

Thomas Buckingham Junior aka Hugh Carder and his wife Hannah aka Reilly, were the stars of the show A Long Way From Devon. This performance celebrated the Buckingham Family. Thomas Buckingam Junior's father was the first settler to take up and farm land in Roleystone.



Aspects of Mr Thomas Buckingham Junior's life were presented to an appreciative audience in St Mary-in-the-Valley Anglican Church in Kelmscott on 30th April and 7th May as part of the annual WA Heritage Festival.

Many of the audience were Buckingham descendents.

The drama was written by Hugh Carder, with themes from Thomas Buckingham Junior's diary. The work was commissioned by the City of Armadale Local Studies Librarian, Susan Hall, and enacted by City of Armadale Library staff, the Rev Ben van der Klip and Carder family members.

Thomas Buckingham Junior and his father farmed on 5550 acres (this is now a large part of Roleystone) from the 1860's.

There are only ruins left of the old home but Thomas Junior's cottage at Poplar still exists and is inhabited.

Thomas Junior, a true pioneer, worked hard at many tasks to make a life for himself and his family in a number of places within Western Australia. He hauled timber and other freight with his trusty bullock team and set up a waterpowered saw mill to further the timber trade. He built the first St Mary-in-the-Valley Church,

married his treasured wife and helpmeet Hannah there. Thomas Buckingham Junior along with his father, mother, wife and many other local pioneers of the district, now lies at rest in the heritage listed St Mary-in-the-Valley graveyard.




RNFC Gets a New Sign

Editorial June 2014

A Letter to the Editor in last month's Roleystone Courier entitled 'Autism Awareness' caused a great deal of conversation across town. While some of this was just quizzical, some was quite focused.

I felt for the people involved, especially as much of this was conjecture, but I do not step back from my responsibility to publish such pieces of correspondence. This is what a public forum is all about - it raises issues, creates debate and hopefully achieves improvements.

From my perspective, I will always publish letters which I believe air genuine concerns, irrespective of my own attitudes on the matter.

The author of this particular letter is pleased with the outcome on two fronts:

1. awareness about the issue was raised

2. her own child's circumstances were improved. The difficulty with the letter was that, in our small community, sensitivities were raised. The location where the alleged comment occurred, expressed disappointment that the mother had not approached them directly. They felt saddened that they had been given no chance to rectify the situation. As a business with a proud history of supporting the community, this allegation was hurtful.

From my perspective, as an ex-school principal, any time we are alerted to the possibility of discrimination it improves our world. Every workplace, school, community area, even our private homes, can be made more supportive of those who face the daily battle of attempting to cope in an able bodied world.

Most people with a disability will make it; they just need a bit of extra support, perhaps a bit more time and a huge dollop of understanding. We all need to be vigilant about off-hand comments. Even those that are well meaning, can hurt, especially if they are made to a parent of a child with a disability.

We can all become more tolerant.

So how does our community stack up in being tolerant and supportive of folks who are different? In one aspect I think Roleystone is exceptional. I think most Roleystone folk are kind and will help others, especially those less well off than themselves. In my role as editor of the Courier I have seen numerous examples of this occurring. Our local people will get involved and pick up and support folks with particular needs.

Recently I was approached by an organisation wishing to make our community more Alzheimers/Dementia tolerant. I pointed out to them that our community is already well down the road in this regard. We are very tolerant of the elderly and infirm, even though our physical surroundings are not always supportive. I think even in our treatment of people with physical disabilities we have all come a long way.

I see many of our local businesses taking on work experience students, no matter their level of competence. Most of our employers give locals a go, even when they have had a bad track record of 'going off the rails'. All in all, most of our local employers get the 'thumbs up' from me.

But perhaps Roleystone could improve in

the number of permanent or casual employees with disabilities in our workplaces.

I have been concerned for some time that the area across our society, that we lag behind in, is how

we treat folk with mental health conditions. Often these people look the same as other folk. Sometimes, for the vast majority of the time, they 'are normal'. But their coping skills may not be as fine-tuned or they may need extra help with communication or social interaction. This is a huge challenge for us all.

