

Roleystone locals Jessica Hayes and Gavin Zimmer are Telethon Adventurers, and love making a difference. They have just left Western Australia to take on the mighty summits of Bolivia in South America and are appealing to Roleystone Courier readers to follow their journey and donate to the charity which provides funds for research into childhood cancer.

In late July, Jess and Gavin left for Bolivia where they will be attempting to climb four summits: Pequeno Alpamayo (5379m), the right wing of Condoriri (5630m), Huayna Potosi (6088m) and finally Illimani standing at 6462m!

Jess first became an adventurer in 2010, when she joined the AHG Adventurers climb of Mont Blanc in France. That year Jess raised \$23,000 for the charity. In 2011, shortly after meeting, Jess and her partner Gavin left to climb Mt Kilimanjaro in Tanzania. Jess reached 5700m but was rushed down due to altitude inflicted cerebral oedema. (The summit was 5895m - so close!) Gavin and 4 of the team pushed through to the top.

After their return to Perth, Jess and Gavin decided they needed a new challenge and began looking for new trips, an expedition to South America hit the spot and they began pulling the trip together for the Adventurers.

All Telethon Adventurers cover expedition costs by themselves and Jess and Gavin hope to raise at least \$20,000 each for the charity. Their family and friends have been involved in the fundraising doing sausage sizzles, hosting a Stand up Comedy night and helping run a Superhero dress up fundraiser.

When they return home, Jess and Gavin will be hosting a highly accomplished 'Australian Mountaineer for an Evening' in September and all readers who would like to attend are welcome.

The couple don't just go overseas for their adventures - they love exploring in Australia and one of their favourite pastimes is hiking on the Bibbulman Track. Quarantine Risk with the Importation of Grapes

It has come to the attention of the Grape Grower's Association of WA that the Federal Government has approved the importation of Californian table grapes into Western Australia.

This approval has been given as part of Australia being a signatory to World Trade Agreements.

The first shipments of fruit are expected to arrive from Wednesday this week via Perth International Airport.

It is imperative that this fruit be prevented from entering our local Canningvale Markets. Recently the Department of Agriculture and Food WA (DAFWA) advised that it disagreed with the science being used as evidence that importing table grapes into Western Australia would not be detrimental to our local fruit industry. DAFWA then provided a submission in response to the Federal Government's Biosecurity Advice 2013/06 highlighting where they believed the risks were greater than documented by Biosecurity Australia.

The entire grape industry in Western Australia is at risk:

Pierce's Disease

This is a devastating bacterial disease present in the USA which requires the replanting of infected vineyards. Pierce's disease has only one known vector, the Glassy Wing Sharpshooter.

This pest is currently not present in Australia and hence it has been determined that without a vector, the risk rating of this disease being able to enter Australia is accordingly low. Yet Pierce's disease has also found to be

spreading in Oklahoma yet the Glassy Wing Sharpshooter is not in that state.

Red Blotch Virus

This virus is new to the USA (2008) and very little is known of its biology. What is known is that the disease reduces yield and delays maturity which in many cases causes a complete crop loss. The vector for this disease is still not yet known.

Therefore the risk analysis must assume the worst case scenario as the unknown vector could be prevalent in WA and subsequently pose a high risk. This has not been the case in the DAFF report. There are no treatments for this virus other than severe heat treatment which will then render fruit useless.

Some viruses can also be transmitted by contact and the situation with Red Blotch is unknown.

These two diseases alone could have catastrophic repercussions on the entire grape industry, i.e. table and wine.

State Legislation currently protects our industry from any imported grape material. The Federal Government has NO RIGHT TO OVERRIDE STATE QUARANTINE LEGISLATION!

The wine and table grape industries need your support. Please get onto your local member and express your concern.







From The Archives

Canning Mills was the first large population settlement in our area, with over 400 people living there in the mid 1890's. The following article shows a facinating view into the timber milling past, now almost forgotten. Thanks to Gordon Freegard for the photographs from the White Collection.

A VISIT TO THE CANNING **JARRAH SAW MILLS**

Reported in the West Australian, 5th December 1893

The old saying is that there is nothing like Leather, but if this refers to its durability then West Australians may disagree. When the question of durability arises it would be better, in this colony, at any rate, to allege that there is nothing like jarrah.

This timber, which is really a mahogany, and which can be put to quite as good and ornamental uses as the famous timber from Honduras, is now fast acquiring world-wide reputation, and the trade is growing apace.

a recent use has been, found for it in London and other cities, which promises to give a great stimulus to the trade. It has been discovered to be a most valuable material for read-making, when cut into suitable blocks, and is better able than any other material to stand; the wear and tear of the incessant traffic of the City of London.

Its increased cost over other road materials is far more than compensated by its vastly greater durability and suitability, and although strong and interested efforts are being made in London and elsewhere to prevent the use of jarrah for street paving, a majority of the councils are deciding in favour of our hardwood, and the trade in consequence is bound to grow enormously.

