Karen
Bailey OA

In the midyear Honours List, Karen Bailey was recognized with an Order of Australia Medal.

Karen's award was based on her exceptional work in establishing and strengthening links with Indonesia, particularly in Western Australian schools.

Her journey started back in 1995 when she was still living in Roleystone and taught Indonesian at Armadale Senior High for 3 years.

(Karen had completed her own high school years at ASHS, so this in itself is amazing).

Karen was born and raised in the area. (She was a Fuller, one of the pioneering families of the district.)

Since 2005, Karen has been the Head of Languages at the Schools of Isolated and Distance Education in WA, leading and managing a department of up to 40 teachers delivering programs in French, Indonesian, Italian and Japanese to schools and individuals across WA and overseas.

In July 2010, Karen took up a temporary contract as the Principal Consultant, National Asian Languages and Studies in Schools Program, a Commonwealth Government funded position within the WA Department of Education.

A few of the things Karen has achieved include:

- President of the Westralian Indonesian Language Teachers Association (WILTA).
- She proposed and undertook a lead role in staging WA's first Australia Indonesian Film Festival.
- She established the Indonesian Language Assistant Program whereby Indonesian post graduate students come to WA for 12 months and support schools in their Bahasa Indonesia programs.
- She was the recipient of the Australian Government Endeavour Executive Award, a merit based scholarship program that provides Australian citizens with an opportunity to undertake study, research or professional development in countries within the Asia-Pacific region.

Cementing her links to the region of her childhood, in April this year Karen was able to work with Roleystone Community College organising for Balai Bahasa Indonesia Perth (she is the Chairperson).

Roleystone Community College Students worked with a film crew from Jakarta, filming an episode of an Indonesian mockumentary shown on Kompas TV called SuperMom Super Rempong. The filming of an episode was done in just under a day at the school.

Karen recalls: 'The Secondary Indonesian Language and Film & Television students spent the day working on set and getting to know the stars of the show. I spent most of the day watching the filming and was very impressed with the students genuine interest and enthusiasm in talking with and getting to know the Indonesian celebrities and film crew.' Karen is humbled by her award:

'I feel very honoured by this acknowledgement from the Australian Government through the office of the Governor-General.'

I would like to thank all those people who have worked beside me and supported me, and who share my passion for Indonesia and the importance of a strong and healthy Australia Indonesia relationship.'

Well done Karen. We are all very proud of you.



Walking 800km, carrying everything I needed in a backpack, turned out to be one of the best things I have done. It was truly an awesome and spiritual experience. Pilgrims have been walking this ancient route since the Middle Ages. In 2000 around 50,000 people walked the route and over the last 12 years this has increased to over 200,000. It is expected that the numbers will keep increasing. I commenced the walk on April 8 and finished on 11 May.

It's a great time to walk as it is early in the season with fewer people but the weather can be a little unpredictable

There is a variety of accommodation along the way but the majority of pilgrims stay in the hostels or albergues. These are reserved exclusively for pilgrims and you need to show your pilgrim passport and have it stamped. These hostels can range from 8 bunk beds in one room to 80 beds in 4 rooms and anything in between.

I loved staying in the albergues as I would throw my sleeping bag on the top bunk, put my iPod in my ears to drown out the snoring and be asleep in half an hour. You would be awake by 6am to the rustling of pilgrims packing their packs to get an early start.

Blistered feet, knee and shin problems were a common cause of people struggling to walk without pain and in some cases having to give up the walk. I am happy to say my feet held up well with no blisters. I put it down to good Aussie Merino Wool hiking socks and well tested hiking boots.

After a few days on the track people were busy lightening their packs by sending clothes home and discarding anything that wasn't essential. I kissed my favorite polar fleece jacket goodbye and left it on the track after a week as it weighed a kilo and it had served its purpose crossing the Pyrenees.

I discovered shower gel served as

a shampoo, conditioner and was also good for washing clothes. My pack weighed just over 7kg and that included my sleeping bag.

My friend Niki and I started the walk in St Jean Pied-De-Port in France and walked across the Pyrenees where we encountered snow, rain and a very cold wind.

Our first night in an albergue was with 14 other people: 2 Canadians, 2 Germans, 1 English and 9

Niki and I did stay occasionally in pensions (B & B's) so we could have the luxury of sheets, towels and our own shower.