The mother of the child with autism who penned the letter was overjoyed when a local business rang up and offered her son casual employment. What a step, what an achievement! I hope to bring his story to readers in the next edition of the Roleystone Courier when the details have been settled.

Making our workplaces more inclusive of all employees may not be a possibility for all businesses. Some may not yet be able to cope with such a challenge. But it is important that we all take steps to try.

Thanks to everyone who participated in this debate. Only by talking about it, reviewing our own actions and acting on it, will we make things better.

ARMADALE MUSICIANS A Touch Of History

The Armadale History House Museum has a number of musical instruments that have been archived in the collection. With the efforts of the Museum Curator Christian Bell, the Museum recently held an exhibition "Playing Tonight".

The exhibition looked at the story of performance in the City of Armadale. It remembered our pioneering performers who

sang, recited, acted and played not only for their own enjoyment but also for the enjoyment of those around

But therein lies a dilemma; the purpose of a musical waxing, instrument is to be played and enjoyed by all, yet a tinting. museum's policy is generally "look and do not touch". manicures & How can we then appreciate the instruments in their pedicures, true glory and purpose?

So in conjunction with the exhibition, the Museum fadals, also held a "Musician in Residence" program that was makeup arts run by the talented David Hyams (musician/song and spray tal writer/producer).

Members of the local community were invited to the Museum to create new music inspired by the musical collection and to have the instruments used in a performance. Some of the instruments have not been heard for decades.

On the 3rd May, the final performance was held at History House. I had the pleasure to play with musicians: David Hyams, Kim Bettenay, Cathie Travers, Mark Peacock, Meg Travers, Piers Smith, Adam, Wendy Penton and Vince Domenico.

The pictures are from that performance night.

The instruments included in the collection that we played were: the Ronisich Piano (1857) owned by the Dumsday family, the Kelmscott Church Organ (1910), the Dumsday Fife (late 1800), Banjo Mandolin, Irvin Phillips' Harpsichord and Mrs Lillian Turner's Wooden Flute. Mrs Turner once owned the music shop on Jull Street where the KFC

Following the performance we recorded all the playable instruments and these audio files will be stored in the Museum archives.

Thanks to Morley Johns from Classic Sounds who

helped repair some of the old instruments and thanks to the support of the Department of Culture and the Arts and the City of Armadale.

Special thanks to Christian and David for giving life to this fabulous concept, and for helping us to rediscover our local history.



I am a proud father of a son who has Autism and would happily engage to educate those who would like to know more. This dilemma is not going away with 1 in 68 children born now diagnosed with Autism.

ONE LAST LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Reprinted from May 2013:

As long as I've been connected with Roleystone, I first came here in 1956 and have lived here since 1975, at this time of the year I have gazed in wonder at the beautiful flowers that arise in Autumn. They seem to grow anywhere, in rows, solo long the roads and in great masses especially on steep hill slopes along our highways.

After the long hot scorching days of summer, the appearance of the Easter lilies shows that Sol is finally losing its power. They come from the dry parched soil and they resurrect themselves. Long straight stems with no sight of leaves, they finally burst into bloom; white, pink and deep pink, almost red. Their flower life is only about a month and then they appear to go back into their crypt to await another resurrection day.

Their name is Amaryllis Belladonna, the Easter lily or Belladonna lily. They grow in the older sections of the community, so it must have been a flower much cherished by our early

pioneers. When I see them flowering I know that our battle with sol is over for a while and Easter is on its way. To me they are a symbol of the crucifixion and resurrection. They are a very welcome sight



THE PASSING OF THE HORSE

FROM THE ARCHIVES The West Australian Saturday 2nd August 1913

The really marvellous strides that have been made in mechanical means of locomotion, lend strength to the belief that so many of the uses of horsepower being already usurped by the machine, the time will come when all its other avenues of usefulness will also be supplanted.

Indeed, it is not unlikely that a time may come when mechanical devices may have evolved that will encompass the whole gamut of force as applied to motion.

