



Outstanding Nominee's Win Premier's Australia Day Active Citizenship Awards

Roleystone's Dr Ian Colquboun, a founding member of Roleybushcare and chair of the Roleystone Dieback Action Group was awarded the Environmental Contribution of the Year Award at a special ceremony hosted by the City as part of its Australia Day celebrations on Sunday 26 January.

Ian has worked tirelessly both in the professional arena and wider community, to prevent the spread of dieback and minimise the impact of the disease on our State's reserves and enhancing our bushland communities. (See more about Ian's contribution on p37).

This year the City awarded the Active Citizenship Award for a person 25 years or over to two worthy nominees in recognition of their outstanding contributions to community programs.

Well known Roleystone identity, Gerry Chapman is a shining example of what volunteering is all about.

He has given endless hours of his time to various organisations such as the Roleystone Theatre, where he attained life membership for his tireless work since joining the theatre in 1976. Gerry has written notes for the Bowling Club and the Theatre, and submitted numerous other contibutions and anecdotes for the Roleystone Courier over many years. Well done Gerry.

Mayor Henry Zelones said Gerry's community service is extensive and varied, having served on the Roleystone Church

board for 30 years, been a weekly volunteer at the Leprosy Mission Op Shop and a scripture teacher at Roleystone Primary School.

"For the last three years Gerry has been a volunteer with the Adult Migrant English Program where he takes weekly conversation classes. His contributions to the local community are endless and to be highly commended."

For over 19 years, Mal Osborne has been the popular face of Armadale Youth Resources and instrumental in developing community programs aimed at creating opportunities for 'at risk' young people.

Mal is also a key member of the Armadale Independent Film Festival contributing his musical skills and industry knowledge to events such as the Australia Day fireworks celebrations, Youth Music Festival and numerous youth music programs within the community.

Many local young people in the Armadale community have benefited from Mal's mentoring and gone on to have successful careers in the music industry.

Members of the Armadale Kelmscott Memorial Hospital Auxiliary Inc., winners of the Community Group category, were acknowledged for their fundraising efforts. Since 1964 the Auxiliary volunteers have raised over \$1.4 million through running the hospital kiosk, which has contributed towards much needed equipment for patient care.

The Active Citizenship Award for a person under 25 years was awarded to James Devine, a Year 12 Chapel Prefect at John Wollaston Anglican Community School in 2013. James was a role model to Year 8 to 12 students, and was involved in fund raising for the Light Home Orphanages during his mission trips to Bible Schools in India.

Armadale Mayor Henry Zelones presented this year's winners with framed certificates and said the awards recognise outstanding contributions to the community by local residents and groups.

"The winners all demonstrate community leadership and are ideal role models who deserve to be recognised and I congratulate all the worthy recipients."

"The calibre and diversity of all the winners this year is an example of how many wonderful, selfless people we have living in the City of Armadale," he said.

Albert Della Franca and 'My Barruffini'

My name is Albert Della Franca and I live with my family in Karragullen. I have lived in this area all my life.

My grandfather Giuseppe, grandmother Caterina, father Frank, his brother Lui and sister Ann, came to Australia from Baruffini in Valtellina, Italy in the late 40's as did many others from the same region.

They came because....., they believed their family would have a better opportunity for success here than in post war Italy.

My Grandfather returned to Baruffini in 1983 to live. He renovated the original family home built by his father in the early 1900's and remained there until he passed away in 1996.

This house is now owned by his grandchildren, of whom I am one.

For the last six years I have returned to Baruffini for a month or two with, at different times, my wife, children, relatives and friends from Australia.

My father Frank was passionate about his

home land and instilled that love of Valtellina, its people and culture in me.

I, in turn have enjoyed passing on his passion to my family, friends and relatives and anyone who will listen.

In the last year, I have discovered the phenomenon of facebook and began to post about my experiences in Valtellina this year on my personal site: https://www.facebook.com/mybaruffini.

I am very interested in the history of this region, its people and especially the story of emigration to Australia by the many families that did so over the last 100 years.

The history of "contrabando", the smuggling of goods from Switzerland to Italy, of which the people of Baruffini were heavily involved, is also an interesting story I would like to know more about.

I have created the facebook page in a hope to interact with people who have a connection with, or interest in Baruffini and the area around Tirano and Sondrio in Valtellina.

It is designed to be a place to post personal experiences and stories and discuss with others our shared history. I have begun this page by copying from my personal timeline all of my posts relating to my trip to Baruffini in August and September 2013.



Jon Rides the Length of the British Isles

If I had a bucket list, which I don't, then I can guarantee that peddling from the top of Scotland to the bottom of England would not be on it.

My husband, on the other hand, has been dreaming of doing exactly that for some time and in October 2013 he achieved his goal and became one of the elite band of JOGLERS – John O'Groats to Lands Enders.

After many months of planning, reading books about it, blogs of other like minded folk and hours spent with the UK road map and pieces of string (distance!) in September 2013, we flew from Perth to London Heathrow.