One of the most interesting albergues we stayed in was in the semi-abandoned mountain village Foncenbadon where 12 of us, from 8 different nationalities, shared a small room with one tiny window.

Our coldest day was walking the 19ks along the Calzada Romana when the temperature was 5C and the windchill around 1C and we were wearing everything we had. The Calzada Romana is classified as 'the most perfect stretch of Roman road left in Spain' no asphalt, village, or houses anywhere to be seen. We managed to find a tumbled down barn to shelter behind to eat our lunch out of the freezing wind. We walked 32km that day.

Our biggest day was 41km and that was our last day into Santiago - we arrived at 7.30 in the evening.

Some of the semi-abandoned villages in mountains are now stirring back into life with the reawakening of the Camino. A few of the abandoned houses are now undergoing extensive renovations, giving pilgrims much needed accommodation.

This walk is somewhat of a life changing experience. For me it was the people I met from all over the world from all walks of life and all ages. These people come into your life for such a short time but for that time you share an incredible bond.

market and with 79 stalls, there were plenty of temptations to keep everyone interested.




The Fruit Fly Action Group collate all emails and inform the decision makers of resident's concerns.


What a magnificent effort to our walkers,







Editorial

JULY 2013 LINDA MOORE

Over June, I was lucky enough to have escaped the winter cold. Mike and I went overseas to Laos,

Thailand and Cambodia. Although I have been to Thailand many times and I have frequented numerous other spots in Asia, this was my first experience of Laos and Cambodia and I must admit that I was very surprised. I had always thought that I had a clear understanding of Asia and that most countries were similar. This trip made me reconsider this judgement. All Asian countries are so very different.

Laos is a small land-locked country, still with a communist government but it is heavily steeped in Buddhism. The country has a

relatively low population density.

We went first to the capital Vientiane. This city is built on the banks of the Mekong and is really showing how fast Asia is moving ahead. The place is very clean and there is a lot of building occurring but everything moves at quite a slow pace. Many of the cafes were filled with young Laotians drinking very cheap Australian wine!

We then flew into the stunning township of Luang Prabang. This is a truly remarkable place, built high in the mountains, at the confluence of two great rivers. The town has been heritage listed and so no facades can be altered, so it will retain the French neo-Colonial charm into the future. We stayed in an amazing French Hotel, Maison Souvannaphoum Hotel, where the staff couldn't have been more accommodating. If someone wants a slow, clean Asian experience this is the place. There was a total absence of coercion or hassle.

And then to Cambodia - what a contrast. This place has people on people. First we went to Siem Reap - the site of the most amazing Angkor temples. There are so many!!! They are spread out over the whole country and all are very different from each other. The Khmer Dynasty lasted for many hundreds of years and each monarch made his mark with amazing constructions.

From there we went to the capital Phnom Penh which was a very busy, modern city. The bitter modern legacy of Cambodia, the destruction of the society and the murder of one third of the population over five years, can be seen quite clearly here. A visit to the Killing Fields is a truly sobering experience. Many of the perpetrators have still not

been brought to justice as the trials still continue - nearly forty years later. Pol Pot died peacefully of old age - his victims did not.

Over the 'Khmer Rouge' time this city was deserted and, as the intellectuals and city dwellers were routed, this left a blank canvas for today's modern government. Mike had been there ten years previously and was astounded at the progress - the slums and back alleys had gone and modern shop fronts flourished. Large four wheel drive vehicles (Range Rovers and Lexus!) clog the roads.

The unit intends to use the gun for practice in dismantling and reassembling pending the supply of weapons to the Home Guard by the Commonwealth Government.

THE BATTLE FOR AUSTRALIA

Throughout the month, I've scoured local and other papers to see if there was any acknowledgement or reference to Australia's most important event - and was surprised to see nothing. Back in 1942, between the 4th - 8th May, Australians felt that invasion was imminent.

The Coral Sea Battle was fought between the Japanese, American and Australian fleets. The four day naval action was almost entirely between aircraft carriers: from the USA - Lexington and Yorktown, from Japan - Zuikaku and Shokaku and from Australia - HMAS Australia.

There were big loses of machines, aircraft ships and of course men.

In my view, the results was that Port Moresby was saved and Japanese advancement was halted. This battle was coined the Battle that Saved Australia.

We have many commemoration days including: Anzac Day and November 11th is marked as Remembrance Day. Plus many individual battles are remembered including: El Alamien and Kokoda but this battle, fought on our own doorstep, has little recognition.

