It is timely to remember that we all have responsiblity for the preservation of our area.




Alisa and Joel



Local Government Reform Process Ceases

The City of Armadale is now developing an exit strategy following the State Government's decision to put its local government reform process on hold. Premier Colin Barnett announced recently that boundary adjustments for 15 metropolitan local governments will only proceed if affected councils provided a resolution in support of it.

Local Government Minister Tony Simpson indicated that he will hold discussions with any Council wishing to proceed with reform before rescinding Governor's Orders issued for boundary adjustments.

CEO Ray Tame said the City of Armadale is well aware that the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale has already withdrawn from the reform process, making it unlikely the Government will proceed any further.

"The City is yet to consider its options," Mr Tame said.

He said while always seeking continuous improvement, the City did not initially seek any change to its organisation, boundaries or operations. In response to the reform proposal, the City compiled and put forward a submission that was most likely to provide positive outcomes for the district.

"We are disappointed about the amount of money, time and energy that now appears to have been wasted on the reform process," Mr Tame said. "We have been working with the Shire of Murray and Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale in good faith and the proposed changes were confirmed in Governor's Orders issued on 24 December 2014. We did everything required to meet the Governor's objectives and were prepared for changeover on 1 July 2015." Mr Tame said direct reform costs incurred by the City of Armadale this financial year totalled more than \$300,000 and would have amounted to about \$1.2 million by 30 June.

"Those figures do not include the hundreds of hours existing City of Armadale staff have spent working on the reform process so far," he said. "We would also estimate several hundred thousand dollars in associated costs over the past few years in the lead up to implementation."

Mr Tame said staff of all three Councils have always had a good relationship.

"I would like to think that everyone has learnt something about better governance from the process," he said.

"There is so much work involved in looking after growth areas and we now need to convert those lessons into better outcomes for our communities."

The Markets will aim to give the area more vibrancy, making Armadale an attractive destination for residents, shoppers, visitors and businesses alike. Things could have been a lot worse as he died about 10 metres from a road and on the other side of road is a large playground which covers the canal. It was very fortunate that it was so cold that children weren't playing

Before we left I bought a lovely bunch of flowers. Stacey and I each wrote a note and stuck it to the front. We had no idea how close the incident was until we took the flowers and placed them on the ever growing pile. When we watched the news we could see the back of our apartment block!

On the whole we had a wonderful time. It's not very often that I get to spend time with my children, even more so as Stacey has just begun working in Brisbane.

Over the years Roleystone has been subjected to a number of events which have required a community response and emergency attention. These have ranged from a tornado which cut a destructive path across Garland Road and down along Croyden Road in June 2008 to the Roleystone/Kelmscott fires of 2011.

Communication with residents is difficult during these times and with the advent of "real-time" social media the opportunity now exists for residents to share information quickly and easily in forums such as Facebook.

Roleystone Mothers Rock has already demonstrated the popularity of Facebook in forming a local community group with a common interest. Seeing the need for an all inclusive group focussed on alerting local residents of events occurring in the community, the Roleystone Community Alert Facebook page has been initiated.

This page has published its reason for being as follows: "Roleystone Community Alert is intended to keep local residents informed and aware of issues of common interest e.g. planned community activities, incidents, crime, suspicious activity, fire risk etc. All Roleystone/Karragullen/Bedfordale residents are welcome and invited to share real-time knowledge of issues affecting the immediate area and surrounds. Community posts are welcome along with any local photos. Posts can be anything that builds a sense of belonging to our community". Whilst not limited to emergency issues, the Facebook page has already proven its worth uniting residents across the area during the recent bushfire along Brookton Highway beyond Karragullen.

The Facebook page to date (as of the 5 Feb 2015) has 240 members. It is a closed group which allows for candid posting and open discussion. Any resident of Roleystone/Karragullen/Bedfordale is welcome to join the group. The more members the merrier, as the more on board, the more information will be available to the group. If residents would like to have a post office box, they need to apply at the Roleystone Newsagency over the next two weeks. PO boxes will be limited so early applications are essential.



What Day Should We Celebrate Australia Day?

As we put all our flags and our red, white and blue face paint away for another year, it is time to consider a better date for Australia Day than 26 January.

That date commemorates an event in New South Wales that has no real historical resonance outside NSW. It is also a date that is offensive to our indigenous population.

The new date for Australia Day should be at a better time in the year, well after Xmas and when children are back at school. It should be a date that all Australians, old and new can celebrate. From Australian history suitable dates could be the opening of the first Commonwealth Parliament on 9 May 1901, the famous Tenterfield address of the father of Federation, Sit Henry Parkes on 24 October 1889. Another date is that on which, after approval referendums in each state, it was agreed that legislation will be

enacted by the UK Parliament to establish the Commonwealth of Australia. That was in the last quarter of 1989, I think in September 1989.

The ceremony in Sydney on 1 January 1901 to proclaim the Commonwealth is no use as an alternative; it clashes with New Year's Day and was just a final lick in a long process. Nor is ANZAC Day a good alternative to the current 26 January. ANZAC Day has another important purpose and that will suffer by the combination, as will Australia Day itself.