We landed on the Sunday night and just 48 hours later, on Tuesday morning, we had the bike in the back of a borrowed car and we were heading up the motorway to Scotland. The borrowed car belonged to our daughter who I should point out was not best pleased with the swap she had made, her large Volvo easily held the bike and was luxury in comparison to the smaller vehicle we had hired for her to drive, she had forgotten that windows used to have winders!

Two days drive up to the very bleak and barren John O'Groats to begin the journey down the countryside.

I was the back up crew, the tour coordinator, carrier of all gear and the booking agent for our overnight stops, basically anything that required action and didn't involve peddling a bicycle.

I had determined before leaving home that I would attempt to write a blog of the trip and although I was not confident in having either the technical knowhow to figure that side out nor the dedication to complete it, I did and I am really glad

We had a blog/diary entry for each day which, when we returned home I made into a book, reading through the entries is a great way to relive what was a great trip. Blogging is something I would highly recommend, others apparently

do read it but do it for yourself!

For those who are into detail and numbers, the ride was 1724km and took 14 riding days. It took us south west from John O'Groats across the highlands of Scotland to Oban on the West Coast. From there we travelled South to Tarbet (delightful place) and across on the ferry to the Isle of Arran where the sun came out for the first time on the trip.

I don't think either of us will forget sitting at Lochranza looking across the waters enjoying a cherry and almond scone for morning tea. We crossed the Isle and another ferry onto the mainland again.

The trip down was at times confusing for the Cyclist where he managed to cycle back and forth on the same narrow country roads, I think its called being lost! We both enjoyed the amazing variety in the countryside, from the stone walls of the North to the lush green hedges as we got further South.

I am still amazed at the hills he managed to pedal up and slightly concerned at the speed at which he must have descended the other side. He had close encounters with red squirrels, deer and pheasants and stopped to let a hedgehog cross the road, but never had to fix a puncture or change a tyre, amazing!

The final day's ride to Lands End and the journey was over: 15 days, 1724km. I'm pretty sure if he had been able to, the cyclist would have turned around and done it all again the other way.

Her family lost a wonderful mother, wife and grandmother and we all lost a sensational friend. These are the hardest obituaries to write; when the person is too young and too full of the joy of life - Wendy was only 61 and had so much more to give... and be given.

Wendy was always so positive, she shone with suppressed energy and enthusiasm. Many across Roleystone will recall her as the receptionist at the Roleystone Medical Centre, always with a smile and a welcome.

Long term locals will remember her as the mother of Glen and Darren Weaver, helping out at school events or serving at their football games. Wendy was instrumental in the early days of Roleystone's Neighbourhood House, she was a committed member of this community.

She was an involved resident, a member of the tennis club, an exceptional artist and joined in with anything going. She loved reading and nature and never failed to see the beauty in everything.

Wendy loved and missed the farming life, so Earl and Wendy moved to Westdale fifteen years ago. But Wendy used this as an 'outer suburb of Roleystone', coming in to work, to visit with her mum and sister, to see her sons, their lovely wives and very soon to babysit a bevy of wonderful grandchildren.

As they had retired, Wendy and Earl were full of plans to travel, they were going camping, to climb mountains and really discover Australia.

The early discovery of cancer just after they had returned from a trip to Tasmania, was just a mild inconvenience and would only delay their leaving for a few weeks, months, perhaps a year.....

She endured and faced each hurdle convinced that she would survive and conquer it. Earl and the family stood by her. Her soul mate Earl was by her until the end.

Wendy bounced and conquered and laughed and this was the same way she tackled this cruel disease. Wendy was always going to defeat it and I have never seen anyone who could always see the bright side in everything. Even her tumour!!!

Goodbye my friend - my heart is saddened at your loss. I cannot imagine how Earl, Glen and Leesa, Darren and Emma, Pat, Ian, Donna and the grandies must feel. My fondest wishes go out to them all as to have lost a beacon like you would leave a tragic hole in their lives.

The last words are Wendy's:

I have reached the end. I have just had another painkiller & need to sleep.

I do hope you all have an enjoyable, family CHRISTMAS. I do think of you all often & thank you for being a part of my life, you mean such a lot to me. I can't believe how supportive you all are.

Earl will notify you, especially family overseas when my demise occurs. No news is good news! Earl is not good at typing his one finger emails!

Skate Park Accolade

I am sending this story to you, at the suggestion of Mrs Lesley Choules, to illustrate that the younger generation still are mostly well behaved, considerate and good citizens. To protect the subject of this letter from ribbing by his peers, I ask you to withhold my name from publication to avoid identifying of him.

I have a 14 year old grandson who, through no fault of his own, has faced problems during the whole of his school life, both socially and scholastically. Until recently, his main activity outside school was playing computer games. Then he discovered the Roleystone skate facility at Cross Park. Ever since he has spent most of the daylight hours after school and throughout non-school days performing old and new tricks, returning home exhausted each time.

