RECOGNISED WITH CITY PLAQUE On the 11th April Patrick Weir and Maggie

Burke, current owners of 'Darjeeling' an historic homestead in Roleystone, received their Heritage Plaque from Mayor Henry Zelones of the City of Armadale.

Henry Zelones, said the plaque recognised the cultural value of Darjeeling and is a token of the City's appreciation for Patrick and Maggie and the many previous owners of this majestic home, in preserving the City's heritage. Vyonne Geneve and Ron Facius, a Roleystone couple who have been instrumental in setting up the Art Deco Society of Western Australia and have worked tirelessly for the restoration of heritage buildings reflecting this era of architecture, were also present at the awarding of the plaque.

Darjeeling is a large weather board and iron home, off Brookton Highway, with a commanding view of the Canning Valley. It is believed to be the largest fully jarrah built structure in the world. The homestead was built over the period 1925 - 29 for Mrs Dargen and was originally used as a guest house. Over the Second World War it was used as a children's home for Sister Kate's (for part aboriginal children). Many important guests have resided in the beautiful residence and the accompanying self contained apartments, including author Ernestine Hill who wrote 'My Love Must Wait' the fictionalised biography of Mathew Flinders.

Patrick Weir gave an interesting account of some of

the past owners and locals who have lived in the home.

Heritage Plaques commemorate properties that are important to the community and have been recognised in the City's Municipal Heritage Inventory.

Another Heritage site chosen to receive plaques in 2012 is Illawarra Orchard, home to the Price family, where clearing and planting began in 1893. This is the site of the first apple cool store in WA built in 1899 and still in use today. Previous recipients in our area include Araluen Botanical Park and the Roleystone Theatre.

Roleystone residents will have heard the loud retort of gas guns recently. This has been a feeble attempt to protect apple crops as flocks of black Cockatoos have decimated this year's Hill's Apple crops. Orchardists have lived in harmony with these majestic creatures for many decades but for some inexplicable reason this year the cockies have developed a taste for apple seeds. And the best seeds lie inside the developing Pink Lady apples. The following is an article published in this Month's Countryman and reproduced with their permission:

Orchardists in the Perth Hills region are expecting a crop loss of up to \$1 million this season because of damage caused by black cockatoos.

Hills Orchard Improvement Group president Bruno Delsimone said up to 30 orchardists had been affected. 'One small six hectare orchard lost \$60,000 worth of apples, another lost 150 bins,' he said. 'We don't mind losing a few apples (to birds) but this is destructive. The birds are being forced out here because there's food for them.'

Sally Rainoldi runs Roleystone Orchard and is estimating a loss this season of \$60,000. Although she doesn't want to see the flock of 100-200 birds hurt, she would like the Government to provide assistance to

'It's a disaster, I've got nothing,' Ms Rainoldi said. "I don't know how orchards are going to be able to sustain this. It's never been this

bad in 20 years. 'I don't think there's been enough research. The Government needs to step in and supply the growers with some sort of deterrent. It's getting to the point where the consumer will be affected.

Ms Rainoldi said the birds, both the long (Baudin) and short (Carnaby) bill types, had been seen in the area for the past six

years but problems only began four years ago.

'They're magnificent birds, we're fortunate to have them in WA. It would be a shame to see them eradicated but we need to survive. They've eaten all the Pink Ladies, now they're eating the Granny Smiths. I'm done.' The damage has caused Ms Rainoldi to pick Granny Smiths now when they usually wait until May.

'It's crazy for us to pick now,' she said. 'We'll be flat out getting 20 bins when last year we had 140. We've forgotten about the Pink Ladies, we're just going to try to salvage the

Ms Rainoldi doesn't endorse shooting the birds, which is also illegal, and has come up with a deterrent method of her own - a 'flapper', simply a bin liner attached to a broom handle.

'It must sound like an injured bird,' she said. 'But because they're intelligent they get used to it. At the beginning of the

> season they were easier to scare away.' Fruit West is looking at what to do next.