The jarrah tree grows on the plain as well as the hills, but the superior variety found on the ironstone ranges, were it is particularly sound as

Here the bush loses its eternal sameness and becomes varied, majestic and even beautiful.

Tall trees, rear their heads aloft on the steep and rocky ranges.

Tier upon tier; palms, luxuriant growth would bear fruit-trees and vines

in abundance.

Streams and water courses pour down these verdant hills, and although the reservoir which supplies Perth prevents much of the precious fluid from running to waste, simple modes of conservation will serve to irrigate miles and miles of country.

There certainly would be no need to fear that the city will ever suffer from a water famine, as a supply for millions could be collected and conserved in these hills alone.

The Canning Jarrah Mills,

although some 20 miles out of the city, and over a thousand feet above the sea level, are reached by rail. The enterprising company which purchased the station about three years ago have constructed a railway connecting with the Eastern line and the former is, I may almost say, amongst the engineering wonders of Australia. This line, called the Zigzag.

The range is mounted by a series of lines rising tier upon tier, zigzag fashion, and the train is alternately pushed and pulled by the engine until the summit is attained. As one mounts higher and higher tho air becomes rarer and more exhilarating, and a lovely panorama unfolds itself. An area fully equal to that of three or four British counties, lies at

In the far distances is the Indian Ocean, with Rottnest Island nestling in its bosom, its gleaming sands and snowy white buildings and lighthouse showing up quite plainly at what must be a distance of fully thirty-five miles.

Nearer at hand the Swan and the Canning rivers mark a sinuous silvery course, whilst, the quarry at Rocky Bay forms a clear land-mark and nearer still is Perth itself, looking like an imposing city.

Still nearer, and almost nestling at one's fest, is the pretty village of Guildford, whilst settlements here and there dot the wide-spreading scene, and stimulate visions of the time, let us hope not far distant, when the virgin bush will be cleared away, and in its place we shall see scores and hundreds of smiling farms and vineyards.

As we rise we pass bluestone and granite quarries, where tho commencement of a very important industry, in which quite a large amount of capital is being expended, are to be seen. Higher yet, we passed gardens and orangeries, then, after much puffing and straining by the engine, the summit is reached, and a fairly level distance of six or seven miles until we reach the timber station itself.

The appearance of a typical forest settlement Small Timber huts and houses are everywhere to be seen, dingy grey in appearance, inseparable from each other.

The many dead trees around are of the same, grey colour; whilst old logs and lumber axes are scattered about the place.

Inside the Mill the whirr of machinery at work in the long, low sheds, or mills, as they are called. Huge jinkers, for hauling-timber, pass along, wearily dragged by teams of heavy-eyed oxen, who look more stupid than patient as small puffing and snorting locomotives whisk along.

The railway trucks are laden with the rich brown coloured timber; and there are many signs of life, bustle, and activity. In the company of Mr Frank White we are treated to an excellent luncheon, the menu including young lamb from the recent Guildford Show. It would have easily passed for well-grown fat mutton.

Conversing with the manager, I learned that there is a

community of about 400 people at the township, of whom 150 men: are employed, at the mills, or in felling and, hauling timber, the total wages paid out ranging from £1,800 to £2,200 per month. So it will be at once recognised that this is an important local industry.

Grouped about the station are several stores including the office, where a staff of book-keepers and accountants are 'kept easily occupied, and where also there is that great convenience of modern times, the telephone, communicating with the head office in Perth.

There is also a Government school, the company giving the use of a room, which the Board of Education have come to regard as their own.

Also present is a postoffice and a hall which serves as a place of public entertainment and also of worship.

Whilst briefly describing the community, it should also be mentioned that there is a doctor who has a well-equipped surgery. Plus the town has a general store, belonging to the company.

We first visited the Yankee, an American mill, where the timber is being cut, with such rapidity it is almost amazing.

The huge logs are hauled to the bench, cut into the requisite lengths by the aid of twin and circular saws of various dimensions ranging from 5ft. 6in in diameter, the refuse either going on to a heap where it is destroyed, together with enormous quantities of sawdust, or it is sent down to Perth as firewood.

Editorial

The large earthmoving vehicles ripping up the tarmac and piling the earth into mounds ready for the Skate Park, certainly brought me a sense of satisfaction last week.

Now it will soon be a reality and I am sure the young people of our community will embrace it enthusiastically.

This has been talked about and debated over many years but always the major stumbling block was about 'who would finance it'. Advocating about why something should happen and finding a way of actually making it happen, are two very different things. So I for one, am very appreciative of both groups of people - a community needs 'those who ask the questions' but it also needs 'those who achieve results'. Well done to all.

I am reminded of other great achievements across our community. Looking back over decades of Couriers, it is interesting to see how 'progress' has occurred. Someone raises an issue, debates rage, letters are written, folks get passionate, organisations which will fund/achieve it are found and then, occasionally, the result is achieved.