Lay Off DAFWA

I don't usually speak up about local issues because there are usually two sides to every argument and ethical publications ensure both sides are aired.

I feel however someone should speak up in defence of DAFWA in response to the unrelenting campaigning from one of your contributors.

I write not so much about DAFWA, but the dedicated people who have worked there over the years - (including the hundreds who have been forced to retire).

I left after 30 years (voluntarily), in frustration over political interference, underfunding, industry indifference and contempt. I know of plenty who committed decades of effort (often in their own time), towards saving and improving agricultural relevance in this state, but can't think of any that "travelled the world for decades at taxpayer's expense".

If DAFWA is seen to be inactive or negligent in support of medfly control in horticulture, don't think you are special. Support for control of locusts, footrot, rabbits, wild dogs, foxes, pigs, starlings, lorikeets, camels, ovine Johne's, donkeys (need I go on?), has been wound down or terminated. R & D in general, is to be phased out of DAFWA's business model.

All programs require money, staff and facilities. Have you inspected the head office buildings in Kensington? Amnesty Int. would take us to the World Court if illegal immigrants were detained there! 90% of Ag. research stations have been sold, leased or maintained in caretaker mode.

DAFWA has been financially gutted by successive governments with hardly a whimper in protest from the public (who want the produce) or the industry (who want the profits).

I once organised a market initiative forum (after work hours) for the hills orchardists. Advertising, venue, 3 expert speakers, slide presentations etc....

The one grower who attended was given very personalised attention!

Without DAFWA there probably wouldn't be a horticultural industry in WA.

There certainly wouldn't be pink ladies, red globes, nadines

There would however, be codling moth, phylloxera, Q fly, fireblight, PCN, - you name it.

Medfly could have been eradicated in the mid 80's (on the back of Q fly), but the vocal orchardists opposed the proposal because medfly gave them a marketing advantage over backyard growers.

Don't blame the DAFWA people for their impotence. Blame the state government (especially conservative ones. You know, the ones who close down railways).

DAFWA staff can't defend themselves publicly, because they are bound to support agriculturists even when they're down and being kicked by them.

I have nothing to lose as long as I'm anonymous.

DAFWA is a soft target for funding cuts and a whipping boy for swaggering farmers. DAFWA didn't conspire to cause the current calamity, but they did notify growers 15 years ago that they would be banned from using Fenthion by the National Regulator, and alternative strategies for medfly control should be tested and implemented.

More cooperation from landowners & local authorities in removing neglected orchards, over the last 40 years, would have reduced the medfly risk.


DAFWA don't have the resources to develop an Area Wide Management system, monitor compliance or mount a sterile release program.

'Biosecurity is a shared responsibility'.

Growers and local government must cooperate, and contribute significant funds towards an agreed control strategy. If they won't put up, they should shut up!

Colin Barnett Comes to Roley

Local orchardists welcomed Premier Colin Barnett's commitment that part of the government's \$20 million biosecurity package will be available to help Perth growers control the Med Fly.

Mr Barnett made the commitment at a meeting with the Hills Orchard Improvement Group on January 30, when he inspected fruit fly crop damage at the DelSimone's orchard.

Accompanied by Member for Darling Range Tony Simpson, Mr Barnett honoured a commitment that he would look at the problems caused by fruit fly to Perth's orchard industry.

HOIG spokesman Brett DelSimone said the meeting produced positive results for the industry.

"Mr Barnett showed genuine interest and concern for the battle that local producers have in fighting fruit fly and he agreed that the state government's \$20 million fund would be shared with Hills growers," Mr DelSimone said.

"This is a great boost to us because the Department of Agriculture and Food WA (DAFWA) had ruled out spending any of the money here and planned to use it just in Carnarvon."

He said the Premier emphasised his support for local WA fruit and vegetables and his desire to see our fresh food production industry flourish and agreed that more action was required by



government on the ground to tackle fruit fly, which can cause devastating losses to fruit growers.

HOIG urged Mr Barnett to step up government measures to control fruit fly through Area Wide Management – a system of orchard hygiene, trapping, baiting and removal of abandoned fruit trees. Action was urgent because DAFWA reported last week it had found huge numbers of fruit fly in traps.

"Trap numbers have been reported to be over 100 flies in some traps," Mr DelSimone said. "DAFWA staff have told growers that any more than 10 flies within a single trap is cause for high concern."

Mr DelSimone said DAFWA had yet to implement Area Wide Management across the Perth Hills region.

"Growers can look after their orchards but they can't force their residential neighbours to do the same." "DAFWA has legislated custody of Med Fly control among the residential community and Mr Barnett agreed biosecurity was a DAFWA responsibility.

"Growers are holding up their end of the bargain but DAFWA is failing to undertake an education and enforcement role in the community."


He said Mr Barnett agreed that an ongoing systems-based approach, including a buffer zone for the Perth Hills producing region, made sense and that there was a need for greater action in the community.

"The Premier supported the notion that Government had a role to play in ensuring that businesses who retail fruit trees to the public also had a duty of care to provide educational material detailing Med Fly control to the customer," Mr DelSimone said.





