The Peet Road/Brookton Highway Junction

A bad accident happened on the 1st April. With the diversion due to the closure of Holden Road, this major event held up traffic in both directions and even forced road trains to divert and travel up Peet Road.

The scene was abuzz with Police, Main Roads, Fire and Rescue plus an enormous tow truck. One assumes the Ambulance was there too as the damage to the cab suggested the incident was serious.

Many Precedents to the Accident on Peet Road Corner

I guess you will be covering the truck crash at the bottom of Peet Road in which the bus shelter was creamed.

If history follows its course, like two other shelters in Roleystone that I know of, that went to the good Lord above through deterioration or structural demise by car, the Peet Road bus shelter will not be replaced.

If anyone had thought to consult Roleystone residents, especially old ones about the Holden Road closure for works, they would have discovered that Peet Road has a history when it comes to heavy transport. There used to be a sign on the light slope on Peet Road. The sign was timber on two posts with two cross beams and a sheet of metal was wrapped across. On this sheet of metal on white was painted:

WARNING STEEP GRADE ONE MILE"

It was a non-standard road sign and was there for many years. It was a childhood target for stones in passing and the last time I saw it, the sheetmetal was dished almost to the rear of the timber frame and the lettering, all but erased. It was legend then that the section of Peet Road, between Urch Road and Brookton Highway should not be used by trucks at all. The likelihood of brake fade was too real.

The whiteknuckled agitation of going downhill in an old Ford, in brake fade with two feet desperately heavy on the brake pedal, bum high off seat, bottom of steering wheel all bent from pulling against it for extra purchase, is an embedded memory. The likelihood of running out of gears, stalling the engine or breaking a transmission or axle, then rolling back out of control when driving uphill was also a real possibility.

The buses travelled in low gear down to Urch Road but did not travel the Urch Road to Brookton Highway section at all.

It has been not a matter of if but when, a truckdriver would lose control and run off the bottom. With modern power assisted brakes and steering on trucks and higher engine powers, drivers have come to rely less on anticipating and more on the reliability and power of their vehicles.

A modern automatic vehicle has only to engine stall going down the hill and it could be very interesting as power steer and brakes would be lost to the average driver.

Yet drivers blithely rip down the hill trusting entirely on the brakes and without selecting an indirect gear to keep the engine turning and supplying power assistance to a much slower road speed before it stops. Heavy transport detour should have been to Westbourne Road and not Peet Road except for local delivery.

Since the accident, there is another set of tyre marks from hard cornering from an out of control truck, turning right this time instead of left.

Autism Awareness

I am the mother of a 16 year old boy with autism.

Thanks to an early diagnosis at the age of 2, he was able to receive hours of early intervention as well as longer term programs, which have greatly assisted him to be where he is today. He is functioning at an age appropriate year 11 level, at a local school.

He is desperate for a "casual job" and has applied at numerous organisations to no avail.

One of the businesses in our location advised in writing that they were not in a position to offer any part time employment.

I could have accepted this had I not had a recent conversation with a current employee who confided with me that my son wouldn't be able to cope working there because, "the boys would tease him".

I could only assume from this comment that the decision not to offer him some sort of casual employment was due partly or wholly to his autism. I left totally dismayed and somewhat disgusted.

If this was indeed the case, I would have to suggest that the business's employees would benefit from some education about exactly what autism is.

I find it hard to believe that in these days of inclusivity in schooling that the message still isn't getting out there to the wider community that there are people in our society that have special needs but they still have the right to be treated with equal respect.

As a parent of a special needs child, I have to hold out hope that this day is not long in coming. *Name withheld*

City staff and community members.

This division has existed since time immemorial and even lead to a recommendation that a referendum be held in the mid nineties for Roleystone - Karragullen to secede from the City of Armadale. This proposal failed.

In the hills, residents have larger lots and have the impact of vast natural environmental surroundings. There is also the distance and separation of Brookton Highway which leads to a different cultural approach. This has compounded the perception of us and them, although this appears to be nowhere as bad as it was in the past.

The Council Amalgamation may lead to many of these clashes of cultures. I think of the very rural Mundaring Council being amalgamated into City of Swan, the Shire of Kalamunda to the very urban City of Belmont and of course a large portion of the Shire of Serpentine-Jarrahdale into the City of Armadale.

