schedule and see which items you can enter. There are plenty of sections for the green-fingered amongst you and just in time for peak orchid blooming. Perhaps your roses are back flowering or you have poppies or irises or you might even consider entering your humble nasturtiums. The sections for vegetables ought to be very popular with all those gardening in raised beds.

I'm sure you are all enjoying the rain nearly as much as the weeds are. With the glorious weather we are having it is nice to get out weeding and the chooks appreciate all your efforts. It doesn't take long for the weeds to really get lush growth and if we leave them in the ground it takes away from your plants. Weeds can be composted or soaked in water and then this liquid makes a good liquid fertiliser and then left on the surface it will rot down and compost back into the soil. 

DEVELOPING A BUSHFIRE SURVIVAL PLAN



If you live in on or near bushland, you are at risk from a bushfire and developing a bushfire survival plan is critical.

Being prepared for a bushfire

can help save you and your family's lives, your property and your livelihood.

Are you and your family at risk? You need to think about the bushfire risk to your family and home:

- Do you live in or near bush?
- Does your local area have a bushfire history?
- Do you have trees and shrubs within 20 metres of your house?
- Is your house built on a slope?
- Is your bushfire survival plan more than one year old?

If you answered yes to one or more of these questions then being impacted by a bushfire is a real risk to you and your family. You need to have a bushfire survival plan and keep it updated.

When developing your plan decide together if you will leave for a safer place, which may be to relocate to family or friends, or stay to actively defend your home. Make sure you write everything down

Keep your bushfire survival plan in an easy to find place and make sure everyone knows where it is. At the October meeting of the Roleystone Organic Growers Chris Cairns from the Roleystone Volunteer Fire Brigade will be discussing how to develop a

bushfire survival plan and we will meet in small groups on the night to share ideas. Chris has a wealth of knowledge

and experience. She has been in the Roleystone Volunteer Fire Brigade as a fire-fighter for 16 years, Bushfire Ready educator, part of the emergency response groups and been involved with Juvenile and Family Fire Awareness Program (JAFFA).





Astronomical Highlights October

Time for us at the Observatory to come out of hibernation. Since early May we've had hardly any contact with normal people. Staff members just quietly worked away on a couple of projects, attended a conference, and took some time off. Now, back to reality! The new public viewing season begins with the spring school holidays.

As far as planets are concerned, the brightest ones - Venus and Jupiter - will both feature in the October viewing list. Jupiter's been around as a morning object since May, but now it's visible in evening skies. Venus has been out of sight behind the Sun since early July but will be in plain view by mid-month, if you have the luxury of a low horizon in the west (such as the view from the Darling Scarp at dusk).

The Moon's in waxing crescent phase at the beginning of October, with first quarter on the 4th, full moon on the 12th, last quarter on the morning of the 20th, and new moon on the 27th. So the month also ends with the Moon in waxing crescent phase, the evening crescent moon. The full moon on the 12th will make its appearance about 20 minutes after sunset (assuming a low eastern horizon). Rising in the twilight like this, it's a fine sight in binoculars: almost a 3-D effect.

In early October Jupiter's coming up in the ENE around 9pm, passing due north at about 2am, and standing out in the NW sky at daybreak. Mid-month, it rises as the evening twilight ends, passes due north at about 1am, and dominates the NW sky at dawn. By month's end it's pretty obvious low in the ENE at nightfall, culminates in the north around midnight, and is low in the WNW at daybreak. Opposition is on the 29th.

Venus lurks in the evening twilight until mid-month, when it begins to get out away from the glare of the Sun. Look in the direction of sunset, about 45 minutes or so after the Sun's gone from view. By late October, no doubt, the Observatory phones will be once again running hot with calls from people suddenly noticing Venus for the first time: "What's that really bright star in the west after the Sun goes down?". It's getting set for a good Star of Bethlehem impression this year.

Mercury will also come into view late in the month, low in the WSW at dusk. On the 28th, Mercury and Venus will form a triangle with the thin crescent Moon low down in the WSW in the evening twilight. This one's for the aficionados: go where you can see 'way low down to the western horizon at about 7:20pm, and watch as the daylight fades. It will be worth the effort.

Dear Friends

Hilary, my wife, hates heights! And that's a real pity because there's nothing I love more than mountaineering as it used to be – steep rock, not too many technical difficulties, natural protection (none of your steel pins, nuts and bolts etc) and oodles of exposure.

