Retracing Stalian Origins

The northern Italian border town of Tirano, only 3 kms from the Swiss border and the surrounding province of Sondrio in the Valtellina Valley, is the ancestral home to many of our region's Italian families.

Recently Albert Della Franca and his wife Desiree hosted Sue and Gary Kemp, first time visitors to Europe; welcoming them to the Della Franca's 'old home town'. The group were able to experience the true Italy; far from the tourist centres and in Albert's words: 'about as isolated in Italy as you can get'.

This amazingly beautiful location perched high in the Alps may be 'picture post card perfect' today but life there earlier this century, was a very difficult existence. Thus when Albert Della Franca's grandfather, grandmother and three children made the hard decision to immigrate to Australia they were the last ones to do so in their family.

The Della Franca family followed in the footsteps of many others from the area, in moving to Australia. Many chose specifically to join relatives in the fruit growing areas in the Perth hills.

Albert's grandfather Giuseppe made the journey in 1948 as a non English speaking immigrant. Post war opportunities in Italy were extremely limited, the economy was in dire straits and the chance of a new life in a non war torn land was very tempting. He worked hard over the next few years to get the funds to bring out his family; wife Caterina, young sons Frank and Lui and daughter Ann followed in 1950. Giuseppe was soon able to purchase and farm a property in Karragullen adjacent to Illawarra (now owned by the Engels), his sons later moving to land on Irymple Road and on Brookton Highway. These properties are both still in the family.

Albert reflected on the many families who had followed this route to Australia.

Walking through the cemetery of the small town is reminiscent of the 'who's who' of Karragullen and the hills fruit growing region with names adorning headstones like: Agostinelli, Armanasco, Bombardieri, Del Dot, Della Franca, De Piazzi, Del Simone, Della Vedova, Giumelli, Marchetti, Natta, Omodei, Rainoldi and Salla Tenna - all have some history in our

Almost everyone in Albert's home mountain village of Baruffini has relatives in Australia! Albert even confirmed that the Comettis were from this village (Dennis Cometti's Grandfather comes from a house close to Albert's family house.)

Today Tirano has recovered from the ravages of war that influenced many families to emigrate. There are many industrial areas close by and the people are generally well off. The group were amazed at how the local people were fiercely proud of preserving their local culture and traditions. Rejecting many of the negative influences of the outside world.

Food and wine is celebrated; simple traditional meals with the focus on freshness and local availability were the staple at the local restaurant in Albert's village. Sciatt and Pizzoccheri, made from the locally grown saraceno flour (buckwheat) and the many dishes containing local Porcini mushrooms were among the group's favourites. These were dutifully washed down with a Sassella or an Inferno (the two main varieties of red wine grown on the terraced mountain slopes below the village).

Albert and his family now 'go back' most years and he reflects: 'Karragullen is certainly my home now but I am rediscovering my roots and celebrating where I came from.'

Corinne & Doug Celebrate 40 Years


Local residents, Corinne and Doug Boardman (left) celebrated 40 years of marriage on the 27th of this month.







Grant is excited about the challenge ahead of him. He believes that Armadale City is at a very interesting time, with a range of development projects and great challenges but also some real opportunities. Grant sees his role as both working for the City as a whole but also providing an advocacy role for people and issues in his own ward of Jarrah. He intends to look towards improving things for the whole region so that everyone benefits rather than favouring


aspects that suit one lobby group or locality.

'I plan to meet regularly with our other Jarrah Ward Councillor, Caroline Wielinga, to ensure that we are working together on issues. Grant is also keenly interested in bushfire management and hopes to join the Bushfire Advisory Committee, His other roles to date include membership of the Technical Services Committee that is responsible for roads, footpaths, parks, reserves, the construction and maintenance of Council buildings and the collection and disposal of waste, including recycling and Community Services that deals with all recreation, aquatic, library, cultural and community development issues such as finance, rates and ranger services.





Editorial

Following Grant Nixon's recent success as the newly elected Councillor for Jarrah Ward he came over for a chat about a few things. He asked what 'I would like from my local councillor'.

Wow. Firstly, it's great to be asked! So this gave me a wonderful opportunity to outline a







few things I would like, based on my own observations but also on my experience as an editor where I have had the priviledge of receiving many 'letters to the editor' over the years.