Hindsight is a wonderful thing as rarely does anyone recall the passion and the angst that went into getting something to happen (or preventing it from happening.)

For an example of how our community can stop an 'unwanted bit of progress', one need go no further than the massive community pressure which prevented the development of Lot 62, Croyden Rd. This was alluded to in last month's Roleybushcare report.

I believe that this one issue, generated more correspondence for the City of Armadale, than any other issue in the history of the Shire.

We sure know how to say no!

But sometimes many across the community say 'no' but others say 'yes' and the decision makers have to toss the proverbial coin. I am happy to say that, generally, we are a mature society and we move on gracefully.

How many folks now recall the angry debate about whether to allow the Restaurant to be built over Picnic Rock (this is now the delighful location of Brackenridge and Roleys on the Ridge).

This was a popular and historic public place but now most of us can appreciate that the new structure is also a beautiful use of this location

We know how to acept the umpire's decision! The development of Springdale Park created a massive community outcry. Councillors were embroiled in controversy over their insistence that the town needed larger sporting facilities. Debate also raged over whether to shift the Roleystone Fire Brigade and in more recent times the location and nature of the 'new school'.

We are all waiting with bated breath to hear the decisions about the future of the old Primary School site and whether the iconic oval can be retained.

Plus, we are only now recovering from the misguided push to downgrade Araluen and

do away with our cherished Spring Tulip Festival. Personally, I am very pleased that another 100 000 bulbs have been planted this year, so we can all go in and appreciate the wonder of this special garden.

There are lots of other 'still current' debates raging like the 'Toilets in Borello Park' issue.

Go back into history and in 1919, the town was divided on whether to build the new oval on land next to the Hall (now the Roleystone Theatre) or to develop it on more level land donated to the community by Harry Cross; the outcome gave us Cross Park.

Even before this, the townspeople were in uproar in 1912 when the new church/hall was built (now the 100 year old Roleystone Community Church Building). When a newly appointed Minister arrived he decreed that there would be 'no dancing in the Church' so the community went across the road and buit a new hall, outcome, our lovely theatre.

We sure know how to get what we want!

So thanks Roleystone. It is great to live in a community which is cerainly not moribund!

Dogs Should Be In Control

After numerous differences of opinions with owners of unleashed dogs in Roleystone, I feel compelled to write a few lines.

I have looked up the Council rules regarding dogs off lead in parks (in particular Cross Park) & it states:

"All other reserves owned by or under the care, control and management of the City of Armadale are dog exercise areas where dogs may be exercised off leash provided they are kept under control at all times."

I think I must have differing views to others regarding the "kept under control at all times" stipulation. I would have thought that this would mean that the dog returns to its owner each and every time when called, and does not run up to dogs that are on lead and not return when called. Obviously not - apparently it doesn't apply if "He's friendly" or "She just wants to play" or "He's just a puppy" accompanies the free running dog.

Don't get me wrong - I can see that it's not always possible to get your off lead dog to come back, but the accompanying

argument of "Perhaps you should go elsewhere", rather than the expected apology, is really annoying.

There is a reason that people keep their dog's on lead and I would have thought that they have just as much right to exercise their dogs as those who choose to have their dogs run free.

I was a professional dog trainer for many years, yet it still astounds me that people are so rude and allow their dogs to be rude too. Some dogs don't want to (or can't) socialize with others, so your dog being friendly, a puppy or just wanting to play makes no difference at all.

After training obedience dogs for over 20 years and using Cross Park off and on during this time, I am offended to be told to take my new dog to another park, just because others see it as their right to have their dog approach mine.

Please, let's have some consideration for all park users.



Results of Local Trial of **Fenthion Completed**

Following the looming ban of Fenthion, the main chemical used to spray fruit to prevent Mediterranean Fruit Fly, the Hills Orchard Improvement Group campaigned and was granted a one year extension which permitted commercial spraying on a restricted basis. One of the stipulations was that the group needed to monitor

their own use of the chemical on commercial orchards across the district.

The members provided samples for testing (MRLs,) randomly and at their own cost over the season.

The results of the HOIG tests are shown in the attached table.

No test result exceeded the MRL standard of 0.20mg/kg for peaches and apricots, 0.25mg/kg for nectarines, plums and pome fruit, and 0.30mg/kg for persimmon/fuyu and 0.40mg/kg for cherries.

The Hills Orchard Improvement Group has now completed their report on the HOIG MRL voluntary tests completed this season, as well as reviewing the nationwide trials that were also conducted. HOIG also paid for a complex review of the results completed by Mark Imsides aka Dr Chemical.

This report has now been sent to the APVMA and will soon be available on the HOIG website at www.hoig.org.au

The HOIG Orchard Fenthion Trial establishes that the use of Fenthion under the existing permit applying in Western Australia produces Fenthion residues that do not exceed the relevant MRLs.