> 'There's a real issue with birds again this year,' executive manager Gavin Foord said. 'Their

habitat is being destroyed everywhere - food sources for these birds are being taken away. Growers can't take responsibility at the expense of their livelihood.'

Caught in the Act!!

Mr Foord said there were several options but no simple overnight solution.

The Department of Environment and Conservation (DEC) said it was monitoring the birds and recommended orchardists use scaring devices such as Bird Frite.

DEC senior investigator Rick Dawson said the birds were listed as a threatened species under State and Federal legislation and killing or harming them was illegal.

'During autumn and winter, the cockatoos tend to congregate in the Perth metropolitan area and the surrounding hills in search of food and this can give a misleading impression of the abundance of these birds, he said.

Mr Dawson said numbers had declined drastically over the past 50 years and the

remaining birds had adapted their feeding habits to include orchard produce.

'This has resulted in damage being caused to some crops,' he



Vale Keith Rinaldi 9/12/49 - 6/4/2012

Keith Rinaldi died in early April after a long battle with cancer. Many across Roleystone knew Keith as a former Principal of Roleystone Primary School, a passionate member of the Roleystone Bowling Club, an involved community member or just as a keen walker around the streets of our town. Few appreciated how widely known Keith was outside of our locality, largely through his participation in education across the state and his strong sporting contacts

Keith was born 9th December 1949 to Peter & Gwenyth Rinaldi. He was the second eldest and only boy in a family of four children with his sisters being Carmel, Frances and Heather.

Keith had a fun filled childhood in Scarborough roaming the scrublands and dunes that led to the beach. He trained as a teacher and his first country posting to Derby led to a long and passionate involvement in country education particularly in the North West of WA. At Derby DHS in 1971 he met and married Leonie and they almost made it to 40 years of marriage.

Keith loved sport, particularly cricket and football. He was a loval and devoted follower of the Sharks and the Dockers!

Francine was born while Keith was at Kulumburu and she didn't meet her Dad 'til she was 1 month old – no such thing as paternity leave in those days. He later worked across WA in Derby School of the Air, Bindi Bindi, Marble Bar, Jigalong, Hollywood, South Newman, Kalumunda and lastly at Roleystone PS.

Francine grew into a young daughter she followed Keith into Leonie.

teaching! After 8 years in WA schools, she went overseas and 12 years later she still hadn't come home!

Here are Francine's thoughts about her Dad.

'Isn't it funny that we don't realise how special our parents are until we become parents ourselves? Of course it's true and so now, when I think of my Dad, I understand and appreciate all the gifts he gave me – even the ones that felt like hard lessons at the time.

After all, not every girl has had the opportunity and satisfaction of navigating a ute through the Pentecost River, changing a tyre on her car, catching and cooking a mud crab, landing a barra or driving her car up a vertical sand dune ... So, thanks Dad for sharing so many wonderful adventures and teaching me how to face the challenges that life inevitably throws at us - hopefully with as much courage as you did.

My only regret is that you won't be there to share in more adventures with Jack, guiding and encouraging him - just like you did me. We all love you and miss you terribly, Dad – Pappy Keith.'

Keith was a very successful cricket umpire and the highlights were his outings at Lilac Hill and the international one-day games he presided over. His services to cricket were recognised in the Alan Border Medal presentations of 2010.

Sport and travel continued to be his favourite occupations after he retired from teaching in 2005.

The Dockers had a loyal follower in Keith who was a Harbour Master. He gathered a group of like minded supporters around him and they could be found at the Irish Club before each home game. Once a year they all decamped to a democratically chosen away game to cheer their team on...they only saw one away victory! It was a source of great excitement and pleasure for him when the Dockers won the first game of the season against Geelong.

Lawn bowls at Roleystone was his next project. He first played to 'make up the numbers' but became increasingly active in the club.

Keith was never happier than when he was packing his bag to catch a plane or packing the camper to head off up the track. He surely had gypsy blood in him. He went to England to see Francine married and to be around for his grandson Jack's birth.

