# LOCALS ATTEND LESMURDIE SHS YEAR 12 BALL






# Our April Cover

# Streamcare 2012

April in the hills is the perfect time to start planning a revegetation project and preparing your site ready for planting in winter. If your property includes a waterway, the City of Armadale Streamcare program may be able to help you take care of your local riverside environment. The Streamcare Program aims to revitalise local streams and improve the habitat for native fish and wildlife through the planting of native flora and careful use of weed control, fertilizers and pesticides by landowners. Any Roleystone resident who has a watercourse flowing through their property has the chance to participate in the program. Landholders can receive technical advice regarding weed control, herbicides, property planning and revegetation, all specific to their property from the City's Streamcare Promoter. Landowners may also be eligible for free native plants through the program, to revegetate their waterway and create a healthier environment.

# Sharon and Dwayne

In 2009 our family had first hand experience with the ICU at Royal Perth Hospital. Never in our wildest dreams would we have ever expected to experience what we did that day.

In the early hours of the morning of September 7th we received the knock on the door that changed our family forever. Two police officers stood there to tell us that our eldest boy Dwayne had had an accident & was being taken to RPH. 'We should head straight there,' they said.

On arriving at RPH we were given the horrific news that our son was unlikely to survive the injuries he sustained in his motor vehicle accident. Apart from breaking nearly every part of his body, his car had also amputated his right leg.

Later that morning we were told that the doctors had to amputate his left leg in an effort to save his life, though they were still doubtful that he would survive. However, after almost six weeks, this amazing department performed miracles beyond our belief & gave us our son back.

For this reason I am dedicating my run this year to raising money for this fantastic organisation. The Intensive Care Foundation is dedicated to improving the care of those who need it most in our community, the critically ill. Over 145,000 people are treated in Intensive Care in any one year.

This means that 16 people every hour of every day, 365 days a year are hoping for a miracle. Unfortunately there is no one reason as to who ends up in Intensive Care: accidents, heart attacks, strokes, pneumonia, asthma & even swine flu are just some of the reasons. So anyone, at any time can find themselves fighting for their lives.

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### Green light for the Return of the Spring Festival to Araluen

In Early March, a proposal to reconsider the suspension of the Springtime in Araluen event (often referred to as the Tulip Festival) was put to both the Tech Services committee and to full Council. At both meetings the proposal was carried and this means that Roleystone and the City of Armadale will again host this iconic event.

The major reason for suspending the event lay in relation to the lack of parking available for visitors to the Park. This has been partially redressed with the increased availability both within the Park and the use of Camp Simons for overflow parking. Some concern was expressed about traffic congestion and the inconvenience of large volumes of cars on these roads for residents in the immediate area.

Some disquiet was expressed about the lack of consultation with local residents (more specifically the residents of Croyden Road) about the traffic plan. However Cr Wielinga expressed that she felt that just consulting those in Croyden Rd and surrounding affected roads was too narrow as it is after all 'Roleystone's Park'!

Many Councillors expressed how Roleystone residents and many across the City of Armadale love Araluen and had been saddened by past decisions to remove all events from the Park. Arguments for were obviously that it is a family/community event of positive value, and that it is supported by both Roleystone & Armadale and that the Park needs visitors for viability.

In the City of Armadale's Tourism Strategy 2009, one of the actions was to coordinate with Araluen to promote more events. It is widely recognised that Araluen Botanic Park is the most recognised place/event in the City of Armadale to non-Armadale people. It is hoped that the new traffic management strategy will prevent much of the traffic congestion.

# 'The possibility of a Springtime in Araluen Festival' Some questions answered by the City of Armadale

The Araluen Botanic Park Springtime Festival is a major drawcard in the Armadale region and entices thousands of people to the Perth Hills each year. It is significant because it is the only tulip festival in Perth and it attracts many people to our region.

The City has never resolved a firm position on the merits or otherwise of the Springtime in Araluen Festival. It has been required to make a decision on the impact of traffic and parking during the festival and any statutory matters relating to the conduct of the event. The City needs to maximize benefits of any local business or event, particularly where it can bring spin-off benefits to other businesses or enhance the image of the district.

What will the arrangements for parking be?

'Parking will initially be contained within the Park with the overflow into Camp Simons (YAL Campsite). Should these areas become full then parking will be permitted onto Croyden Road on the northern side, between east of the Araluen Lane Bridge and Redtail Lane' said Armadale CEO, Ray Tame.

