Arnold is the youngest son of Roland and Mary Gwynne.

This wedding in the Old Church is intertwined with some significant church and local history. Roland's father was David Gwynne, a very early resident of this area and a stalwart of the church community. Roland's mother was Sybil Gwynne (nee Buckingham) and was a decedent of the first family to farm in the Roleystone area. They met and married in this church.

Roland married Mary (nee Bullen) in the old church over thirty years ago. This was the last wedding to be held in the church. Mary has unearthed a photo of the newlyweds being congratulated by Martha Wesley – Martha's was the first wedding ever to be held in the new congregational church. (Martha was the daughter of a sandalwood cutter who arrived in the area in the late 1800's. Martha lived in Roleystone all of her married life.)

So it was felt fitting that Arnold and Coralie Gwynne were perfectly suited to be the first couple to be wed in the new century of this wonderful old building.

# JOHN CHRISTMASS WINS AN ORDER OF AUSTRALIA

On Australia Day 2012, John Graham Christmass, was awarded an Order of Australia medal for: 'Service to Music Education in Western Australia and to Choral Performance'. John is well known across the district for his dedication to bringing great musical experiences to the people across our town.

John was contacted about the award and responded with the following comment: 'I feel humble and honoured to receive this award and know that the support of my parents, wife, daughters and friends has been integral to any successful activities.'

I first remember 'Mr Christmass' as an adjudicator at Eisteddfods in the 1960's, when he was a Senior Master of Music at Churchlands SHS and later at Perth Modern School. His musical knowledge and passion was evident to me then as a young primary school student.

His career since that time has been entwined with music: John established The New I Voci Singers, in 1978 and has been the Musical Director, of this group over this time. A range of locals have been members of this group and many more have been treated to their wonderful performances. John took I Voci to Germany three times. Roleystone Courier readers have also been encouraged to attend the Best of British concerts over many years– John has given 48 concerts at the Perth Concert Hall!

John Chistmass' influence has been far wider than our local area. He has been the Production Manager, of the New Year's Eve Vienna Pops Concert, Rotary Club of Perth, for 23 years. He founded the WA Choral Society.


John has been Choral Director/Musical Director many times including at the Perth Esplanade Anzac Day Service, Returned and Services League of Australia, for nearly 50 years. He has been the coordinator of the Schools Choral Festival, held at



Winthrop Hall, for a number of years and was a Former Musical Director of the Gilbert and Sullivan Society of Western Australia. He has a vast range of other musical accomplishments- too many to mention.

John Christmass is also multi dimensional with a passion for community. He has been important in the Kelmscott District Residents' Group and is a frequent author of letters in local media. He was appointed as WA's Seniors Ambassador for 2011.

In 1983 John Chirstmass was given the high honour of being made WA Citizen of the Year Award (in the Arts and Entertainment Category). In 2001 John Chrismass was awarded the Centenary Medal, and he is a Paul Harris Fellow, Rotary Club of Perth. He has now added an Order of Australia to his list of achievements. - Subject awards in Chemistry, English and Economics Plus and ECU Excellence Award


She is both really surprised and very happy with her results. Originally Kimberly was planning on studying commerce and law, but after studying chemistry and physics she found a 'real passion'.


# Gary Smith Wins Citizen of The Year



So if anyone knows who these young people are, please let the authorities know as their misbehaviour cannot be allowed to continue.

As we enter February, every hills resident turns their minds to the ever present summer threat of bushfires. Last year's horrific fires are a constant reminder to householders to 'be prepared'.

Late summer rains and a cool start to summer are now a distant memory. This last week of soaring temperatures has created the tinder box conditions that can allow our bush to erupt.

A story on page 31 from Rohan Carboon, alerts us to basing our prevention strategies on research and evidence rather than on opinion. This seems very wise to me. I also welcome the review on 'burning off rules' to be introduced this year by the City of Armadale to allow householders to better control their property's fuel loads (See Cr Grant Nixon's report on page 41.)

For too long those of us on smaller blocks within our area have been hamstrung with regard to bushfire prevention during the winter months because of unwieldy restrictions. It is great to see those in authority being proactive.

Another revelation in this edition is in Helen Morton's article on page 39 announcing that new homes will soon have underground power connections. This is welcome news in an area where there is constant threat of fires sparked by faulty overhead power lines and the ever present 'power failures' caused by tree damage. Plus many households will welcome the cost saving of not having to cut back garden and trees overhanging the connection lines. Of course it would be great if all of our power went undergound but I fear that the cost of laying undergound power across the hills could be prohibitive!