This last visit, two years ago, saw his illness return. He is ever grateful that he had two years of the greatest pleasure with Jack, albeit via Skype.

He fought a valiant and uncomplaining battle with cancer and never gave up hope until the medical people told him the treatment wasn't successful. There were to be 10 weeks in which he spent the days doing normal things such as having a coffee at morning tea, enjoying visits from friends & family, reminiscing with Leonie and making sure all was in order for his ultimate

Keith can be remembered for his integrity, loyalty, sense of fun, and for being visionary. Overall he was a wonderful dad and a loving husband.

Over 40 years, I found in Keith - first, young love; then a loyal, loving and forgiving husband; next, a wonderful father to Francine and; finally, a fun loving, adventurous best friend.

'Now he is gone I will forever miss his big, gentle bear hugs and twinkling blue eyes, more than words can say.

Keith has been taken too young from us all, but he has found release and rest from the cruel illness he endured so bravely to the end. May his gypsy spirit roam free and at woman and like father, like peace as we cherish his memory in our hearts, with love.



Roleystone Community College was chosen, along with 3 other schools, to have the Greenfingers team, through Guru Productions, create a sustainable garden.

The show was filmed and was shown on Sunday 22nd and Sunday 29th of April on Channel 7, between 5.30pm-6pm.

After a few hiccups we convinced Guru Productions that Roleystone Community College was a great place to build a sustainable outdoor classroom/garden. Once the final decision had been made it was 'all

The move to retail has been great! Being able to offer our 'WA's Finest Lamb' range to the public is a real honour and one that we have been working hard on for the last


6 years. We have combined this with offering a great range of beef, pork, chicken and smallgoods, all sourced from our local farmers.

Easter Lillies




They seem to grow anywhere, in rows, solo long the roads and in great masses especially on steep hill slopes along our highways.





This year I counsel locals to look long and hard at these trees, their presence in our location may be quite transitory. For many orchardists the last few years have been very challenging. Drought, lack of water, poor farm gate returns and spiralling prices have proved difficult for our neighbouring orchardists.

But this season has thrown up even more challenges. As a child growing up on an orchard our family often quoted 'We'll all be ruined said Hanrahan' to our Dad as he complained about the difficulties of farming. But in this modern era, I wonder if these difficulties are surmountable?

This year's poor harvest for most crops was compounded by the usual spate of diseases with brown rot and fruit fly in particular exceptionally rampant.

Shortage of produce however didn't lead to high fruit returns. The buyers and supermarket chains are just too good at anticipating this and all shortages were overcome with high interstate imports, so local consumers didn't notice any shortages or price hikes. But local growers certainly did!

Now our wondrous Black Cockatoos, beloved by nearly all, have turned ravenously to our local apple crop. Many orchardists will hardly pick an apple this year. Sally Rainoldi of Roleystone Orchard is typical of farmers in our area. (See story page 4.)

So what can they do when they are up against a protected and well loved enemy? This must be a problem that we all need to sort out as no-one wants the destruction of this already at risk bird but what can local orchardsits do when their livelihood is threatened?

However an even greater threat to our orchardists is looming. Next summer sees the banning of the major sprays used to protect fruit crops from Mediterranean Fruit Fly.

Our Hills area has proved a

very suitable environment for this pest. Hills growers are extraordinarily fearful of the potential to lose all of their stone fruit crops and a large proportion of their pome fruit crops, without some intervention.

We are all aware that we need to be vigilant about protecting the public from consuming anything that may have health risks attached. For many years responsible orchardists only used cover spraying as a last resort and always aligned to the withholding periods and safety margins. From next summer, cover spraying is now not allowed at all. This challenge just may prove too much for many orchardists.

I realise that the general public may be unaware or even support the phasing out of these chemicals, but I feel passionately that this situation should be known about.

I also feel that this industry is in crisis and our government should 'care' and offer support or even transition out of the industry for thosewho need it. This doesn't seem to be happening at present.

Again I counsell all who live here to look at our orchards while they remain.