HOIG therefore recommends that the APVMA continue the existing permit and establish a similar trial for a three-spray regime with a 10-day withholding period in the 2013-14 growing season.

in defence of controlled burning

Since the big fires a few years ago, those opposed to controlled burning have kept quiet. However, there are signs that they are stirring again. At a recent public meeting about Aboriginal burning, a woman rudely shouted that she wanted less burning, not more. The following short article was written in 1968 by Mr L.D. O'Grady, an experienced forest officer. It was found in the former Forests Department library, by Mr Roger Underwood, another forester. It may be of interest to folk in Roleystone.

To Burn or Not to Burn L. D. O'Grady

Forest Notes 6(1) 1968 (Internal publication of the former Forests Department of Western Australia)

Found in 2011 by Roger Underwood, former Forests Department officer.

Despite the tremendous losses, both in life and property, caused by uncontrolled fires there are still many learned, and unlearned, people who for various reasons are opposed to controlled burning.

While the main aim of controlled burning is a precautionary measure against destructive summer fires, the practice is also justified on the score of the improvement brought about in the forest environment and tree growth.

In 1947 the annual spring burning of the Banksia sand plain bush external to the Collier Plantation was commenced and has been carried out annually as part of plantation protection against external fires. Though much of this original country is now occupied by houses, a section of approximately 50 acres is still more or less in its natural state. A point to remember is that when an area is burnt over yearly the burn is usually patchy i.e. a patch burnt this year may not burn the following year, or the

year after that, but would burn probably every third year. Under these conditions it is rare to scorch the foliage of the dominant species

Results over the 20 years show a noticeable increase in Banksia stocking and a more striking and prolonged display of wildflowers.

The Headmaster of the local school was so impressed with the wildflowers that he requested we refrain from further burning off. He was still not convinced when told that the healthy trees and the floral display were the result of regular controlled burning. This particular teacher, a very keen nature lover, has left approximately 5 acres of the School Grounds as a native garden. This has been left unburnt, with the following result — after almost 6 years the area is a dangerous fire hazard, scrub growth is dense, and withered looking, and objectionable species tend to flourish at the expense of the smaller floral types. It is also interesting to note that all the Jarrah trees on the reserve have lost approximately 90% of their crown, are stagheaded, and the trees are on the way

To summarise - 20 years of annual controlled burning has resulted in a healthy stand of Banksia and associated species. The scrub has been kept under control and healthy with the result that there is an excellent floral display during most parts of the year.

By contrast an area not burnt is in a poor state, and the Jarrah trees are dying out. The dense scrub growth has no doubt taken possession of the site to the detriment of the large trees.

Peta then became the ships curator on board on its subsequent inaugural voyage around Australia & was featured on the front page of the October 1994 issue of the Roleystone Courier.



Vandals Caught and Charged



Aircraft Noise


At last, some prospect of relief from the aircraft noise blight that has dogged Roleystone and other suburbs for nearly 5 years.

Family Centre this coming Sunday afternoon, August 11, from 1.00 to 3.00 o'clock. Some of the material being distributed by ASA requires critical examination.

Like many others I have been rebuffed by ASA countless times with complaints of aircraft noise, even measuring specific instances and suggesting that Roleystone is noisier than suburbs twice as close to the airport.

In a trial conducted in 2011 the aircraft noise was measured and reported as "Short Term Noise Monitoring Program Roleystone WA" a damning indictment of ASA's WARRP changes in 2008 confirming the noise blight. It is noisier at night in our dormitory, semi rural suburb of Roleystone 20 odd kilometers from the airport, than it is during the day time.

The day time noise background was measured at 43.1 dB LAeq going to 49.7 when aircraft are taken into account. At night, the background is relatively high near the shopping centre and oval at 35.8 dB LAeq, at my home it just cracks 30, but at night when aircraft noise is taken into account it measures 50, actually above the daytime noise!

Few places in the world suffer from such blight from aircraft noise; where it is noisier during the night than the daytime. At 50 dB LAeq night, the measured aircraft noise equates to 40 dB LAeq night in a bedroom, some three times higher than the WHO recommended bedroom threshold level of 30 dB LAeq8.

Whilst the proposed trial by ASA of an alternate air route is welcomed, their history in this matter suggests that their integrity has been bought into question to such a degree,

that nothing they say can be taken at face value, ASA are very much like the person who sets fire to the back of your house, then rushes around the front to grab a hose and yell fire, fire, fire! The information issued regarding the Roleystone trial on their web site is open to question. Remember this is only one of some 7 flight paths that cross the district.

ASA has suggested that AS2021 is a standard for sleep disturbance; it is not, such assertions are not only wrong, but present a danger to health. AS2021 (Aircraft Noise Intrusion -Building Siting and Construction) is simply a standard for land use planning and how much noise resistance such as double glazing and the like that has to be built into a home within 15 km of an international airport! It also assumes that all external doors and windows remain shut! Even so the levels in AS2021 are some three times higher than the WHO recommended threshold levels.

