
Then came the push for a purpose built centre to be established. The fledgling seniors group originally met at the Family Centre until they moved into the current seniors centre.

NEW MUM TAKES CANCER CHALLENGE

New time mum, Pauline Monk of Bedfordale, will be taking part in the Ride to Conquer Cancer on 19 and 20 October this year and is using the next few months to get in shape. Plus, as part of the commitment she needs to achieve a minimum fundraising goal of \$2500 which goes to the Western Australian Institute of Medical Research for Cancer Research.

Pauline is a mother of four and her latest baby Owen is only 12 months old so she needs to sneak out at 5:30am before the baby wakes up, to train. She is also training on Sundays when she organises long rides with other novice cyclists through a group she formed via Facebook called "Cycling with Friends".

Pauline reflects on why she wants to be involved: 'In the last few years I have been shocked when some of



my friends have been touched by cancer, breast cancer, lymphoma and oesophagus cancer and these people are my age, fit and healthy with young families just like myself. Thankfully, they are responding well to treatment and things look positive for them but the disruption to their lives has been huge and it's not yet over for some of them.'

The ride will take two-days, travelling through scenic countryside and with a night of camping. Riders will support breakthrough research and the discovery of new cancer therapies at WAIMR.

This is the second annual "Ride to Conquer Cancer" event in Western Australia. The Ride already has a record of success in Australia. Last year in Perth over 1,200 participants raised \$4.6 million.

He's done it! Roleystone's Peter Treasure was one of 26 riders to complete the first, end to end, ride of the iconic Munda Biddi Trail.

Peter and the other riders were officially welcomed into Sculpture Park in Mundaring on April 28 by the Environment Minister Albert Jacob and presented with a 'Munda Biddi Trailblazer' jumper, to commemorate the ride. The three week journey, on what is now the longest, most continuous off-road cycling trail in the world, started in Albany on April 7 and passed through local towns, taking in 1000km of forests, bushland and scenic river valleys, boasting unique flora and fauna and towering eucalypts.

Peter is a fly in-fly out worker based in Newman and spent every day after work cycling 50km around mine site roads to train for the event. He also rides frequently around his beloved hills. He was keen to get home after the strenuous ride. Well done to Peter for completing the 1000km challenge.'

ANZAC SERVICE TRADITIONS

Recently, Brigadier Patrick Gowans (Retired) OAM, travelled to Western Australia and while he was here gave an ANZAC Day address to the Trinity College Old Boys. Brigadier Gowans has had a long attachment to Roleystone as he has frequently visited both his sister Margaret Bettenay and his mother Alice Gowans (dec). In this speech he unearthed some of the traditions underlying the ANZAC Ceremony.

Anzac Day ceremonies are characteristic by the playing of the Last Post after the recital of the Ode. This is a solemn, haunting and beautiful bugle call that stirs all Australians. For many of us it leads to tears. That bugle call and the minute's silence that follows, have a long history. Since the mid 16th century, troops in Europe assembled, at the end of a day of battle, to establish how many had been killed that day. Volleys were fired and a hymn was played. In silence, those lost comrades in arms were mourned. The one minute silence today and the three volleys fired at military funerals, follows that tradition.

Bugle calls have been used for thousands of years. Some give orders to companies of soldiers, such as to attack or retreat or come to parade. Other calls were designed to be heard over a long distance, hence the high, long carried, notes. The Last Post is such a call. It was first used in the early 19th century by British troops under Wellington in the Napoleonic Wars. The Last Post was to tell soldiers absent from camp, that they had to be back to prepare themselves for the next day of battle. Everyone was to be in their proper place by the end of the last note.

The Rouse, the bugle call that ends the silence that follows the Last Post, symbolises the awakening of the dead into a new and better world. The exception is the Dawn Service, when the Reveille is played.

The Reveille was a bright, cheerful call to rouse soldiers from their slumber, ready for duty; it has also been used to conclude funeral services and remembrance services. It rouses the living back to duty, now their respects have been paid to the memory of their comrades. The Rouse is a shorter bugle call that was also used to call soldiers to their duties. Being short, the Rouse is the call most commonly used in conjunction with the Last Post at Remembrance Services. When the Last Post sounds, everyone stands. Members of the Armed Forces and the police salute and other males remove their hats.