So enjoy the February 2012 edition. I had a wonderful time putting it together.

#### On Monday morning, January 16<sup>th</sup>, Milly was hit by a car.

Milly is my 9 months old puppy that I brought from the shelter only 3 months ago.

I was working in Genesis's garden. Milly was with me all morning. And then she was not.

The next thing I know is that I heard a loud knock, then an even louder scream and an accelerating noise of a car hurrying away from theinjured dog on Croyden Road.

I was there within 5 seconds. She was lying unconscious on the road. If I had not arrived there so quickly another car would have run her over.

I know it is my fault letting her run free so close to Croyden Road. I have been blaming myself since. BUT – I am angry. I am very angry at the driver who just left a living creature on the road without even stopping to check if she was alive or dead. Most dogs have a collar with their name and contact number (which Milly has got too), but the driver did not try this either.

Milly was in hospital for 5 days suffering multiple fractures. She has a very long way to recover.

To the driver I want to say: I hope that you will never have to suffer the pain, sadness and helplessness, watching

### PARENTS -DO YOU KNOW WHERE YOUR TEENAGERS ARE?

Over January a wide range of malicious and dangerous acts of vandalism have occurred across central Roleystone.

On a recent evening, night fill staff at IGA were unable to leave the building as two juveniles were hurling tiles down from the roof. These young people also managed do inflict extensive damage across the shopping centre. This has proved very expensive to shop owners and inconvenient to patrons.

The owners wish to let the perpetrators and their parents know that they intend to follow this up exhaustively and their preference is that these young people are found and made to pay for their actions.

#### The two juveniles involved in the tile throwing incident were described as between 14 - 17 years of age one blonde and one with darker curly hair. They were riding on a 50cc peewee motor bike. (NB More recently five individuals were observed: 3 male & 2 female).

**A SPATE OF VANDALISM** 

All incidents have been reported fully to police and Armadale police have indicated that they will be having an increased police presence in the area.

And a word to anyone who knows who the perpetrators are:

'Your community is being damaged by a few individuals. The last thing we want is vigilante squads. Parents please be responsible for the actions of your children.'

### SENSELESS DESTRUCTION ON THE BOWLING GREENS

#### Recently the spate of senseless vandalism that has hit out town has also harmed The Roleystone Country Club and our Bowling Greens.

We were told that on Sunday evening the police were called to move on some young people behaving in an undesirable manner from either the skate park or the oval which they did. It appears they came down to the Country Club and climbed onto our verandah and threw two glass topped tables over the side breaking them. They also smashed drink bottles and tried to make a Molotov cocktail from a plastic bottle of Turpentine. The turps didn't ignite but approximately 2 square metres of grass on the green was killed by the chemical.

We cleaned up the glass and mess on Monday morning. We had a meeting at the club on Monday night which went on till 9.00pm. We found the next day that someone had returned after our meeting and more damage was done, markers and corner flags were broken and scattered on the greens.

Then a week later on Monday night they struck again. This time only a glass topped table thrown from the verandah and a tin of cat food spread around!!

Before Christmas we have had flower heads torn off and left strewn about and the Australian flag was stolen.

Everything and each occasion has been reported to the police, it would seem that a better police presence is needed urgently in Roleystone to stop this and the burnt kids play area from re-happening.

### A RESPONSE FROM THE ARMADALE POLICE

Hopefully the letters on this page may encourage witnesses to come forward or contact police to assist us with our enquiries. Readers are reminded that the contact numbers are: 131444 for information or alternatively Crime Stoppers on 1300 888 000.

In a small community these type of offences are generally committed by locals or friends and relatives staying with locals, especially over the school holiday period. Normally someone will know who the offenders are; it is just a question of whether they will speak up – even if it is anonymously.

The question for the 'silent residents' is: are you happy for these few offenders to alter your lifestyle? If you are not, then at the very least you need to pass on information that you know to police so they can assist you maintain your chosen lifestyle and disrupt / intervene these offenders.

We have increased patrols in the area, however police cannot be on every street 24/7 and we rely on residents to communicate their concerns and observations. The Neighbourhood Watch aims are very relevant in communities like Roleystone where residents combined in purpose can also deter offenders often as much as police patrols.