My first and instantaneous response was to ensure that 'the things Hills people value' are not subsumed; our love of the natural environment, our valuing of our history and our strong sense of community, make our area quite special.

Sometimes these values do not seem to align with some of the aspects driving progress in the City of Armadale.

Grant's response, that he saw ensuring that our location was well served actually leads to improvement in The City as a whole, was a refreshing look at this dichotomy.

Of equal importance to me was to ensure the safety of our homes (and more importantly our lives) in the face of the threat of bushfires. The City and other fire protection agencies, have already made some wise decisions in this regard and I ony hope that this spirit and the proactive actions continue into the future. Grant and Caroline are both very supportive of this one!

This point is linked to the impact on our local environment (the bush and our waterways) and our major industries (the orchards) on our ever drying and warming climate. This threat requires brave decisions and perhaps some protections to ensure our survival into the future.

Our current Councillors are both certainly well aware of this.

With respect to local government spending across our area, I appreciate this aspect is problematic. Always local government faces a multitude of needs and limited resources. Some services are provided and there is always a demand for 'a lot more'.

I have lived here prior to footpaths, street lights, roundabouts and sporting facilites and although I appreciate these, I understand that they are expensive to

provide and maintain - especially in the

Our councillors have always weighed up the range of wants and the limited funds available and have made wise decisions about where these funds should be spent equitably not equally.

More important to me are the decisions about 'zonings'. Commonsense, forethougth and fairness underlying decisions about zoning for 'seniors accommodation' or 'recreation' and particulary for reserves and public open space, are of major interest to

I have seen how a determination about whether land is subdivisible can destroy lives; I can also see that 'indiscriminate approvals' can forever alter the ambience of our region. To me this is a vitally important role of our council.

One aspect I discussed with Grant is the need for fairness and tranparency. We can all have opinions about laws, rules and bylaws but once they are in place they should be aligned to and enforced equally. Too often we see some fragrant abuses of city regulations and this is irritating to all who are abiding with the regulations.

So lastly what I thought was important was the need to communicate ie listen and let us know what is going on. It is important that residents know that a decision has been made and why it was made. Publication of Councillor's items is seen as an important aspect of publishing a community magazine.

SHOULD WE KEEP THE PRIMARY SCHOOL OVAL?

I fully support the Primary School site being used for Seniors Accommodation and also would want to preserve the bushland which borders Robin and Jarrah Roads. However I'm at a loss to understand how the notion has arisen that the Primary School Oval should be preserved because it has been used for 'small community events'. Yes, the school Sports Day and School Fair have been held on the oval but these events

If residents of fire prone areas in the City of Armadale do the right thing and clear their blocks of greenwaste, they have two options of disposal.

They can load it on one or more 6x4 trailers, take it to a tip, using one tip voucher per visit, or place it on the verge for FREE council pick-up.

However, if they were to load it on an 8x5 trailer (minimising the number of trips and vouchers) and took it to the Hopkinson Rd site (not having weekends available for this chore) they would find that vouchers would not be accepted at all and they would have to pay by weight, with a minimum charge of \$32.

If they took the same load to the

Springdale site, the gate person may judge it to be worth 2 vouchers, or (as there is no weighbridge) charge \$49.

One would think that if the City of Armadale was serious in wanting to promote bushfire readiness, Council would not impose petty restrictions and additional costs, rather they would assist residents in bushfire zones by making greenwaste disposal free of any charge (including vouchers), at least during spring and summer. Doing away with the use by date on vouchers would also assist residents in their efforts to be bushfire ready.

At the beginning of 1976 the school was reclassified as a Class 1 school and building began on the first cluster.

On the 7th March 1978 the new Library Resource Building had been handed over to the school. On the 2nd of July 1978 classes in the intermediate section of the school began occupying the new cluster building.

In August 1978 the 75th Anniversary of the school was celebrated with a pioneer dress up day, special guests, a celebration cake and two time capsules set down. One capsule was filled with school memorabilia and the other was a community capsule. Mr Scott reported that each capsule was sealed with araldite glue. He claimed it was air/water proof to the best of their ability. It is a pity that no-one seems to be able to find the capsules today! Roleystone Expo Day was held on the 9th of August 1979 in honour of the 150th celebrations of WA. The day included:

A re-enactment of Robert Dale's crossing of the Darling Range, musical items from each class, sheep shearing using hand clippers and spinning and weaving of the fleece.