A health based standard, AS2107 (Acoustics - Recommended design sound levels and reverberation times for building interiors) is an appropriate standard for assessing noise levels in bedrooms and accords better with the WHO guidelines.

Concerned residents are getting together for a "pre meeting" at the Country Club at 7.30 pm on Tuesday August 6 to compare their experiences and discuss why ASA seems incapable of ensuring aircraft keep to their designated flight paths and designated altitudes on this, and the other six flight paths that cross the Roleystone district.



TRIAL OF A MODIFIED FLIGHT PATH—ROLEYSTONE

From 22 August 2013 Airservices will run a 12-month trial in response to community feedback and a recommendation from the Aircraft Noise Ombudsman.

The trial will modify a flight path that currently overflies the Roleystone area and relocate it several kilometres to the east. The current flight path is being modified to reduce the impact of aircraft noise for more than 4000 residents.

During the trial the flight path will be modified, meaning it will be further away from Roleystone, Bickley, Byford, Carmel and Martin and closer to Bickley East, Pickering Brook and Karragullen.

Airservices will closely monitor the trial and consider community feedback during the evaluation and decision-making process.

Representatives from Airservices along with the Aircraft Noise Ombudsman will be available at several community information sessions, which will be conducted on an informal drop-in basis.

Feral Dog Causes Sheep Deaths

Recently an aggressive, feral white dog has been causing extensive damage to households in Karragullen.

The dog has been behaving aggressively towards my young children and has growled at my father while he was working in his shed, before the dog was seen off.

Over a period of several days this dog was seen inside our sheep yard twice but left by jumping the fence when challenged. On Wednesday night it was chased out of our sheep yard by our neighbour. It had killed three of our pet lambs and sheep, injured two and injured a pet goose.

Our neighbour was not able to pursue the dog as he felt the dog may turn its aggression towards him. It seems to have killed the sheep by bringing them down, holding them down and choking them to death before moving onto the next.

The same thing happened in the early hours of Friday morning. One pet sheep has been killed and another severely injured. The dog we are looking for has been identified very confidently as the dog in the photograph.

It is an American bull terrier type breed, fairly large and thick set, it's body is white, short haired, it has a distinctive dark patch over its face and a distinctive thick brown leather studded collar.

This dog is accomplished at quickly killing small / medium sized mammals such as our hand raised, very tame pet sheep and lambs. It has also behaved inappropriately towards children and adults at least three times in recent weeks.

I would urge anyone who has seen this dog in the Karragullen and eastern side of Roleystone to contact the City of Armadale Rangers department on 93990111. The Rangers have provided assistance already but as the dog does not seem to be registered or microchipped we need to find it through public assistance.

GARDENING NOTES By Jean Evans

After the cold of the early mornings, it is lovely to get out into the sunshine and idle the time away. I always find there is something that needs doing and so the day passes until the cool of evening comes in. I recently returned home from an Australian Eco trip. We drove back from Albany and this gave me the perfect opportunity to collect plants from nurseries and friends along the way. My friend Robbie, has the same type of garden as mine and enjoys the same plants, so we have a constant swap of cuttings and rooted plants.

On her recommendation, I called at 'Poppy Patch' in Mount Barker and purchased three different Cornus, (Dogwoods): the red stick one, the evergreen one and another, one is known as wintersweet.

I collected loads of different Hellebores and also another Helliatrope (known as cherry pie). I have had one under a cherry tree and, although it is still really small, it has survived with no care for about four or more years.

Needless to say the car was quite full, but I still called in at a native nursery that had a number of eremophila tubes. There were other varieties that I want for naturalising the area near Brookton Highway. I have mainly planted small growing plants to provide more shelter for the Bandicoots. (There appears to be a thriving colony in my garden, and I often see the many little diggings as they fossick for worms.)

The Roleystone Garden Group had a large gathering at Araluen last week and we welcomed Stan, Peggy and Fiona to our normal group of regulars. I was delighted to see so many Camellias in bloom. The flowers at Araluen are consistently larger than most people grow them and I appreciated my two eight year old grandchildren reading the name tags on the bushes.

There are of course some varieties that we desire to purchase but these are not commercially available. On the second Monday night in August the Camellia Society members will be demonstrating, how to graft.

This way you have the opportunity to try your hand at this fun project, thus increasing your stock.

You need understock and usually there are plants for sale for just this purpose. Then take the cut off branches home, poke them into a peat and sand mix and grow your own under-stock for future seasons. One year, I broke a piece off Kanjiro, made fourteen cuttings and got fourteen plants. We are not usually that lucky, but Kanjiro is beautiful in its own right, so I was pleased with my achievement.