Tiffany was vibrant and quirky and her earthly journey ended suddenly on Tuesday the 27th December, 2011 – leaving everyone who knew her in shock and grief. Her departure is hard to comprehend – she has left this world too soon, with so many things left unsaid....things not yet achieved or completed. There was so much she was looking forward to..... new and exciting things in her future. Tragically, it now feels as though her 'book' has been closed several chapters too early.....we look for rhyme or reason but sometimes.....life just isn't fair.



started Roleystone Wildlife Hospital, although she had been caring for wildlife for 6 – 7 years prior to this. Pam worked from home, making cakes to sell at the

shopping centre, attending fairs, giving educational talks; anything that was needed to raise money to feed the wildlife in her care.

Things improved when 'Protection of the Earth & Wildlife' sponsored Roleystone Wildlife Hospital and Pam received some much needed funding.

She had a transportable building placed in her garden to create some extra space for the wildlife in her care. This transportable building became known as 'The Cabin'. Things grew rapidly and Pam had many home carers helping her which involved her dashing all over the place to keep track of everything.

It became obvious that more space was needed to provide flight aviaries, pre-release roo pens, duck ponds and other



structures but Pam's search for a larger property was difficult. The owner of Cohunu Wildlife Park (then situated on Mills Rd East) then offered her an area to use.

'The Cabin' and 2 aviaries were moved to the property and power connected to enable hot boxes to be used. There was no water or telephone. 'The Cabin' was very cramped with hot boxes, a fridge, a bench and a sink (without water) and of course lots of people.

Three volunteers started working with Pam, carrying in bottles of water to make the joey's milk and fill water dishes. (As cars were parked a distance from the hospital this limited how much water could be carried.) Dishes and bottles were washed in a creek and any other washing was taken home. Joeys were kept at the trout farm at the other side of the park and toilet facilities were at the opposite end of the park so we all did a lot of walking.

Pam's husband worked weekends on construction and her nephews worked most days throughout the summer laying paving slabs and building large aviaries. Eventually the water and a telephone were connected; there were

workable buildings, lots more volunteers and 'The Cabin' became a place for a sit down and a cuppa. One volunteer, Ken, was a retired man who came in almost daily to handle construction, fencing and all sorts of work and he quickly became 'Mr Fix It'.

Pam committed 24/7 to wildlife and was also active in fundraising, education and training and worked at Cohunu 2 days per week to help pay the Hospital bills. Pam thought that volunteers were precious and should always be treated that way. She held Christmas parties, gave presents, put on lunches and held training sessions. Everything, including the daily shifts, were FUN and a pleasure to attend. Pam was named Citizen of the Year for her work with wildlife. Sadly in 2004 Pam decided that she had 'had enough' and handed the role of Hospital Coordinator on, though she did stay on for 6 months in an advisory capacity. She is still happy today to help carers with wildlife advice. There was a name change from Roleystone Wildlife Hospital to the Darling Range Wildlife Shelter and a relocation 'down the hill', but 'The Cabin' remains in use. Well done Pam!!!

#### Jodi Works Through Adversity

Bedfordale is home to a truly inspiring person; Jodi Bassett is a young person who has achieved as an artist and writer while suffering with a debilitating condition known as Myalgic Encephalomyelitis (ME).

Jodi's illness has made life a real challenge. Despite suffering from this debilitating condition since 1995 at the age of 19, Jodi is able to spend time at a keyboard while lying down and has used this time to run an on-line world newsletter and website on Myalgic Encephalomyelitis. She has now completed a book on this subject entitled 'Caring for the M.E. Patient'.

The book outlines her story and how thousands of patients across Australia and the world undergo enormous suffering with M.E. Jodi describes how people's lives can be made worse by medical misdiagnosis which can leave them with suffering and a feeling of desperation. M.E. carries with it a social stigma and medical ignorance as despite patients suffering from a range of abnormalities which may be tested for, and the disease sometimes being fatal, they may be accused of suffering from an 'imaginary illness' as M.E. is often *incorrectly* said to be the same thing as 'Chronic Fatigue Syndrome.'

M.E. is an acute onset neurological disease which is similar to MS and polio and which occurs in epidemic and sporadic forms. Some of the symptoms that Jodi has include: disturbed sleep, headaches, cardiac problems (including POTS), neurological and cognitive dysfunctions, problems being upright and painful muscles and joints.