Will the roads be one way? (Will the 'no parking' along Croyden Road be reviewed?)

'Where crowds attending require it, a oneway system will be engaged in Croyden Road between the park's entrance and Redtail Lane.'

'Arrangements will be different to traffic

management imposed some years ago in that access will be allowed from the Croyden Road end, rather than Gardiner Road. This will be to test the new arrangement. If the new parking and traffic management arrangements do not match the assurances of DEC and the Araluen Botanic Park Foundation, we will be forced to impose further restrictions.'

'The arrangements will be monitored each week with an overall review on completion of the festival' said Ray Tame.

### What is the duration of the agreement?


Traffic Management will be in place on the following weekends:

- 25 and 26 August,
- Every weekend between Saturday 1 and Sunday 30 September,
- Monday 1 October (Public Holiday).

'There was healthy discussion for and against the proposal with questioners in public question time both supporting and opposing the festival' said Armadale Mayor, Henry Zelones

### Does this arrangement have any bearing on other festivals events to be held in the park e.g. The Chilli Festival.

'Traffic Management is employed through Croyden Road only during the Springtime Festival. The Chilli Festival is now held elsewhere. As a February event there were further concerns about large crowds being attracted at the height of the fire season' said Mayor Henry Zelones.

Tony Simpson MLA, the Member for Darling Range announced that progress had been made on establishing a new cemetery in Whitby. Tony said "The development of a new 40-hectare cemetery will cater for people living in our area."

John Castrilli MLA, the Minister for Local Government, had earlier told the State Parliament that "Forty hectares of land at Whitby Falls has been made available with the cooperation of the Minister for Planning and the Western Australian Planning Commission."

The Metropolitan Cemeteries Board will now prepare a master plan for the site in conjunction with local government. Many local people want to bury their loved ones close to where they have lived and this new cemetery will allow that to occur. The site of the next cemetery has been debated for 30 years.


The ambassadors took 'the team' through a special Starlight Purple Haze banner out onto Fremantle Oval.

# **Bushrangers Learn about Dieback**

### Roleystone Community College Bushrangers recently joined volunteers from Roleybushcare to save jarrah trees around the school from dieback.

Before the students started treating the trees the chair of Roleybushcare, Dr Ian Colquhoun, taught them about the cause of the disease. He told them that the pathogen came from overseas and the first evidence of its destructive capacity was found in Karragullen. In the practical part of his presentation he showed them how successful 'phosphite' treatment was. Injecting trees with phosphite increased their resistance to dieback for about 5 years. The bushranger group are now looking at purchasing dieback treatment kits so they can save all the jarrah and Banksia trees around their school.

# **ARALUEN PARK TULIP FESTIVALS**

We have concerns about the proposal to overturn the previous decision on traffic control during the upcoming Araluen Botanical Park tulip festivals.

The build-up of traffic along Gardiner and Croyden Roads whilst vehicles are trying to enter the Park or be moved on will eventually lead to a serious accident. Neither of these roads have centre line markings at this location. The current proposal of allowing the public to park along Croyden Road will make it extremely dangerous for all concerned.

We have witnessed families carrying chairs and eskies some 1500 meters along Gardiner and Croyden Roads negotiating traffic and slippery gravel sidings. The Council has made no effort to provide safe access to the Park for pedestrians and therefore would

be open to a serious law suit from anyone who is injured. The Council would have no recourse as they have previously identified the risk by painting yellow "NO PARKING" lines for hundreds of metres each side of the park entry and erected several signs. What has changed to allow this previous policy to be overturned? The previous and sensible decision to ban all parking along Gardiner Road and Croyden Road was the correct one! The Council has put themselves and the public at risk by overturning the previous decision.

Should anyone be injured or worse, I will be contacting the family concerned and offering them a copy of all documentation that has been sent forward on this matter.

### FIRIES ABUSED WHILE DOING REDUCTION BURNS

The Roleystone Volunteer Fire Brigade wishes to convey its extreme disappointment regarding the verbal abuse that was levelled at some of our volunteers during a hazard reduction burn in early December last year. The property on Chevin Road and the Roleystone High School grounds were considered high risk due to the amount of fuel loading and our priority was to make them safe.