From The Archives: 'Araluen' by Allen Scott 22nd December 1932

Thousands of years ago a great spirit pervaded the world, roving and restless, seeking a spot, a symbol worthy of a "Palace of Dreams."

Brooding and calm, he one day called his disciples in before him, strong spirits and brave, and from them all he created a creature to perform his quest. Upright, brave, tall, and true, yet possessing human faults and lovableness, this spirit trod the world as "Perditas," the lost one.

Travelling always, never resting, he climbed the highest mountain, swam the deepest rivers, always on. Wherever he trod, and whomever he touched he brought goodness and sunshine, and this great spirit was spoken of by all the lowly and the high, until his name was known throughout the land. One day, after many weary years, Perditas found a spot that gladdened his heart, a Valley of Dreams, a valley that caught the breath in your throat, as you gazed, and turned back a leaf of your heart to leave.

Perditas gazed on this and cried, "It shall be mine."

After spending days searching for hidden beauties, he hurried to the Master Spirit to tell the good news and the Master said: "My son, I am proud of you. Go forth and make of the dream a place worthy to house the great spirits. Touch not a blade of grass unwisely, cherish all Nature's handiwork, kill not an ant, bird or butterfly; let these little messengers carry the example of thrift, happiness and song to our people. Touch not the stately tree that breathes forth its message of love or the brook, in its search of service and let the whole sing a requiem of tolerance."

Through the stately entrance, and up the myriad paths, beauties lay before dream cabins, rough hewn and strong, symbolic of this great thought, fashioned and wrought by little human hands, with love and service, hammered in every plank; the Shrine of Remembrance, the most beautiful thought of all; the calm and stately pool, over which on drowsy summer days, the dragon flies hover, and touch with their beautiful wings the cool green surface; the running, singing, ceaseless brook, most beautiful epitome, sometimes sad, sometimes gay, always breathing tolerance.

And so, in the depth of winter, and the height of summer, possessing the spirit wings of our human bodies we fly away to this dream place. We see the Great Spirit with Perditas by his side, wandering at will in the dead of night, for their eyes know and love every twig and blade.

And in the murmuring and sighing of the leaves one hears the Master Spirit breathe, "Well done son, I am proud of you and my Temple of Dreams."

So we open our wings, those great purple clouds of darkness, that waft back from the spirit world to catch a glimpse of Paradise. But there is a benediction on our heads, and imparted to us a message of sweetness to deliver to the world the greatest message of all time. Love, Service and Tolerance.

Norma Priscilla Bullen 23/3/1921 - 1/2/2015





On time, every time, or I will keep you updated



Baby Boomers

I am a baby boomer. As a generation we have been under attack from younger generations for having comfortable life styles and in some cases retiring with attached superannuation or even for owning a second home. I find this somewhat irritating because you need to ask why are we such a 'lucky' group of Aussies?

In my case I watched my parents and grandparents practice thrift. Nothing that had a use was thrown away. They kept chooks, even in the city. They had veggie gardens: my mum, who loved flowers more than anything else, still had a small patch of tomatoes and corn as well as the ubiquitous mint, rosemary and parsley. They started small and in many cases, in war service homes...ie public housing built post war of fibre in a small box design which was blisteringly hot in an era of no air-conditioning.

We grew up in such homes where you shared your bedroom with your siblings, and often your bed; the demarcation line in mine was a line of teddy bears. There was only ever one bathroom so you learned patience and the art of queuing for using the basin the toothpaste and toilet. We often shared the bathwater which sometimes found its way onto the garden.

Nothing was instant. If you went to the pictures there was a newsreel, a cartoon, a B grade film, interval and then the main event. It took forever but that was the entertainment and it was cheap.

We made our clothes having been taught to sew garments at school. This in turn fed back into the community through the draper, the wool merchant and grower, ditto the cotton grower, the mills, the dyers and so on.

Clothes lasted a lot longer because they were hard earned and you saw the value in them. You couldn't just rock up to any one of a dozen stores and but a T shirt for a fraction of its real cost as you can today.

And the boys learned manual arts. Now I agree this is sexist and in fact it was our generation who argued against this. In fact my father manfully fronted my school in the seventies because I wanted to learn metalwork and was confined to needlework, which I disliked. He didn't succeed but two years after I graduated that school had desegregated the curriculum following pressure from students. Holidays weren't overseas, they were taken in canvas tents beside a river or the sea. You got sand on your plates and in your camp beds, you fished with bamboo rods and hand reels. You lured up yabbies on 'dog' meat from the local butcher.

At Easter you got one largish egg which you had to wait till Sunday to consume. At Christmas again there was no plethora of gifts, you learned to be satisfied with less because there were other things out there to be enjoyed. 

Merv Mundy was born in 1924 into a large & close knit family - his mother was Lillian Parker one of six of the amazing Parker family, early pioneers of Roleystone.

At the age of 3 an unfortunate burns accident on one of the family outings to relatives in the hills resulted in a three month stay in hospital. This traumatic experience stayed with him for life.