Normally, other than subduing weeds, this is a time to read the catalogues to see what bulbs and plants we need to order for summer flowering. Also there are a lot of books that need to be read, so find a sheltered, sunny spot, a comfortable chair, maybe even a rug for the knees and soak up the sun. We still need the rain, but what better way to get natural vitamin D.

Until next month enjoy the outdoors when you can and remember any plants planted under the eaves still need a drink.



ARALUEN NOTES

Springtime

The first of our 100,000 tulips should be in bloom around mid August spreading ablaze of colour through Araluen to the end of September. It's also the perfect time to see Daffodils, Azaleas, Camellias, Rhododendrons, Magnolias and many other spring flowering plants. The train will commence operations Saturday 10 August and will hopefully run through until the end of October. Pool

With Stinton Creek dry and the water level very low in the Pool it was a good time to clear the silt that was building up around the silt trap across the entrance to the pool. After so many weeks without rain the day the excavator started work removing the build up of silt, it started to rain and a small trickle of water started flowing over the dry creek bed.

The team managed to clear quite Araluen Botanic a bit of the silt away although the flow of water did make it a little more difficult. They also managed to remove some of the more evasive weeds, trees and fallen logs from along the edge of the creek. Next time you visit the Park have a look at the work that has been done around this area.

No 2 Car Park

While we had the excavator in the Park we put it to another use and that was clearing some extra space on the edge of the No 2 car park. This will give us some extra car parking and also storage for mulch and wood. The excavator isn't the only big piece of machinery that we have had in the Park. The other monster was a large machine that just ploughed its way through huge piles of green waste turning it into fine mulch. What the green waste monster couldn't handle was feed into a mulcher that made short work of some very big logs. The garden team enjoyed having all this heavy equipment in the Park as it made a change from things like rakes, blowers and shovels.

Hi everyone

Many thanks to Linda for submitting an article for me in the June Courier as I was still out in the desert near Alice Springs!

I have now returned and have many amazing memories of working with the Scientists day and night on species collections. Every day we went out with different Scientists concentrating on their speciality, but always open to collecting and bringing back 'presents' for others to share at the end of the day. Here is a brief rundown of my daily activities -

Day 1 - Off by helicopter with the Botany and Lichen team. Hunting for elusive species and getting back to my grass roots - being a botanist at heart! This was my favourite day as I got to see many plants which I had learned about in the past - and I was delighted that my memory from my university courses was able to dredge up prior knowledge and understandings!

Oh – and we had to send smoke signals when our lichen guy became separated! We had tried to direct him by 2 way radio to join us but to no avail. The other teams were very entertained over the 2 way radios, by our efforts at giving directions, waving bright red jackets across the hilltops and finally lighting the fire!

Day 2 - Out pootering! Collecting True Bugs by whacking shrubs and trees, catching the fallout in a net and then 'sucking' up tiny (1 - 2 mm) bugs via a pooter was fascinating. Basically pootering is a way of collecting the bugs quickly, efficiently and without damaging them, plus without sucking them into your lungs. It was actually quite difficult to organise the equipment and work on your own - it would have been helpful to be an octopus! We may have collected some new species.

Day 3 - Heads down looking for trapdoor and tarantula spiders. I learned that the female of some species can live in her well constructed burrow for up to 40 years! She waits for a male to walk by - sometimes for a very long time!

After dinner we went ultraviolet scorpion hunting! How amazing to see these active and ferocious creatures by UV light- easy to spot up to 3 or 4 metres away. We just had to be careful we did not step on any other nocturnal creatures as we searched through the spinifex.

Day 4 - Gone fishing! The desert waterholes have about 9 species of fish and we hauled and threw nets. I am not so good at throwing the big heavy net out but still managed to catch a variety of fish. We had fun hauling - just like



prawning – and Totally Wild had fun filming us!!! They spent 3 days with us filming the scientists and teachers at work.

After fishing, Michael (the fish scientist) joined me Skyping to some of my classes back at school. The children asked some really interesting questions and showed they had done some research about desert fish. The internet managed to cut in and out but – hey – we were way out in the middle of Australia!

Day 5 – Reptile hunting. The weather was a bit cooler than hoped for but we explored the bush, river beds and rocky outcrops by day and went stalking at night. Pit traps and net traps were checked daily- making sure you did not put your hand in on a death adder, as they like to hide in the sand.

 \mathbf{Day} 6 – Bee happy! I spent a day with the bee people-learning about our tiny native bees and using a variety of collecting techniques. The best way to collect insects- by far- was with Annette! Originally called Priscilla- this net is on a frame on top of the car and works all day.

At the end of the trip the collecting bag is unzipped and a huge range of stunning and alien-like insects – including tiny bees - is revealed under the microscope. Many of these bees make their nests in the hollow stems of dead plants making them very hard to find. I thoroughly enjoyed my Bush Blitz experience - working alongside scientists and sharing daily adventures with 4 other teachers. Being able to connect to some of my classes by Skype and via the questions on the website was fantastic and brought my experiences directly into my school. Finally, I have re-invigorated my love of both Science and teaching and the opportunities that this combination allows me to experience and share with children!