While the majority of Rolevstone residents appreciate the work we do, there are a few in the community who obviously do not feel the same way and felt it necessary to hurl abusive comments such as "get a real job" or "are you crazy" (expletives deliberately omitted). I am sure Rolevstone residents are well aware that the hills district is one of the highest fire risk areas in the State. Fuel loading in the form of fallen tree branches and leaf litter compounds over time and is responsible for the increased intensity of fire.

The brigade conducts hazard reduction burning wherever possible in an attempt to keep our community safe from the risk of fires during the summer months and the task is not taken lightly. We have a very limited window of opportunity in which to conduct the hazard reduction burning and safety is our priority.

The majority of our members DO have "real jobs" and endeavour to protect our community from the threat of fire on a VOLUNTARY basis. Our volunteers give up their time unreservedly to protect the community and work in a very physically demanding and hazardous environment without complaint. We have chosen to live in this environment and have made a commitment to protect it where we can.

Unfortunately, the vast majority of our community do not keep the fuel loading minimised on their properties and firebreaks are not always well maintained on larger properties which increase the risk of bush fires.

With the Roleystone/Kelmscott fires of February 2011 and more recently the Margaret River fires still so fresh in everyone's minds, perhaps the community should look at better preparing their own properties against the threat of fire rather than abusing those who do their utmost to try and protect it. *Chris Gairns*






On the 26th of March Wendy Weaver turned 60.

# Council Cracks Down on Anti-social Dogs

The City of Armadale is urging dog owners to be vigilant when out in public with their dogs. A strong reminder is being sent to all residents to watch their dog at all times.

Armadale Mayor Henry Zelones is asking residents to be conscious of their pets' behaviour, when out in public, particularly in dog exercise areas.

"Dog exercise areas are places in which dogs are allowed to be off the leash; however this does not sanction anti-social behaviour by dogs who threaten other animals. A recent attack in a dog exercise area has seen a family lose a loved pet.

"It is the responsibility of all dog owners to constantly keep an eye on their pets. If a dog is behaving in a manner that is aggressive or hostile towards another dog, the owner is directly responsible. The City will not tolerate anti-social or aggressive behaviour by any dog. Owners who do not control their pet's anti-social behaviour may face penalties of up to \$10,000. An *attack*, in relation to the behaviour of a dog includes —

(a) aggressively rushing at or harassing any person or animal; or

(b) biting, or otherwise causing physical injury to, a person or an animal; or

(c) tearing clothing on, or otherwise causing damage to the property of, the person attacked; or

(d) attempting to attack, or behaving in such a manner toward a person as would cause a reasonable person to fear physical injury,

Residents are urged to contact the City Ranger Services on 9399 0111, if they observe dogs acting in a threatening manner.

# THE HISTORY OF WYGONDA – A FOLLOW UP

In the March Courier there was reference to the origin of the term Wygonda. The original Parkin homestead and property was called Wygonda Park and all Roleystone residents know the major road now bearing this name.

Some years later when the Zavatteri's took over the orchard, they started to trade as Wygonda Orchard. Dom Zavatteri has the original stencil from Wygonda orchard, dated from the early 1930's. This stencil lives on and has pride of place at his front door. These stencils were used to label fruit boxes with 'butcher's black' applied with a brush to identify the source of the fruit within the crate.

The Zavatteri family has named their home Wygonda and still uses the name in Dom's newly established Fencing buiness. *Below: Dom is pictured with the original stencil.*

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


Pictured at left: are the protagonists that will bring to life the script from famed, award-winning US playwright David Mamet.

# An interview with 'President Bree'

### When did you join the theatre?

I first did a junior workshop in 1997 and my first show was Oklahoma! in the same year (I was 17).

My husband Daniel Ramsell has been involved with Roleystone Theatre since he was 5 and along with his siblings used to sleep in the Green Room during rehearsals and on show nights while his parents trod the boards! Daniel and I met at the Theatre in 2000 and in 2007 we were married.

Funny story there actually.... it was April 15th 2007, which some may remember as that April day that the skies opened and drenched us with an immense amount of rain. We were supposed to be married at Araluen Botanic Park but as the day went on it became obvious that this would not be happening! The Theatre was presented as a backup plan, however in the end we were very kindly able to make use of the Church across the road from the Theatre.

Looking back it would have been fitting to have the wedding at the Theatre but on the day, I was under immense stress. It certainly was a day I'll never forget! My Mum and sisters have been involved with the Roleystone Theatre on and off too and we were all in Calamity Jane, back in 2002.