In her book Jodi reveals her own battles with the medical profession and how mistreatment has left her bedbound for the last decade. All of her writing has been done from her bed, using a reclining laptop stand, and Jodi is on average able to write for only a half hour per day. She has been too ill to leave the house for over 6 years, although her condition has recently begun improving very slowly.

She recounts some harrowing stories of disability and

She also provides helpful information for anyone who deals with M.E. patients such as doctors, carers, friends and family members as well as patients themselves.

Jodi's book is mostly about how to make things better. It provides practical ways for patients and families to recognise what they are facing. This new book also provides information on how to test for M.E. for doctors, and guidelines for carers and includes some helpful check sheets to help patients measure their disability levels over time.

The forward to this book was written by Dr Byron Hyde of the Nightingale Research Foundation in Canada one of the world's most experienced M.E. experts. Dr Hyde writes: 'Jodi is a very courageous young woman. I recommend her book to all and wish it every best success.'

So how has Jodi managed to do this while in the grip of this illness: 'I try not to let all the awfulness that comes with having this condition get me down too much. M.E. is something you try to kick in the shins a few times and then quickly run away, rather than overcome through perseverance. It's that sort of thing, but still, small victories are still victories, that's for sure! That I have been able to write this book, bit by tiny bit over 7 years feels like a miracle. Some days I can't even read any of my own book I'm so ill, let alone believe I wrote any of it! I hope so much it'll help other M.E. patients not have to suffer as much as I did. That would be so wonderful.'


Following a recent request the following shows the origin of the naming of 'Roleystone':



# **R**ESEARCH SUPPORTS TARGETED FUEL MANAGEMENT PROGRAMS

In the first research of its kind in the world, a study has looked closely at the relationship between land management practices and house loss in bushfires. The research undertaken by 10 scientists in Australia, the US and an international peer review, is based on 12,000 measurements at 500 houses affected by the Black Saturday fires.

If is well documented that reducing fuel loads is the most effective preventative measure that can mitigate the impacts of bushfire. But the question is where in the landscape should we concentrate on reducing fuel loads? Over the years land management agencies have aimed for a percentage of estate or total size of land be burnt each year. It was a target they were regularly measured against. I think times are changing. The Keelty report rightly identified that **quality** of fuel reduction burning is more important than **quantity**.

The Victorian Bushfire Royal Commission recommendations focused on the need to triple the prescribed burning program but did not indicate where it should be done in the landscape. The research found the most effective fuel reduction occurs in the 40 metre zone surrounding a house. On Black Saturday, clearing vegetation and reducing fuels in this zone was twice as effective at saving homes than was broad landscape prescribed burning.

Other findings include :

- Houses close to National Park were at the same risk as houses adjacent to State Forest (ie logging made no significant difference)
- 87% fewer houses were destroyed where fuels surrounding them were at minimum levels.
- Planted gardens performed better than remnant native vegetation.
- On severe FDR Days, reducing trees and shrubs from 90% cover to 5% cover within 40 m of houses could potentially reduce house loss by an average of 43%, making this the single most effective fuel treatment that was measured.

Of course this research makes us ask questions regarding environmental impact, native vegetation clearing regulations, aesthetics and costs to the community. We need to keep having this discussion, we need to support this evidence based approach and we need to incorporate these findings into planning regulations.

I will leave it up to Dr Phillip Gibbons (one of the lead researchers) to conclude from his recent opinion piece in the media: Broad scale landscape burning in remote areas do not afford increased protection to houses on days like Black Saturday, the proximity of burning off to houses is far more important than total area burnt.

Evidence is not as timely as opinion. Evidence is not as entertaining as opinion. Evidence isn't as black and white as opinion. And while opinion is delivered with confidence and certainty, evidence must be presented with caution and uncertainty.








#### Education and the Omphalos A bit of Philosophising

Some people like, and understand, metaphors, others don't. As Francis Bacon suggested in 1625, there are those who, when they do not understand something, will try to ridicule it, so hoping to appear wise. Old Francis knew a thing or two. Whatever people's views, I hope this metaphor will stimulate some conversation on education and our local schools.

Education is a very complex matter, and there are many views on how it could be improved. Some teachers get annoyed when non-teachers express views, but since we have all undergone some years of education, we can all claim the right to a view, with





due respect to those who are professionally trained. To put my view, perhaps I can use Welsh mythology as a metaphor. I am not an expert on the subject, so I hope any Welsh readers will correct me if I get things wrong.