A thousand feet of fresh air under the soles of my boots spices up such a venture beautifully. Hilary loves mountains too but she much prefers her feet solidly grounded on a good path. On one occasion in the Julian Alps saw us negotiating a rock corner balanced on pegs driven into the rock face with 2000 feet of space between our feet and the valley floor. It's remarkable how often that one crops up in after dinner conversations!

So it was more than a little surprising to hear that whilst on a visit to our daughter in West Africa, Hilary had completed the Tree Top Walk in Cancun. It was similar in concept to the Tree Top Walk in Walpole but had a distinctly African flavour. Instead of steel walkways, wooden slats joined by ropes with single rope handrails were suspended 40-50 metres above the ground in the tree tops. Apparently they had the stability of a spinning plate on a stick and were easily provoked into ever increasing pendulum swings. The really amazing thing is that Hilary paid to go on this contraption! Sensing her unease, the guide advised her to stop as soon as she felt the walkway start to sway but the key instruction was to keep her eyes fixed firmly on the next staging platform at all times. He didn't say anything about not looking down – that was a given. His guidance emphasized the positive thing to do, avoiding references to the many things she should NOT do. And Hilary proudly succeeded – another popular after dinner topic!

A friend of ours has struggled with controlling her weight over the years. She recently told us that her most successful time was when she diligently recorded the amount of good food she was consuming rather than totting up the bad stuff she should avoid. Her eyes were set on hitting the right protein and fibre scores etc. and if she ate the right things to achieve those high scores there was no room left for junk. What we set our mind on determines how we develop physically. It applies equally well to our emotional and spiritual development. We get out whatever we put in. There used to be a saying in computer circles - "garbage in, garbage out." If you feed the machine faulty instructions, you are bound to get nonsense out.

All this adds up to keeping our eyes firmly fixed on good things and measuring ourselves against admirable yardsticks. It's so much better than immersing ourselves in negative rules and regulations - don't do this or don't do that - and wallowing in the low life which dominates much of our society. The Bible talks about setting the right goals in life quite a bit and in his letter to the church at Philippi, Paul says, "Whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable - if anything is excellent or praiseworthy - think about such things...and the God of peace will be with you." May we be encouraged by that thought and may the God of peace be with us all...even if we do find our feet poised in scary places!



Wild Gossip: **Spring Means Ducklings!**

Duckling season is here and I have never seen so many ducklings in care or received so many phone enquiries about ducklings.

Most enquiries are for advice about abandoned or orphaned ducklings but sometimes enquiries are regarding parent ducks and ducklings in a dangerous or inconvenient place – in these situations, often the best thing to do is to make the area as safe as possible (secure dogs and cats, alert traffic, etc) and leave the family to move on. Attempting to catch and move the family will usually result in some or all of the ducklings being abandoned. If you rescue abandoned or orphaned ducklings your first decision must be whether you pass them to your local wildlife carer or raise them yourself. Single ducklings seldom survive so in this case it is important to contact your local wildlife carer. To raise ducklings you must provide: secure housing, warmth, food, water and cleanliness.

Housing can be as simple as a long, high sided box with newspaper, towels or similar at the bottom (avoid frayed cloth that the ducklings could get tangled in). Warmth can be provided by deploying a heat lamp at one end of the box, thus allowing the ducklings to move in and out of the warm area or with a heat pad - temperature must be monitored at all times to prevent cooking or freezing the ducklings (I find around 32C to be the most successful).

Food should include chick starter crumbs in a small, non tip container and a separate container of any or all of the following: finely chopped lettuce, grass, parsley or snails.

Water must be provided at all times but only in small quantities. Ducklings instinctively jump into water but without mum to provide warmth and essential feather oils they will quickly become cold and wet - they are also likely to sink. Small water dishes or duckling water containers are required.

Cleaning is essential as ducklings can be very messy and bedding must be changed frequently.

After a few weeks the downy duckling feathers will start to be replaced by adult feathers and the ducklings can spend time outside in a secure cage on sunny days. Water can be provided in larger containers for playing and bathing.

A few weeks later the ducklings can be moved to an aviary or safe enclosure with a pond for them to practice swimming and diving skills whilst a suitable release site is found.