# What have been some of your major roles (acting and back stage)?

My first lead role at Roleystone Theatre was playing the understudy for Dorothy in 'The Wizard of Oz' in 1997. I then went travelling for a couple of years but within a month of my return I was cast as Sally Smith in 'Me and My Girl' (2000). The cockney accent required for the part was helped along by the fact I had been living in the UK.

I have since played a myriad of roles in plays, musicals and one acts. I absolutely love the rehearsal process for a production; the singing, the working on line delivery and memorisation, the costumes, the laughs and the camaraderie. For the space of time that a show is in production you have a new 'family'. You may not see each other often, or ever again, after the show ends but the bonds made under the intense and focussed situation of a community theatre show make for a link that stays with you forever. Community theatre is a passion I'll admit. If you don't have a passion for it then you may do one show and never again do you feel the need to get back up there.

### You are taking over as President but you have been on the committee for a long time. What other roles have you had?

I have been on the Roleystone Theatre Committee since 2005. In that time I have been a general committee member and for the last three years have been Vice President. I have been the Bar Manager for the Theatre since 2006 and have helped run Front of House since 2004, alongside my husband. We have also run three successful junior/teen workshops together. I have also been Musical Director for numerous productions and co-ordinate the Roleystone Theatre Choir. I have been the newsletter editor since 2006 and have had a hand in many other organisational areas of the Theatre.

# What are your major aims for the theatre while you are President?

To maintain the good name of the Theatre! Roleystone Theatre is well known in Perth for the quality of our productions, however just as importantly we are known as one of the friendliest, politic-free community theatres. That kind of feeling keeps people coming back to watch our productions and be part of our productions. To be successful we need to put on quality productions that people come to see. Unfortunately, though we are a not-for-profit organisation, if we do not get 'bums on seats' then it is difficult to keep the ball rolling.

We have a marvellous group of people on the Committee who all bring different skills sets and strengths to the table, and this is what will ensure the ongoing success of our Theatre. We need to keep actively reminding local people that they have a quality community theatre on their doorstep.

# What, if any, are the main challenges facing the Theatre?

The Theatre has low membership at the moment which means there are never enough volunteers for the things that need doing. It tends to end up being the same group of people doing the majority of the work. Membership fluctuates depending on what type of productions are on and how big the cast requirements of the shows in any given year are, however there is also the issue that these days many people don't have a 'home theatre'. A 'home theatre' is one that traditionally you live near and do most of your shows with.

Many people currently go from club to club depending on which production they would like to be in. This tends to result in a higher quality of performance but has a negative impact on the clubs themselves in the long term as with no stable membership base people do not feel enough of a connection to a club to help out when needed. Being a voluntary organisation can definitely be a challenge when you don't have sufficient volunteers!



# **Billy Shears**

David Appleton, his son Javier and wife Karen run Billy Shears the Hair Club operating in Brackenridge Village in Roleystone. So why Billy Shears......

The idea to use Billy Shears for the salon was from Javier and Karen. He was David's grandfather and his real name was Robert



Unit 2a Brackenridge Village Cnr Brookton Hwy & Soldiers Rd Roleystone WA 6111, Call 9397 9219 William Campbell Pemberton. He got the nickname from the salon he trained in.

There was another Robert working there so they called him Billy. Apparently he was a really good haircutter so they started to call him Billy the Shears and then it got shortened to Billy Shears. This information was passed on by David's Mum and Dad who were also both hairdressers. Javier is now fourth generation hairdressing. **Robert William Pemberton aka Billy Shears** 

So the legend would have it Billy was born in Liverpool in 1895. He began his hairdressing career at 14 years of age and soon showed his talents for expert cutting. Six years later he opened his own salon - client's travelled from miles around to have their haircut by the talented Billy. Soon he was the most famous hairdresser in his hometown of Liverpool but Billy wanted more. He wanted to pass on his creative ideas to others and most of all he wanted to lift his industry and make it respected. He began to travel to show others his talents. Hairdressers everywhere would clamor to see him perform his techniques and he is reputed, by his peers of that time long ago,



to have been the first hairdresser to evolve systems of cutting with his now famous shears. As Billy travelled around he began to unite hairdressers in a common cause to make a better industry for all. He became a champion of this cause by the early 1960's.