Other than this incident, his early years – growing up in Claremont & South Perth with his three sisters -Gwen, Verna & Phyllis were happy ones.

The family valued education - his mother in particular, coming from a teaching background - and Dad was a good student and all rounder. He played tennis, hockey & cricket and dabbled in athletics.

He also learnt the piano and violin. He attended Modern School from 1940 - 41 and retained lifelong friends from those days.

Family life was full and active. His writings describe: "a nebulous quantity of relatives from 'the hills' who usually came bearing fruit" and "visits to them thar hills became perhaps the most memorable parts of my life for many years to come...."

He went to University to study engineering although these years were marred by the war in many ways.

He met Audrey Longmore during these years through the family visits to Roleystone/Karragullen and they married in 1950. They lived in Como and later Geraldton where Merv took up a position as Engineer for the Northern Districts.

Not long after retirement the family unit - at this stage consisting of Vernon at Uni, Jodi at school, and his wife's mother Rene - moved back to their roots at Roleystone.

Merv had a very long retirement. Necessary house extensions; the arrival of grandchildren and great grandchildren; the illness of his parents and mother-in-law and maintenance of a 10 acre hobby farm all took up time and energy. He maintained a small involvement in musical theatre for a time and played bowls for some years.

What he did attack with some vigour was writing - on many subjects.

Daughter Laurie summed up his mindset:

"My earliest recollections of awareness of any intellectual activities, are of a general distrust of conventional wisdom, an inclination towards socialism, a dislike of existing social conditions and a questioning of conventional religious beliefs."

Most of the last decade was devoted to Audrey's care following her somewhat sudden decline.

The role of carer was not one he would have chosen but refused to give up - choosing to soldier on with the help of family and Silver

Suffering greatly himself from osteoarthritis of the knees and also Congestive Heart Failure, this was not an easy road. (And yes, he has extolled a cure for arthritis).

His heart condition deteriorated rapidly about 2 years ago and there were many hospital stints during

He swore to "resist to the end" going into care - and managed to do so until 7 months before the end. Last year he made his 90th year - an event which caused great celebration.

He was a complex, scholarly man with a great passion to leave his philosophical mark on his friends and family - thereby leaving the world a little better off. His all consuming need to do this made him, at times, a difficult person to







Local Author Talks at Kalamunda Historical Village

When local author Linda J Bettenay entered the Station House at the Kalamunda Historic Village the first thing that struck her was the authenticity of this amazing place. A beautifully preserved monument to times gone by and a perfect location for her to talk about her books which also celebrate this time in history.

For readers who have not visited this place it is magic. History is all around. It is just behind the Zig Zag Museum and should be on every hills dwellers 'must visit' list.

Bettenay began her talk referring to this 'sense of place' and gave due deference to the members of the Historical Society who crowded in, for their roles in maintaining this location. She was the guest speaker for the Kalamunda and Districts Historical Society meeting on February the 5th and her topic found great resonance with an informed and attentive audience, all of whom are passionate about their local history.

This was one of Bettenay's first public events of 2015 and she revealed some background behind her newly released novel: 'Wishes For Starlight' - a story which resonated strongly with the audience. Much of the story played out in Canning Mills - our own back yard.

In Bettenay's talk she explained how this story came from her father's and grandfather's memories and although it is historical fiction it's also grounded in factual events. The central character, Starlight, was a deaf mute Aboriginal, born in the 1890s in Canning Mills, Western Australia, a thriving timber town.

'Starlight was discovered living in a chook pen and fighting dogs for scraps by three remarkable children. Their actions result in the aboriginal boy being adopted by the community and over the next thirty years their friendship and loyalty enabled Starlight to survive in this time of prejudice and disadvantage,' explained Bettenay.

'Wishes For Starlight' is steeped in our pioneering history: when the orchards, the dams and the timber mills were being established, when typhoid epidemics threatened daily survival and fears of forest fires, destitution and starvation were very real. A time when the Zig Zag railway was built, the horse and cart reigned and barn dances provided entertainment, Bettenay said.

Bettenay has tied in many themes and events of the time into her novel; the difficulties of migrants, the challenges faced by women and the marginalisation of anyone who was not 'normal'. She explained that in this period 'The War to End all Wars' accounted for the loss and mutilation of many soldiers while also seriously impacting those 'left at home' but it also allowed for the blossoming of mateship.

'I was impressed with the warm welcome. Special thanks to organiser Marcia and President Gay, for their organisation and support. Sharing the joy behind my books is a fulfilling experience,' Bettenay said.

IT'S A THREE-PEAT!

As expected, albeit mainly by Patrick Fisher, the RKCC are again T20 Division 1 Champions!