It is acknowledged there will be large financial costs associated with these proposed amalgamations (boundary changes?) but have the social and cultural impacts been formally identified? If these proposals are approved there should be a lot of thought go into the best ways to blend these new city/ rural partnership right from the beginning. If not it may disrupt the balance that exists in these rural-hills localities for many years.

I think this is worth considering? Pat Hart

This month, instead of an editorial I am offering an opinion piece.

WHAT WORKS IN ADVERTISING???

As the owner of the Roleystone Courier, I am often asked: 'does advertising in the Courier work'? My reply is: 'it depends'. But there are loads of folks who believe it does.

I am no guru - but I have been around this business for 8 years and I have watched many businesses try to get their message out there. Obviously, I have a vested interest in this area - advertising pays our printing bill, and allows us to all keep reading the Roleystone Courier month after month. But advertisers in the Courier, even the nicest and most benevolent of them, do not advertise purely for socially altruistic reasons - they want to sell/promote their product, service or event.

I have collected a lot of evidence to show that advertising in the Roleystone Courier can achieve results. Some folks put an advert in and pull it out quite rapidly because the business builds up too quickly. Some find that: 'go large when you want to attract attention' and 'go smaller when you just want to keep your name and number out there' - works for them. Some, like Vogels Plumbing, have advertised with us for 38 years!!!

But some folks find their advertisement does not seem to generate the response they would wish.

Print Media

I still genuinely believe in print advertising. In our community, if you want locals to see and use your service or product, then you cannot beat advertising in the Courier. Will it always work? Well it depends on what you are advertising, how your advert looks (size, colour, readability.....,) and a wide range of economic and social factors. But most importantly it depends if the person looking at it, sees it and wants what you are advertising. Those last bits are up to the advertiser to sort out.

Technological Based Advertising Modes Internet, Face book, email lists, telephone. These are not my core business but I am an expert for two reasons. Firstly, I have recently been exploring these methods and secondly, as a consumer who spends a lot of time on my computer and telephone - I know what I hate!!!!

My Hate List

1. Cold call telephone calls, pretending to offer me something I didn't ask for.

 2. Junk Emails pretending to know me and offering me something totally useless.
3. Internet adverts that flash up on my screen when I am trying to do something else.

Call me cynical; but if an advert causes anger in the receiver, it cannot possibly work to sell the product or idea!!!

Recently, I have been marketing my book (and I apologize, up-front, for my enthusiastic marketing stance.)

I have tried many and varied types of promotion. Obviously the one that works the best (by a country mile) is word of mouth. And thank you to all of the beautiful folks who have been kind enough to help me out in this regard.

But the methods that have stunned me have been the ones linked to Social Media. Initially I was not a convert. Personally, I am not a fan of putting blatant advertising on purely social sites. It defeats the socialness and chattiness of such forums. (I think a lot about blurring the line between information/education and advertising!)

I was told that the 'way to go' regarding promotion is to set up a Face Book Business Page. I did so and I have worked on this dutifully.

This was wonderful - at first

But over the last two months I have found this to be less and less successful. The stupid rules on 'face book advertising' make the whole process frustrating and useless. Running a Business Face Book page has become decidedly 'Unfriendly'. My main gripe is that the posts are just not going anywhere. My faithful friends who are kind enough to comment are seeing them, but no-one else. And every time I want to do anything, Face Book flashes me a message suggesting I pay for what I used to get for free!!! I recently saw this blog....

Do you feel like the posts you're making from your business page on Facebook are largely ignored?

You're not alone. Sure, maybe some of your posts are getting ignored by some of the people who are glancing at them. But there's a more obvious reason for the dip in your Facebook fans' engagement; "most of your fans aren't even getting the chance to ignore your posts, because they never see them in the first place." Why? Well, Facebook is intentionally limiting the number of fans who see your content. And they've admitted that it's part of their plan to increase those restrictions in an attempt to get you to PAY for further reach (through promoted posts and advertising).....

ie Face Book has listed on the stock exchange and the shareholders want to get paid! We are even being encouraged to dob in others who advertise on face book personal sites. Insidious I say.

Perhaps Facebook and the web works for some. For me, it is not justifying the time and money spent. But the other side of this rant is that I should stick to what I know. I will continue to use and promote old fashioned advertising - like an advert in the Roleystone Courier. You pay for it, it goes in. Readers know what is advertisement and what is not. They can decide. **So what do you think????**

Brown Rot Disease

City.