It is also said that around this time four young Liverpool musicians went to his salon for a new look. After his death a few years later, those same four now famous musicians sang about a Billy Shears on one of their unforgettable albums. Could they have been paying tribute to him? Billy's name will live on forever and in some way we owe it to the legend of Billy Shears to keep his ideals of ethics, education, artistry and creativity alive for future generations of hairdressers. ......he is said to have died a happy man in the salon he made famous.

David, Lauren and Javier have brought these same ideals to the Billy Shears Hair Club in Roleystone.

Facilities for community groups in the City of Gosnells will be enhanced shortly thanks to an exciting \$200,000 development by the All Saints Anglican Church.

Parish Priest, the Rev Chris Hind said the church was in the process of making massive improvements to its hall/theatre complex on the corner of Dorothy and Hicks Streets.

He said community groups who use the hall would welcome the installation of air conditioning and storage facilities.

"These were the two major upgrading requirements requested by the community when we surveyed over 50 local groups last year," Rev Hind said.

lighting systems.

"We are also making great improvements to the adjacent house in Dorothy Street which is being converted to a parish centre with facilities available for wider community use.

"We have already moved our Emergency and Welfare Relief Service to this centre. The service helps over 700 local families each year."

Rev Hind paid tribute to the assistance of Lotterywest, which recently awarded a grant of \$145,517 towards the project, and the City of Gosnells which last year contributed \$8000 towards kitchen equipment.

"We could not have contemplated these improvements without this generous assistance, nor without the \$50,000 donated by church parishioners, who are also contributing hundreds of hours of volunteer labour," Rev Hind said.

"While we have made a start already, we expect the major works to begin within the next month."

Rev Hind said a number of additional community groups had expressed interest in using the hall when improvements were completed. These included Al-Anon Family Groups and Legacy, which helps the widows and dependents of deceased servicemen. Community groups interested in learning more can contact Rev Hind on 0417 927 877.

# Cross Park Skate Park Progress Update


On Thursday the 23 February, a follow-up workshop took place with the residents from Roleystone and a design consultant regarding Cross Park Skate Park.

### EARBUS MAKING NOISE IN THE EAST METRO

Since 2008 the Telethon Speech & Hearing Earbus has been touring the Perth East Metro region to help address the high incidence of middle ear disease amongst Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children.

During the Earbus' visit to Westminster Junior Primary School in the East Metropolitan Region, I went along to see the Earbus in action.

Equipped with audiological equipment, the Earbus provides a free ear health screening service to Aboriginal children and children at risk of recurring middle ear infections. The Earbus team includes a doctor, nurse,trained ear health screener and Aboriginal Liaison Officer, who work to diagnose children with ear health problems and ensure they receive appropriate treatment.

Unfortunately, middle ear infections (MEIs) occur in Aboriginal children at three times the rate of non-Aboriginal children; currently Aboriginal children have MEIs, on average, for two and a half years compared to only 3 months for all other Australians.

Having the Earbus identifying problems early on helps an individual's quality of life because hearing loss through middle ear infections (MEIs) can lead to significant lifelong challenges, including difficulties with schooling and life-long social isolation.

Given the benefits of screenings and early intervention a visit from the Earbus can be life changing and I am glad to see the Earbus in the electorate and look forward to its continued operation.

The Telethon Speech & Hearing Earbus program has a fleet of mobile children's ear clinics which travel to select primary schools, kindergartens and child care centres in the Perth metropolitan area, South West and Pilbara Regions.






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Katy Exhibits

# Astronomical Highlights April

### Greg Lowe, Perth Observatory

For years I've been saying that Easter Sunday is the Sunday after the full moon that follows the autumn equinox.

After a bit of Googling on the subject, I find that Easter Sunday is the Sunday after the Paschal full moon that follows the autumn equinox. The term Paschal refers to the Jewish festival of Pesach (pay-sark) which celebrates the Passover.

If I ever knew, I'd forgotten that the Passover was the time when the Angel of Death is said to have passed over and spared the houses of the Hebrew slave families who'd painted their doorposts with lambs' blood.

Not so lucky were the families of the ruling Egyptians. The God of the Hebrews smote them with ten plagues, the last of which was the death of their firstborn children.

Anyway, the ecclesiastical Paschal full moon can differ from the actual full moon by a day or two. Most of the time it doesn't matter. Easter Sunday can be anywhere from March 22nd to April 25th, as reckoned by this method. This year, full moon's on April 7th and Easter Sunday is the very next day.