While the 3 Division 2 sides we had competing didn't quite make the final, it was a solid and fun effort all round by the boys. In the T20 Division 1 Final, the RKCC dismissed a desperate Lesmurdie-Mazenod side for a paltry 113. In reply a strong start meant that the result was put beyond doubt relatively quickly as the RKCC made the total with 7 wickets and 5 overs to spare. Confidence heading in to the final was sky high after a dominant performance over Ellenbrook who only managed 65 in reply to RKCC's 9/145, Mitch and Trent Stuart doing the damage in that match with figures of 3/16 and 2/13 respectively. In the other last round results of the Division 2 T20 competition, Jon Stockey's side demolished Maylands after dismissing them for just 75. The sub-par total was made in just 11 overs at the loss of just 2 wickets meaning Jon's side finished 3rd overall.

Michael Chmielewski's side was captained by Feidhilm Bennetts for the last match but the only highlight came from Sam Ierino who notched up 38 of the 109 runs scored by the RKCC. In reply the home team ensured a swift result, reaching the result with 4 overs and 6 wickets to spare. The 'grey' side as they were known finished a disappointing campaign with their worst defeat of the season.

A defeat in their 2nd last match of the season sees A grade fall out of the top 4 for the 2-day competition and will need to beat rivals Lesmurdie-Mazenod in the last round in order to be able to be able to defend their crown in the finals. Recent results include defeating Forrestfield 153 (Trent Stuart 36) v 120 (Hickinbotham 3/24, T. Stuart 3/43) & 198 (Mobilia 3/43, Fisher 3/45) and losing out to a plucky Ellenbrook side 7/289 (Mobilia 3/47, T. Stuart 3/80) v 211 (Mobilia 75, T. Stuart 32). But in the mix was also the one-day grand final played on a Sunday between Helena Valley and the RKCC. Defeat was clutched from the jaws of victory, or more accurately victory was dropped from a few buttered fingers as we let Helena Valley sneak away with victory thanks to a 48 run last wicket stand which saw 3 dropped catches. Trent Stuart's 40 and Hickinbotham's 5/31 wasn't enough as Helena Valley took home their first A-grade silverware.

Greg James' B Grade side had similar results to A Grade with their 1 win from 2 games over the past month which included a good team effort in the match against Forrestfield where Brett Turner took 4/19 and made 32, Jo Jackson took a miserly 3/6, Norris made 47 and Leeder 35. I'm glad the guys have been reading the Courier. A Jon Stockey 30 in the first innings wasn't enough to help B Grade make a reputable total but managed to dismiss Ellenbrook for not much more with Turner again doing the damage with 3/31. Leeder and Allen's unbeaten 57 and 36 respectively garnered some respect from the match but there was no time to push for an outright. The result leaves B Grade still shy of the top 4 with it all to play in the last round against Lesmurdie-Mazenod.

C Grade also sit just out of the top 4 in 5th place but an unreachable gap to 4th means the last match against the undefeated top side will be a fun affair. Not a lot of highlights with the bat other than a Rigby 47 and an unbeaten Brad Stewart 54 against Ellenbrook but some good team efforts with the ball.



The last two matches have seen 17 wickets taken by 7 different bowlers, the pick of which is Mears with his 4/46 and 2/14.

Lars Olesen's D Grade side have managed a couple of wins from their last 4 matches from all the way down in second last spot. Some inspiring batting has lead the way thanks to Dickenson's 34*, Alex Stockey's 33, Moore's 30, Darren Wilkinson's blow the dust off 63, Hammond's 31, Wright's 34 and most notably Glenn Coppin's 118*. The bowling has been pretty spot on as well with Dickenson also taking 5/27 in the win over Helena Valley but Moore's 3/35 and Olesen's 3/24 weren't enough to top Darlington and Lesmurdie-Mazenod. Matt Thomason's 4/16 and Wright's 4/22 helped Swan View crumble to 98 with RKCC making 7/248 in reply. Not bad from the second bottom side.

The old boys in the E Grade side have continued their winning ways and evidently perhaps also read The Roleystone Courier as they jump from 5th to 2nd spot since last report. With just one loss from the last 4 matches, Steve Reeves will be hoping, nay demanding, the side continue their form in to finals. A few close matches have been at play here with RKCC defeating Bullsbrook 3/130 (Matt Faranda 38, Stapleton 34*) v 122 (Manning 3/19, Flanders 3/23), Maylands 166 (M. Faranda 45, Reeves 40*) v 4/144 and losing out narrowly to Glen Forrest 5/151 (Fuller 69*, M Faranda 40) v 4/156 but another sterling 50 from wouldbe retiree Graham Fuller saw an awe inspiring result over Helena Valley who were dismissed for just 90 in reply to 7/153. The two 50s are the 3rd and 4th 50s this season for 'Buzz' who is also averaging 45.43 so that bowling green may just have to collect dust for another year.

We also recently had our annual Australia Day 5-a-side tournament and all-round good fun day out. This is always a great day with both fresh faces and familiar ones around too! Stay tuned for news on finals fixtures or just come up to Cross Park on any given Tuesday or Thursday.

Frontline 2020 Policing Initiative

The East Metropolitan Region saw the introduction of the Trial of the Frontline 2020 model, the new policing initiative, in late 2013.

This model, bringing personal policing back to our streets, saw dramatic results in the South East region when it was trialled, and the benefits are going to be felt in the entire metropolitan area with the start of the initiative everywhere. It is not often in government that we can stand up and point to a policy direction that has had such an effect, so soon after its introduction, but with an almost 9% reduction in crime in the areas that the Frontline 2020 program has been operating. The results speak for themselves.