There is, in Wales, a mountain called *Pumlumon* (pronounced, in Welsh, as Pimlimon, which the English garbled to Plynlimon). The word means 'five summits', and between those summits there are small lakes and boggy places. In Welsh mythology, these were home to three water spirits, called Ystwyth, Hafern, and Varga. Their mother told these three to go down to the sea. Obedient Ystwyth went straight down, to the west, meeting the sea at Aberystwyth.

Hafern wandered to the east, but eventually met the sea at what is now known as the Bristol Channel. The youngest, Varga, was a bit wayward, and wandered all over the place, but eventually joined her sister Hafern on her run to the Bristol Channel. So we have the rivers Ystwyth, Severn, and Wye, and some call *Pumlumon* the '*omphalos*', or very navel of Wales.

These three rivers might be compared to the three mainstreams of human knowledge, namely humanities, natural science, and social science. These have their origins in the five main branches of philosophy, namely logic, ethics, esthetics, ontology, and epistemology. In simple terms, these are concerned with the great questions which confront humans. What is true, what is false? What is good and decent, what is not? What is beautiful, what is ugly? What is real, what is imaginary? Where do we get our knowledge, and how reliable are those sources?

Although debated by the ancient Greeks, and jumbled by some recent pretentious academics, these are still the five most important questions for teachers to present to young people. They link well to traditional subjects, such as mathematics, science, comparative religion, art, creative writing, and history. Might the metaphor be helpful for both students, and teachers, to create clearer mental maps of what they are trying to achieve?

I am sure it is better than the obscure gobbledygook I have seen in some educational literature. Can an Australian metaphor be created? Is there an Australian 'omphalos'. Perhaps Uluru with its songlines? I look forward to any suggestions. David Ward

#### GARDENING NOTES JEAN: 9397 5547

The weather outside has been far too hot to go out into the garden, so it's with much pleasure, I'm sitting in the study thinking out my garden notes.

I hope you have all

appreciated the beauty of the Crepe Myrtles (Lagerstroemia indica) around our village. One person in Holden Road has a large deep pink red version on the corner of the new developmen. There are many soft mauve, deep red and white ones as well as other shades around town. My deep red, which I transplanted from my old home in Holden Road, never looked back and is now flowering beautifully.

There are a lot of smaller growing varieties too especially in the Indian range; I planted a small one last year at the bottom of the Rosemary hedge.

Down on the edge of 'Quarry Park' there are about three plants that come back after 'the mowing' each season and even manage to put up flowers before the mowers get them again. Because these plants are drought hardy, once they have got through one year they can manage with just the rain we get.

The storm in mid January was very welcome and I recorded forty mls in the rain gauge and the creek swelled from a metre wide to about six metres. Great for the garden.

I have been really noticing the Frangipanis in Kelmscott, and other areas. I think I mentioned the ones in Buckingham Road last year, they are magnificent and worth a detour through that road. It is wonderful to see the houses being re-built and people showing faith in survival after our terrible time last February. It shows a lot for the resilience of our local flora and fauna and also the courage and strength of our people.

Anyway back to frangipanis, because of their water-wise tolerance to our environment, they really are one of the easiest and most showy plants for our gardens and in summer they make lovely shady spots to sit under.

There are so many new varieties now available. Deep blood red, tropical red, Rasberry Royale, George Brown (a purplish brown), Bowen Yellow (total yellow) plus a range of variegated ones, Pink Apricot, Mango and Fruit Salad. (It is making my mouth water just listing their names).

Pioneer Gardens Nursery have got the lot and also several new miniature growers. My friend Joyce was telling me about the ones in Malaysia. Unfortunately one of their common names is the Grave Yard Plant probably because they are easy to grow and a piece broken off the home plant can be just stuck in the ground beside someone's last resting place.

What else should we be doing in our garden now other than keeping the water to the plants and picking our salad vegetables, especially tomatoes? Not really anything much!

Beware of pruning that would let the sun damage unprotected tender young leaves. Sometimes it is wise to clip back the finished roses so that in six weeks time we will have a lovely showing of large beautiful autumn flowers.

The Agapanthus are looking lovely now, let them flower and the seed bracts form then, these can be cut back and used as autumn dried arrangements.

Don't go looking for work other than some winter grass weeding, but take advantage of the weather and rest-up, find a good book and make summer work for you. *Good Gardening.*







### POLE TO HOME POWER CONNECTIONS AT AN END

The historic power cables that once connected homes directly to overhead power cables across Perth are set to disappear with all new connections to the Western Power network to be served by underground power.