Thanks to Earthwatch TeachLive for making this unique opportunity available and to ASTA (Australian Science Teachers Association) for their support.







Isn't it wonderful to see the Skate Park starting to take shape nearly 3 years after the idea was first raised?

The amount of work put in by the City of Armadale staff, skaters, scooters, BMXers and their supporters, consultants, and the councillors has been incredible!

The placement considered accessibility, passive surveillance, and relationship of other facilities locally in the final design. Even though it has taken longer than everyone expected to get to this stage, it was worth waiting for the skate park to be included in the Cross Park Master Plan.

This means that Cross Park has a design for the future rather than looking at the individual items in isolation. The consultation and planning to get the Skate Park and the Master Plan to this construction phase is as I have said before, an example of local government working at its best.

The Cotton Bush Local Law draft has been forwarded to the Minister for Agriculture, Minister for Local Government, Water Corporation, West Australian Planning Commission, Swan River Trust, Main Roads, and DEC for comment.

The letter emphasises the need for a coordinated response in the City and provides the opportunity for these agencies to meet with the City to determine how the issues should be managed.

A report detailing the results of consultation and the city's approach to enactment and compliance will be presented to the Development Services committee in September before subsequent presentation to Council.

Day of Burn Checklist - Have you checked that...

- It is a good time to burn in your area (Check DFES website)
- Neighbours have been notified
- Winds are between 12 and 19 kilometres per hour
- A haze alert has not been issued for today or tomorrow
- The sky is clear
- It has been between five days and ten days since it last rained
- It is later than 3.00pm
- If you answered yes to all the questions the conditions are suitable for you to burn. For more advice consult the City of Armadale, DFES, or our local Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade.
- Do not leave the fire until it has gone out or you have put it out.

It is getting closer to 1 November when the Cat Act 2011 legislation takes effect. This means your cat must be registered, sterilised and micro-chipped. Cats will be required to wear a collar and registration tag to ensure any cats found can be returned to their owners. The legislation is to provide for better management of the unwanted impacts of cats on the community and the environment as well as encourage responsible cat ownership.



Pax: Paying Attention by Rev Lesley Borowitzka



I've just returned from a trip to Southern Cross and beyond, driving through the eastern wheat belt for the first time.

Names that I'd heard often: Meckering, Kellerberrin, Cunderdin, Merredin all came alive as the many straight kilometres stretched out. Flat country, far horizons and an enormous sky.

Seeing a very different landscape jolts me into seeing the hills around Roleystone with new eyes. Familiarity does breed contempt, or perhaps blindness.

The hills and valleys, the rocky outcrops, the tall trees of Roleystone even after a dry year are still green compared with the wheat belt.

I had forgotten to stop and just look. I haven't been paying attention to the changes in the seasons. I did notice the beautiful autumn colours of the orchards but only in passing. I have looked down on valleys blanketed with white fog, and looked up to hilltops lost in cloud and scarcely noticed-to my shame! Being busy meant that my mind was in my diary, or planning the rest of the day, not living in the present.

Not paying attention can rob us of so many wonders of life: missing words said to me that needed a thoughtful response. Or missing the wonderful word experiments of my grandson as he tries out new words and phrases. Missing the first moment that the orchard trees took on a yellow hue.

My wise spiritual advisor suggests this meditation exercise. Take a chair and a thermos into the bush and sit for an hour. In that hour, pay great attention to all the details that can be seen and heard and smelt from that seat. Look carefully at the patterns on the leaves, the activities of the ants, the shadows. Listen carefully to all the different sounds of the birds, the wind ... Then sit for another hour and do it all again, and notice, with surprise, what you have missed the first time.

It's amazingly refreshing. It is not wasting time!!! I guess it could work even in a city street with lots of discipline. However, since we are so blessed in our bush surroundings here in Roleystone, let us enjoy them to the full.

Leaving Roleystone is another reason to open my eyes and look carefully at what I am leaving and pay attention to the wonderful people I am leaving.

This is my last contribution to the marvellous Roleystone Courier, as Michael and I are heading off for new adventures, and very different bush, in Tasmania. May God bless you all, good people of Roleystone. Farewell.



City Invests in Local Equestrian Facilities

Upgrades on Palomino and Fletcher Park have recently been completed, allowing both parks to cater for equestrian activities in our community.

Since 2010 the City of Armadale has been working with seven local equestrian clubs in the area to develop a strategy for the provision and maintenance of space for their use.

Armadale Mayor Henry Zelones said early consultations with the clubs allowed the City to prioritise a list of works for upgrades to Palomino and Fletcher Parks so they could be used all year round and accommodate additional riders.