Locals may have noticed a rise in the incidence of brown rot in the fruit and vegetables they have purchased.

Apparently perfectly healthy items are consumed by a brown, fungal growth and this can occur very rapidly if fruit is left at room temperature.

Often the producers and grocers selling the fruit are 'at a loss' because no sign of the fungal spore shows when the fruit is picked, packed or sold.

This disease was introduced into Western Australia fairly recently and, anecdotally, was due to the relaxation in quarantine conditions.

Good news has surfaced with UK researchers identifying a new way to control this disease. Researchers at the University of Kent and East Malling Research have identified a new way of controlling a fungal disease that can have a devastating impact on the UK's valuable cherry and plum crops. Brown rot disease, caused by the agent Monilinia laxa, attacks stonefruit as well as causing blossom wilt and twig canker.

Traditionally, this has been controlled through the use of fungicide treatments, but in some cases these are now becoming ineffective. Now researchers from the two organisations have identified a new strategy for controlling the disease, using biological control agents derived from isolates from UK cherries and plums. The researchers identified 12 possible isolates and then narrowed this down to two via a series of tests on detached fruit. Controlled sets of cherries and plums, with and without the biological control agents added, were placed in conditions known to induce the onset of brown rot disease.

Professor Peter Jeffries, of the University's School of Biosciences, said: 'Brown rot disease is a major problem for the UK's cherry and plum producers and in a growing number of cases traditional fungicide treatments are becoming ineffective.'

'Our research found that microbial antagonists against the brown rot disease can be found from indigenous sources in the UK and that they are capable of preventing the disease in controlled conditions.'

'The challenge now will be to see whether these biocontrol agents can be adapted commercially and be used by the stonefruit industry to control brown rot disease.' Current research with commercial companies is formulating the two strains of biocontrol agents and conduct pilot commercial trialling of formulated products. Source: University of Kent

At both Joondalup and Subiaco, appreciative audiences were entranced by this unique way of bringing historical fiction to life.





ROLEYSTONE/KARRAGULLEN ORCHARDISTS TAKE CONCERNS TO THE LEGISTALITIVE COUNCIL

On Wednesday April the 9th, at the invite of Shadow Minister for Agriculture - Ken Travers - a committed & spirited group of 25 Hills Orchard Improvement Group members (myself included) gave up valuable harvest time and put their lives in the hands of fellow member & bus driver, John Gregorovich. The HOIG members boarded the bus and took on 2 of the greatest challenges known to mankind - early morning peak hour traffic snarls & the current inhabitants of the Western Australian Legislative Council. Our mission?

To find unilateral support for a credible, proven & long term solution to the omnipresent threat of Mediterranean Fruit Fly, one which would alleviate the fear & uncertainty surrounding the future of the local fruit production industry.

The local producers were greeted warmly on the steps of Parliament by Opposition Leader, Mark McGowan, Ken Travers, Darren West and our own 'local product', orchardist's daughter - Rita Saffioti.

From there, media questioning was conducted regarding the current dire state of affairs and any hopes that producers had to secure the future production of a valuable food supply industry.

Following this, the producers entered the Legislative Council to view a Non-Government Motion on Orchardists. The ensuing debate, far from being combatative, all sides of Parliament agreed that a credible solution to fruit fly control which transitions away from traditional chemical usage needed to be found sooner rather than later.

Much of the discussion focussed around the need of a full and total commitment to Area Wide Management, as well as the emerging technologies revolving around mass sterile fruit fly release.

The issue was of such significance, that the time of debate actually ran out with numerous Senators yet to express their views. All sides of Parliament were impressively committed to working on a united basis on this issue and the HOIG producers were extremely pleased to not see their plight politicised or used for points scoring within the Senate.

After the Senate Motion, the HOIG members were greeted in a Parliament courtyard by Minister for Agriculture, Ken Baston, as well as Senate members from all sides of Parliament to discuss industry issues, principally, the fruit fly issue.

A small delegate of the HOIG group sat down with Minister Baston, and his staff, discussing the appalling crop losses of the preceding seasons, as well as fears for the upcoming years.

HOIG reaffirmed it's commitment to be an integral part of any solution that helps producers transition away from chemical usage.