Even now we are familiar with the sight of self-propelled vehicles doing work which was once the exclusive province of the horse. When Stephenson made the locomotive a practical certainty, he laid the foundation of a new and wonderful adaptation of mechanical force that has revolutionised transport.

The advent of the railway was the first step in a process that has been going steadily on ever since, by which the domain of the horse has been rapidly and surely encroached upon, until today there is scarcely any field that he has to himself.

The steam-engine invaded one channel after another with dogged insistence and continued to score in every encounter by showing a better rate of profit on the work it was able to perform. And as if the steam engine were not in itself a sufficient competitor, there has risen up in these later days yet another aspirant for supremacy in the internal combustion motor which threatens to speedily complete his overthrow. Already it has invaded the highway, and given the world a means of speedy, safe, cheap and luxurious travel that has never been nearly approached by any previous means.

The stagecoach with its 12 to 15 miles an hour gait, when it was running well, and its many stops for a change of horses, has given place to the motor car that glides along, insidiously hurling a strip of white road behind it at a 30 to 40 miles an hour rate for as many hours as you care to sit in it. And the perfectly effortless way in which it performs the task is a source of wonderment to anyone receiving his first experience of these fascinating vehicles. To reflect that under its bonnet, a small engine of comparatively light weight has the energy of 30 horses stored within it, is a striking fact as is also the complete control it is under.

With the touch of a hand it can be roused into throbbing and lusty life, while with a further touch, it can be soothed into a gentle purr as the whim of the driver dictates.

It is perfectly tractable, it never shies or stumbles, nor does it jib or bolt.

Neither does it flag when hills are steep and long, nor halt when sandy stretches appear. No haunting fear of cruelty to a dumb creature need spoil the pleasure of the longest or the fastest journey one's humour may suggest.

Is it not wonderful, then, that this means of transit has captured the highway, and that not only in the cities and towns, but in the country as well, the horse is giving way to the motor, until the farmer's car is becoming as common a sight as his buggy and pair used to be.

Another field in which the internal combustion engine is ousting the horse is that of traction. Long since, the lorry-work of the great cities has seen the invasion of the newcomer to the advantage of business. And in older countries where roads are better made than here, the motor trolly has in recent years secured a rapidly increasing proportion of the heavy goods traffic upon the highways. Even in Australia we are getting the first evidences of the invasion of the new force, and as progress gives us better road surfaces, so will the motor wagon increase in numbers, and in the variety of the avenues of utility it appropriates. For speedy and convenient delivery vans it has no approachable competitor. It is so perfectly tractable, and does work at a cost ratio far below that of horse-drawn vehicles.

Already in our cities we are familiar with a steadily increasing number of utilities being served by motors: heavy lorries, light delivery vans, cabs, fire engines, mail-carts, street sweepers, and buses. With these, work is now performed, and done cheaper, faster, and better than by horsepower.

Indeed, it is very probable that the time is not far distant when the horse will not be seen at work at all within the boundaries of large and progressive cities.


The question has already been raised in other parts of the world as to whether the horse should be permitted to enter the busy thoroughfares of large and congested centres, from consideration of a sanitary nature.

Nor does he mix well with the faster, and more controlled traffic, either, but is often the cause of accidents due to his inclination to exert 'his own will' at a time when safety requires that he should go exactly where he is bidden.

This Aggressive New Force is making it hard for the horse in some of the indirect results of the change that has come. For instance, the road conditions that suited the horse are not those that suit the motor. The motor likes a hard, smooth surface under it, and in all countries where it has been upon the road long enough to demand conditions which suit it, it has secured them.

On the Continent, in England, and in America, the number of self-propelled vehicles is so large, and their tax revenue so great that they have been able to get the kind of road surface that they require. And in securing it the horse has been rendered less able.

A striking illustration of this was when the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals held in London stated that in

regard to the demand of motorists for an improvement on the surface of roads throughout the kingdom, changes had effected a reduction in the foothold for horses on the roads that had been tarred.

The Royal Society suggested an improvement in shoeing which would give the horse a better and surer grip,

while at the same time avoiding the danger of puncturing the surface of the road.