In the May edition I have broken a rule, 'not to publish any really long letters'. On page 20 and 21 a local mother has written an impassioned letter about her son's suffering. The poignancy of this letter, particularly as we all think of mothers with Mothers Day approaching, is stark. Her story is heartfelt and I wish her luck with finding a solution.

Lastly this month I would like to send my deepest sympathy to three families. To the family of Roy Bettenay, born in Roleystone in 1924, a memory of a well lived, long life. To Gary and Wendy Smith and all at the Manse Restaurant, Dave lived life to the full and will be missed.

Lastly my heartfelt sympathy to Leonie, Francine and all the Mitchells on the death, far too early, of Keith Rinaldi. Keith was a wonderful man and his contributions to the Courier, to the community and his friendship over many years has been appreciated. Vale. So, please enjoy reading our May Courier.

FIRE, FLOWERS & FURPHIE

Chris Gairns has described (letters April 2012) how some people tried to discourage the Fire Brigade from prescribed burning near the High School. I am sure the Fireys, who give their time and sweat to defend us from bushfires, have serious views on the matter.

Parents, concerned about their children's safety next summer, may also have views. The need for prescribed burning to protect buildings and lives is well known, and need not be discussed further. The science on that matter is settled.

However, our passionate objectors may have been misled by some publications, such as the recent 'Local Flora & Bushlands' by Cliff and Sharron Burns, who claim that frequent, mild fire is harmful to plants.

The book has been widely circulated, and contains many photos of Darling Range wildflowers. It is recommended, in the foreword, by Associate Professor Kevin Thiele, a botanist at the WA Herbarium, who describes it as 'scientifically rigorous'. It depends on what science you are talking about.

As an example, on p.114 the authors refer to a paper (Lamont & Downes 1979), which used grasstree flowering as an indicator of fire events, and concluded that pre-European fires were at 80 year intervals. In fact, grasstree flowering is an unreliable indicator, as explained in a later paper by me and Professor Lamont (Ward & Lamont 2000). They also claim that fire frequency has 'increased dramatically by a factor of between 12 and 22 times' since European settlement. I am unaware of any scientific grounds for this strange claim.

There is overwhelming evidence that fire frequency has decreased since European arrival, litter has increased, and that is the main cause of the uncontrollable bushfires we have all seen recently. There are, in the book, other misleading claims about bushfire effect on plants, which I will leave readers to disentangle.

With such misinformation, it is no wonder that some people are confused about the need for prescribed burning, and local government has, on occasions, been reluctant to carry it out. Those promoting misinformation, or trying to prevent prescribed burning, must bear some responsibility for the loss, in uncontrollable fires, of homes, and the deaths of many mature trees, and native animals.

Botany has been described as 'stamp collecting'. The book is a beautiful album of coloured

pictures, and I am sure the species names have been carefully checked, but labelling is not the same as ecology.

Those interested in some facts about bushfire should read Dr Sylvia Hallam's scholarly book, 'Fire & Hearth', available from the State Library. Other reliable books are by Professor Steve Pyne, and Professor Bill Gammage.



H Local Mum asks: Can YouHelp Relieve Chronic Pain in Children in Hospital?

Dear Reader,

Having a child who suffers chronic pain I wanted to draw your attention to an area of PMH which I believe is lacking in services, and to the children, parents and caregivers who are in desperate need of support.

I feel very strongly about the chronic pain suffered by our children and the need for a dedicated pain unit at PMH but I'm not really certain how to tell you, and moreover, not allow too much of my emotion creep in and diminish the importance of what I would like to say to you.

I could try and start at the beginning but I'm not sure where that is anymore, so perhaps I should introduce you to my son James, invite you into his world, and ask you to form your own opinion of the need for a paediatric chronic pain specialist and dedicated pain management service at PMH. Here goes...