This means that even if you need a new connection in an area serviced by overhead power lines, the physical connection to your building will most likely be an underground cable from the nearest pole in the street to a green dome, just inside the front boundary of your property. Such connections are called "Pole to Pillar" connections or "P2P" for short.

Under normal circumstances, you will need a P2P connection when you; demolish and re-build; build on a vacant lot; sub-divide; or upgrade your supply.

Despite the old roof to poles having been standard fixtures for so long, moving them underground brings many benefits, most notably of not having to trim branches and the like away from connecting lines. In the East Metropolitan Region, this means that people with new connections can avoid the hassle of inspection notices and having to trim back the garden – a big bonus particularly for Roleystone residents!

Other benefits of underground connections are that they often improve the appearance and value of a property and such connections are also more secure in bad weather. With this in mind, it is worth noting that you do not have to wait until you need a new connect to shift to a P2P connection.

If you currently find your overhead power connection a problem, you can apply to Western Power for a standard underground connection – you may even be eligible for the subsidized poleto-pillar rate.

### I can't believe it has only been a couple of months since I was elected to the

Council. The time has flown by as I become accustomed to how everything and everyone links together to manage the City of Armadale.

I have learnt a huge amount in a short time and it will still take more time to get my head around it all. Armadale is a big place & growing so quickly, especially the areas of Harrisdale and Piara Waters in the Lake Ward & Seville Grove in the Palomino Ward. I have been speaking to the Councillors in those areas to take me for an educational drive to learn about their areas.

This year the Council is required, under the Local Government Act, to conduct a review of the ward system. This looks at the City's ward boundaries and the number of offices of Councillor for each ward.

The Local Government Advisory Board suggests the ratio of Councillors to electors across the districts needs to be similar. With the growth in Lake and Palomino wards, the boundaries may need to be adjusted to even up these ratios. Additionally, recent advice

from the Board confirms the recent advice that the Minister's mandate that Elected Member numbers for each Council will be between 6 and 9 Councillors. As Armadale has 14 Councillors it appears in all likelihood there will be changes in the way Armadale is governed.

There will be a public notice inviting submissions so I'll keep vou informed as to when this will be.

At the last Council meeting there were changes made to the Environment, Animals and Nuisance local Laws. These issues were raised as a result of

the Roleystone/Kelmscott bushfire in 2011 and the reduction of fuel loads.

Accordingly the law is to amended to:

- remove the requirement for permits to be issued to control burning off between 1st April & 30th September each year (Check with Ranger Services that restricted burning periods haven't been extended due to adverse weather conditions)
- permit burning off to occur on lots less than 1,200 square metres provided that specific approval has been granted by the City's Ranger service to burn for fuel reduction purposes
- include an amendment carrying a modified penalty of \$250 for deliberately setting fire to materials such as plastic, rubber, and food scraps, wet or green garden materials that are likely to generate excessive smoke so as to cause a nuisance.







## Pro Bono: Bread David Bardsley, Minister Community Church



Dear Friends

For the most part we bake our own bread. Correction! For the most part, Hilary bakes our bread in a bread making machine and, for the most part, she – or rather the machine - turns out wonderful, tasty loaves.

Our daily bread bears little resemblance to the steam baked cotton wool like stuff every child under the age of twelve appears to adore. I suspect there are some older "children" who like that stuff too although heaven only knows why. I love the smell of bread baking and the satisfaction of the machine pinging away to tell us it's finished. We lift the lid and the crust of a beautiful, risen loaf greets us almost with a smile. Incidentally, why do we call it our "staple" food? I fail to see any connection between bread and those fearsome wiry creations which sometimes hold paper together. One of my earliest childhood memories is of my year one teacher stapling her finger to my artwork. But back to bread...sometimes things don't go quite to plan. They didn't the other day. The machine pinged. We lifted the lid. No crust in sight. We peered into the depths and there was a slab of what should be bread but looked more like a brick in size, texture and density. Anyway, the same ingredients as usual had gone in so it must be edible, mustn't it? With some difficulty, I cut a slice – my angle grinder would have been helpful here – buttered it and took a bite. It bit back! In a stroke, the beast split one of my molars in half. Fortunately some time ago a dentist had extracted the nerve from that particular tooth and only my pride was hurt. I suppose one nasty incident like this in all the years we have been baking isn't a bad track record and anyway it serves us right for not using fresh yeast.