Liza Harvey MLA, the Minister for Police, and the incredible efforts of the team from WAPOL that have overseen the roll out, are to be commended.

The Local Policing Teams, consisting of a Sergeant and several constables, over time, get to know the streets and personalities of the suburb that they are responsible for. This allows better targeting of police resources, and local information gathering to allow them to respond to issues faster, and with more certainty.

The feedback from community members on having a single local group looking after them rather than any of hundreds of police officers has been positive, and the links developing between the Local teams and the residents is removing a lot of the institutional distance that once existed.



Each of the Police Districts will be upgraded to 550 officers, as part of the Government's commitment to ensuring our streets and communities are as safe as possible.




Performances by Mascotia, The Passing Strays, Fired Up and Dave & Evie added up to a great night of music, all for \$5!


Rob's Keen To Fix Your Fitness

Gardening Notes with Jean

My garden is very untidy, partially because I leave the weeds to shelter the roots of other plants. Then when the cooler weather comes along I can then rake it all off and we have some semblance of tidiness. Secondly, I do not want to go out into the heat to do any work. My other excuse is I have a sore foot. All I am doing is keeping the water up to the more fragile plants. Mind you what we think are fragile are often very drought hardy. The begonias are thriving with only the occasional light watering.

I have a crack in the pavement that produces Lippia and every now and then I cut it back and distribute it to other sections of the yard to make a ground cover. It is a great plant and does not require mowing but be aware that the bees are really fond of the little pink blooms. People with bare feet ought to avoid walking on it when it blossoms. Some of my favourite summer plants are the vincas and portulaccas, once they get their roots established they generally do not need watering and go ahead and reward with numerous showy flowers.

I notice the delightful Crepe Myrtles are becoming abundant in the nurseries and these make a spectacular statement - blooms in late summer and wonderful autumn foliage. Sadly the prices have rocketed up with many above \$100 dollars a plant. (So if you see them on special make a place for them in your garden).

It is impossible not to notice the heavy winter. I certainly hope so.

Soon we will get rains then it is time to think about planting our native plants especially get the everlasting seeds scattered so we can all enjoy these wonderful West Australian annuals. Try to put in eremophilas and correas so that the native areas bloom in May, a time when we have very few flowers out. These grow low to the ground allowing a good habitat for the bandicoots. To my mind, although they are meant to be nocturnal there really isn't a specific time of the day that I see them when I am working in the garden.

I hope you have taken the opportunity to check out bulb catalogues, so the bulbs can be ordered in and planted when the season is right. Well enough for now enjoy your garden and the respite time.

Getting Ready for Winter Veggies and Herbs

Roleystone Organic Growers is getting started again in March and the meeting will be a hands on one-sowing of different varieties-you may vegetable and herbs seeds that love the winter!

For success in growing vegetables and herbs, it is important to time the planting of seeds and seedlings to take advantage of seasonal conditions most favourable for their growth. The marvellous thing about autumn is that it is a good time that you can put in those seeds that thrive in the winter.

At the meeting, we will talk about how deep to sow seeds, how to water, fertilise and transplant.

Please bring all you need to get your seeds into soil: Seed raising mix, seeds, trowel, gloves, punnets, trays, plant tags/ labels, permanent marking pen, and a bucket.



When you sow vegetables from seed in punnets/trays, it gives you an enormous choice like to bring some of the following seeds to be sure you sow what you want to grow: Beetroot, Broccoli, Cabbage, Cauliflowers, Brussel sprouts, Kohlrabi, Kale, Silverbeet, Spinach, Leeks, Lettuce, Parsley, Florence fennel, Early White onions., Chives, Chinese Cabbage, Radish, Swedes, Mustard, Turnips, Coriander, Rocket, Mizuna, Pak Choy. Many of these seeds will be available on the night from our organic seed bank for a small cost.

We suggest planting organic non-hybrid or heirloom seeds, as you can then save the seeds for the future. These can be either purchased at local retailers, online or from our seed bank.

Life Member Paul Treasure was elected unopposed as our new President for 2015.



COUNCILLORS' COMMENT MARCH

One of the bad things about my new job is the lack of time I get to walk in the Park. On the other hand, the great thing about the new job is the time I now have to walk around Roleystone early in the morning.

It is a beautiful time of the day to enjoy walking around a beautiful community. I am always surprised by the number of other early risers that get up to run, walk their dogs or just stroll around enjoying the cool of the morning.

There is a great camaraderie between these early birds and it is surprising how much you learn about people in those quick chats on the footpath.

The 50mm of rain that fell at the end of January/early February has kept the bush looking great with the Marri blossom - one of the best I can recall in recent years. Not so good for trying to keep the gutters clear and the undergrowth from creeping up on buildings.

We have lots of places around Roleystone where homeowners have worked hard to create the buffer between bush and building or to separate the understorey from the trees, but we still have many houses that look as if people just think, "it won't happen to me".