Anne Johnson remembers back to her time involved in Pre Primary education.

'In 1977 Pre School Education was assumed by the Education Department and the Primary had two preschool classes both off site. I was the teacher at one with Pauline Peacock as the aide and this is now the Seniors Centre. There was also a transportable building where the Volunteers Fire Brigade is now located, with Wendy Devlin as the Teacher and Sylvia Dawson as the Aide.'

'By 1980 Roleystone Primary was trialing a separate 'Early Childhood Unit' school. So the Primary School was split into two; an Early Childhood unit of P-3 and the Primary School (yrs 4-7).

On the 26th September 1980 Principal Horton described a meeting held at the school to discuss a proposed Roleystone High School.

The 15th December 1982 saw

the Kindy to Year 2 children once again became part of the Primary School while the Year 6 & 7 children became the first children in the new Roleystone District High School, on the grounds of the Primary School in temporary demountable classrooms.

On the 7th April 1983 children from Roleystone Primary School participated in a Children's Performance for Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales at the Commonwealth Hockey Stadium. The Year 3 & 4 children performed the 'Health Hustle'.

On the 26th August 1983 a special assembly was held at the school to mark the end of term. The District High School children were expected to move into the new school at the beginning of term 3.

Disaster struck the school in September 1986 when the first cluster building was gutted by fire. Fire units from Armadale, Maddington, Belmont and Perth attended the blaze, which was discovered at 7pm on Saturday. The Principal requested that parents keep Year 1 & 2 children home until Wednesday until provision could be made for them. Temporary accommodation was provided until the new building was ready to move into in October 1987.



Better Than

Recently we had to make the very tough decision to remove our giant 20m Black Wattle tree (Acacia mearnsii) that would be familiar to most Roleystone residents who pass by the corner of Peet & Mackie

This big old tree had outlived the normal short lifespan of black wattles, and has stood in our front yard much longer than our own mere 7 years in Roleystone.

It provided gentle shade for our house in summer and has been home to numerous birds, skinks and possums over the years. It also gave us a brief but glorious cheerful yellow puffball bloom every winter. This tree was certainly the largest of its kind I have

But sadly we had to call an end to its time as a huge adornment to our front garden. Termites were living around the base of the tree, and it was leaning ponderously over our power line connection to the street.


Two weekends ago in strong winds we had a medium-sized Silver Wattle keel over elsewhere on our property. If our giant black wattle was to fall as well – as it inevitably would – it would have snapped our power line, possibly done damage to the house and car (and us!), and would have completely flattened our front garden. It had already split at the base 5 years ago, and it was dropping a limb or two every now and then to remind us of its age and brittleness. It was finally time to say goodbye to our "Old Man Wattle".

So we made the decision and contacted Jean-Michel of JMC tree services, who came along on the first day of school holidays to put our dying giant to sleep for a reasonable price. The local JMC boys worked very hard for 4 hours, and the grinder and chainsaws were buzzing. They did a great job and the remains of our enormous old tree will now be stacked and dried for firewood, and the big pile of mulch will be composted

and will go onto our garden to minimise water loss in our soil.

So now we are left with a giant empty space in our front yard that is aching to be filled by another less invasive, longer-lived shade tree. We are going to miss our great big shady Old Man Wattle, but in this case when such a large tree had no future except to fall, that old wise saying applies: prevention is better than cure.





REMEMBRANCE DAY AT THE GROVE OF THE UNFORGOTTEN

The Grove of the Unforgotten,' otherwise known as 'The Lyre of Remembrance.' graces a hillside at Araluen, the Young Australia League's resort at Roleystone. This beautiful conception was intended as a memorial to members of the League who fell in the Great War.

Western Mail 21st April 1934

The first Armistice Day Ceremony (now renamed Remembrance Day) was held at the site on the 11 November 1934.

In 1996 after many years of lack of maintenance, the Armadale Rotary Club and the Araluen Botanic Park Foundation restored the grove after thirty years of neglect.