Speaking of the Moon, the main phases for April are the full moon on the night of the 6th (100% at 3:19am on the 7th), last quarter on the 13th, new moon on the 21st, and first quarter on the 29th.

At dusk on the 3rd, the gibbous Moon will be above Regulus and Mars. At dusk on the 7th, the full moon will form a triangle with Spica and Saturn.

Venus continues its "evening star" impression right through April, looking like a beacon in the NW sky at evening twilight time. Jupiter is slipping away, down to the left of Venus, and will be out of sight by the middle of the month. Mars, easily identified by its reddish colour, is the brightest starlike object in the NE sky at nightfall throughout the month. Its brightness is diminishing as we move away from it on the inside track. Saturn will be the prime target in the Observatory's public stargazing sessions this month. In early April it's just rising at the end of evening twilight. If you look to the east around 7:45pm you'll see what appears to be two fairly bright stars, one above the other.

The upper one is the star Spica and the lower one is Saturn. The time of rising gets earlier by about 4 minutes per day. By mid-April Saturn's clear of the horizon at nightfall, and by the end of the month it's well up in the east at dusk. It goes through opposition on the 16th: Sun, Earth and Saturn will be in a line, in that order.

Saturn will be on the opposite side of Earth from the Sun, rising as the Sun sets, and will be up all night. It's the most distant of the 5 visible planets, and is closest at opposition time, so this month is ideal for Saturnian observing.




"With the primary school students now at the original high school site, it is imperative to get a crossing guard for the school straight away," he said.

#### COUNCILLORS COMMENT

It has been a busy month with lots of work being done to set up for the future. The skate park concept plan was presented by Convic, the Melbourne based designers, who came up with a great design that incorporated all the ideas that had been given to them by the young people that use the existing facilities. This will be a great addition to the Cross Park precinct. Caroline & I have been looking at the positioning of the skate park with the existing facilities & the possibility of a Men's Shed & Community Garden. Master planning is being undertaken by the City of Armadale to look at how all the parks, Cross, Springdale & Karragullen Oval & their facilities co relate to the area & each other and this should optimise the organisation of the current & proposed activities.

Roleystone Primary is still being used for the kindergarten children until the facilities are finished at Roleystone Community College.

This has meant that the Men's Shed & Community Gardens, that are temporarily located at the school, have had time to do more planning because the real work won't start in earnest until the children move up the road to the big school. It is very pleasing to see the amount of young people starting their school life at Roleystone and we hope that as they progress the College grows to enable them to finish Year 12 there.

These high student numbers starting at the school

appear to be changing the demographics of Roleystone where currently over 50% of the voting population are over 50.

These over 50's are the people that are talking to me about the benefits of having an area zoned for senior's independent living. This rezoning for senior's use has already been initiated by the City of Armadale and Council



is now awaiting the report on the public submissions - which is expected soon.

DEC has requested the rescinding of the parking restrictions on Croyden Rd, which was passed at the full Council last week. This paves the way for Araluen Botanic Park to resume their Springtime Festival with the appropriate traffic management in place.

There have been some mixed messages coming from the results of the Roleystone & Margaret River Keelty reports. DEC report that they are not allowed to burn within 5 km of a township and all burns being carried out by contractors or volunteer brigades must have completed a prescription. These prescriptions are time consuming to fill out so will severely curtail the ability of the volunteer brigades to carry out prescribed burns.

Hopefully the regulations will be adjusted to reflect the intent of carrying out more prescribed burns, not less.

Senior Ranger Brian Watkins has informed me that the fire season will be extended this year for at least 2 weeks or until we get 20 mm of rain. Will let you know when this changes. *Grant Nixon and Caroline Wielinga* 

## NARROW LEAF COTTON BUSH ALERT!

Following last month's Councillor Comment the following letter was sent to Mr Rob Delane, Director General, Department of Agriculture and Food.

NARROW LEAF COTTON BUSH IN THE CITY OF ARMADALE

The City of Armadale repeatedly receives expressions of concern from residents in relation to the proliferation of Cotton Bush (*Gomphocarpus fruiticosus*). This problem is particularly pronounced in the hills areas (for example, Roleystone). As you are aware, the plant is an extremely efficient coloniser and is to the detriment of native species.