My son looks like he is resting comfortably, but its 10am and he's 9 years old. No, he's not resting, he has withdrawn into his own world, and lying in a foetal position his eyes are open, glassy. His face is white, with a pale tinge of blue around his mouth as his breathing is shallow and there he lies very, very still as he tries to manage the pain he is suffering. Try to get him up? Wanting to comply, he struggles to get out of bed unable to stand independently. He's hunched over, can't eat or drink, unable to focus on what's happening around him. Worse, he starts to lose control of that pain. He hits, scratches, bites himself and others, tears his skin until it bleeds and starts sobbing uncontrollably.

This is bad enough but imagine, James already takes 80mg of MS Contin a day, 12.5mg up to 2 hourly for breakthrough pain and there is no pain service to call. He will need to present at PMH ED for a fentanyl infusion but we know how that course of events will unfold so we hesitate, sometimes this may only last for 48 hours until the pain becomes controlled again....will we, won't we? We juggle the drugs (we have had to learn by ourselves), use alternative therapies but we aren't winning. With tears in our eyes we make the call, please expect James in approximately 1 hour, they know he is coming.

PMH should be his sanctuary; there are qualified people there who can help him, the necessary drugs, ability to control the pain and give James some relief. However, at hospital he can't access the pain team without first having a referral made by a medical team, which needs to be requested by the doctor, which needs James to have an initial assessment by a nurse who can't get near to him because by this time he is thrashing around wildly, sobbing and tearing himself and anyone close by to pieces. The process seems to take such a long time, perhaps because James doesn't have a diagnosis. Who is he being admitted under? Is the pain related to a new specific cause? Please, please ask the pain team to come; even then we appreciate their dilemma.

It gets worse; the pain is one of his triggers for seizure. He's treated immediately and recovers but it happens again, his eyes show the fear as he desperately tries to cling on to some form of contact with us. This time he can't stop fitting, he loses consciousness, and he goes into status. Several hours later and after a myriad of drugs it is decided that James should be intubated. We've been here before, and I'm relieved he will finally be asleep and comfortable but we also know that this isn't the end...... 48 hours later on waking after intubation, James can't move, he has tears in his eyes and makes little whimpering sounds. His MS Contin (80mg a day) was stopped two days earlier and we plead with intensive care staff to contact the pain team...

Reader, I need to stop a moment, there is something I didn't tell you at the beginning, it shouldn't make a difference but it does. James can't talk, he can't verbally tell us the pain he is suffering or the fear he is feeling worse, he can't be reassured that "it will be ok" - Perhaps you could re-read the above knowing James doesn't have the ability to tell us what he's experiencing.

I could go on with stories about incidents of suffering that would make you cringe with horror and bring tears to your eyes. This isn't however intended as a criticism of the care given rather, a reflection of the current systems and lack of services in place to prevent children suffering unnecessarily. I understand that paediatric chronic pain is not a well-researched area and especially so in those children who can't verbally describe what they are experiencing. Moreover with such limited research and the very nature of the opiate treatment there are bound to be many different and conflicting opinions on how the pain is assessed and treated.

I have been very fortunate with my dealings with the pain team at PMH and found them very helpful however, they don't specialise in chronic pain and, as purely a consulting team, (as I see it) weren't in a position to manage James's medication and care.

Ultimately, as James's tolerance to opiates grew so did my ability to find a doctor who could treat him. He had "outgrown" the service that was offered at PMH yet he was only 8 years old.

I consider myself one of the lucky ones, I am fortunate enough to have the means to explore other alternatives and eventually came in contact with David Champion from the Eastern States who supplied me with some valuable information and resource tools. Moreover, he helped me realise that what I was asking for, pain relief for my child, was not unreasonable and that there were people out there with experience in this field who would understand the difficulties we were experiencing and could help

I did find somebody, a great doctor with paediatric chronic pain experience who is currently in Perth. However, James can't see this doctor at PMH and therefore his care is compromised; should he need to be admitted to hospital for pain, who is he admitted under and who oversees pain management?