In order to stimulate interest a prize of £100 was offered for the invention of a suitable horseshoe. The offer of this prize is a striking sign of the times. It clearly indicates the coming of a new order. It seems but yesterday since the motor was grudgingly permitted to use the highway at all, and then only in the most restricted manner. Today it is in the ascendant; it demands the kind of road surface most suited to it, and those demands are being met. The outcry against the machine for frightening horses is answered by calmly asking the horse to get off the road.

The nuisance created by the dust it raised, instead of resulting in penalties being imposed upon it, has set the road authorities inventing a road surface material that would meet the demands of the newcomer. So is it time for the old to make room for the new?

No matter how long or how well the old order was served, at the appearance of the new it is ruthlessly cast aside, and in a short space forgotten. One feels that an injustice is being done and that an ungrateful world is calmly shutting its eyes to the lasting obligation it is under to the horse for thousands of years of patient, efficient and sympathetic service.

School Banking takes place every Wednesday morning at the Roleystone Community College in Block 2 from 8.15 to 8.45.



SIMPLE SAFE RECIPES

Over 30+ locals gathered recently at the Organic Growers Meeting held at the Roleystone Neighbourhood Family Centre to learn about the chemicals around us and how to make simple recipes for soaps, washing powder, etc!! Here are a few of the recipes for readers' interest.

Toothpaste

Basic

3 tablespoons Iodised sea salt

3 tablespoons bi carb.

Grind the sea salt into a powder and add bi crab and add enough water to make a soft paste. Store in a sealed container, place pea size on your brush. You can add 1 table spoon coconut oil and 2-3 drops flavour like spearmint oil or peppermint oil. Mix and use as normal.

Deodorant

1/4 cup bi carb

1/4 cup arrowroot powder

Coconut oil

Mix bi carb and arrowroot together and add enough coconut oil to make a firm paste. Add 1 or 2 drops of either tea tree or eucalyptus oil. In summer you need less as the oil is more a liquid where in winter it stays

Face cream, body cream and saving cream

Use organic unrefined cold pressed coconut oil. Use as a day and night cream, body cream and make up remover. Mix a teaspoon of oil with ½ teaspoon sugar as a face scrub or body scrub. For a body scrub or foot scrub: mix 1 tablespoon oil with ½ tablespoon sea salt. Use coconut oil as a shaving cream for men and women. You can use coconut oil as deodorant.

Sun cream

½ cup olive oil

½ cup coconut oil

2 tablespoons zinc oxide

1/3 cup beeswax

2 tablespoons shea butter

Place all ingredients in a small pot and melt gently over a low heat. Place in a sealed container and if it gets too soft place in fridge.

Place 1 tablespoon bi carb into a cup and while in the shower fill the cup with water and stir with your finger. Place the mixture on your head and wash your hair as normal. Rinse. This works well but might take a few days to get used to. Use the apple cider vinegar as conditioner.




PERENNIAL & ANNUAL PLANTS"

Transplanting simply means moving a rooted plant from one place to another. Plant transplants are an important part of keeping healthy plants and gardens. Whether it be seedlings, potted plants, shrubs, trees, or even a new plant, it is important to relocate them properly.



We finished off the night with Dale and Mike playing Metallica's Nothing Else Matters with Joe, from Placid, joining in on drums.



Helping Those Who Need it Most

The State Budget has been released and even in these fiscally tight times, the Barnett Government is putting extra resources into areas that desperately need them. The huge influx of people moving into the State is putting strain on most services, so as a government we are committed to ensuring that people don't slip through the cracks.

Child Protection:

The Department of Child Protection and Family Support is having its budget increased by \$33.5 Million over the next year, to a total of \$624.7 Million. This significant increase, coming when many agencies are having to find savings, will allow us to properly care for the more than 4,000 children in care, and allow us to perform safety assessments for 18,500 children who are the subject of Child Protection concerns.