As shown in many communities in metropolitan Perth and the southwest this year, it can and does happen!

I was staggered after speaking with some of the people that ended up around Northcliffe, either fighting the fires or working to support the frontline crews, just how huge the management effort is.

I guess it should have been obvious but once they started telling me about accommodation, transport, the amount of people needed to feed the crews, the air support and the time put in by professional staff in supporting the people living in these areas, we really need to do whatever we can to ensure these fires do not happen in our community. If you see anything suspicious call the Police on 131444.

Metropolitan Local Government Reform has taken up a lot of time in discussing the planning for the future of City of Armadale, Serpentine Jarrahdale and Shire of Murray over the last few years. The State Government has put the reform process on hold and we are still awaiting further clarification.

In the meantime, why not get up a little earlier for a walk around your community?

Compulsory Microchipping of Dogs

As of 1 November 2015 all dogs in the City of Armadale must be microchipped and registered.

The legislation has been introduced to promote responsible dog ownership and reduce the number of dogs abandoned or lost in the City. The microchipping and registration of dogs will allow the City to better manage dogs in the community and return these pets to their homes as soon as possible.

The City also strongly recommends that a tag with the owners contact details is attached to the collar to ensure family pets are easily identified.

Dog owners must also register all dogs over the age of three months, or owners could face a fine.

Registration costs are as follows:

Sterilised dogs: \$20 per year or \$42.50 for three years or \$100 for a lifetime. (proof of sterilisation must be provided)

Unsterilised dogs: \$50 per year or \$120 for three years or \$250 for a lifetime.

Pensioner discount rates also apply upon producing an appropriate pension card.

Should your dog go missing, check the City's website for images of impounded dogs.

Bushfire Action Plans

Bushfires occur every summer and often start without warning. If you live in, or near, bushland developing and using a Bushfire Survival Plan is critical.

A Bushfire Survival Plan helps local residents take action and avoid making last-minute decisions that could prove deadly during a bushfire. "By now all residents should be aware that there have been dozens of fires in bushland around the Perth metropolitan area," said Armadale Mayor Henry Zelones.

"When developing your plan, decide if you will leave for a safer place, which may be the home of family or friends, or stay to actively defend your home. The plan also needs to take into account different circumstances and be based on the Fire Danger Rating.

"Homes are not designed or constructed to withstand fires started in

catastrophic fire weather conditions. You must decide in what conditions you will stay - if any - and when it would be best to leave. On these days you should put your survival first and leave early.

A Bushfire Survival Plan must be written down and practiced with every household member.

"Give everybody their own tasks and if you are on your own, you may like to develop your plan with a neighbour. Do not forget to think about what you will do with pets and livestock," said Mayor Zelones.

While everyone's Bushfire Survival Plan will be different, it needs to be flexible and cover a range of situations, including what to do if things go wrong. Conditions can change very quickly in a bushfire and often without warning, so a back-up plan is vital.

Practice your plan regularly and review it every year, keep it in an easy-to-find place and make sure everyone knows where it is.





Climbing Mountains David Bardsley

We have just climbed Bluff Knoll...again!

I must say that in a State which has little to offer in the way of mountains, Bluff Knoll stands out as an absolute gem.

To my way of thinking it's everything a mountain should be with towering sheer cliffs, a rocky exposed summit and no easy way to the top.

A great mountain doesn't have to be huge and at a tad over 1000 metres Bluff Knoll is hardly more than a pimple on the world scale. But its shape and disposition make up for its relatively diminutive size. We love it.

Each time we have exhausted ourselves on the steep climb, we have been rewarded with the sight of eagles soaring around, sometimes below us, always seeming at play on the thermals.

So far it has always given us a breath taking mountain top experience – and that has nothing to do with our panting lungs.

We don't have to go up mountains. It's something we choose to do, just as we choose to do lots of other things in life. I know that there are many folk who think us quite bonkers to put ourselves out in this way. I agree that doing this stuff is not a soft option. But then how else are you going to reap the rewards of an outstanding mountain experience?

In Switzerland we once took a cable car ride to the top of a genuinely huge mountain and although the views were magnificent, the overall experience wasn't a patch on today's expedition.

There was a lot of effort and more than a spoonful of discomfort involved today!

Whilst trying to avoid the cliché that "there's no gain without pain", it does seem to me that nothing really worthwhile is achieved without a modicum of effort and discomfort. Climbing mountains is essentially a personal experience and the rewards are very personal too. But the same principle applies to putting yourself out for other people – enduring some discomfort and putting in some effort so somebody else will be better off. That's definitely not a personal thing with purely personal benefits. And it's not a soft option in the grand scheme of things either. Sometimes the tangible rewards are less than magnificent but the intangible rewards are out of this world!

Life is full of choices and so often the attraction of the soft option is overwhelming, particularly when faced with the opportunity of doing something for somebody else's sake. Why should I put myself out and when I can sit back and enjoy "the good life" from the comfort and security of my favourite armchair? Will they appreciate what its cost me? Let them stand on their own two feet or let some other nut put themselves out.