Moreover, perhaps a paediatric chronic pain specialist and dedicated department could help identify those children who are non-verbal thus treating and alleviating the considerable pain they go through - James was believed to have behavioural issues until a routine blood test enabled a diagnosis of pancreatitis to be made - It still makes me cry thinking of the pain and suffering he must have gone through.

Pain specialists might disagree but I believe paediatric chronic pain, as opposed to acute pain (even paediatric acute pain) brings a whole new range of variables to the concept of pain management and whilst, as a civilised society, we like to think we are doing the best for our children, without a paediatric pain specialist who can pass on their knowledge to caregivers and develop individual, appropriate care plans, our children are isolated in that their pain is not always recognised or treated appropriately. Again, I would like to stress that this letter is not intended to criticise in any way the fantastic work carried out every day in PMH by its dedicated staff. Rather it is to draw to your attention an area of care that surely should be considered a priority and ask your help, as stated in Children's & Adolescent Health Service's vision statement to "improve and protect" the lives of our children who suffer chronic pain.

The 1st of June 1829 is historically recognised as the day when European Settlers, on the merchant vessel Parmelia, first sighted the coast of the land which was to become the Swan River Colony. Since 1832, when Stirling decided to commemorate the date as an annual celebration, we have celebrated this day as "Foundation Day", with the public holiday falling on the first Monday of June.

Governor Stirling's decision to celebrate Foundation Day, was based on the desire to unite the settlers, masters, servants and Indigenous Australian who lived in and around the Colony. It is with that same inclusive vision, that Premier Colin Barnett introduced the "Western Australia Day (Renaming) Bill 2011" to change the name of Foundation Day to "Western Australia Day". As the Premier mentioned in his speech on the Bill, it was in fact the second bill he had introduced on the matter, having introduced a private member's bill to the same effect in May 2008.

There can be no argument of the importance of 1 June 1829 for our state; however, by naming its respective holiday as "Foundation Day", our celebrations have been inherently focused on the singular historical event of European colonisation. By renaming this day as Western Australia day, our scope for celebration can extend to unite all Western Australians who have come together over all periods of time to make W.A. their home, and a home they can be proud of.

There are many elements of contemporary Western Australian that will ensure our state always carries a legacy of British heritage, most notably our legal and government structures, but a rich indigenous history prior to colonisation and a diverse tapestry of immigration after, means that renaming our state's special day to Western Australia Day will give us a better way of bringing ourselves together as one, just as Governor Stirling aspired in 1832.

Armadale covers an area of 560km² and encompasses 1600 hectares of parks and reserves. It reaches from the shores of Forrestdale & Champion Lakes to the hills, rivers and valleys of the Darling Scarp.

Our population is 67,725 and is set to double in the next 20 years. 28% of us were born overseas and 7.5% come from a non-English speaking background with 89% able to only speak English.

With such a diverse area and people the City is conducting a community survey "Ask Armadale" from May - June to find out what you want for the future of our region. These will be available through the libraries, the City Views publication, a random mail out and email distribution. The information will also be available on the website (http://www. armadale.wa.gov.au/) and residents will be able to complete the survey online. If you get your answers back to the City before the end of May you will be in the draw to win one of 4 prizes of \$500.

The Executive Director of the Agriculture Resource Risk Management has responded to the question regarding Cotton Bush problems in the hills. His recommendation is to pursue this weed's gazettal as a Pest Plant under section 10 of the Agriculture and Related Resources Protection Act. This part of the act empowers local governments to make local laws prescribing a plant as a Pest Plant within their municipality. We will be talking to the officers at the