Mental Health:

Our Government's expenditure in Mental Health funding has risen 68%, by \$321 Million since we took office in 2008. In the next year we will fund 136 new mental health beds spread over the Metropolitan area, in both adult and children's care.

Disability Services:

The State Government has provided \$58 Million for the NDIS Trial in the Hills from the 1st July 2014, as well as funding an additional 1,135 people to receive support services, including accommodation, family and carer services.

In this Budget, grandparents who look after their grandchildren full-time can receive Grants of up to \$400 for the first child and \$250 for each additional child, per Helen Monton

The City will collate the stories by Armadale young Writers Award place getters into a book. These, along with a trophy and a certificate, will be presented to each place getter at the award ceremony.

A Perpetual Shield will be presented to the school of the student whose work is considered Best Overall.

of relevant material is available to view at the Birtwistle Local Studies Library, located at the Armadale library.

The Araluen History of the Tulip

Tulips were first planted at Araluen in 1934. Ninety years ago!!!!

They came from Holland in wooden boxes with each bulb wrapped separately in appropriately coloured paper. The first planting took place on the terraces on the 'Grove of the Unforgotten' It was reported in the YAL magazine 'The Boomerang' that the tulips presented a beautiful sight.

Having researched back through some of the records held at Araluen, we have discovered the following:

September 1940: The tulips were not as numerous as former years due to the very dry weather.

September 1944: Due to the hard work of Jack Italiano there is a fine display of tulips, though the inability to import bulbs has made it difficult to keep the display up to standard. It has been found it is hard to 'breed' the bulbs in the average west location, hence the necessity to frequently fortify with new stock.

During the war years bulbs were imported from New Zealand as they couldn't be supplied from Holland.

September 1946: The number of weekend cars is up to pre-war level again. About 500 tulips out at one time.

Tulips continued to be planted in a small way until changed circumstances saw the Young Australia League sell Araluen in 1985. With strong community support, the State Government purchased the Park in 1990.

On the 27 August 1991 a media release was set out with the heading "Araluen is Blooming". Ten thousand tulips donated by Yates once again saw this once mighty bulb take its rightful place on the slopes of Araluen.

This year we will be planting a record 120,000 tulips. Maybe we can take a word from history and say 'Tulipomania' is coming to Araluen in August/September.

GARDENING NOTES BY JEAN

As I sit here writing, the rain is gently persisting. This is the rain that soaks into the ground and actually wets the understory, soaking into the under-layers of the ground.

We often dig and find the ground is only wet in the very uppermost ground then bone-dry right down. If we plant into this the roots spread across the surface and weaken the plants structure so it is susceptible to strong winds and may blow over. Keep the plant above the ground level but unwind the roots gently and plant them deeper. A lot of the plants 'on special' are root-bound and need sorting out or splitting up to give them a chance to grow. It is better to cut off half the depth of roots and allow these to regrow as they are pretty useless and only good for anchorage.

When we visited John Coles Nursery we were given Lemon Grass which had grown through the pot and was about three foot high. This could have been cut back and divided into several plants but a nursery often has no time for re-potting so it is easier for them to get rid of it.

Giving it to a customer makes the nurseryman happy and the customer will remember the gesture more than they remember the plants they bought. Win/win. This time my car was mostly occupied by people not plants. I only purchased one Camellia: a lovely japonica 'Nuccio's Carousel'. This is one I admired several years ago and one of the ladies from the Camellia Society had a beautiful bush growing in the Bickley Valley.

Over the last two weeks, I have visited:

a range of nurseries, as well as dining at "HopsScotch" (formerly Miaflora).

Many of these nurseries are well established but some feel a little tired. We need to get out and support them, otherwise they will close down and the diversity of plants will

The family owned nurseries provide advice and helpful service. I think the large nurseries are no cheaper than the small ones and there is no-one who actually assists you in putting together your plant collection. By having the diversity, you can mix and match plants, check colour schemes and similar growing conditions.

Most of the purchases I made were chrysanthemums, and then when I got home I discovered the ones I had planted last year were in flower too. This time I went for a mauve selection, so now I have a good collection. The taller yellow ones came from the local garage on Brookton Highway.