In 1946, a 'Coral Sea Week' Celebration was started, mainly to thank the Americans for their part in the war.

This commemoration is scheduled for the 1st of September (which is a mystery as this date seems to have few links with the actual dates).

I believe we should surely acknowledge this vital of all battles on the correct time and date, as it was 'the battle that saved Australia'.

I salute and pay homage to those who fought in the Battle of the Coral Sea - a Battle to Remember.

PETITION RECEIVED

The following petition was presented to the City of Armadale Council Meeting 10th June.

Proposed Toilet Facility at Borello Park This petition, signed by 14 residents, was tabled by Cr Sargeson, the prayer of which reads:

We the undersigned request Council not support the proposed toilet facility at Borello Park.

The toilets have been costed at hundreds of thousands of dollars to build and \$20,000 per annum to service from the ratepayer's purse.

The target of graffiti, vandalism, antisocial, behaviour and possible environment impact will reduce the quality of the Park.

An independent survey of 1000 Roleystone residents initiated by the City of Armadale, identified 68% oppose the Borello toilet construction and prefer the money is spent in park improvement over all of Roleystone. Borello is a small park dedicated to young children's entertainment for casual use and not a large sporting facility.

Council resolved:

That the petition be received and be referred to the Technical Services Committee.



ADDRESSING LAW AND ORDER IN THE CITY OF ARMADALE

I took the opportunity to attend the Armadale community public meeting called by the Commissioner of Police Karl O'Callaghan on Thursday 20 May.

In the past, I have had cause to express community concerns with senior police over delays in response and timing to incidents in the Roleystone Karragullen area.

I was therefore interested to hear what was proposed by the Commissioner, given the current concerns expressed by the broader Armadale community.

It was interesting to hear the Commissioner say that while the police had the ability to catch and prosecute offenders, their role does not extend to addressing the many social issues that on most occasions caused these criminal actions to occur i.e. domestic violence, poor parenting, alcohol and drugs. All of these issues were at a high level throughout the City of Armadale and the Police were going to work cooperatively with the various organisations in Armadale to try to address and assist those families identified. In the near future they will be be employing an additional 12-15 police officers for Armadale, whose roles will be to address community interactions, leaving other

officers free to deal with response calls.

They need the community to use Crime Stoppers -1800-333-000 to ring and report any possible crimes that may be occurring. This is vital to addressing crime in our community. People do not have to give their name or address.


The meeting was advised that many arrests were achieved throughout this community policing role. This has included home drug laboratories, drug dealings and trail bike offenders.

The Minister for Police, Lisa Harvey, advised that they were looking at legislation to try and stop the revolving door that is occurring with some criminals. They are also looking to change the 3 strikes law that is not working as it was intended to.

All in all, I found it a very informative meeting. It was very pleasing to see that community concerns had been recognised and responded to at a high level.

Now we wait patiently for the rolling out of this new proposed Policing Management Plan to address law and order in the City of Armadale.





Grafting and Budding Ornamental and Fruiting Trees

At one point in every gardener's life they think: 'I want to grow a Fruit Tree or Ornamental plant!'

What can be better? The product of caring and patience is a delectable and delicious fruit that has come into existence because of your desire to tame the plant-world and grow your own food!

The choices to starting a fruit tree plant are grafting or budding techniques. Grafting produces an identical specimen to its parent plant (if one plant sample is used) or the offspring can have a combination of traits (if two separate parent specimens are used).

There are many advantages to grafting or budding: the ability to induce fruitfulness without the need for completing the juvenile phase, to induce dwarfing or cold tolerance



or other characteristics to the scion, ease of propagation, hardiness: Because the scion has weak roots or the roots of the stock plants have roots tolerant of difficult conditions. e.g. many showy West Australian plants are sensitive to dieback on heavy soils, common in urban gardens, and are grafted onto hardier Eastern Australian relatives.

At the July meeting of Roleystone Organic Growers, local Chris Oliver, will be explaining and demonstrating specialist grafting and budding techniques. Chris will also show what tools are needed and will cover the basics, as well as incapability problems, nurse grafts, etc.

Chris has over 40 years experience as a horticulturist, including 33 years of teaching experience at TAFE, a degree in Botany and a Diploma in Horticulture. He is also the garden coordinator and consulting horticulturist at the Roleystone Community garden.