Everyone stands in silence for the one minute that follows the Last Post call, and when doing so, they remember all those men and women who have fallen in their country's wars.

They shall grow not old,
as we that are left grow old:
Age shall not weary them,
nor the years condemn.
At the going down of the sun
and in the morning
We will remember them





Welcome to Autumn.

In this month's editorial I wish to digress a little, discussing how we name our important local landmarks. Sometimes major structures are named and there seems to be no rhyme, nor reason for it. (For reference, see some of the street names in our location.)

May 2013

Recently I was discussing the Aboriginal heritage of our location with my parents. The discussion ranged over the historical relevance of

local places named after significant Aboriginal people.

My understanding is that the large area of bushland reserve now referred to as Midgegoroo National Park (east of Gardiner Road) is named after Yagan's father. This is perhaps fitting as Midgegoroo was an important leader of his aboriginal Nyoongah group. However it is fairly well established that they were not from this location, their area extended between the Swan and Canning Rivers towards the ocean. Most of 'the action' in their story happened around Melville and Helena Valley. (Both were killed in the early days of settlement: Yagan's head was famously removed and finally returned and buried back in the Swan Valley 177 years later). But this National Park is a long way from his traditional lands.

Another Aboriginal name preserved in our location is Munday. (Munday Brook and Munday Gully can be found along Canning Rd.) His tribe's range did extend into Roleystone. My Mum believes that the southern border of his range was close to Raeburn Road. (While we are talking about mis-placed names, The Bibbulman group were actually indigenous to the area around Busselton!)

Now why this is all relevant, is that my old Dad started talking about recognising the last Aboriginal to be living a traditional life style in our location. Apparently his name was Starlight (obviously not his real name). Starlight was an important character in the lives of the children who attended Karragullen School around the mid 1920's - 1930's. He was often a person they came across on their way home from school and by reports was: 'a pretty scary bloke'. He hardly spoke any English and lived very rough and his clothes and hair were pretty wild. He lived in the bush, but occasionally came to visit homeowners to: 'cage some food and old clothes.' Sometimes he would 'help a bit with wood chopping' to repay a housewife's generosity. Starlight just vanished around the mid 1930's, just one of the many disenfranchised half castes caught between cultures.

Sadly, this was all I could discover about Starlight. If any readers know more, I would be interested in following this up. There are no records of his life or mention of him in any of our City's historical records. I just feel that if he was the last Aboriginal to be living traditionally in our area, some record of him should remain. Perhaps we could have the Starlight Skate Park?

The name Karragullen is an Aboriginal word meaning 'red gully' and was first used by Daisy Bates when she came to the area in 1905. Daisy was prolific about recording Aboriginal Heritage and she wrote about the passing of Joobaitch, the last full blood of the Perth Tribe, in 1907:

'Joobaitch clung steadily to Maamba, his own ground; even when the doctor urged his removal to hospital. "No," said Joobaitch, "I shall die on my own ground, and not in a white man's house. When I die, I shall go down through the sea where all my people will be waiting on the shore with meat food, my mother and my woman, my father, and my brothers. Before it sets out on its journey, my spirit must be free to rest on the kaanya tree."

One day the cart came to take Joobaitch to hospital. "Don't let them take me!" he pleaded. I said, "It is all right, Joobaitch. You will die before you pass the kaanya tree at Karragullen, and your soul will rest there before it goes to the sea." Joobaitch died as the cart crossed the little creek near Maamba, as he had wished it, still on his own ground, close to the kaanya tree.'

So perhaps we should also name something after Joobaitch - he obviously had his heart well and truly in our location. So can our next park by called Joobaitch Reserve? What do you think?

One volunteer declared that this was EXHAUSTING, but fun.

One of their aims was to pick up some extra stallholders for the Karragullen Expo to be held in October and they were happy to report that they achieved this.

HOIG sponsored Garden Week this year, with 500 bags of mixed fruit available free to visitors and fruit for decorating the cooking stage and all the fruit for the cooking demos. Illawarra Orchard also provided wooden boxes. Thanks to Fruit West for providing pamphlets and other material and The Countryman for their continued support.

The HOIG volunteers distributed 2500 fridge magnets advertising the Expo and some glossy information cards which

have generated huge interest in the event.