This month saw some new faces at our gardening outing and we all had a good time. We swap information on how plants grow for us and even get inspired to try new things. Cherry, our selector for the opengarden scheme was able to come along this month and her knowledge of plants and plant placement is quite overwhelming. At least we were not walking around in the dark and she knew which plants warranted a place in the garden.

Seeing that we are having wet weather we have the time to put our feet up, relax and let the garden look after itself.

The Trip To Bountiful


This month at Roleystone Theatre, we opened our second production of the year - The Trip to Bountiful, directed by local (and life member) Kim Martin.





Burning Off

It's that great time of the year to get out and clean the back yard after a long hot summer.

Some people are going to decide to burn off their leaves and sticks.

A permit is required between 1 April and 31 May 2014.

Permits can be obtained from Ranger Services at the City of Armadale's Administration Centre, on Monday, Wednesday and Friday's between the hours of 3pm and 4pm. The permits are issued for a maximum of 3 consecutive days and are not issued to properties under 1200sqm in size.

There is no charge for obtaining a Burning Permit, however burning without a permit is an offence under the Bush Fires Act and carries a penalty of

\$500. As can be seen on the variable message boards on Brookton Highway, burning of any type is not permitted, including incinerators on Sundays and Public holidays.

The Urban Forest Stratgey

The Urban Forest Strategy was adopted at the 12 May Council Meeting. The final document was quite different to the draft after many interested parties and community members provided feedback, especially in relation to bushfires.

The Urban Forest Strategy is not a Bushfire Management Plan and recommends a city- wide plan be prepared to address those regions historically considered bushfire prone.

The Urban Forest Strategy does consider 'firewise' landscape planning including recognising WA's latest state bushfire guidelines recommending appropriate planting within building protection zones and hazard

separation zones.

One of the areas that bothers me around the City is the building of car parks without including adequate shade. There are always conflicts between trying to maximise the size of the building to what is required for car park bays. It is at this time that the designing of adequate shade for the people using the car park should be allowed for.

There are many new techniques for achieving these shade goals without losing the required bays. Some of these new techniques are by using GeoCells filled with good soil under the compacted road base, allowing the trees to reach the desired shade canopy. This is something I will be pursuing as a follow on to the Urban Forest Strategy.

The Garden Crew

Over the next few weeks the gardening crew from the City will be installing paths, planting gardens, mulching and generally finishing off some of the small jobs around the skate park. They have already done some re-graveling in the car park and some minor work on the skate park and now with the rain falling it is a perfect time for them (and us) to start planting.





Take Part in World No Tobacco Day

Every year World No Tobacco Day is observed on May 31. This initiative aims to raise awareness of the health risks associated with tobacco use and to advocate for effective policies to reduce tobacco consumption.

The City of Armadale supports smoke free environments and reducing the negative impacts of tobacco in the community.

Mayor Henry Zelones said smoking is recognised as the largest single preventable cause of death and disease in Australia.

"As a former smoker that was able to eventually quit a 20 year addiction, I am fully aware that smoking not only negatively impacts on the health of the individual smoker, but exposes those around them to the dangers of secondhand smoke.

"Having personally lost four family members to smoking related diseases, I understand only too well that smoking, and even second-hand smoke, can cause serious cardiovascular and respiratory diseases, including coronary heart disease and lung cancer.

"There is no safe level of exposure to second-hand smoke. Breathing even a little second-hand smoke can be harmful to a person's health.

"A smoke free environment is the only way to fully protect non-smokers from the dangers of second-hand smoke," said Mayor Zelones.

Armadale Health Service will be the first to utilise this opportunity as part of their World No Tobacco Day activities, and in support of their smoke free policy.

Staff, patients, visitors, contractors and volunteers are not permitted to smoke anywhere on the Armadale Health Service's grounds, including the walkways, car parks or in vehicles.

The City of Armadale praises their commitment to providing a healthy, safe and smoke free environment to the Armadale community.

Be Part of StreamCare

Since its inception in 2002, the City of Armadale Streamcare Project has helped hundreds of landowners take care of their local riverside environment.