There's more than a touch of a common subculture in this way of thinking and it's one which robs folk of many rewarding experiences. Reaping the rewards of "loving your neighbour" doesn't come from sitting back and letting somebody else do the business.

Jesus illustrated the sacrificial element of helping others when he told the story of a foreign alien who put himself out to help somebody in trouble by the roadside, after a couple of so-called nice people had taken the soft option and avoided the guy in the gutter.

The foreigner has gone down in history and everybody knows him as the Good Samaritan. The people I remember with affection are folk like that. And so does the God that I know and call Father. I believe he smiles on us every time we shun the soft option to help somebody else. And a smile from God is worth infinitely more than any mountain top experience I can think of! Yours in Christ



I have had a very interesting month keeping busy with our precious wildlife. My most recent admission is a beautiful Boobook Owl that was found caught in a barbed

wire fence, freed, taken to a vet and then passed to me. Over the past few days the little darling has taloned me on numerous occasions whilst I have been cleaning his box and trying to feed and give him water and medication. Gloves don't work as it is virtually impossible to have the control required for his care. I have been wrapping him in a towel with just his head out but somehow he manages to wriggle and free at least one foot to talon me and whilst I am trying to detach the talons from my hand the other foot usually manages to get free so that I

get double taloned!

Other admissions include a bandicoot brought into the person's house by the cat. Sadly, despite treatment and medication the poor thing died within two days. Cat bites and saliva are killers to wildlife and usually end badly.

I have also admitted a variety of birds some of which were cat or dog attacks. Some were poisoned by snail bait, some were roads hits and others seemed not to have developed their flying skills sufficiently before embarking on adventures.

The Armadale Wildflower Society March is our 54th Birthday

"At a public meeting held in the Armadale Hall on Tuesday 12th of March 1961 at 8pm, Mr E Watts moved a motion that a Wildflower Society be formed and be named "The Armadale-Kelmscott Wildflower Society". The motion was carried."

So the Armadale branch of the Western Australian Wildflower Society was born - only 3 years after the main branch was established in 1958 but its roots can be traced back to 1924 when the WA Naturalists Club was founded.

While members of the WA Naturalists Club by definition had general interest in all things to do with nature, individual members had specific enthusiasms. This ensured that within the Naturalists Club there was an identifiable group dedicated to the interests of the state's plants. It was these enthusiasts who were responsible for the displays of wildflowers at the annual Royal Show.

They grew concerned at the scale and rapidity of the clearing of land for agricultural purposes evident after the Second World War. The development of the bulldozer, enabled post-war land clearing to burgeon. This resulted in the formation of the Wildflower Society of Western Australia in 1958.

Successive WA governments have endeavoured to balance development and conservation; an almost impossible task. The Wildflower Society has played an important part in an appreciation of the natural environment. The faint murmurs of dissent of forty years ago are now mighty roars when local or state authorities misread public opinion and upset this balance.

In the Armadale district a branch of the Tree Society of Western Australia was established and extended to the formation of the Armadale/Kelmscott Wildflower Society. Many prominent citizens were present at the formation meeting on 12th March 1961. The initiative for the formation of the Society came from

the conservationists of the district. These included: Rev Ewan Watts of the Uniting Church; Mrs Rogerson, a local lover of wildflowers; and Michael Morcombe, then a young but talented nature photographer, and of course, many others.

The establishment of a local flora sanctuary was an early focus for members. With the support of the Road Board, the Society commenced work developing an area of about half an acre (0.2 hectares) on the corner of Orchard Avenue and Jull Street. The sanctuary was named "Minnawarra" and received much attention during the first year or two of the Society.

Paths were laid, beds were graded, and native flora planted. Kangaroo paws and other understorey plants collected from the district were a feature.

The sanctuary was opened on the 10th June 1961; a great effort for a group that was only formed ten weeks earlier. The new Armadale Council building is located on the original site, but some of the trees planted in 1961 are still there.

At a committee meeting held on 7th April 1963 members decided to approach the Shire of Armadale for the use of some Government land in Bedfordale. So began the Society's association with what became known as Reserve No. 4561, and (now known as Bungendore Park). After many letters back and forth and much unofficial lobbying the 450.8378 hectares was finally vested in the local authority. The Shire set up a committee to manage the Reserve on its behalf. The Wildflower Society had a significant membership on the initial Management Committee of the Reserve.

During a ceremony on 10th June 1972 (nine years after negotiations had commenced to obtain the Reserve), Mr Cyril Rushton, MLA for Dale, stated that the park would become as significant to the Armadale district as Kings Park had become to Perth. The question of a suitable name for the Reserve was also raised at the planting ceremony. Later that same month, in a letter to the Shire the Society suggested that the Reserve be called Bungendore Park; 'bungendore' being an aboriginal word meaning 'place of gum blossom'. In the Government Gazette of 7th September 1973 the Reserve became officially Bungendore Park.

Minnawarra and Bungendore are just 2 of many parks and reserves the Society has been involved in and still is.

Some of the names of the founding people may be familiar - they are still members of the Society as are many of the original Bungendore Committee members.