Minister Baston was very open to HOIG's concerns and expressed his own view that he did not wish to see any agricultural sector's demise, but would rather see all sectors expand and flourish.

New technologies regarding sterile fruit fly release were discussed and precedents of successful worldwide usage of these methodologies were considered and agreed that action needed to be taken and that time was of the essence.

HOIG would like to thank both the Minister & Shadow Minister for Agriculture, as well as all Senate members who took time to speak within Parliament, or meet our members personally.

It was a morning of open and honest discussion, one that boosted the flagging morale of a once proud industry that was certain of it's future.

The time for discussions is rapidly drawing to a close and the time for action and commitment is now.

The community at large can play a hand

The ensuing debate, far from transitional period to being combatative, all sides of Parliament agreed that a credible solution to fruit fly control which transitions away from traditional chemical usage needed to be found sooner rather

in assisting this occur by lobbying the State Government and Opposition to commit to funding, trialling and implementing systems that have been proven to work internationally and assist local producers

in their solid commitment to maximise the reduction of chemicals.

To the dismay of commercial producers, at this point we are seeing bits and pieces of internationally proven systems being picked out by DAFWA and held up as a solution.

This is a piecemeal approach of minimal effort and commitment that will undoubtedly lead to the demise of the local industry and is not only being forewarned by HOIG, but also by national peak representative bodies such as Summerfruit Australia Ltd (SAL), amongst others.

It is the producer who is the person in closest contact with the chemical usage point, we have as much stake as anyone in seeing this commitment through to the end and our care and concern for the consumer is of utmost importance in the daily operations of our businesses.

ANZAC DAY FEATURE The Parkin Family: A Lesson in True Sacrifice

Anzac Day is a time to remember those who have defended our land and our way of life: in times past and present. A particularly poignant example of such sacrifice exists in our own community with the Parkin family. When one considers the war contribution made by the Ryan family in 'Saving Private Ryan,' the Parkin's of Roleystone clearly rivals this sacrifice.

If you visit the Roleystone Hall there is a Roll of Honour. The name Parkin appears several times (in fact one name is missing - M.R Parkin who served in the RAF). Mr and Mrs A.J.H Parkin were married on the 25th April 1905, a date that was to become so significant a few years later. The whole family: mother, father, eight sons and two daughters moved to an orchard on Holden Road, Roleystone in 1920. Next time you are on the veranda at the Roleystone Country Club reflect on the view that this family used to gaze upon. All of the children, except the two eldest, enrolled at the Roleystone Primary school.

When war was declared in 1939, all eight sons enlisted almost immediately.

So how did their war end up? W.A.A (Bill) Parkin joined the 8^{th} Division signals. He was taken prisoner in Malaya in Feb 1942 and spent the remainder of the war in various prison camps including Changi.

The next eldest J.O.W (Jack) Parkin was not initially allowed to enlist. He had to manage the orchard. However sister Joyce and wife Dorothy, with some outside assistance, were able to relieve him and he enlisted in the Army accounts section in Perth.

M.R. (Roy) Parkin joined the 2/11th Battalion. He served in Libya and Greece where he was killed in action.

M.G. (Max) Parkin joined the RAAF, where he served as a driver and mechanic. He served out the war in Britain and in the eastern states. After the war he went to Indonesia and later Japan, doing airfield construction.



R.G. (Keith) Parkin was a policeman and not allowed to enlist.

C.O. (Charlie) Parkin joined the 2/3rd Machine Gun Battalion. He served in Syria and was captured in Java. After a period of internment in Indonesia he was shipped to Japan. The ship was torpedoed by an American submarine and sunk. After many hours in the water Charlie and 71 others (out of a total of 250 Australian POWs) were recaptured and sent on to Fukuoka near Nagasaki. Charlie lived through all of this to face the lethal atom bomb 'Fat Boy' dropped on Nagasaki. Even this couldn't kill him in spite of being only a short distance from Ground Zero. Charlie survived the attack and the war. He earned the praise of many of the local people for helping them to evacuate children from the area.

D.W. (Doug) Parkin was the first to enlist. He was a 39er, that is he enlisted before the end of 1939. He saw service in Libya, Greece, Crete, Syria and later New Guinea. Tragically he was killed in action.