The aim of the program is to revitalise local streams and improve the habitat for native fish and wildlife through the planting of native flora and careful use of weed control, fertilisers and pesticides by landowners.

Mayor Henry Zelones said some landowners are unaware that there is even a stream running through their property, as some streams only flow for a few months a year.

"The best way of caring for these waterways is by educating the residents, to ensure local

natural habitats are protected and also improving the quality of waterways for everyone.

"The success of the program means the waterways in the area are protected for future generations.

"Improving the water quality here means we are contributing towards a significant difference to the waterways of the metropolitan area as these streams flow into the Wungong, Southern, Canning and ultimately the Swan River.

"The City's Streamcare Promoter provides landowners with technical advice on the management of their land and waterways, and provides technical advice on weed control, pesticides, property planning and revegetation.

"Some landowners may also be eligible for free native plants through the program, to revegetate their waterway and create a healthier environment," said Mayor Zelones.

Astro Highlights June Greg Lowe, Perth Observatory

June the 1st, officially the first day of winter in Australia, is with us again. For years I've been muttering about starting the seasons at the solstices and the equinoxes, in the old-fashioned way. It would boost the recognition of astronomy and astronomers in the community; but nobody else cares, so I'll let it be. Suffice it to say that the winter solstice will occur on the 21st: the time of shortest days, with the day length being 10 hours and 3 minutes for Perth. That's the time from sunrise to sunset. Approximately 10 hours of "day" and 14 hours of "night", if we count the twilight times as part of the night. In high summer it's the other way around.

Jupiter's run as the dominant evening planet will draw to a close at the end of June. The giant planet is still the brightest starlike object in the early evenings. It's located in the north-western sky at dusk and is setting in the WNW at about 8pm in early June, then some 3 or 4 minutes earlier from each night to the next. By mid-month it's setting around 7:15pm. At the end of the month it'll be low in the WNW at dusk, poised to disappear into the glare of the Sun. Watch for the pleasing sight of the crescent moon near Jupiter on the 1st and the 29th.

Mars, now visibly less bright than it was a month ago, is still easy to spot by virtue of its orange colour. You'll find it high up in the north-eastern sky at dusk early in the month, when it'll reach culmination (highest altitude) very high in the north around 8:15pm and will go down in the west at about 2:15am. As the weeks pass, Mars will be found higher and further to the west (left) at nightfall. The time of culmination or "meridian transit" will be about 3 minutes earlier day by day, hence

7:30pm mid-month and 6:50pm at the end of the month. Similarly with the setting times: around 1:30am in mid-June and 1am by month's end. The Moon will be just to the east (left) of Mars at nightfall on the 8th. While it doesn't recommend itself to the unaided eye, Saturn is sure to knock your socks off if you see it through a decent telescope. In early June Saturn's well up in the east at dusk, passes high overhead around 10:45pm, and goes down in the WSW at about 5am. By mid-month it's higher in the eastern sky at dusk, culminating at about 9:40pm and setting around 4am. At month's end Saturn begins the night high in the ENE, culminates 'way up overhead around 8:45pm and goes down at about 3am.

Venus is a grand sight as the brilliant "morning star" standing out in the ENE before dawn. Its rising time is getting later by about 2 minutes per day: around 4:15am at the start of the month, 4:40 mid-month, and 5:10 in late June. It'll still be visible, though not as nicely – steadily losing altitude – for the next couple of months. Watch for Venus with the waning crescent moon nearby, at daybreak on the morning of the 25th.

The Moon begins the month in waxing crescent phase: crescent moon in the western sky at dusk. Remember the rule of thumb: if you can see the Moon at nightfall, it's waxing. Up until full moon, that is. The major phases this month are first quarter on the 6th, full moon on the 13th (Friday the 13th!), last quarter on the 20th, and new moon on the 27th. In the last couple of days of June, the waxing crescent moon should again be visible low in the western sky at dusk.