HOIG President Bruno Del Simone was asked to participate in the cooking demos with Adrian Tobin and apparently he was 'sensational'. Adrian was cooking with locally sourced fruit and Bruno answered questions about fruit growing and gave out prizes.

At the stall HOIG volunteers also sold fruit fly traps.

Spokesperson, Brett Del Simone, said: 'The interest in fruit fly is overwhelming and anyone who has heard about the banning of Fenthion is genuinely sorry for the growers.'

A final quote was given that captures a fundamental problem this industry currently faces:

'Fruit sales are steady, but not fantastic, which really surprised us as we are the only fruit selling stall here. It bewilders me that people will pay \$18 for entry, \$5 for coffee, \$13 for a burger and \$3.50 for a liquorice stick but look at us like we are criminals when we ask for 50 cents for a premium October Sun plum. Poor growers!'

I think people have got used to cheap fruit. The problem is cheap fruit tends also to be old, or green, or tasteless fruit. People may have forgotten what good fruit tastes like. And if they want to rediscover it then we have got to stop importing 'junk fruit' and buy locally. And just perhaps, prices for this better quality fruit will have to rise!

Australia. Sadly, much of this terrible toll could be easily prevented. The disease is actually very curable, but the key to successful treatment is catching it early. That means regular screening, which is the goal of the annual Rotary Bowelscan program, now under way across Western Australia.

Here in Roleystone, local Rotary coordinator for the program Jeff Cairns says it's all about establishing the healthy habit of an annual test for everyone over 40.

"Forty is when the risk factor starts rising dramatically. Early detection can save your life, and that's why we say Bowelscan is about catching cancer before it catches you."


For the month of May, Bowelscan kits are being sold through Roleystone Community Chemist. Rotary distributes the sampling kits at \$8 (no profits go to the club or the pharmacy). People use them at home, deposit them back at the pharmacy, and the program's supporter Western Diagnostic then provides the pathology testing free of charge.

Bowelscan results are confidential but through volunteered information it's known that at least 6 Western Australians discovered cancer last year through Bowelscan. Plus at least another 15 found potentially precancerous polyps and had them removed. In the eastern states, where the program's been running for 30 years, the numbers are, of course, even higher.



This month our Roleystone Karragullen Seniors Club has celebrated its twentieth birthday. Happy Birthday to all involved.

Back in early 1992, Wendy O'Dea who was President of Roleystone Neighbourhood House (now Roleystone Neighbourhood Family Centre) and Jean Davies, who was a member, decided to do something for the senior members in the community. It started as a morning tea and was so successful that they decided to have a 'Light Lunch' once a month. This was homemade soup and bread, tea, coffee and cake and was catered for by various members of Neighbourhood House. Diana Haggart, also then a Neighbourhood House member, organised some special outings and specially themed lunches.

Pat Hart who was then a City of Armadale Councillor, assisted at some of these lunches. She suggested that a Seniors Organisation needed to be formed as a formal voice. Their first role was to organise for the bus to be re-routed to stop near the Hillendale Village.

Pat then organised a meeting for the senior members of Roleystone and Karragullen at the Roleystone Country Club on the 24 May, 1993 and The Roleystone Karragullen Seniors Club was born.

Henry Hawfield was the first President, Vice President Brian Gunn, Secretary Peggy Dyson and Roy Davey Treasurer. Graeme Hart was nominated as their auditor and remains in that position today.

The Neighbourhood Centre was their original home base and they created a small senior's library there. As the membership grew, they moved to the small meeting room in the Roleystone Hall. This room was too small and it was identified that the Seniors needed to have their own building.

They then heard that the Roleystone Kindergarten would soon become vacant. They took the opportunity to request it's use as a Seniors Club and this was finally agreed to. The building was then handed over to the City of Armadale who retrofitted it to meet the Senior's needs.

To furnish and fit out the building the Seniors raised \$5,000, Anglican Homes (now Armana Living) donated \$5,000 and Lotterywest \$10,000.

The building was formally opened by Peter and Ann Thompson and named "Thompson House," Peter and Ann being long term residents.

(Peter had previously been a City Councillor, was heavily involved with the then Roleystone Progress Association and was co-owner of the Roleystone Courier at the time.)