The meeting is on Wednesday, July 10th at 7.30pm. Please note that this month we will be meeting at the old Roleystone Primary school on Robin Rd, Roleystone, where you can view the Roleystone Community Garden and the Men's Shed.

It's been busy, busy, busy, here at my house and no, the house is still untidy but I've been trying to get the weeds under control. It is amazing how easy it is to weed where the weeds are choked and not allowing the moisture into the ground.

A friend dug out my winter iris (Iris unguincularis) as they were enormous clumps. I planted small pieces eight years ago and they have really grown. They are not going out for verge pick-up but are available if others want some - just give me a ring. Each year we are supposed to cut the leaves back to show off the beautiful mauve flowers. They look

like orchids, they're wonderful at suppressing weeds, they make good border plants and they still flower in winter - even after total neglect.

In the course of digging them out, we broke the main reticulation pipe; something that had obviously occurred several times prior to yesterday. Often reticulation is laid only a few inches under the soil layer or even on top of the soil, so it is easy to forget where it is. It's a good idea when laying it to cover it with white sand or road-base or anything different to the soil that it is in, so you become aware of the difference when digging. Just as well there is a winter ban on watering.

After 12 months of virtually no maintenance on my Camellias it is amazing how well they have survived. In fact, with my bias, I know these are the easiest fuss free and most rewarding attractive plants that it is possible to surround yourself with.

If you don't believe me, the Garden Group are visiting Araluen Botanical Park on the third Thursday in July, just to see the Camellias. I think we are taking a picnic to enjoy while we are there. Anyone wishing to join us can ring Lyn, our co-ordinator.

The Garden Group had a magical day on Thursday, with two full car-loads of us heading to Zanthorrhea Nursery. I bought mainly tube-stock but also a 'Cousin It' Casuarina. I needed it to fill a planter shaped like a head and I'm very happy with it.

Mainly the plants I purchased are 'small growers' that can clump along the Brookton Highway end of my garden edge. I have previously planted a hedge of different Correas and also some Eremophilas. I felt

Kangaroo Paws and leschenaultia would be appropriate too, as most are native to Roleystone. The tubes are so much easier when digging holes and also the plant only has the one shock so does not set-back so much.

After leaving High Wycombe we came back to Mia Flora for a feast for the eyes, the soul, and the stomach. Stan joined with us, adding another male to the group. Yes, these outings are meant to be enjoyed by both sexes. As usual John was flat out attending the gardening queries, so we were well looked after out in the sun-deck, even though we were assured that the fire was going in the other area.

We could have been sorely tempted to purchase but our car was pretty packed with all our native plants. I might mention the range of costume jewellery in the cabinets is really stunning. I found it very interesting to see just what they have achieved in the eight years we have been privileged to have this major asset on our doorstep.

I'm thrilled to say the Frangipanis that I planted over the past few years are doing wonderfully well and the Sasanqua Camellias are really coming into their own. I have wonderful blooms on my Japonica Camellias too (these seem to be flowering early): Ave Maria, Black Lace, Volcano, Nuccio's Cameo, General George Patten and Violet Bouquet.

Until next month, enjoy your garden but try to get out to the nurseries to see what is around for winter. Araluen too is a great place to visit to see a magnificent winter garden.

WELCOME DONATION FROM UCVPA

The Upper Canning Valley Progress Association has now disbanded. They were formed to campaign about Lot 62 in Croyden Road. 'Lot 62' is that beautiful property on the banks of our Canning River.

Clive Spiring, a member of the UCVPA, presented Ian Colquhoun with a cheque for over \$800. The UCVPA decided to choose a community group to donate their surplus funds to and Roleybushcare was selected.

These much appreciated funds will go towards the Roley Pool Interpretive Trail brochure. The use of the money for this project will be of special significance because of the relationship to the Canning River.

For those unaware of the campaign and outcome of the fight for Lot 62, The UCVPA argued that Lot 62 was part of the Araluen Golf Club and had been set aside at the time of development as land that was to remain undeveloped. It is unsuitable for the approximately 160 bed intensive development that the owner wanted to get the rural land rezoned for.

Contrary to the requests of the UCVPA, thousands



of petitioners, and the overwhelming majority of local submissions, the City of Armadale recommended rezoning to the WA Planning Commission.

The WAPC also recommend rezoning to the planning minister who had the responsibility to sign off on everything.