The City of Armadale Shows Excellent Support for the Environment

Over the past years, the City of Armadale has really made a strong commitment to the management of our natural environment. In recent Council recommendations they have agreed to an additional environmental officer to continue the implementation of the State of the Environment Report and to increase the funding for the Armadale Gosnells Landcare Group.

This will mean 3.4 environmental officers, plus ongoing support for the two Armadale Gosnells Landcare officers in addition to the 3 person bushcare management team.

As a long term environmental volunteer, I have a letter we wrote in 1997 to the then Mayor Roger Stubbs requesting that Council consider employing an environmental

officer. We had made this same request over the previous 5 years. We were not successful on that occasion but two years later, in 1999, Council finally employed our first Environmental Officer the late Ron van Delft. Ron was an amazing environmental trail blazer for our community and Council. It has been a long journey but it is very rewarding to see the commitment we have been asking for rolling out over the years to assist in the management of the outstanding natural environment that we have all around us.

Our magnificent natural environment that, I believe, should be the key selling point for the City of Armadale.

Armadale Council Warns Dog Owners to be Vigilant When Walking Their Dogs

Reports last month of dogs dying from poisoning now seem to be linked to a single private property, rather than a public open space.

In April the City's Rangers Services received reports that several dogs had died, as a result of suspected poisoning in the area of Rushton Park, Kelmscott.

Further recent cases of dogs suffering from what appear to be effects of poisoning have now highlighted a single property in Mt Nasura as the common link to all of the suspected poisoning cases.

Chief Executive Officer Ray Tame said that as a precautionary measure the City acted swiftly to advise residents to be vigilant when walking dogs in the area of Rushton Park, due to the speculation that baiting may have been involved.

"The City's Rangers undertook thorough searches of the reserve and its surrounds on several occasions and were unable to identify anything suspicious.


"Ongoing investigations by Ranger Services have found no evidence to support the speculation of dogs having being poisoned at Rushton Park, or any other public open space within the City of Armadale.

"Unfortunately two more dogs have recently died under suspicious circumstances, and the common denominator is that they all resided at, or visited, a private property in the Mt

"Last week local vets sent off samples for toxicology tests and are waiting on the results to determine if poison was involved, and if so what type, so the property owner can act on the results to remove any poisonous substance.

"The RSPCA are continuing to look into the matter, in consultation with local vets and the property owner," said Chief Executive Officer Ray Tame.

Whilst at this time there isn't concrete evidence to pinpoint a specific location, the City urges owners to be vigilant when exercising their dogs in open space areas, and report any suspicious behaviour or substance to Ranger Services on 93990111 or 1300 886 885.

Wild Gossip

The cooler weather is starting to bring back roof invaders looking for a warm, dry place to spend winter. My phone is ringing with enquiries as to what might be in the

roof and people wanting me to go to investigate and remove whatever it is. Unfortunately I don't climb ladders or go investigating roof spaces so the problem remains yours and all I can do is offer advice.

If the noise occurs at dawn and dusk then it is most likely a possum, but if it continues day and night then it is likely to be rats.

The quickest way to decide what is living in your roof is to go up and investigate any droppings. Possum dropping are much bigger and fatter than rat droppings.

If you have a possum, the first thing to do is to find and secure all possible entry and exit points. Wait, watch and listen for the possum to leave and then secure that remaining entry / exit point.

This can be harder than it first appears as possums are very cunning creatures. The one living in our roof pulls the gutter away from the roof and enters through the gap - a very noisy process both on entry and

One morning my husband waited outside with a broom to ward off the entering visitor but it stood its ground on the roof and fought back for quite some time before running off. The following day it was back in the roof and continues to come and go as it pleases.

You can set a live catcher to trap the possum but if you take it off and dump it in the bush it will have no shelter and not know where to find food or water and is certain to die. The best solution is to buy or make a possum box, put it up a tree in your garden and make it nice and cosy with some straw or bedding inside and a feed platform on the outside on which you place food then catch the possum put it in the box and hope it stays there!

You must be sure to completely secure your roof or all you will have done is left a warm, cosy, possum smelling roof just waiting for another visitor to move in.