The Roleystone Karragullen Seniors has grown from strength to strength. They have had many fabulous local community members, some unfortunately having past on.

There are many stories and happy times associated with this great community organisation and its future is very much assured.


Our Club Champion award this season was presented to Jesse Mason. A deserving winner – well done Jesse!


many flowers. The Amaranthus are about a metre high and set off the cosmos daisies. All colours are soft pink, mid pink, light burgundy, and white. I've put in a row of tall bearded Iris and these look to be coming on well. Petunias, vincas and geraniums provide a lot of background colour and the standard roses and camellias are starting to do their own thing.

City Bans Cotton Bush

The City of Armadale has just resolved to introduce a new local law banning Cotton Bush. This news has been received with enthusiasm by campaigners such as Pat Hart and Cr Grant Nixon who have worked valiantly to bring this pest to our attention.

This plant has become a huge pest over our hills area. Cotton Bush has spread especially along watercourses and into bushland. (It is also known as Swan Plant, from the shape of the seedpods that look like a swan.) It was planted in gardens because of the white /cream flowers and for the Monarch or Wanderer Butterfly which lays its eggs on it.

The seedpods explode sending masses of seeds, each attached to light, fluffy kapok like parachutes that are easily dispersed by wind & water. They are extremely fertile creating new infestations everywhere they land. They will form dense thickets. The plant is poisonous and produces a milky sap, which can cause death in animals that consume it. It is not hard to manually remove, especially the small plants. Spraying with Glyphosate is also effective. See www.agric.wa.gov.au for more information.

Under the new local law, landowners will be required to remove or control the weed. If the landowner does not comply with a request, a notice requesting the treatment of cotton bush may be served and a fine may be is issued.



W.A. Mental Health Court Operational

It is estimated that currently over 2000 people who come before the Perth metropolitan Magistrate's courts in a year have a serious mental illness. In the Children's Court it is estimated that over 200 young people appearing before the court each year could have a mental

The mental health court diversion and support program is a way of putting mental health expertise into the criminal courts to provide a means of diverting offenders with a mental illness into mental health treatment. In some cases this will be an alternative to prison, and in other cases it will add a mental health service component into a community-based order. The program is voluntary and entry is at the discretion of the magistrate. Similar programs operate in other jurisdictions in Australia and internationally.

The pilot program will run over 20 months, followed by a comprehensive evaluation of the program's effectiveness. In the adult program there is a dedicated magistrate and court, and a dedicated clinical team. The team includes a range of experienced mental health clinicians, including a psychiatrist. Other team members are drawn from a range of disciplines, including psychology, mental health nursing and social work. There is also a dedicated prosecutor, duty lawyer and coordinator on the team. In the Children's Court specialist clinicians are based within the court to be able to provide quick assessments, reports, liaison and treatment. There is not a separate magistrate for the Children's Court, as the court already operates in a very multidisciplinary, multi-agency way, and the role of the clinical team is to support this work.

The cost of keeping someone in prison for three months is estimated at \$23,000 and the cost of diverting someone through this program for three months is estimated at

\$10,000. It is also very clear that it is much more cost-effective in the long run to treat people in the community rather than in prison, where appropriate.

There are certain basic requirements around a persons' eligibility. For example, if the person will inevitably be sentenced to a term of imprisonment because of the nature of their offending then they will not be eligible for this program, as it is designed to operate in the community. It is also a basic requirement that the person give informed consent, in line with the principles of any sort of effective therapeutic intervention.

This program is not intended to excuse or diminish the seriousness of offending simply because someone has a mental illness. It is also important that we do not criminalise mental illness itself. The program targets specifically those people who it is very clear would benefit from mental health assessment and treatment rather than solely a criminal justice response.

This is an exciting and positive step for the WA Justice system, as it allows the Court System to approach justice in a way that has the best outcome for both the alleged offender and the Community they are a part of.

WESTERNAUSTRALIAN TREE CLIMBING CHAMPIONSHIPS



How old are your Jarrah and Marri trees?