Recently, his uncle (my son) visited the skate park with his 8 and 5 year old sons and was pleasantly surprised when the teenagers already there made way for the younger arrivals and politely acknowledged their father. He was further pleased by the reaction of several lads who chastised a peer for swearing in the presence of the smaller boys. He has had similar experiences on subsequent visits.

So impressed was he that he told his sister (my grandson's mother) of these experiences, including a Facebook message in which he congratulated her for her son's manners and behaviour, signing as "A proud Uncle".

Underground Power

When we heard that the recent Stoneville bushfires were started by a fallen private power pole, my wife and I looked at each other. We just knew - it could so easily have been us. Twice in the last two years our private power

> line has been brought down by falling tree branches, though in each case we were lucky: it happened in winter. All the same, we knew it was only a matter of time.

> Last September we took the plunge and went for underground power. We thought it was going to be difficult, disruptive, and very expensive, but were surprised to find it was none of these.

The first stage was to get Western Power to place a connection dome at the front corner of our block where a neighbour potentially could share it.

This was the most surprising thing: if we'd insisted that the dome be where we wanted it by our gate, the fee would have been around \$16,000, but if we accepted it in the corner, it was a flat \$681

courtesy of a State Government subsidy. We didn't argue.

Then it was our responsibility to get the power to the house, a distance of 101 metres over steep and very rocky ground. We thought our block would end up looking like a Pilbara mining operation, but no, local operator Terry Close completed the job in a day for just a few hundred dollars – a very neat piece of work. The power line was the most expensive part, mainly because of the very long run required in our case – the cable costs \$40 per metre. But the installation itself was not at all expensive and was carried out with minimum fuss by local electrician Bill Macaulay who only turned the power off for a total of about half an hour. And then it was all over – we hardly felt a thing, and there was an unexpected bonus: a new firebreak right where we needed one.

So if you have an overhead power line, I recommend you think about converting to an underground line. That way you can never suffer the anguish of starting a fire from it, and you won't come back from holiday to find your freezer has defrosted (as we



VALE Rosaria Caccetta

Sarina Carmela Tranchita, known by most as Rosaria Caccetta, was born on 6 April 1922. Rosaria was the eldest of five children, of Sicilian-born parents Michele Tranchita and Rosalia Agnello.

Rosaria and our Nonno, Antonino, met during their childhood years in Sinagra. Antonino was undertaking National Service in northern Italy, when he was told by someone the woman he affectionately came to call "Sara", was promised to another man. Upon hearing this, he wrote a letter and sent his brother to hand deliver the letter to Rosaria which read "I love you and will you please wait for me to come back".

On 25thJuly, 1940, at 18 years of age, Rosaria married Antonino Caccetta aged 24, in Sinagra. Soon after, they purchased their own property and continued to work on the land. In 1941, they welcomed their first daughter Carmela, and in quick succession came Rosalia, Antonino, Maria, Paolina and Leone.

In 1955, Antonino left his pregnant wife and six children behind in Sicily and departed for Australia in search for a better life. Calogero was then born in 1956 and for the next 5 years, Rosaria raised livestock on a shared farm, and grew fresh produce which was then traded for other necessities. Rosaria and her sons survived after the family home was struck by lightning which caused a pig living beneath the house to die.

After five years, Antonino returned to Sinagra, and in 1961, Agostino was born. Only 10 days after his birth, Antonino set sail again for Australia, only this time leaving Rosaria with eight children to care for.

Finally, two years later, Rosaria and her children departed for Australia arriving in Fremantle on 20th September, 1963. They purchased their first home on ten acres of land which is where they remained until today.

Neither Rosaria nor Antonino held a driver's license and there was only one bus a week that travelled to Perth city to do shopping. In light of this, Rosaria and her family were self-sufficient, growing much of their fruit and vegetables on the land.

In 1980, tragedy struck as Rosaria and Antonino lost their youngest son Agostino in a car accident near the family home. Rosaria especially, was overwhelmed with grief in coming to terms with the loss of her baby son at only 19 years of age.

As difficult as it was for Rosaria, she carried on with life. The company of others gave Rosaria comfort and there was always someone passing by or someone staying for dinner, there was always something cooking on the stove.

Special occasions were always celebrated and it was very crowded and very loud! The family grew so much that Rosaria and Antonino extended the house twice to accommodate the growing family.

In 2005, Rosaria lost her husband of almost 65 years and once again Rosaria was left broken-hearted. For the next 8 years she was cared for by the family and enjoyed her life with her children and grandchildren.

Rosaria was never alone, as her beloved companion Giorgio was never far from her side. Sadly, whilst Rosaria was in hospital, Giorgio passed away. We suspect he died of a broken heart when Rosaria didn't return home.

This year marked 50 years since the family were reunited in Australia.