Since Remembrance Day that year Araluen Park has hosted a service each year at this hauntingly beautiful location. This year's service, some three quarters of a century after the first one was held, is still being used to remember these fallen soldiers and the many others in more recent conflicts who have died overseas.

This year, at 1.30pm on the 11/11/11, locals are invited to attend this graceful and moving ceremony at the Grove for the Unforgotten in Araluen Botanic Park. The service will be officiated by the local RevLesley Borowitzka, choir will be Karen West and the Roleystone Primary School, while a special solo will be performed by Mal Young.



How many of you have your weeds under control and have cleared the long grass in your yard? There is no way we ever need another bushfire



NEXT FIELD DAY







WATSONIA ERADICATION

Two oil paintings from the brush of a former student illustrate the story of how the Stony Brook Valley appeared when I first came to live at Roleystone in the late 1980s. When Studio Gen-ius began operations in the early 1990s, students enjoyed ambling down the winding path to the brook to capture the peaceful images on canvas. Since those early days a devastating flood and two bushfires have significantly altered the terrain. Stony Brook was, at that time, a slow-moving, tranquil water-course. Several water-falls could be glimpsed from a high vantage point on my property. After the February1992 flood this peaceful flow of water became a raging torrent. Three or four metres of earth and rocks were swept away to expose bedrock level and dumped near the Contour Channel pipeline. Branches and other objects were seen in the trees about six metres overhead.

The flood brought unwanted vegetation and the aftermath from the two bushfires fertilised much of this nonindigenous growth, including the watsonias.

As much as the attractive cyclamen coloured blooms enliven the valley, they are, in other respects, an unwanted pest. With a great deal of help, the watsonias are (more or less) managed on my property by annual digging. However, they are rife elsewhere.

In this regard, accolades must be given to the Contour Road, Bushfire Ready Action Group which has successfully obtained a grant to purchase the necessary



equipment to help eradicate the overwhelming growth of the South African bulbs. To date a few Contour Road residents have responded to this generous assistance which has resulted from the efforts of the BRAG coordinator.

Bush fire season preparations

Cr Caroline Wielinga would like to remind all Roleystone residents of the need to properly prepare their homes and properties for the upcoming bushfire season.

Burning off:

Burning off is believed to be one of the best ways to reduce fuel load in natural bushland.

The City of Armadale has made the process of applying for

permits easier.

Greenwaste:

As part of the aim to reduce fuel load, the City of Armadale will be conducting an additional greenwaste collection in November. This is partly to remind residents to collect up the excess leaves, twigs and weeds and to prune lower branches and overhanging branches as well as to help them remove it from their property.

Firebreaks:

Firebreaks are not expected on lots less than 5000m2 (1 ¼ acres), but fuel loads must be kept at minimum by raking/slashing/mowing/burning. Firebreaks are required on larger lots but should not be installed on verges.

Landscaping:

Some garden planning/landscaping can help improve the safety of homes. Things like watered gardens (fruit/vegetables/grass) or nonflammable – low flammable gardens/spaces (paving/gravel mulch/low ground covers) abutting the home are safer than big bushy native shrubs which are not recommended and should be located further away.

Safer homes:

The Council is encouraging residents to consider retrospectively improving the bushfire safety of their homes by using ember screens on their air conditioners, metal wire fly screens on their windows and closing in their eaves and any other gaps in their roofs/walls/floors to reduce ember attack in the event of a fire.

Astronomical Highlights November

From the biased viewpoint of a guy who has to entertain visitors at the Observatory on November evenings, there's usually a shortage of bright(ish) interesting targets.

The Southern Cross has gone out of sight and Orion isn't quite up to where you can see it well at nightfall. The Milky Way's sinking into the city glow. Luckily, this November is different from most: Venus and Mercury will be paired in the western sky at dusk for more than half of the month as they travel together through Scorpius. At the same time, on the opposite side of the sky is Jupiter which makes a fine telescopic target.