G.V. (Geordie) Parkin) was the youngest brother to enlist. He joined the $2/3^{rd}$ Machine Gun Battalion also seeing service in Syria and later in New Guinea.

W.G. Savage (Warrick) (Joyce's husband) served in the

RAAF as ground crew in Libya and Palestine. He was wounded in action and repatriated. In thinking about those who went to war and their sacrifice we should never forget their loved ones left behind at home and the anguish they were enduring. Just a few days after farewelling Geordie and Charlie, the terrible news of Roy's death would have been received. Ten months later they were told Malaya had fallen and Bill had been captured. Less than a month after that they would have received news that Charlie was missing in action. It was more than a year before the family heard that Bill had managed to survive.

This left just two brothers, Doug and Geordie still in action. As the war was nearing its end these two were placed in the same unit in New Guinea. Then the final tragedy struck with Doug killed in action just 8 weeks before the war ended!

The horrific outcome of their war makes the following ring hollow. (This article appeared in the West Australian Newspaper - date unknown).


Fighting Family Seven Sons Enlist - a Magnificent Record

'A remarkable record of service in Australia's armed forces by a Western Australian family was revealed yesterday. Of eight brothers, seven have enlisted in the army and air force. The eighth is a member of the State Police Force and is not permitted to enlist. The eight brothers are the sons of Mr and Mrs AG M Parkin of Roleystone where Mr Parkin has an orchard...... When this family record was brought to the attention of the General Officer Commanding the Western Command Major General JMA Durrant, he expressed admiration for the spirit which had prompted such complete service to the country.

Following your characterisation, Clifford Hulme has at last found some understanding; many generations after his execution. Your empathy and compassion was immensely gratifying.

I found the way you brought together the threads of these people's lives was amazing. Your writing style is so easy to read and this book is a real page turner.



What is remarkable, is that in spite of the dark subject, this book exudes warmth (although I must admit I had a tear in my eye at the end). You have captured the essence of so many facets of pioneering life: war, love, home life, relationships. I think 'Secrets Mothers Keep' will be talked about long into the future. Thank you for writing it and I cannot wait for your second book.



PTSD Awareness Day

Parliament recognizes an Annual PTSD Awareness Day PTSD, or Post Traumatic Stress Disorder is more common in society than most of us think, and with the sacrifices and courage of our service men and women just having been recognised again with the ANZAC Day ceremonies, it is a good time to spare a moment to recognise the facts behind PTSD. Importantly, it is not a condition that is solely experienced by members of the Armed Forces; any traumatic event



can lead to PTSD, and the ramifications can be felt for an extended time, often without the person knowing what they are going through. Police, Fire and Ambulance Officers, teachers, shop assistants, anyone at all can experience PTSD if they have been exposed to a traumatic situation, especially if the exposure is prolonged or repeated, and the old attitude of having a stiff upper lip and bottling it up inside is contributing to the issues.

Symptoms such as reliving the event, hyper-alertness, emotional detachment, insomnia, worrying, irritability, being in situations that trigger rage and depression, are some of the outcomes.

On the 9th April, Parliament finished a debate and agreed to set aside the last Friday of every May as "Invisible Wounds: PTSD Awareness Day". The call for this recognition was made by the Partners of Veterans Association WA, a Western Australian group, and was supported by both sides of the House. It was a pleasure to see members of the Association observing the debate in the Upper House, including Association Vice President Judith Firth, a local resident and long-time campaigner on the issue.

May 30th 2014 is therefore Invisible Wounds: PTSD Awareness Day for the State, and there will be an information booth set up in Murray St. Mall for the day, as well as other events.

If you are suffering with PTSD, either personally or trying to support a friend or loved one that is suffering, there are resources available to help. It is not weakness to admit that you are suffering, and reaching out may make all the difference in your quality of life, and the lives of those around you.

Intrigue, thievery and heart break... continued...... The Dutch History of the Tulip

The Dutch History of the Tulip During the second half of the 16th century, news of the extraordinary flower reached Europe and seeds were then sent to the prefect (Clusius) of the Royal Medicinal Gardens in Prague. This event marked the arrival of the Tulip to Europe.

Some years later (1593), Clusius fled to The Netherlands for religious sanctuary and became the curator of the Leiden Botanical Gardens. Although these gardens were planted chiefly for the supply of herbs and plants for medicinal purposes, Clusius had brought his huge collection of Tulips (rumoured to be one of the most impressive in Western Europe at the time) with him and so planted these also in the gardens.