Rosaria left behind 74 members of her extended family. This includes 19 grandchildren, 26 great grandchildren and one great great grandchild.

Her courage and strength throughout her life is an inspiration to us all. She endured great hardship and tragedy and survived the toughest of times for the sake of her family.

Rosaria Caccetta will be sadly missed by her many friends and our great big family.



Farewell Eufemia Casotti

It's almost impossible to describe an incredible 93 years of a life in just a few words.

To us, it's not because Nonna was born in a small village in Italy, or that she immigrated to this country that makes her unique or special. It's the wonderful life she lived surrounded by the love of her family and friends that we know she will be remembered for.

Nonna was born Eufemia Maria Baisi, on the 7th December 1920, daughter of Giosefata and Viola, and in 1949 arrived in Australia to start a new chapter of her life.

She met and married our Nonno, Giustino Casotti, in 1950 where they began a life together in Roleystone.

The family property was initially used to grow vegetables and over the years grew into the current family orchard of today that always held a special place in Nonna's heart.

Everything Nonna did was for the benefit of her 6 children: Renata, Clara, Peter, Nancy, Peena and Paul. She worked hard in tough conditions to provide only the best for her family. From making sure they received a good education, to buying their first cars, her children always came first.

We thought we would mention just a couple of memories. Like the time she chased Richard out of the house with a broom after bringing Nancy home late one night. Or when her and Nonno pleaded with the headmaster of Peena's Catholic school to re-enrol her after one of her more rebellious teenage moments.

However, times spent together as a family, are what Nonna would treasure most. She often spoke about days spent at Como beach and even in recent years - still pointed out the place they would go together referring to it as "our beach" whenever she passed by.

Nonna was thrilled when the family began to grow, with the addition of her daughters and sons in law and eventually welcoming 24 grandchildren and great grandchildren into her world. To us grandchildren, Nonna was an irreplaceable part of the family.

For us girls, she was like a second mother, providing guidance, helping shape us into the women we are today.

For the boys, she acted as their unofficial matchmaker, always

trying to set them up with yet another "lovely girl" she happened to came across.

Religion was always a big part of Nonna's life, devoting a large amount of her time to her prayers. You would often find Nonna quietly reading from her prayer book and her rosary beads were never far from her reach.

Nonna loved playing cards and spending time with her closest friends, with a special few having always been there for her throughout her life.

There are two fundamental skills Nonna never quite managed to master: speaking English and driving a car. One of her early attempts to drive ended in tears after she launched the ute over the creek in the orchard. Luckily we were only happy to take her wherever she needed to go.

Nonna thrived on the daily interaction with people. She was famous for being the self-appointed concierge of the shed, sitting at the front door, and greeting people day in, day out.

Nonna's personality was unforgettable and sometimes even inescapable. Her natural ability to tell a story and make people laugh was priceless. And how could anyone forget her cheeky smile when she knew she had everyone laughing, this is when she was in her element.





CITY OF ARMADALE: DRAFT URBAN FOREST STRATEGY

The City of Armadale must be commended for recognising the need to formalise and enhance what we already are aware of, and that is the City of Armadale's urban forest and landscape character.

Something that is not so evident when you drive north of the river.

In the executive summary there is a paragraph that appeals to me, that states: "By unifying, understanding and strengthening this landscape character, there is opportunity to provide future generations with a resilient, healthy and diverse urban forest canopy".

Formally recognising: 'providing for future generations' is something that should, in my opinion. be taken into account in all decision making both at local, State and Federal Government levels. It is very hard to find most of the time but extremely pleasing to see it recognised, along with our natural environment, this time.

While the submissions for this document will be closed by the time the Roleystone Courier is published, the basics of what the City hopes to achieve in this Urban Forestry Strategy are very positive.

I know there will be quite a number of submissions with suggestions, but overall it is a very positive move forward in light of climate change and as the City of Armadale continues to expand.

Cape Leveque after Tropical Cyclone Christina

On Monday 30th December 2013, my daughter, Stacey and I headed off to the airport to fly to Broome in the early hours of the morning, only to be told that our flight had been cancelled.

We returned home and headed back down to Perth airport in the afternoon, finally flying to Broome early that evening. It wasn't a very comfortable flight as we had to fly around Christina up there. On arrival the streets and car parks in Broome were covered in puddles from the heavy rain and it was just so steamy. Apparently at 6pm it was 24°C but it felt so much hotter.

Stacey lives up there and works for one of the big resorts. She had time off until 2nd January. We had a great time with some of her friends and on New Year's Eve I joined in on the Hash House walk. The theme for this walk was 'Medical' as many of the members are medical professionals and so we had to go dressed up in a medical costume. This was so much fun. For Christmas, Stacey paid for me to go on a scenic flight over the Horizontal Falls. What a wonderful experience. After flying over the falls we headed to Cape Leveque for lunch. This was a very strange experience as my father, Jim Hay, Stacey and I had driven to Cape Leveque in October 2013. At that time it had been so busy but his time there were only the 5 of us on the flight and a few staff. Cape Leveque during the dry season is the most beautiful place to 'go and chill' as they say. The beaches are beautiful and so many people from everywhere to talk to.