On the 10th, Venus and Mercury will make a neat line with the star Antares (Alpha Scorpii, the brightest star in Scorpius). Watching how the two planets move day by day in relation to Antares, you'll see why planets are so named: the word means wanderers. Stars keep the same formations, year after year. Planets don't – they shift about. Brilliant Venus will steadily set later and later, going from a setting time of about 8:10pm on the 1st to about 8:45pm on the 15th and 9:05pm on the 30th. Mercury will seem to faithfully keep pace with Venus until tiring of the chase around the 18th - 19th. Then it will begin to drop away, to be lost in the Sun's glare in the last few days of the month. In the north-eastern sky meanwhile, bright Jupiter will steadily gain altitude as the weeks pass. As seen at dusk, it begins the month fairly low in the ENE; then it works its way higher and more to the west so that by late November it's high in the NNE by the end of evening twilight.

Mars is visible in the NE sky at daybreak and it's gradually brightening, but it doesn't hold a candle to Venus and Jupiter. Jupiter can still be seen in the western sky at dawn Greg Lowe

until about the 13th, by which time it's setting at the onset of morning twilight. By the end of the month Saturn will be visible low in the east at daybreak.

The major phases of the Moon are: first quarter on the evening of the 2nd, full moon on the night of the 10th – 11th, last quarter on the morning of the 19th, and new moon on the 25th. Watch for the sight of Venus near the thin crescent moon at dusk on the 27th.

We have just returned from our son Richard's wedding to Kezia Koka in Tanzania. It was a really special occasion for us made more so as the Lutheran Church in Arusha allowed me to conduct the marriage ceremony. For legal reasons, the local Pastor had to sign the marriage certificate but I could do everything else. And it was the pinnacle of a wonderful celebration as several cultures were welded together in a day long series of events.

It started with the formal separation of Kezia from her own family and acceptance into ours, through a conventional but moving Christian marriage service - hymns sung in Swahili - to a reception incorporating cake cutting, champagne toasts, Scottish country dancing, the giving of presents and traditional Chagga tribal song and dance - which we all joined in!

The lady guests had outfits made locally out of several different patterns but all colour themed in burgundy and gold - it was visually stunning. The men wore lounge suits with burgundy ties...except me! The Lutheran Pastor insisted that I had to wear a clerical collar and robes during the church service. "They won't know you are a real Church minister if you don't look like one," was his plea.

It's not the custom at the Community Church here for the minister to look much different from anybody else - part of our expression of "every member ministry". But in other churches, ordination, which confirms a calling to God's work in a pastoral

capacity, is often signified by the outward symbol of a clerical collar at least.

Who we are, how we think, what we believe - our real personality and character - cannot be concealed from God. He sees right through any superficial screen we might erect. And one day we will all have to face Him. Even a dog collar won't be of much use then!







Wild Gossip: Abandoned Baby Birds.

Spring is such a lovely season with beautiful flowers, blossoms and fragrances to enjoy, baby birds can be

heard in the trees and seen on the ground feeding with the parent birds. It is also a time when I receive numerous enquiries about baby birds.

Here are a few ideas and suggestions of what to do if you see a baby bird on the ground:

If the baby bird is feathered it is likely to be on the ground during a flying lesson or whilst being shown where to find food by the parent birds. Please leave it alone and observe from a distance to be sure that the parents are in attendance.

If the baby bird is in danger from predators it can be gently picked up and placed on a nearby tree branch or similar - parent birds will usually return and attend to it.

If the bird is unfeathered and no nest can be seen you will need to make an artificial nest, secure it to a nearby branch and place the baby bird inside. The baby bird will then need to be observed from a distance to see if the parent birds continue to care for it.

Abandoned or injured birds will need to

be gently picked up, placed in a secure box (small enough to prevent flying attempts and wing damage) with padding beneath and kept in a warm, dark, quiet place until a wildlife carer can be contacted.

Never attempt to feed orphaned, injured or abandoned birds without the advice of a wildlife carer as incorrect food will kill. Forget 'old ideas' such as bread & milk, brandy & water etc. as these definitely will kill. Keep handling to a minimum as stress is also a killer.

Sometimes a young bird can be caught outside the normal time frame eg a magpie unable to return to the nest before dusk or an owl unable to return before dawn.

If left the young bird will be in danger so should be gently picked up using a towel for protection from beak & claws, placed in a secure box, kept in a warm, quiet, dark place until a more suitable time (morning for a day bird, evening for a night bird) when it can be placed back at the original location.