Whatever bread we like and however we prepare it, in our society we take it for granted. In fact it has been the staple food there's that horrible word again in many societies for thousands of years. It has been such foundational food that eating bread has been associated with sustaining life itself – a crust of bread and some water kept the very poorest people alive apparently. Bread and life have become almost synonymous. Jesus was fond of using word pictures to reveal deep truths. He used stories and analogies frequently to explain spiritual realities so that people throughout the ages would understand the ideas he was opening up. And one of his most powerful pictures was the connection he made between bread and spiritual life. He quoted Moses when he said "Man does not live by bread alone but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'

Bread might sustain physical life but spiritual life is dependent on something else altogether. Later on Jesus said that he himself was the "bread of life". He was indeed a great teacher and gave us the highest moral code of behaviour. But he was so much more - he declared that he is our actual source of spiritual life. That's quite something to chew on. Why not try a slice or two? I can absolutely guarantee that you won't break a tooth on this bread! Yours in Christ David





# Astronomical Highlights February

March 1.

Valentine's Day and leap years. Astronomers have other priorities.

This year, February 24 is the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the discovery of the supernova in the Large Magellanic Cloud. SN1987Å, i.e. the first supernova found in 1987, was bright enough to be seen as a medium-bright reddish star for several months. The previous naked eye supernova was in 1604.

The Large Magellanic Cloud (LMC) is one of the small companion galaxies flanking our own Milky Way. It's easy to see from a dark site, on a moonless night. In the middle of the month when there's no moon in the early evening, look high up in the south to find the faintly glowing patch of sky that just might be a little tuft of thin cloud, but isn't. It's about 170,000 light years away - very close in galactic terms.


Speaking of leap years, this is one. February will have 29 days. Remember the rule? Starting from the century year \*\*00, every fourth year will be a leap year. So far, so good. But the century year itself can only be a leap year if it's divisible by 400. So 2000 was a leap year, but 2100, 2200 and 2300 won't be. Venus continues as the "evening star" dominating the

Normal folk tend to remember western sky at nightfall. Next in order of brightness February for events like is Jupiter which is in the NW sky at dusk. Gradually these two very bright planets will seem to converge, until they're closest in mid-March. Mars is rising just to the north of east around 9:45pm now, and is easy to identify with its orange colour. It's brightening and rising steadily earlier as it heads for opposition in early March.

By mid-month, Mars rises around 8:45pm, and by "leap day" at the end of the month it will be visible in the evening twilight. Saturn rises in the ESE around 11:15pm in early February, 10:20pm mid-month, and 9:25pm at month's end.

The major phases of the moon are: first quarter Jan. 31, full moon Feb. 8, last quarter Feb. 15, new moon Feb. 22, first quarter Greg Lowe

# Wild Gossip: **Spring Means Ducklings!**

### I recently had an enquiry as to whether or not wildlife is territorial – yes it is.

Magpies are a good example of this - they attack and kill intruding magpies and other small birds. They even swoop on us if we go onto their territory at nesting time. This presents a major issue when young magpies come into care and why we try to leave uninjured birds where they are. We need to know exactly where the bird was found and return it as soon as possible. If we do not know where the magpie came from it is hard to have a successful release.

Some wildlife facilities refuse to take in a magpie if it is not known where it came from. Other facilities will take in these birds and group them together whilst looking for a release area with a low magpie population and a plentiful food supply.

Ravens & Crows are very territorial and the same problems occur.

Bandicoots are very territorial, males will aggressively defend their territory and females will also attack intruders. Females also have cannibalistic tendencies and will kill and eat both the babies of an intruder or their own. Young male bandicoots have a tough time when they leave the pouch as they are forced out of the territory and have to try to find one of their own.

Trapping bandicoots is illegal and removing one from its territory for relocation is basically a death sentence. A relocated bandicoot does not know the area, where to feed, where to find water, where to find shelter, where to run for safety and will probably have a big territorial male fighting it.

Possums are very territorial; males will aggressively defend their territory in a death fight. Young males are forced from the territory and have to try to establish their own. Trapping and relocating a possum (the old 'dump it 3kms down the road' approach) is a death sentence.

In all wildlife the size of territory is governed by the food and water supply the more food the more likely a newcomer will be accepted but the dominant male is not going to share his females without a fight.