At the time, this was Allanah McTiernan. She met with representatives from the UCPVA and gave her commitment that the development plan would need to be improved before she would approve it. Shortly after these meetings however there was a change in government and the rezoning was approved.

Despite the rezoning approval, many highly restrictive conditions were imposed which probably made development of the site impossible. A development application has not been subsequently sought, and if it ever was, then it will again be strongly opposed.



City Reminds Residents To Report Hoon Behaviour

The City of Armadale is reminding residents to report the illegal use of off road vehicles and trail bikes to the Ranger Services, where life or property are at risk or to the Police when such vehicles are being driven or used on public roads.

If an Off Road Vehicle (ORV) is being used in bushland or reserves under Council control community members are encouraged to call our Rangers. When ORVs are on public roads or private property the Police should be contacted.

Armadale Mayor Henry Zelones said the City is always looking for alternatives to find the best solution for our community.

"Once again we would like to encourage residents who see such anti-social behaviour to report it to the Police immediately.

"The reality is these urban trail bike riders are usually neighbours, nephews or sons of our own community. We need to take collective responsibility for this problem.

"City Rangers cannot pursue and detain these offenders. City Rangers are not Police officers and do not have the same powers, that's why it's so important to contact the Police. "The City's Rangers have a vast area of land to patrol and maintain. We do our best to assist residents when instances of anti-social behaviour occur, however we will not put

the safety of our staff or community members at risk by chasing these offenders.

"The anti-social behaviour caused by ORVs should not be tolerated. It is dangerous behaviour and puts both the riders and members of the community at risk," said Mayor Zelones

Firstly I would like to thank Caroline for carrying the extra load while Andrea, Emma & I had a wonderful break in Europe.

She has committed many hours of extra work as generally the committee meetings, enquiries and follow-ups are spread between both councillors. I was very impressed with some of the ideas, artwork, water features and planning that is happening in Europe and will share these with the Council staff & City Councillors once I sort out the photos. At Monday night's council meeting the planning application for a new cold-store

planning application for a new cold-store facility in Karragullen was approved. This had been originally rezoned and the plans approved by the previous Councillors in 2009. The main concerns raised by local residents, traffic, noise & amenity, have been addressed by the conditions applied to the development. The vehicle entry & exit points are

limited to non-residential streets and the trucks unloading, cool room condensers /compressors are to be located inside the warehouse to reduce noise.

A 15m buffer of natural vegetation

around the development site is to be conserved and protected by a fence before site works commence and for building materials and colours to minimise the visual impact.

The recent articles in the press regarding orchardists wishing to cease operations and submit applications to rezone and sell land has been planned for in the new Local

Planning Strategy.

Under the "Hills Orchard Strategy" it states:

"In the event of the existing operators relocating, a review of appropriate zonings could be undertaken in consultation with the community and following advice from the Western Australian Planning Commission, Environmental Protection Authority and the Department of Agriculture. Lot sizes will require careful consideration in view of many existing lots having already been created as small holdings which may have no further potential for subdivision and the need to consider the context of the wider Rural area and avoid setting an undesirable precedent for further land fragmentation. It should be noted that removal of orchards does not infer an automatic right for further intensification".

"The strategy will provide scope for precinct land owners to review land uses in the Karragullen-Roleystone Hills Orchard area on the basis of planning for orderly precincts and over time provide for a transition of land use to the Rural Living zone". The City of Armadale Local Planning Strategy is currently with the State Government's Western Australian Planning Commission for assessment/approval.

I was impressed with the efforts in Europe, especially Germany to become self sufficient in energy. They are working toward shutting down their nuclear power stations and reducing their dependence on oil and gas from Russia and other countries. Most of the buildings, including houses, barns and even super markets are covered in solar panels. The countryside has hundreds if not thousands of huge windmills and hectares of solar panels. They are also growing lots of crops that are being used to create energy. This is all being done in a country that only gets a percentage of the sun we get.

We have a lot to learn.

Pax: Leadership by Rev Lesley Borowitzka



Leadership is very much in the headlines at present: leadership of our Federal Government, including roles of women as leaders, now and in the future.

It may be useful to reflect on the differences between leadership, power and authority, as we have some important decisions to make as a nation, come September. These definitions from Sister Joan Chittester, a respected leader*, may be helpful for us.