Have you often looked at the large trees on your property and wondered 'how old are they?'. Well, now we have a way to estimate their age. Trees can be aged by counting the growth rings within the trunk. This is a very difficult task without cutting the tree down....which sort of defeats the purpose! However, a Department of Environment and Conservation research scientist has done all the work for us by counting the growth rings of about 200 trees and correlating the number of rings with the circumference of the tree. It is valid for both jarrah and marri. This means that if you can measure the circumference of the tree then you can estimate its age.

Roleybushcare has simplified the process even more. We have marked-up three fibreglass tape measures so they read in 'tree years'. All you need to do is borrow one of the tapes from Roleystone Hardware (thanks to Ben and Sue for their help) then loop the tape around the tree at 1.3 m height and read the age from the tape measure. What could be simpler!!

Members of Roleybushcare measured the largest tree they found in Stinton Cascade Nature Reserve during a recent field day – it was 285 years old. Do you have an older one on your block? We are keen to find the oldest tree in Roleystone/Karragullen so please borrow a tape, measure your biggest jarrah and marri tree then send the data to info@roleybushcare.com.au. We will inform you of the results through the Courier in a few months.



DRAFT PARKS FACILITIES STRATEGY

The City aims to take a "strategic" approach to nearly everything, including its parks.

Several Strategies cover different aspects of our parks.

Firstly the "Public Open Space Strategy" (City Strategy Committee, November 1999) sought to catalogue & analyse all the parks in the City. Some parks have environmental value and some social value and residents should generally have a park in walking distance and a certain amount of parks per area (generally around 10%, but 5% in Roleystone). After these investigations, it was decided some parks were "surplus to requirements" and sold (and the profits used on remaining parks in the area). The types of parks that were sold were mostly a few of the small local "Neighbourhood" parks and 4 of these were in Roleystone.

Next came the "Active Sporting Reserves Study" (Community Services Committee, February 2012). This Strategy deals with only the large "Regional" parks. It too seeks to analyse and catalogue the parks.

This Strategy has only just begun and preliminary recommendations suggest some relocation & consolidation of facilities, however not for Cross Park & Springdale Reserve, which have just completed their 'master planning'.

The new "Draft Parks Facilities Strategy 2013" will replace the "Playground

Strategy" (Technical Services Committee, March 2008) which both sought to order the parks into the categories "Regional" (eg Cross Park), "District" (eg Borrello Park) and "Neighbourhood" (eg Lina Hart Park) and then attribute a certain amount of facilities to each park depending on their hierarchy.

In the "Playground Strategy" (2008) all Regional & District Parks were to have "significant infrastructure which includes: toilets, shade, parking, lighting, picnic facilities, shelters, rubbish bins, drinking fountain sand seating."

In the "Draft Facilities Strategy 2013", some of these items are now proposed to be "conditional" in District Parks subject to criteria.

In the case of toilet infrastructure, the conditional criteria are proposed in the "Draft Public Toilet Strategy" (Technical Services Committee, March 2013), another Strategy that analysed and catalogued, in this case toilets, and recommended some rationalisation. The conditional criteria proposed include proximity to another public toilet, amount of infrastructure at the park, likelihood of antisocial behaviour & public visibility, length of stay, number of users, level of services & future costs.

Enough Strategies? But wait, there's more... the 2002 "Skate Park Strategy" is also under review... What does it all mean? In Roleystone, 3 half acre reserves and an access way were sold, this money together with some money from subdivisions, was pooled to over \$600K. Two thirds of this has been budgeted to the new skate park at our Regional Park, Cross Park and the remainder is hoped to be spent at our District Park, Borrello Park subject to Council's consideration of the abovementioned strategies. I hope this clarifies some of the 'mudiness' surrounding this issue.



Pax: Lesley Borowitzka Dying



One of the privileges of being a priest is in being able to share in the important, life changing moments of other people. The 'rites of passage': baptisms, weddings and funerals.

Yes, funerals. It is a privilege to help to say the goodbyes, to hear about the mark the person has made on the lives of others. I've sat with someone who is dying, sometimes they are conscious, sometimes they are not, and you know it's a special place for me to be. To see the end of a life, to know that moment when that person is no longer there, in the room, but their soul has moved

Many people feel uncomfortable in the presence of death, in listening to the dying person, uncomfortable at funerals. Even talking about dying is generally shunned. Yet it is a wonderful gift to give a dying person to be with them, to listen, often to reminiscences, sometimes to fears about what is to come, and very often concerns about what will happen to the ones left behind, humans and animals, even the garden. Being there and listening is something we can all do, and it's a wonderful thing to do.