Historians say that Clusius was a selfish gardener. He was keeping his beloved Tulips to himself and refused to sell or share them with anyone - despite many generous offers. Naturally, with their growing popularity Tulips aroused intense interest and some Tulip devotees became so desperate that they eventually resorted to sneaking into the gardens and stealing some. Apparently this act so disgusted Clusius that he gave up any dealings with Tulips. He never even grew them again.

However, now that the Tulips were 'set free' from the botanical gardens there were plenty of others willing to grow the bulbs. Speculation on Tulip bulbs began building quickly as the middle and upper classes sought them as the ultimate symbol of wealth and prosperity. Along with avaries of exotic birds and large, decorative fountains, there would always be Tulips in the garden of any self respecting Emperor, King, Prince, Archbishop or member of the aristocracry. Often mirrors would be

set up in the garden to give the illusion that the owner had been able to afford to plant many more tulips than he actually had.

Until 1630 the bulbs were grown and traded only between connoisseurs and scholars but more commercially minded people soon noticed the ever-increasing prices being paid for certain Tulips and thought they'd found the perfect "get rich quick" scheme. And so the popularity of the Tulip increased and more and

more people became caught up in the trade. Groups of speculators were meeting regularly in the local inns to buy and sell Tulip bulbs. (The innkeepers of the time really flourished!)

It wasn't long before the majority of the Dutch community became obsessed with these flowers. Those who could not afford the bulbs settled instead for art, furniture, embroideries and ceramics which featured the flowers.

Many of the gorgeous Tulip water colours painted during this period are now considered works of art but were, at the time, painted for catalogues with which to tempt buyers into ever more extravagant purchases. It was only ever the most expensive Tulips (ie those with 'broken' colour) which were painted.

Since bulbs were sold by weight, most people were speculating on the future weight of the bulb once it was dug. All investors had to do was plant some bulbs and sit back on the reasonable assumption that the bulbs would grow whilst in the ground. It was like making money out of thin air and hence this speculating also became known as "the wind trade".

From the period of 1634 to 1637 bulb prices sky rocketed as 'Tulip fever' spread like wild fire amongst the normally solid and sensible Dutch. Bulbs of one or two Guilders could be worth a hundred Guilders just a few months later and bulbs would change ownership several times before they even bloomed for the first time.

The period between 1636 - 1637 was known as 'Tulipomania' and absurd things happened. A single bulb could be sold for the price of a house in one of the best parts of Amsterdam. Late in 1637 the inevitable 'crash' happened and many people lost everything they owned although some of the rare varieties still commanded very high prices.

The story continues next month with the Araluen history of the tulip!



After the talk you are welcome to stay and talk to other wildflower enthusiasts







Fremantle Doctor not pushing that far inland but a lot is to do with the Urban Heat Island soaks of tar-seal, rooves, driveways, footpaths, and the lack of trees and grass. The difference was actually even greater when he dropped his friends back later in the day.

Hopefully the City of Armadale's Urban Forest Strategy will work to overcome some of these problems.

The areas I would like to see us start with are along the major arteries into the City, for example Albany Highway from the intersection with South West Highway and Armadale Road to Kelmscott.

It would be great for people to realise they have arrived in our City by the green entries. We have a great team of horticulturists who have made giant strides over the last few years to beautify our City, as can be seen in the gardens and parks we enjoy and in the letters congratulating them on the work being achieved.

I believe we need the benefits provided by trees, such as shade, improvements in air and water quality, reductions in energy use and the links to improved physical and mental health for our community.

We need to make our City more heat resilient by the simple act of planting more trees, and I'm pleased this is being strategically considered.




Our Sponsors are very important to our Club, and we are lucky to have some terrific local business and Perth based companies investing in RJFC.

Astro Highlights May Greg Lowe, Perth Observatory

The month of May this year brings us views of four out of the five visible planets, though not all at the same time of night. Mercury's out of sight, too close to the sun for observation. Jupiter continues to be the brightest object other than the moon in the evenings. At dusk it's in the north-western sky. It sets in the WNW around 9:30pm in early May, 8:40pm mid-month, and 8pm by month's end. On the 4th the waxing crescent moon will be just to the left of Jupiter at nightfall.