City in regard to seeking this declaration. Now is the time to start preparing your property for next year's fire season. A fire permit is required up until the 31st of May. These can be obtained from the City office Mon/Wed/Fri between 3-4 pm, or by fax or email if a ranger is available. Between Dec 1 and Mar 14 the rangers inspected 5212 properties and





issued 127 infringements for failing to comply with the firebreak notice. The rangers are currently conducting random dog registration inspections. If you are unsure if your dog is registered ring the ranger services to check. All dogs over 3 months old must be registered and a can be registered for 1 year or 3 year periods. The City is also commencing its Local Planning Strategy review, which precedes the Town Planning Scheme review, both of the current documents are available on the website (http://www.armadale.wa.gov.au/ Home/Publications/Public Documents). Councillors have been asked for feedback and comment on issues such as the Housing Strategy, planning of the Activity Centres, Landscape Protection, Bushfire Protection & Local Biodiversity Areas. The review process is seemingly quite involved as it is scheduled to take several years to complete. The Local Planning Strategy & the Town Planning Scheme are the highest level documents that a Local Government administers and can greatly influence residents - any questions or comments please contact us or the City (info@armadale.wa.gov.au).







Pro Bono: Things to come

I am writing this on the balcony of our house in Bridgetown, the place where we plan to be based when our term here is finished.

In many ways, we wish we wouldn't have to relocate but several practical issues have influenced our decision. Even so the plans we are currently holding may change. There have been a few events recently which have illustrated a phrase from the Bible - "in his heart a man plans his course but the Lord determines his steps."

Our near neighbour, a man of my own age, has just had a significant stroke on the eve of his retirement date. Another friend's relative, who had accumulated a healthy Superfund with a view to travelling extensively, suffered a heart attack. Travel is now out of the question.

A colleague who is a Chaplain in an aged care facility fell off the rocks at the Dawesville Cut whilst fishing with his grandchildren. His ankle is now pretty well destroyed and walking itself is going to be an issue for him. On his imminent retirement he was planning to have an itinerant country ministry. He and his wife have had to rethink how that might work out. Incidentally when I visited him recently he expressed the thought that he could return to work fairly soon if his "clients" could shuffle their way round to him instead of vice versa. It seems to me the only shuffling most of his clients could consider involved their "mortal coil" so it sort of defeats the objective. The last I heard was that they had adapted their plans and are not at all disappointed by the outcome, except of course for the Meccano set which is currently stopping the bottom of his leg falling off. And so we're very open minded when we consider what's really around the corner for us. Over the years we have learned to hold on to our own plans lightly. We have been prepared to change direction if we believe God is opening up a different road ahead of us. That's how we ended up back in Roleystone five years ago. We were happily pursuing life in the UK when we received an email asking us to consider returning to this beloved part of the world to minister in the Community Church here. Although it came right out of left field we never doubted God's hand in the move and it has been a wonderful episode for us.

In fact our personal horizons have always been pretty close and we have learned to revel in the journey as much as the destination. For sure there have been times of tears but overall it has been an amazing adventure, one which I would dearly love others to share. I guess we have proved the premise that God always has our best interest at heart. The key to it all seems to be how we determine our priorities. Whose agenda is it anyway? The old Sinatra song "My Way", an anthem of my generation, might sound fine but the words reflect a stiff necked and self-centred approach which discards God's influence completely. If we are not malleable in God's hands we're going to miss out on the good things he has in store for us. There's another phrase in the Bible - "Many, O Lord my God, are the wonders you have done. The things you planned for us no one can recount to you; were I to speak and tell of them, they would be too many to declare." I'll stand on that, thank you very much. How about you?





Last Saturday's Club Night saw two new acts, Caitlyn McFadyn and Nadia Shaw with both girls playing original compositions!







Wild Gossip: Identifcation is Important

Correct identification of wildlife is a major issue and for an inexperienced person this can be very difficult and often end badly. Pictures in books and online can be useful

provided there is a clear weight & size shown, otherwise they add confusion.

Anyone who has worked with wildlife will be familiar with the "baby kookaburra", as we have encountered it so many times, we now expect a dove though very occasionally (bit like winning lotto) we actually do end up with a kookaburra! We also receive many calls about mice or rats thought to be bandicoots and some about chickens thought to be ducklings. I actually was given 3 ducklings that were silky bantam chicks, despite advertising they remained unclaimed and grew up to provide me with a few years of delicious eggs.