A death and a funeral at the end of a life well lived, surrounded by family and loved ones is a great blessing. But what if the death was unexpected, a sudden illness, an accident, a suicide or killing?

A young person, life cut short? How can we cope with the grief? I am so often asked: why me?

And of course there is no easy answer. We know that good things and bad happen. Bad things happen to good people and sometimes it seems the opposite is true too. It seems that the most important thing is how we deal with what comes to us and our loved ones, for that is what makes the difference in our lives and our future. Feelings of grief, anger, remorse, sadness, betrayal are all normal aspects of grieving and must be accepted as normal and lived through. Grieving people, just like the dying, need a listening ear. For a long time. Much of what is said may sound repetitious, but it needs to be heard. It is not helpful to try to short circuit the grieving process, by trying to distract or 'cheer up' or urge the person to move on, get on with life. In time and with kind and listening friends, they will. Eventually.

Later on, when the grief is fading and being replaced by memories, there is time to reflect on the big questions.

Why me? Logically, we know we will all die, we don't know when, could be tomorrow, could be in fifty years time. Paradoxically, living with the knowledge of the certainty of our death can have an invigorating effect on our lives. Every day becomes precious, a wonderful gift to be lived to the full. No time is to be wasted on being angry, miserable, vengeful or resentful! Perhaps also paradoxically, the best way to honour the life and death of a close loved one is to go on and live, to really live, a full and satisfying life. Really use to the full that

Astronomical Highlights May

At the Observatory we believe in tempting fate in the form of the weather demons, so we've extended our public viewing season into May: Fridays and Saturdays, the 3rd & 4th, the 10th & 11th, the 17th and the 25th.

Madness? We'll see.

One reason is that we want to show people Saturn. Another is that there's a good section of Milky Way coming into view, running from the Southern Cross on down to Scorpius which is above the south-east horizon in the early evening. The Scorpion's sting is a pattern of stars looking like an inverted question mark. See if you can find it.

To be able to see the Milky Way you need to be somewhere pretty dark, with no moon. The evenings in early May are moonless, with last quarter on the 2nd. Last quarter's the morning half moon it rises around midnight and is high in the north at daybreak. New moon, no moon, is on the 10th and brings with it an annular solar eclipse; more about that later. The waxing crescent moon is a feature of the evening sky from the 12th, when it's near Jupiter in the WNW at dusk. Having an obvious reference point such as Jupiter, you can take note of how much the moon moves day by day: check its position again on the 13th. First quarter phase, the evening half moon, occurs on the 18th. Full moon's on the 25th. Then it goes on the wane, with last quarter on the night of the 31st (morning of June 1st).

The annular solar eclipse on May 10th isn't very conveniently placed. its path begins at sunrise near the rather remote Collier Range National Park in the Pilbara and heads ENE, crossing the bottom corner of the Gulf of Carpentaria and going on over the middle part of Cape

York Peninsula, then out over the South Pacific. Annular eclipses occur when the moon's directly between Earth and the sun but not near enough to us to totally obscure the sun. The result is that the sun appears as a bright ring, an annulus, around the moon. There'll be a partial eclipse for Perth, with about half of the sun hidden by the moon. Mid-eclipse will have occurred just before sunrise. Remember, never directly observe the sun. Casting an image from a telescope or binoculars onto a white screen is safe. And, of course, there are bound to be images on the internet.

Jupiter and Saturn are the only planets visible to the naked eye all month. Jupiter's easy to find: look to the WNW at nightfall and you can't miss it because it's the brightest starlike object in view. In early May the giant planet is setting at about 7:30pm, and it sets steadily earlier day by day. In mid-May it's down by 7pm and at the end of the month it's setting in the evening twilight.

In the last few days of May Venus comes up out of the sun's glare to partner Jupiter for a short while before Jupiter drops out of sight - to see this pairing you'll need a good vantage point with a clear view low into the WNW around 5:50pm from the 26th to the 30th.