Mars is still bright but its brightness is gradually diminishing - opposition was three weeks ago and the distance between Earth and Mars is increasing as we zoom away from it on the inside lane. Earth's orbital speed is about 30 km per second; Mars does about 24 km per second. The further a planet is from the sun, the lower the orbital speed. You'll find Mars, still noticeably orange in colour, well up in the eastern sky at nightfall in early May. As the weeks go by, its altitude increases so that by the end of the month it's high up in the NE sky at dusk. It culminates (reaches highest altitude) very high in the north at about 10:20pm at the start of the month, 9:15pm mid-month, and 8:15pm by month's end. It sets in the west around 4:15am in early May, 3:05am mid-month, and 2:15am by the end of the month. On the 11th around 9pm the moon will be just above Mars.

Saturn's also visible at nightfall. At the start of the month it's low in the ESE as the evening twilight fades. By mid-May it's higher and easier to see, and by the end of the month it's well up in the east at dusk. Opposition is on the 11th. That's the alignment of Sun, Earth and Saturn, in that order. It's the best period for observing an outer planet because the planet's at its closest, therefore looks its biggest and best, and is up all night. Saturn culminates high overhead around 1am in early May, midnight in mid-month, and 11pm by month's end. Generally the clearest views of a planet (or other celestial object) will be had at culmination - it's when the shimmer of our atmosphere is minimised. In early to mid-May, Saturn is still visible at daybreak in the western sky. By the end of the month it's setting just after 5am. In the early evening of the 14th, the moon will pass between Earth and Saturn with the result that Saturn will be occulted (hidden) from view for about an hour. Start watching at dusk - evening twilight.

Venus continues to prompt calls to the Observatory along the lines of, "What's that *really* bright star in the eastern sky in the early morning?". To me, it's remarkable that so many people just suddenly "discover" Venus when it's been around for ever. But we're not all astronomers, are we? Still, from time to time I encounter someone so out of touch with things that they could easily be people of the dark ages, believing that the Earth is the centre of the universe. Anyway, Venus, the "morning star" if you will, rises in the east at about 3:40am in early May. Then its rising time gradually gets later: about 4am mid-month and 4:20am by the end of the month. On the 25th and 26th, Venus and the waning crescent moon will make a fine sight for early risers.

The moon starts the month in the waxing crescent phase, grows to first quarter (evening half moon) on the 7th, and keeps on growing to reach full phase on the night of the 13th-14th. Then it starts to wane, with last quarter on the 21st and new moon on the 29th. The new crescent moon should be visible in the western sky at dusk on the 30th and 31st.



I am still getting lots of calls regarding roof space invaders but can only offer the same advice I have given before. If your roof space invader is a possum, it will

usually leave around dusk and return around dawn. Depending on your roof and its access the process of arriving and leaving can take several hours and be very noisy. Mine usually starts at about 7pm and lasts until about 9pm when the possum goes out to eat, then starts again at about 5.30am until about 7.30am when the possum returns to sleep.

Rats have no specific times and tend to run about day and night at no specific times.

Possums are usually very clean animals and will not foul where they live, so they go out to pee and poo. Rats pee and poo everywhere and the evidence is often seen as a yellow stain on the ceiling. A good way to check what is living in your roof is to go up into the roof space and look for droppings – possum droppings are quite large usually about 2cms long whilst rat droppings are smaller at about 1cm long and much thinner. A sample can sometimes be helpful for me to make an identification. Once it is established what is living in the roof then steps can be taken to remove it.

If the guest is a possum then you will need to watch and see where the possum is exiting the roof and when it has left quickly secure the area so that it can't get back in. This can be harder than it seems as possums are very clever and can easily remove an insecure blockage. My husband actually watched a possum come down and try to remove the mesh he had just installed. He tried to shoo it off with a broom and the possum fought back quite vigorously. The possum was back in the roof the following day. Rats are even harder to deter as they can get in through the smallest of gaps. We have a tin roof and the ends provide a perfect entry; the only solution would be to seal every corrugation which is both impractical and expensive.

We use live catchers as a way of keeping numbers down without killing animals we don't want to kill. Naphthalene flakes (moth balls) are said to be a good deterrent but now have been declared a carcinogenic so perhaps these are not a good idea. I will be sticking with my live catcher and releasing the possums I catch! Please contact me for help for or