When we were taken to the swimming beach, I couldn't believe my eyes. All the sand had been completely washed away on both the West and East beaches. The East beach is the swimming beach as the West beach has a very strong current and is too dangerous. The tide rose 14 ½ inches in a matter of hours. This is a normal occurrence each year for the beaches to be washed away and it takes about 3 months for the beach sand to come back.

I have taken a couple of photographs of the beach as it is now. In the photograph at left, the large group of rocks in the middle, is where we used to put our towels and clothes last October. Sand covered the beach and no rocks were to be seen.

During the dry season the tide goes out to the reef and people walk along collecting some beautiful shells. When the tide is in you can see the reef and it's wonderful for snorkelling. With this last visit, the reef could not be seen as it was totally covered by the beach sand. The photo on the upper left is of the West Beach. This is a beach that is lined with large red cliffs. Although it is easy to walk along the cliffs, it is not allowed as this is Aboriginal

I mentioned that it was a pity the top of the cliffs were covered in broken bottles. Our guide told us that they were the remnants of WW2 when a secret radar station was based on top of the cliffs. This was set up to protect the west coast of Australia from Japanese invasion. I thoroughly enjoyed my day out and recommend it to anyone. There are several airlines that do this tour but I flew with King Leopold Aviation.





ANOTHER RAILWAY WANTED. Karragullen to Kelmscott DEPUTATION FROM ROLEYSTONE

A large deputation representing the orchardists and other settlers in the Roleystone portion of the Kelmscott-Armadale Roads Board waited upon the Premier yesterday morning and asked that the Government would favourably consider the construction of a railway from Karragullen to Kelmscott.

Mr Turvey, M.L.A., who introduced the party, said that the railway would serve one of the finest fruit and horticultural districts in Western Australia, in fact he doubted if there were any parts of Australia better adapted for the production of fruit and for dairying. The fertility of the land was such that given the opportunities, a densely populated district would be created there.

He regretted that up to the present, the Premier had not been able to pay a visit to the district, but the other members of the Government who had seen it had been struck with the marvellous fertility of the country. The Kalamunda, or what was known as the zigzag railway, which at present brought down to Midland Junction from the Hills District large quantities of timber and road material, had given, he believed, a fair amount of trouble to the Railway Department, and the line which the deputation was asking for would greatly facilitate matters so far as the Railway Department was concerned.

It would be only an eight or nine mile proposition to link up the line with the South-Western railway at Kelmscott and would enable the timber and road material to run on the downgrade by way of Kelmscott to Perth or Fremantle.

The population, more particularly in the Roleystone portion of the district, was rapidly increasing, and with railway facilities there was sufficient fertile soil in that part to supply the metropolitan district, if not the whole of the State, with fruit and market garden products.

If the Government could not entertain the proposal at present they hoped that the Premier would at least have inquiries made and a thorough survey put through. If that was done, he believed that the Premier would be satisfied at a later date to give the proposition favourable consideration. The outstanding feature of the benefits of the railway would be the impetus that would be given to settlement, and it was a comparatively small proposition considering the large number of people with small holdings that it would serve.

The Premier, replied saying that he was sure that the deputation did not expect him to commit the Government to the construction of the line that day. His object in receiving them was to hear from the settlers of the district some of the reasons why the Government should take the proposition into consideration.

He was pleased to hear about the fertility of the district and its possibilities in the direction of producing supplies for the local markets.

From the point of view of the working railways he was inclined to think that the proposition they had put forward was one worthy of favourable consideration, but the question at present was just how far they could reasonably go in railway construction. Already they had more miles of railway in proportion to the population, he believed, than any other part of the British possessions. It worked out at a mile for each 108 persons, and in those circumstances it was of course difficult to make the railways pay.

They were thus faced with the fact that they must see that the persons who lived in the districts served by the lines used the service sufficiently to make it pay.

In connection with the water supplies the holders of property, whether they used the water or not, were compelled to pay taxes, and he thought that much the same thing should apply with regard to the railways.

The man who held land adjacent to a railway and did not make use of the line, so that it became an unpayable undertaking, for which the general taxpayer had to answer was not treating the State fairly.

They had-to seriously consider whether a railway proposition was likely to be payable. At present he thought they had just about reached their limit. Of course, he admitted that the lines opened up opportunities for further settlement, but he did not know that the population at present was increasing at a rate commensurate with the railway construction.

They had had bad seasons which had affected the railway earnings, but he hoped they would not recur. He was not losing heart, but he thought that the districts that were well settled, and where intense culture was taking place should be the first to receive consideration, more especially at this stage. He thought it would be a distinct advantage if such producers in the district represented by the deputation were brought into closer touch with the consumers, and if the proposed line would help the railways from the point of view of working expenses and capital outlay, it was one that they might well take into favourable consideration.