Power is the assurance that I have the resources to expect that what I want done will be done. Parents, teachers and police have this power. It is actually quite a limited thing: 'if you don't do what I tell you, I can make you suffer for it'. We see this kind of power in many regimes we disapprove of. Do we see it in government in Australia?

Authority, on the other hand has two flavours: one is 'ascribed authority': I have a position, for example, I am the Manager of this shop, I am the Prime Minister. Many may not listen to me, but I have this authority.

The second type of authority is 'achieved authority': having personal presence, so people stop to listen, which comes from particular gifts or expertise.

We may not know or like Dr Stephen Hawking, but we listen to him when he speaks about black holes. We certainly ascribe authority to our political leaders, but do we respect and listen to them?

Leadership, which is what I, Lesley, believe we crave from our politicians. It is different from power and authority. It is the ability to unite

and mobilise a group of people to manage their resources in their best interests. It comes with some personal charisma, the ability to get people with differing ideas to see a new bigger picture together. Leaders inspire a group of people to meet their own goals and stretch their vision. A good leader collaborates and serves the group, while helping individual members to develop and grow within the group.

We can use these distinctions to evaluate what our politicians are delivering. Are we getting power, or authority or the leadership we wish for? What might great leadership look like? It would unite all Australians in an inspiring vision of what we could become as a nation, what we would like to be famous for, what would make our children and grandchildren proud to be Australians.

It would not seek to divide the nation along the lines of gender, rich and poor, or ethnic origin or religion. Instead, as a priority, it would work to draw in new and old Australians, including those granted asylum, with all their gifts and experience, into a big national vision for the future. It would provide the means for all of our children and adults to develop their gifts and inspire them to use those gifts for the good of the nation. Good leadership could help us address the really important issues which will confront Australia in the future: water, food, energy and best and fairest use of the resources with which we have been blessed.

Great leadership will help us think creatively about how Australia can unite, with a shared vision as the nation of the fair go, the can-do, the wise user of its gifts and resources to benefit the whole world.

Be Prepared this Winter

Armadale Mayor Henry Zelones said winter weather conditions can greatly assist residents with maintaining their properties and ensure risk of bushfire is mitigated.

'As the cooler weather approaches many of us may become complacent and not believe bushfire is a risk. Bushfires are a risk all year around. Be vigilant and maintain your property throughout the year and keep your home and community safe.'

'Winter is a great time to reduce fuel loads and ensure your property is well maintained and prepared for the upcoming summer season,' said Mayor Zelones.

Tips for maintaining your property this winter include:

- Tree pruning remove lower branches and check power lines are clear. Use a professional contractor.
- Reduce fuel levels around the house clear long grass, leaves, twigs and flammable shrubs.
- Ensure petrol and other flammables are safely stored away, from the main dwelling.
- Ensure your fire fighting equipment is serviced and in good working order.
- Ensure all residents are aware of your

emergency evacuation plan including evacuation routes.

'You can get some great advice and hazard reduction tips by joining your local Bushfire Ready Group. Bushfire Ready Groups are a great networking tool and information source for residents living in bushfire prone areas.'

'They provide residents with a point of contact, a network of information and an emergency strategy to ensure they are prepared for bushfire season,' said Mayor Zelones.

Recent Forums Represent Community Concerns

Armadale has been host to two community forums this month, both of which have provided the community with an opportunity to have their say.

Channel 9, 6PR and WA Today hosted the Armadale: Your Suburb, Your Voice community forum on Wednesday 12 June and saw more than 400 people attend the Armadale District Hall

Armadale Mayor Henry Zelones said the Armadale: Your Voice, Your Suburb forum clearly indicated the main issues for residents in our community.

"Crime, safety and anti-social behaviour dominated the night's discussions. This clearly indicates the reasons why the community is asking for additional Police presence in our City," he said.

A WA Police Community Forum followed on Thursday 20 June at the Evelyn Gribble Community Centre with approximately 150 people attending.

"The Police forum was an opportunity for those with concerns to hear directly from the Minister for Police Liza Harvey and Police Commissioner Karl O'Callaghan.

"We were told \$500,000 would be spent on refurbishing the Armadale Police Station to house an additional 10 to 15 officers.

"Mr O'Callaghan said our district faced a range of social problems including mental health, substance abuse and parenting issues and the police force could not be expected to solve them all.

"He defended his decision to not have a 24-hour counter at Armadale police station, saying the suburb already had officers 24 hours a day and staffing a counter was not a good use of resources.