When I receive a wildlife call I ask lots of questions in an attempt to correctly I.D., possibly ask if a photo can be emailed or that the wildlife can be brought over to me for viewing, all to enable me to offer the best possible advice and care. Some people tend to get frustrated and angry with me, as they feel that they already know the I.D., but as incorrect I.D., handling, feeding, care and treatment will kill, I persist, though sometimes I can be wrong.

With a young "kookaburra" I will usually ask questions about size of the

bird, beak shape & colour, feather colour, tail shape etc. A young kookaburra is smaller than an adult but not by that much though it is fluffier which makes it look bigger than it is, the upper beak is large, blackish in colour and has a hooked end, the lower beak is large and cream coloured and there are distinctive brown coloured blushes going from mouth to ear. If a feathered bird fits into the palm of your hand it most certainly is not a kookaburra.

With all bird enquiries I ask the caller to gently fan out the bird's wing and look on the underside to tell me the plume to quill ratio (how much feather bit & how much stick bit) to enable me to know if this is a baby, young or adult bird and offer the correct advice.

Bandicoots have a short tail, about 2/3 of the length of its body and are welcomed. Rats and mice have tails much longer than their body and are unwelcome.

Correct I.D. is really essential for appropriate care and handling so even if you feel sure of an I.D. please be patient and answer some relevant questions to confirm this, as the future of wildlife you have may depend on this. Please listen to any advice offered as incorrect handling, feeding & care kills our wildlife.

I have added my email address as an addition to my mobile & home phone numbers and hope we can work together to help and preserve our precious wildlife.

Please contact me for help for or advice about all orphaned or injured wildlife.

Astronomical Highlights May

Greg Lowe, Perth Observatory

The waxing gibbous moon dominates the evening skies for the first week or so of the month. "Gibbous" means hunchbacked: it's the half moon with a hump. The hump grows day by day, heading for full moon on the 6th when moonrise comes just a few minutes after sunset. After full moon comes the waning gibbous moon, with the hump diminishing day by day. Last quarter, the morning half moon, is on the 13th. New moon's on the 21st and first quarter's on the 29th.

In the last days of May we'll lose Venus from the western evening sky as it disappears into the glare of the Sun. On June 6th Venus will pass directly between Earth and the Sun: the last transit of Venus in this lifetime, and then some. There'll be no more Venusian transits until 2117 and 2125. More about that in the Highlights article in

No other planet attains anything like the brightness of Venus; the second brightest is Jupiter but it's out of sight behind the Sun (conjunction on the 13th). The only other objects with comparable brightness are the International Space Station and the Iridium satellites. You can check on their visibility using the satellite prediction website www.heavens-above.com. The Space Station sometimes is brighter than Jupiter, though not quite as bright as Venus. The occasional Iridium "flares" can be many times brighter than Venus! Note that the "magnitude" (brightness) scale is peculiar: negative magnitudes are bright. Venus is -4.5, Jupiter -2.0 but not in view now, Mars +0.2, Saturn +0.4. The brightest stars are Sirius at -1.4 and Canopus at -0.7. At nightfall Sirius is high up in the west and Canopus is equally high in the south-west.

Mars is in Leo, well up in the NNE at nightfall. The slight orange hue aids identification. It's been near to the star Regulus for weeks, but will move steadily away to the east of Regulus this month. Mars culminates in the north at about 8pm in early May, 7:30pm mid-month, and 6:45pm by month's end. "Culmination" is when a star or planet is at its highest and can be best observed, with the least atmospheric

Saturn begins the month in the eastern sky at dusk, below and just to the right of the star Spica in Virgo. The distance between Saturn and Spica will remain much the same all month. Saturn's the furthest visible planet and moves much more slowly than Mars, so its motion relative to the stars isn't nearly as obvious. As the weeks pass, Saturn and Spica will be higher in the sky at dusk. Saturn's culmination time ranges from about 11pm in early May to 10pm mid-month and 9pm by month's end.

Rob Zielinski Returns

On Saturday the 12th of May Robert Zielinski is returning with his violin to Roleystone Community Church. 