Their representations would receive careful attention. They would have to consult the working railways with regard to the junction with the South Western line, and he would not make any announcement in that respect at that stage, but they would not lose any time in obtaining particulars with regard to the proposition which would provide the facilities which they wanted as producers to supply the consumers in the metropolitan area.

Hopefully, it never will happen, but a little preparation now can make all the difference, and allow choices to be made, rather than simply reacting to a developing situation.

GARDENING NOTES

I hope that, as we enter this hot period, everyone is well prepared. I feel for the people over the other side of the ranges who are enduring the devastation that affected Roleystone such a short few years ago. Noone can afford to be complacent or careless. There's so much that we take for granted and our Australian: 'she'll be right' attitude means a sort of nonchalance. Let's get back to the past in care and consideration of others. Look back to the December copy of the Courier for the 'Virtues' lift-out. You may have been so busy then and just skimmed over it.

I hope you haven't lost too many of your garden plants! Again, I have lost some camellias. I really do not mind too much because a lot of varieties were not bred for our conditions.

Among the losses I do mind are specially grafted plants like 'Alta Gavin' and my backup grafted seedling plant, 'Pioneer Ginny Megan', which should have survived as it was in the shade-house. As the plants have grown they blocked off the sprinklers spraying it and I failed to notice. Now it will need Seasol and a miracle to save it.

On the subject of Camellias, this is the time to take cuttings while the plants are still slightly flexible but could easily break off. Also keep an eye out for seeds dropping. Plant the seeds as soon as you can because the fresher they are, the more viable they are.

Stephanotis is one wonderful creeper which ought to be more widely grown. This plant starts to bloom at Christmas every year and continues through the hottest months. If the roots are in the shade the creeper happily grows and flowers in the sun.

The seeds form after flowering and the seedpod looks a bit like an a mango seed. When it is ready, it spurts its seeds to the four winds hoping some will grow. If you want to catch the seeds, either use a paper bag or a net cloth over the seed-pod and catch them before putting them in a seed-tray of good seed-raising mix. Keep moist but not wet and watch for germination.

The Amanda Young Foundation are after plants, especially agapanthus and other perennials, to use for their fund-raising effort. If you have any spare, I am sure they will be eagerly accepted. The Garden Group is always willing to assist with cuttings and assistance, just ask.

I have noticed the effect that taking out the trees along Brookton Highway has made to our home. The trees were a wonderful habitat to the quenda and rabbit populations. We certainly have a lot more diggings on the block again and the fruit that drops is eaten before I can pick it up for the chooks.

The clearing has made the noises carry so much more too. Previously it was almost impossible to hear noises from across the road. Luckily, we have solid walls and still plenty of green cover between here and the

I feel distressed when I notice all the bushland being cleared, especially the sandy dessert that now surrounds Tonkin Highway. All the trees, shrubs, birds and animals are gone, now it will take another decade for what was there to be replaced.

Keep your own little patch watered and cared for. It's all we can do as individuals. Enjoy the quiet time in the garden and only go out into the sunshine in the early morning and evenings. It is amazing what we can do in half an hour twice a day.

CAT ACT WELL RECEIVED

The long awaited Cat Act is now being implemented and greatly appreciated by

I had never really thought about the number of cats we have within the City of Armadale but on reading the numbers registered, so far, it is considerable. 1694 at this stage and this number will obviously continue to increase with the population growth.

I am sure it would have been a lot higher if the community organisation: 'The Cat Sterilisation Society', run by Cherry Leonard and supporters, had not been offering reduced prices for cat sterilisations for many years. So much time and effort has been spent by this group fund-raising and working with cat owners. Their love for cats is their motivation. They have recognised that there is a need to assist low income cat owners with sterilisation. They are worthy of wide recognition.

The City of Armadale has now received some state funding to assist pensioners and low income families with cat sterilisation. A special license is now required for cat breeders and when cats are sold they must be sterilized and micro chipped.

All cats should now be registered and are recognised by having a collar with an identification tag. If you are concerned with a cat coming onto your property and creating a nuisance or killing wildlife, the Council has cages for trapping. There are strict guidelines for their use.

We still only have one location within the City of Armadale where cats are prohibited and that is on the large Churchman's Brook Estate which backs onto the State Forrest and water catchment area.

It is very reassuring to know that those residents understand the possible impacts of cats on our native animals and accept the conditions required to live there but also the benefits.

I recognise that we do have many responsible cat owners who accept their responsibilities to the environment and to their neighbours and go to great lengths to do so.

Outbreaks Cause Concern

A recent outbreak of Queensland Fruit Fly in the Riverland, the first in some 20 years, has rapidly reinvigorated local producers' memories of the devastating crop losses suffered in the Perth Hill's region just one year ago.