Many members of the community take an active role in removing this noxious weed from their properties. However, their efforts are compromised given that Cotton Bush is not a Declared Weed in the City of Armadale. Given the nature of the weed and how aggressively it spreads, the City requests that the Department of Agriculture 'declare' this weed in the area. It is only through this process and with the support of the Department of Agriculture that the prevalence of this species may be reduced.

In addition, the City will actively pursue grant funding opportunities in the future and work with private landowners to control the prevalence of Cotton Bush. Consequently, a letter of support addressed to the City would be appreciated for submission in conjunction with applications.





#### Pro Bono: Easter. David Bardsley, Minister Community Church



I remember having all sorts of problems when computers first came into common use.

I was running my own business and acquired what they laughingly called a "portable" computer to take with me to clients. It was so big and heavy "luggable" would have been a better label for it. Its memory was also pretty limited.

I think my car keys today have more bytes in them than that "state of the art" IBM machine. And using it was a nightmare. "Windows' was still a gleam in Bill Gates' eye and ms-dos was hardly the most intuitive of operating systems.

I thought I knew what to do with it but quite often I would feed in a stream of data and get nonsense out, a set of hieroglyphics which meant absolutely nothing to me. I would struggle to sort it out, applying the sort of reasoning I would apply to the use of say a slide rule or a set of log tables – remember those? After wrestling with it for a little while I would admit defeat and have to take it back to the supplier. I often emerged feeling very embarrassed because the fix was so simple. New technology, just like any new idea, can be an embarrassing struggle for the unfamiliar.

But my embarrassment pales into insignificance compared that of a friend who struggled with her new VHS video tape recording machine. It was "new technology" once, believe me. She wanted to record a TV program and had bought new tapes to use with the new machine. But every time she loaded a tape straight out of the box into the machine, the message came up, "No Tape". She tried several different new tapes with the same result each time. "Of course there's a tape!" she velled in frustration, "I loaded it. You swallowed it and it's still in there. How can you say, No Tape?" She took machine and tapes back to the shop and laid the offending bits and pieces on the counter. The patient lady in the shop quietly removed the still intact shrink wrapped clear cellophane packaging off one of the new tapes, loaded it in and said gently, "There you are, dear, now it knows there's a tape inside." Simple things really can get in the way of our understanding, much to our embarrassment.

Our minds aren't machines of course, although there are some similarities! But it's surprising how often we load something in - data or a tape - and our mind fails to deal with it properly. For instance, what happens when we feed "Easter" in? We should get a screen reading, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son that whoever believes in him shall have eternal life,"...or something like that. But I fear that too often the output is a bit of nonsense looking like a small furry animal with big ears and a fluffy tail yet made out of chocolate. Or there's the equivalent of "No Tape". Maybe it's about time to get some help to process that particular input properly as the Maker intended. Or perhaps we simply need to remove the cellophane which is blocking the works. And when we do cut through to the reality of Easter, we see something far more wonderful than we could ever imagine - God's love for us really is that big! Yours in Christ, David


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




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### Dale Cottages Care Foundation

The following morning I took the possum to a vet specialising in Ophthalmology but unfortunately the eye could not be saved. I was left to decide whether to have her euthanized or give her a try at life. I chose to try and spent 100's of dollars on surgery to remove the eye, suture the socket etc. and antibiotics.

Everything went well and she seemed able to manage with one eye, so eventually, after consulting with other experienced carers I decided to give her a sheltered release on my property. I bought and painted possum boxes, spent hours looking for suitable placement and had various feeding platforms and shelves put up to make things easy for her.

Early one December morning when she came out of her box in the aviary to greet me and enjoy her morning meal I caught and bagged her. The possum box was moved to the prepared place and I put her inside. That evening when I took out her supper she had come out of the bag and was peeping out of her box at me, she came out onto the feeding platform to greet me and enjoy her food.

The following morning when I took out her food she had gone from her box and despite searching all around I could not find her. I continued taking food to the area for about a week but it wasn't being eaten so I discontinued. I felt very sad as I had grown quite attached to her and now I didn't know what had become of her. I regretted my decision to release her but couldn't change it.

Last week we heard lots of possum hissing outside so I went to see what was going on and there she was on the patio eating fruit, hissing a warning to a large male to stay away and there was a baby riding on her back! I don't know where she is living as all my possum boxes are empty but she is obviously doing well, which is a great relief. I have seen her and her baby several times and she now seems to be coming to the patio so I can see her from the window.

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

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
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