"Equestrian facilities are under pressure in a number of outer metropolitan areas as the increased level of development results in increased competition for land. Over the past 24 months we have consulted with local equestrian clubs to strategically consider how equestrian activity can continue in our high growth areas.


"Works at Palomino Park included a major upgrade of the main riding surface and the inclusion of a new sand area and fencing. Fletcher Park has had its grassed arena and competition sand arena redeveloped.

"The City has committed approximately \$65,000 per year for ongoing maintenance of the facilities which will be partially offset by user fees from the resident clubs," said Mayor Zelones.

The total project cost for Palomino and Fletcher Parks have totalled \$690,000 with a contribution of \$219,000 Department of Sport and Recreation Community Sport and Recreation Facilities Fund.

Astronomical Highlights August

The two brightest planets, Venus and Jupiter, are visible now - but at opposite ends of the night.

Venus is an evening object: the brilliant "evening star" that stands out in the WNW at dusk. Jupiter rises in the ENE in time to be visible low in the NE sky at daybreak. Do resist the temptation to call any object the morning star, or the evening star; an astronomer may be listening.

Planets aside, and Venus and Jupiter are the only ones that always are much brighter than any star, the stars follow a steady year-round progression that's easily modelled by a simple gadget known as a planisphere. It's not a planet-sphere, indeed most planispheres don't show the positions of planets.

A planisphere or star disc can be used to show where the brighter stars and the main constellations are at any time of night and at any time of year. The stars come back, in the same patterns and at the same times, in the same directions, year after year after year.

Planets don't: planet comes from the Greek for wanderer. If you cling to the childhood idea of an evening star (most kids aren't up early enough to see a morning star), the brightest star in the early evening, then it could be Alpha Centauri or Arcturus or Vega at this time of year.

Alpha Centauri's the outer pointer of the Southern Cross, located high up in the southern sky at nightfall. It's also the nearest star you can see at night. Arcturus is a bright yellowish star in the NW sky just after dark. At the same time, Vega is a bright white star low in the northern sky. All three are of comparable brightness, from our viewpoint. Their distances from us vary considerably: Alpha Centauri's about 4 light years away, Vega's 25, and Arcturus is about 37 light years from here. As the Earth goes along on its steady journey around the Sun, the view gradually changes. These three bright stars won't even be visible in the evening, a few months from now. There's no single "evening star".

In early August the evenings are moonless - Venus reigns supreme, and the Moon is a morning object. The waning crescent moon starts out quite fat on the 1st but dwindles to new moon, no moon, on the 7th. Then the waxing crescent, albeit a thin one, makes its appearance in the western sky at dusk on the 9th. On the 10th, Venus and the crescent moon will make a fine sight. On the 13th the Moon pays Saturn a visit. First quarter, evening half moon phase, is on the 14th. Full moon's on the 21st. Then it goes on the wane, with last quarter on the 28th.

Wild Gossip: Wild Life Carer Woes

What a strange month it has been. I wonder if maybe the dry weather has been causing it or if there is some other reason.

I have had numerous calls and admitted countless young recently, unfortunately most were too small to survive.

I had a dead bandicoot brought to me with 4 pouch young. All were less than 2cms long and sadly these young were too small to survive as their mouths are sealed around mum's teats and once they are removed they cannot reattach and so die. I recently had a call from someone who had found a small possum on the ground, it seemed too big to have fallen from mum's pouch so probably was a back-rider. I suggested that the caller wait until dark, put the young possum up a nearby tree and observe from a distance to be sure that mum returned for her baby. Sadly the caller rejected my suggestion and asked me what to feed it. I offered to visit to check the possum for injuries and maybe take it to a vet if required but the caller hung up

The following day, whilst out in Fremantle with my family, the caller contacted me as the possum was not eating or drinking. I explained that I was out for the day and suggested that the possum be taken to a vet. The caller protested that all vets were too far away and that I should return home and take it to a vet as it as it was my job. I thought that I was a volunteer! I offered details of nearby vets but the caller hung up on me leaving me to wonder where the possum was and what became of it.

Over the past few days I have had repeated phone calls starting at about 7.30am whilst I was outside feeding, in each case the caller hung up without leaving a message. I live on an acre block so unless I am nearby, I cannot hear the phone or get to it before it stops ringing and if I take the phone with me coverage stops not far from the house. On the good side, I had a lovely couple bring me a dead Western Grey kangaroo with a pinkie in her pouch (a pinkie is an unfurred joey) that they had encountered on Mills Rd near the roundabout.

The road changed a few years back but the Kangaroos, sadly, still use their old route. The lovely people were too frightened to remove the baby as at this point mum was still alive so they fetched the whole thing to me, then took mum to their property to bury her. The pinkie is bruised but doing very well. He lives in a soft sided eski on a heat pad for warmth and is eagerly drinking his bottles. The delightful little boy is yet to be named.