This is of the highest concern to producers and the SA State Government alike as lucrative and important export markets could be jeopardised if Q Fly was to set permanent roots in the region. The Riverland area of South Australia is considered one of the luckiest growing regions in Australia and has market access that growers in other regions could only dream of.

However, this prized status comes at the expense of a lot of hard work, not just by producers, but by Local and State Government Authorities. It also takes a LOT of funding which the SA

Government is happy to commit, as they can clearly see the benefits of a prosperous food production region.

It is from the lead of the South Australians, as well as DAFWA and FruitWest, that local producers are hard at work implementing and testing other systems and products to assess their efficacy in local growing conditions. This assessment will require something that producers are very short on at the moment, TIME.

No product or system can be verified of efficacy in just one season as there are so many variables that affect fruit fly populations.

It is a sad fact that your local producers can't survive on the orchard practices that they implement, alone. Fruit fly is not just a Federal, State or Local Government issue, it is not just a producer issue. It is a backyard issue - mine, your's and your neighbour's. If this local growing region is to survive, we need as many hands pulling in the same direction as possible, that starts with controlling fruit fly in your own back yard.

There is now legislation in place within growing regions that if commercial or backyard crops are left to infest with fruit fly, fines of up to \$5,000 can apply. As a local producer whose crops' fate often lies in your hands, I am asking that you not let fruit fly get to the stage where legislative measures are enforced. Please be responsible and proactive in your own backyard. Baiting, trapping, tree hygiene, monitoring, safe disposal of infected fruit are all measures that can be implemented with no great cost to the household budget.

Control mechanisms, such as the Cera Trap, are available at the Roleystone Hardware and the Roleystone IGA at a significantly reduced price, compared to warehouse style operations. Politicians Listening - At Last

There are some interesting and critical political events taking place in the Perth Hills, revolving around the fight to keep our industry alive and profitable, whilst we continue to battle against Mediterranean Fruit Fly.

On Friday, the 31st of January the Federal Shadow Minister for Agriculture, Joel Fitzgibbon is travelling to our producing region to view the Med Fly situation.

Mr Fitzgibbon will be attending 1 or 2 site visits before a private meeting and light lunch during which HOIG will have the opportunity to discuss measures & obstacles regarding Med Fly in a semi-formal, but intimate basis. (NB This will have occurred by the time most residents read their February Courier).

The Rural & Regional Affairs & Transport

Committee will be arriving in Perth on Monday the 3rd of February to commence the Inquiry into Fenthion and the ramifications for industry if the product was to be immediately removed from usage against fruit fly.

It is a rare honour for a Senate Committee to take the time to visit our region. The Committee will be taken on field tours of several properties including: HOIG guided tours to Byl's & Ghilarducci's orchards and then independent tours of Wilkinson's & Vincenti's orchards.

I believe that this will unequivocally show our position on the retention of fenthion whilst a transition towards products/ systems, that have yet to be proven in WA field conditions occurs, will be justified.





the devastation of 2011. There is still time to trim, rake and remove the litter to give your house the best chance of surviving a bushfire.

URBAN FOREST STRATEGY

The Urban Forest Strategy is out for comment, and submissions on this were to be in by the end of the month. The Public Meeting scheduled for January was rescheduled to 11 February 2014, in the City of Armadale committee room. The public comment period has consequently been extended and now closes 4pm Friday 28 February.

An urban forest is the collection of trees that grow within the CoA and in the wider sense may include any kind of plant.

Urban forests play an important role in filtering air, water and sunlight, providing shelter to animals and recreational areas for people. They moderate local climate, slowing wind and stormwater while cooling and shading homes and businesses.

The CoA Parks and Gardens staff has already made an extensive start to this forest with 12,767 trees planted during 2010. These include residential streetscapes, tree replacements, parklands, estates and general street trees.

This is a great opportunity to have a say in how you would like Armadale to look in the future.

A great Chinese proverb says the best

time to plant a tree was 50 years ago. The second best time is right now.

E-WASTE

New legislation requires that e-waste becomes the responsibility of the electronics industry, and the Regulator has identified preferred suppliers.

Waste Services is entering into an "arrangement" with one of the preferred suppliers for e-waste recycling. E-waste

must, under new arrangements, be accepted free of charge. Therefore the COA has reduced the Waste Tipping Charge for TV and Computer Screens from \$14.00 to \$0.00. Hopefully this might reduce the number of screens being left on the side of the road and in the bush.

One of the regular queries I get is regarding the motorbikes and 4-wheel drives that are driving through the bush and private property. The drivers of these vehicles are cutting fences to gain access, causing damage to property and allowing livestock to wander. I would encourage the public to take down vehicle number plates and report these to the Police and Rangers.



I have been in Roleystone for over six months now - and I have survived!!

I delight in Roleystone and the outstanding people I have met and share with.....