"Mr O'Callaghan reiterated his promise of extra officers at Armadale for community policing tasks such as stopping children alone on the streets in schools hours or late at night, hopefully targeting the social issues we face in our community.

"We hope this increase in commitment from the WA Police will help our community feel safer. The City will continue to work with WA Police and the State Government and advocate for the additional resources required for our rapidly growing community," said Mayor Zelones.

Astronomical Highlights July

Can you feel the planet going a bit slower than it did a few months ago?

Aphelion is on the 5th: the time when the Earth's at its furthest from the Sun, and travelling at its slowest. Our current distance from the sun is about 152 million km, compared with about 147 million km at perihelion in early January. The Earth's orbital speed is now 29.3 km per second, compared with 30.3 km per second at perihelion.

Being a bit further from the sun in July means getting somewhat less solar heating than in January. About 7% less. So you might reasonably expect the southern winter to be colder than the northern, but it's not that straightforward. The southern hemisphere has more ocean, while the northern hemisphere has more land mass. Water holds heat better than land.

Once the sun goes down and the twilight's fading, you're bound to notice Venus standing out as the brilliant "evening star" in the WNW. Gradually over the coming weeks and months, Venus will be getting further east of the sun and setting later and later. It reaches "greatest elongation east" (47°) on November 1st. After that, it slips back westward relatively quickly, staying in view just long enough for a short stint as Christmas Star before passing between Earth and the sun in early January.

The only other planet of note is Saturn which is a fine telescopic target, but looks like nothing more than a mediumbright, yellowish star to the unaided eye. In early July Saturn's high up in the NE

sky at dusk, passes due north and almost overhead at about 7:45pm, and sets just to the south of west at about 2am. Mid-month it's high overhead as you face north at dusk, and sets just to the south of west around 1:10am. By month's end Saturn is high up in the NW sky at nightfall and it sets just to the south of west shortly after midnight.

In late July Mars and Jupiter will be visible low down in the NE at daybreak when most people are likely to be snug in bed and not at all tempted to go out and look. I'll probably struggle for a short while with my conscience and then go back to sleep. The two planets will be rising at the same time, about 5:50am, on the 22nd. Thereafter Jupiter will rise before Mars. Jupiter's the bright one.

In two years from now, July 2015, the New Horizons space probe will reach Pluto and we'll find out at last what that distant, lonely little planetoid looks like. You may find it odd that, even though it was found back in 1930, we still have no more than the foggiest idea of Pluto's appearance. There are no close-ups; no space probe has ever been there. Uranus and Neptune have had only one earthly visitor: Voyager 2 flew past them in 1986 and 1989 respectively.

The major phases of the moon in July are: new moon on the 8th, first quarter on the 16th, full moon on the night of the 22nd, and last quarter on the 30th. Watch for Venus and the crescent moon in the western evening sky on the 10th and 11th.

Wild Gossip: **Bandicoots**

There seems to have been an invasion of Bandicoots into this area recently which may be due to lots of their territory being built on as our urban

development continues - or maybe they just like Roleystone.

Bandicoots are usually nocturnal but now seem to be an around the clock experience due to the massive population increase. Normally Bandicoots are very territorial, males will aggressively defend their territory and females will also attack intruders. Females also have cannibalistic tendencies and will kill and eat both the babies of intruders and their own.

At the moment most rules seem to have been put aside and we have this massive population explosion.

The Southern Brown Bandicoot is a delightful marsupial with a body length of approximately 33cms, a tail length of 12cms and a long pointed nose.

Under normal circumstances Bandicoots would spend the night searching for food both on the surface of the ground and

by digging small conical holes to feed on insects, worms, snails etc. Bandicoots would normally spend the day sleeping in a nest constructed on the ground from leaves, sticks and grass.

As I have said, these are not normal times as the Bandicoot population has increased in this area, so now we have Bandicoots foraging for food both day and night. We can help by putting out water in shallow, non-tip dishes, they also enjoy vegetable peelings and food leftovers. We must also avoid the use of snail pellets which are highly toxic to Bandicoots.

The increased Bandicoot population in our area has also resulted in more road kills than usual.

If you hit a Bandicoot you must stop to see if it is injured or dead, if injured it will

need to go to the nearest wildlife carer or vet and if it is dead the pouch must be checked for young. Remember the pouch faces backwards. If young are found they will need to be kept warm and taken to the nearest wildlife carer.