Saturn looks like a fairly bright, yellowish star in the east at nightfall early in the month. Its rising time gets earlier by about 4 minutes a day. You'll notice that if you locate it each evening at about the same time, say 6:30pm, it'll be progressively higher in the eastern sky as the weeks pass. It reaches its highest elevation (culminates) around midnight in early May, 11pm in mid-month, and 10pm by month's end.

Wild Gossip: Out and About

I have had a few very disturbing phone calls over the past weeks reporting a dog or dogs being let out at night to run up and down the contour channel between Peet and

Mackie Rds. Residents have said that the dog or dogs bark changes to high pitched and excited when prey is cornered. The following morning usually results in the finding of a bandicoot or bandicoots that have been mauled to death.

I also have had one report of a joey suffering a similar fate. It seems very unlikely that this is a wild dog as that would eat the victim where these were just played with and mauled to death, and foxes don't bark, which suggests this is the work of a dog that is fed regularly and is just killing for sport. How a Roleystone resident or residents can let their dog or dogs out at night to play in the Contour Channel is unthinkable as this is a wildlife haven which is rapidly becoming a slaughter house for our precious wildlife.

I have had a considerable number of small bandicoots, most too small to survive, come into care after being found on the ground and have been wondering what was causing this. Thoughts have varied between over population resulting in fights, being scared by predators, over active mating etc. Recently we had this happen on our property and my husband actually witnessed it. He opened the laundry door to go up to the garage and disturbed a bandicoot foraging for food on the patio area, the bandicoot startled and ran up the steps towards the garage and one of her babies fell from the pouch as she did so. My husband picked up the baby and brought it inside to me so it had no opportunity to get cold. This baby was very lucky as my husband saw it happen, picked it up and brought it in for warmth, sadly many others are not seen and die of cold very quickly. If you find a small bandicoot always remember that warmth is the first priority as they die of cold very quickly and the second priority is to get expert help as soon as possible.

Finally, I need to contact the person who has lost a young magpie with a blue leg band. It has to be lost as it is too young for release and we don't release birds with leg bands. I need to know this magpie's history to enable me to act correctly or return it to the original carer.

RKCC Writeup 2012/2013 Season Success

For the first time in 24 years, the RKCC has an A-Grade Flag, in what has been the most successful season in the Club's 63 year history.

The final rounds of the season saw A, B, C and the two E-Grade sides make the finals play-offs. Here's how it unfolded:

In a 1 v 2 semi-final, the A-Grade side was up against the minor premiers Lesmurdie Mazenod who have beaten RKCC both times this season. However they had not yet faced the wrath of a full strength Roley side and in a result few predicted other than the Roleystone-Karragullen faithful, Lesmurdie Mazeond were beaten to allow RKCC to go in to an unlikely grand final position. The following weekend then saw the winners of the preliminary final play off against Lesmurdie for their second chance and in a close match, Les-Maz prevailed for a semi-final rematch in the A-Grade Grand Final.

The A-Grade Grand Final kicked off with Les-Maz winning the toss and electing to bat on a magnificent day for cricket. With hitters still in the bank Pat Jackson and Jayke della Franca pushed the side within 7 runs of victory before della Franca was dismissed for 22. Captain Trent Stuart hit the winning runs but it was Patrick Jacksons 6 which decided the result. A massive victory for the A-Grade side! E Greens finished 3rd on the table and by winning their semi-final and beating 2nd place RKCC Whites in the preliminary final, they faced off against run away minor premiers Glen Forrest. Association representatives had written off RKCC's chances of another E-Grade flag but as was the case last season we proved that we're no push overs. But it wasn't smooth sailing by any stretch of the imagination. Both the top and the middle order failed leaving us at 6/89 with the exception of Wade Maxwell who again proved why he is a vital component of the E-Greens side with a magnificent unbeaten century, getting RKCC to a strongly defendable total of 7/186. With confidence sky high and the crowd edging them on, RKCC shattered Glen Forrest's chances by getting the two openers out cheaply and dismissing the A-Grader Sowden for a meagre 29. Fortunately for RKCC, Glen Forrest don't have a Wade Maxwell and fell well short of the target, all out for 132. Both B and C Grade were knocked out in the first round unfortunately but their efforts this season and their support for the A and E grade finalist sides, got the eventual winners over the line, helping both