Chris who is a champion at Medieval Games but cares in such a way that he wants to bring a healthy spirit to those who are struggling to cope with life;

The Wednesday, 6.30am Araluen Walkers Group who delight in the walk, the environment, in each others company and some 'morning tea' vitals in the Park before getting into their day;

Chris who was given life membership for her community service;

the great number of persons involved in conservation, care for the trees and wildlife,

and just on Wednesday morning past, a writer who returned a year ago to her boyhood sweetheart after forty or so years 'growing up' and experiencing life.

Wow!! Roleystone is so much

For over ten years I have gone down to the city foreshore on Australia Day – just to be there!! Just to enjoy our freedom, our multiculturalism, our diversity and our specialness as Australians. We survive in a world of mayhem, chaos and pain and in a world where the community within community that I belong to, is being challenged to 'walk the walk' rather than 'talk the talk'.

Too many have become prejudiced against and dismissive of the message of: 'faith, hope and love'. That is a good challenge to we Christians and although we can not re-invent ourselves with a different message of love, joy, peace, forgiveness and self sacrifice, our rhetoric needs always to be changing.

There is a story I would like to share with you from my army time:

A German soldier wrote this letter after the second World War, from a hospital bed:

'I was well forward of our front lines, in 'nomans-land', checking our land mines with some other men. Out of the smoke and mist emerged a group of Australian soldiers and there was a frantic battle.

The Australians are great bayonet fighters and we were overpowered. I was badly wounded. When I came to, I heard a noise in the darkness and reached for my weapon.

This Australian pounced on me and said: "don't you do anything stupid or I'll knock your block off. Stay still and let me have a look at your wound. You have a hole in your side big enough to drive a truck through. When we left I thought you would still be alive but in need of help, so I have come back to have a look. I'm going to dress that wound and take you back to our medical hospital."

He dressed my wound and saved my life. I had lost a lot of blood. But I told him: "Please don't take me back to your lines, my men will find me soon". He agreed and I asked him for a cigarette. He said "You light up out here and you will have every Tom, Dick and Gerry shooting at us" but he gave me a cigarette and told me not to light up until he was well out of the way. We heard a noise in the darkness just then and this Australian soldier disappeared. My men found me and now I am recovering in a German Hospital.

I would like to know more about these amazing Australians.

Fantastic isn't it when you hear such stories from other cultures and countries.

When we act with integrity and courage we put mankind above self centered ideologies and win some friends to the cause of 'Peace on Earth, goodwill towards all.'

The second presentation 'Speak Out about Diabetes' commences at 2.30pm and will deliver a broad diabetes awareness and prevention.





Astrolonomical Highlights February Greg Lowe, Perth Observatory

Poor February, sandwiched between the two bigger months of January and March: even when it has a big year, it can't match their 31 days apiece. Noting that even ABC presenters pronounce it as Feb-u-ary these days, I consulted Wikipedia and found that there are at least two good reasons for doing so. Firstly, it's right next to Janu-ary. Secondly, it's easy to say. When enough people use it, it becomes "correct". Looks like we'll never return to the ancient Roman pronunciation Februarius.

Februa was a Roman purification ritual held at the full moon every February 15th, but that was back when they used a lunar calendar. The lunar calendar got so out of whack with the seasons that Julius Caesar turfed it out and instituted his Julian calendar, the forerunner of our present Gregorian calendar. The lunar cycle, from full moon to full moon (or new moon to new moon) is about 29.53 days. At best, February can only muster 29 days. So it's possible for February to have no full moon, if there's a full moon late on January 31st. It's just a quirk of the calendar, with no cosmic significance.

This February actually has no new moon, as the new moon was on January 31st and the next will be on March 1st. By February 2nd the thin waxing crescent moon is visible low in the

western sky at nightfall. First quarter's on the 7th and full moon's on the 15th (Februa?!); that's the end of the waxing half of the lunar cycle. Then the moon's on the wane, with last quarter on the 23rd and the waning crescent phases following.

Jupiter continues as the dominant planet. At the start of the month it stands out in the NE sky at dusk, passes due north around 10:20pm, and sets in the WNW around 3:10am. Mid-month it starts in the NNE, is due north around 9:30pm, and sets at about 2:15am. By month's end it's almost due north at nightfall and sets in the WNW around 1:15am.

Mars comes next, rising just to the south of east at about 11pm. By dawn it's very high in the north. Its orange colour is a giveaway. By mid-February it's rising around 10:15pm and is high up in the NNW at daybreak. At the end of the month it's rising at about 9:25pm and dawn finds it high in the NW. Saturn follows Mars. It rises in the ESE just after midnight in early February and is very high in the ENE at daybreak. Mid-month it rises around 11:30pm and is virtually overhead in the NE at dawn. At month's end it rises around 10:40pm and is overhead at dawn.

Venus is back in view as the brilliant "morning star" standing out in the eastern sky at dawn. It comes up in the ESE, with the rising time going from 3:50am in early February to 3:10am mid-month and 3am at the end of the month.

Obviously I also buy mealworms and nectar as required for new admissions and releases of other birds.
